PARIS (TIP): France rolled out the red carpet, July 13, to welcome Donald Trump on a presidential visit laden with military pomp that the White House hopes will offer respite from a growing scandal back home.

The US president's brief 24-hour trip to the French capital coincides with celebrations for Bastille Day, France's national day which is marked on Friday, and the 100th anniversary of US involvement in World War I.

Remove country quotas for green cards: Lawmaker

WASHINGTON (TIP): An influential American lawmaker has called for the removal of country-specific quotas for green cards in the US, saying the system was unjust for people from countries like India and China.

Republican Congressman Kevin Yoder from Kansas yesterday became the lead sponsor of the Fairness for High-Skilled Immigrants Act.

NEW DELHI (TIP): After the Donald Trump administration's intended tightening of the work visa rules that has come as a blow to the Indian IT companies, the US government's latest announcement to delay the so-called "startup" visa could impact Indian entrepreneurs. The visa program was approved in January by the then Barack Obama administration and was meant to allow foreign entrepreneurs who started companies in the US to live in that country - a longstanding demand of the Silicon Valley. 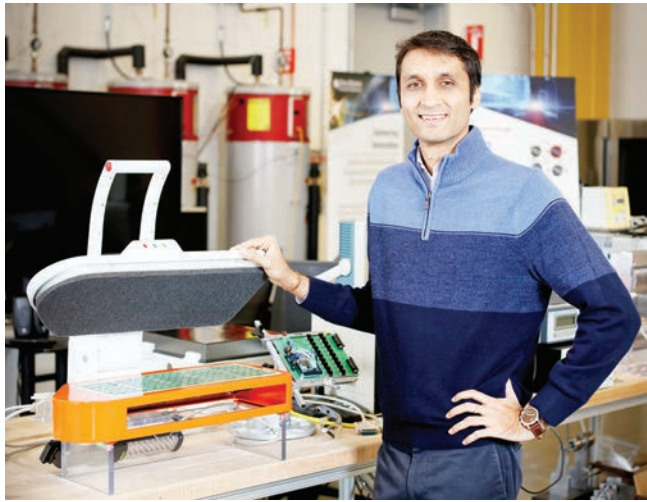
Man Trapped Inside Texas A.T.M. for 3 Hours Rescued by Police

CORPUS CHRISTI, TX (TIP): Just after 2 p.m. Wednesday, July 13, a person in Corpus Christi, Tex., had just completed a transaction at a Bank of America A.T.M. when a surprise slid through the receipt slot.

"Please help," read a handwritten note on a thin strip of paper. "I'm stuck in here, and I don't have my phone."

The person, whose age and gender the authorities did not provide, did not know quite what to do. But it so happened that a Corpus Christi police officer was driving by, so the person went a step beyond what other A.T.M. users had been willing to do and flagged down the officer. *contd on page 3*

Indian-American researcher invents Ultrasonic dryer that dries clothes without heat



Viral jumped into three energy efficiency projects almost immediately after starting at the lab as a postdoctoral researcher

NEW YORK (TIP): An Indian-American researcher has invented a dryer that could easily dry clothes even without heat. Viral Patel along with his team at Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Tennessee have invented a dryer that could laundry your clothes much faster. Expected to be five times more energy efficient, 'Ultrasonic dryer' could dry a large load of clothes in about half the time.

Viral Patel came to Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) with the aim of conducting research that would provide benefits to the average consumer. Viral began his studies after moving from Zambia to the United States for college. As an undergraduate at the Illinois Institute of Technology, he started out in aerospace engineering. But after taking a course in thermal systems design, he decided to broaden his horizons and career opportunities with a dual major in mechanical engineering.

Viral jumped into three energy efficiency projects almost immediately after starting at the lab as a postdoctoral researcher in the Energy and Transportation Science Division in 2015, working on development of two clothes dryers (one ultrasonic and the other thermoelectric) and a new, more efficient rotating heat exchanger for refrigerator applications.

Outside the lab, Viral enjoys reading science fiction, loves to cook and travel, and spends time with friends and family. His family is spread across the globe now-on both US coasts, back in Zambia, and in Australia.

Indian American Charged with Defrauding Medicare and Medicaid Programs of \$9 Million

NEW YORK (TIP): Sunita Kumar, an Indian American Brooklyn based pharmacy owner/operator has been charged with defrauding Medicare and Medicaid programs of approximately \$9 Million.

Joon H. Kim, the Acting United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, announced the unsealing of a criminal Complaint charging defendant Sunita Kumar with operating a health care fraud scheme utilizing two pharmacies in Brooklyn, New York, through which KUMAR submitted approximately \$9 million in fraudulent claims to Medicaid and Medicare. KUMAR was arrested July 10 morning and was presented in Manhattan federal court before U.S. Magistrate Judge Andrew J. Peck.

Attorney Joon H. Kim said: "As alleged, Sunita Kumar defrauded Medicare and Medicaid, public programs to assist the indigent and the elderly, by submitting \$9 million in fraudulent claims. She allegedly did so by inducing people to surrender their own prescriptions and forego their medications in exchange for kickbacks. Medicare and Medicaid provide critical health care for some of our most vulnerable citizens. Together with our law enforcement partners, we will aggressively pursue those who allegedly use public programs as a vehicle for illegal personal profit."

Kumar, 54, of Old Westbury, New York, is charged with one count of health care fraud, which carries a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison, and one count of paying illegal remuneration in the form of kickbacks, which carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison.

Indian American professor Neomi Rao to lead White House regulation agency

WASHINGTON (TIP): On July 10, 2017, the U.S. Senate confirmed Neomi Rao, associate professor at the Antonin Scalia Law School at GeorgeMason University as Administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs, an agency within the White House Office of Management and Budget. She is the first Indian-American to head the important Office in the White House.

Rao's confirmation was welcomed by top American lawmakers.

"As regulatory czar for federal policymaking, Director Rao will play an instrumental role in helping the President fulfill his promise to roll back unnecessary red tape and unleash the full potential of the American economy," said Senator Orrin Hatch, senior member and former Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Hatch said he looks forward to working with Rao to ensure that federal rules and regulations are narrowly tailored to address pressing public health and safety concerns while also leaving plenty of room for job creators and entrepreneurs to expand and flourish.

Rao worked on Senator's staff several years ago.

Senator Ron Johnson, chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, applauded Senate for confirming Rao's nomination.

"We can all agree that federal regulations should achieve their aim without imposing unnecessary costs on

the country's economy and job creators. I look forward to working with Professor Rao to reduce the burden of regulations - by our best estimates as high as USD 2 trillion a year - that weigh on the American economy," Johnson said.

Senator John Hoeven said as the head of OIRA, Rao is going to play a vital role in helping to provide regulatory relief and make the country more competitive.

"Further, I appreciate her commitment to work with me to ensure public-private partnerships receive fair treatment by OMB and the Army Corps," he said.

"In order for our nation to continue to compete around the globe, we need to have a cost-effective, pro-growth regulatory environment," Hoeven said.

Senator Deb Fischer hoped that in her role as the nation's top regulatory official, Rao will focus on eliminating the misguided federal regulations harming Nebraska families and communities.

"Cutting through reams of government red tape has long been a priority of mine and I look forward to working with Rao to continue to do so," Fischer said.

Described by The Washington Post as a "superlative pick", Rao at the George Mason University founded and directs the Center for the Study of the Administrative State.

Rao's research and teaching focuses on constitutional and administrative law.

Rao's scholarship is informed by her service in all three branches of the federal government. Prior to joining the Law School, she served as Associate Counsel and Special Assistant to President George W. Bush. Professor Rao also served as counsel to the U.S. Senate Committee on the Judiciary, where she was responsible for judicial nominations and constitutional law issues. In between government service, Professor Rao practiced in the London office of Clifford Chance LLP, specializing in public international law and arbitration. She clerked for Judge J. Harvie Wilkinson III on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit and for Justice Clarence Thomas on the U.S. Supreme Court. She was a visiting professor at the University of Minnesota Law School in fall 2013.

Indian American Nat Geo winner travels to Iceland

WASHINGTON (TIP): Indian American student Madhuri Molleti of Madison has won the 2017 National Geographic Mundo Explorer Competition and embarked on a travel to Iceland.

DIRECTV and Nat Geo Mundo recently announced the 2017 winner of the Nat Geo Mundo Explorer competition - a unique travel program offering students the opportunity to go into the field with National Geographic photographers, scientists and writers. The competition was created to provide four deserving students (two from the United States and two from Latin America) the opportunity to explore the subarctic island nation of Iceland and learn the basics of climate change.

Man Trapped Inside Texas A.T.M...

The officer, like previous bank patrons, initially thought the note was a joke - some sort of "Candid Camera"-type prank that no one wanted to fall for.

But then the officer approached the A.T.M., and when he listened closely, he could hear a faint sound.

This was how the police came to discover a man who had been trapped for hours inside an A.T.M., said Gena Pena, a spokeswoman for the Corpus Christi Police Department.

"Honestly, we can't say it's never happened," Ms. Pena said in an interview on Thursday. "But 95 percent of people will have their phone on them," she added, and for about three hours, she said, this man did not.

How does one become stuck inside an A.T.M. in the first place? Ms. Pena said it happened this way:

The A.T.M. was affixed to a bank, which was under construction, so no employees were inside. The A.T.M., though, was operational. And somewhere on the site, a door led into what Ms. Pena called an "A.T.M. vault" - a room from which a person can service a teller machine from the inside.

A worker arrived on Wednesday to repair the "locking mechanism" of the room, Ms. Pena said. The door shut behind the worker, and somehow, she said, the man locked himself in.

The worker, whom the police did not identify, had left his phone inside a vehicle. But once he realized that people were using the A.T.M., the man began slipping notes out the receipt slot, a solution Ms. Pena thought was "pretty ingenious."

Unfortunately for the man, several A.T.M. users who got a note thought they were being pranked and apparently did nothing.

"He was kind of upset," Ms. Pena said of the contract worker.

Indeed, the man would later tell the police that he had been screaming for help. Something about the room, though, must have muffled the sound, Ms. Pena said.

The contractor "didn't think this was going to happen, obviously," Ms. Pena said. "I feel bad for him."

Soon you'll be able to openly carry a sword in Texas

AUSTIN, TX (TIP): Starting this fall, adults in Texas can openly carry knives with blades longer than 5.5 inches.

In fact, swords, spears, daggers, sabers, bowie knives and machetes are all perfectly fine to tote around. Pretty much anything you can whip out in a Dungeons and Dragons battle is fair game.

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott signed the bill into law last month, but it doesn't go into effect until September 1.

Under the existing law knives with blades longer than 5.5 inches could be purchased but not carried -- with only limited exceptions.

There are some places where the new law won't apply -- including schools, prisons, hospitals, amusement parks or places of worship. Long blades are still banned at sports events. And you can't bring your sword into a bar, either. The tiny colorful plastic ones that you stick on top of a cocktail, however, are under 5.5 inches, so those are still OK. "House Bill 1935 provides a common sense solution by prohibiting any knife with a blade over five-and-a-half inches in certain location restricted areas," Rep. John Frullo, the Republican representative from Lubbock who authored the bill, told CNN in a statement.

Texas now joins Montana and Oklahoma. Both have both passed laws



lifting their bans on certain bladed weapons, including swords.

The legislation stalled in May after a man was accused of using a hunting knife to kill one student and wound three others at the University of Texas at Austin. Frullo postponed debate on the legislation until a week later -- but stood by his bill.

"It's not making criminals out of people who have no intention of

creating some type of criminal act," Frullo told CNN affiliate Spectrum News in Austin at the time. Knife Rights, a national advocacy organization, supported the legislation but said there is still a way to go to strike "those last remaining minor knife restrictions in Texas."

"We won't stop until Texas is as free as everyone thinks Texas is," the group wrote in a statement on its website.

ACLU'S Jameel Jaffer to Direct Knight First Amendment Institute at Columbia University

NEW YORK (TIP): Jameel Jaffer, deputy legal director at the ACLU, has been named the founding director of the Knight First Amendment Institute at Columbia University. In May, Columbia and the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation announced the creation of the new institute which will work-through litigation, research and public advocacy-to preserve and expand the freedoms of expression and the press in the digital age.

"We're at a moment in our history when freedom of expression, access to information and high quality journalism have never been more important, yet are facing unprecedented challenges," said Columbia University President Lee C. Bollinger, a noted First Amendment legal scholar. "No one understands that better than Jameel Jaffer. Throughout his accomplished career, Jameel has proven himself to be among the First Amendment's most effective defenders and we could hardly have a more ideal founding director of the Knight Institute at Columbia."

Since he joined the staff of the ACLU in 2002, Jaffer has litigated some of the most significant post-9/11 cases relating to national security and civil liberties, among

them: constitutional challenges to gag orders imposed under the USA Patriot Act, surveillance conducted by the National Security Agency, the viewpoint-based denial of visas to foreign scholars, and the sealing of judicial opinions issued by the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court. He has argued cases at all levels of the federal court system, including in the U.S. Supreme Court, and has testified before Congress about a variety of topics relating to national security and civil liberties. Jaffer is also one of the nation's leading Freedom of Information Act attorneys, having litigated landmark cases that resulted in the publication of crucial documents about the U.S. government's counter-terrorism policies.

"The digital age has brought us a wealth of new ways to communicate, but digital technology is also vulnerable to surveillance and control. At the same time, news organizations have fewer resources to fight for access to government records and defend free expression," said Alberto Ibarguen, president of Knight Foundation. "Jameel Jaffer's integrity, intellect and collaborative nature make him the right leader for a new organization. His experience at the intersection of law and

technology make him the forward-looking legal strategist the Institute needs to select-and win- precedent-setting battles."

He also directed the ACLU's litigation relating to the NSA surveillance programs that Snowden disclosed.

Kumar, who will take on the NDA candidate and former Bihar governor RN Kovind, had called up AAP national convenor Arvind Kejriwal and sought his support, senior party leader Sanjay Singh said.

"The election of President and Vice President should be above partisan politics and we would have preferred a consensus candidate. But in the present circumstances, we prefer a strong and united opposition," Singh said.

Kumar is the candidate of the combined opposition but parties such as JD-U and BSP have declared their support for Kovind. The opposition, led by the Congress, had kept AAP leaders away from the multi-party deliberations for deciding their presidential candidate.

**Govt needs math tutor: Rahul
taunts RBI for not finishing
scrapped note counting**

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Congress on July 13 (Thursday) took a dig at the RBI for still counting banned currency notes, with Rahul Gandhi saying the government is looking for a mathematics teacher and one should apply to the PMO soon.

"GOI looking for a Math tutor. Please apply to PMO ASAP," Gandhi said on Twitter, while tagging a news report quoted to Urjit Patel, the RBI governor, saying the central bank is still counting demonetised notes.

Earlier, senior party leader P Chidambaram took a jibe at the RBI for buying note-counting machines eight months after demonetisation and asked the federal bank if it had heard of "leasing" equipment.

"RBI buying note counting machines 8 months after demonetisation! Has RBI not heard of 'leasing'," he tweeted.

Chidambaram also poked fun at the NDA's Mudra scheme, which the government claims has provided self-employment opportunities to over 7 crore people, especially the youth.

"7.28 crore youth self-employed under MUDRA loan scheme' -- that is title of mythological serial beginning today. Scriptwriters may apply," he posted on Twitter today.

The former finance minister has been critical of the government's demonetisation decision and has said it has hit the country's economy and growth prospects.

RBI Governor Urjit Patel, while

**Al-Qaida in Indian subcontinent
getting more active: US experts**

WASHINGTON/NEW DELHI (TIP): Al-Qaida is getting more active in the Indian subcontinent and by 2017, it boasted several hundred members, with its cells mostly in Afghanistan and its operatives flourishing in Bangladesh, counter-terrorism experts have told the US lawmakers.

"By 2017, al-Qaida in the Indian Subcontinent boasted several hundred members and had cells in Afghanistan's Helmand, Kandahar, Zabul, Paktika, Ghazni, and Nuristan Provinces. Al-Qaida's presence in Afghanistan was almost certainly larger and more expansive than five or even ten years before," said Seth G Jones, a strategic expert.

He was speaking during his Congressional testimony before the House Homeland Security Subcommittee on Counterterrorism and Intelligence on Thursday.

This expansion, Jones said, may have been partly due to Taliban advances in Afghanistan and al-Qaida's relationship with operatives from the Taliban and other groups, such as Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan and Lashkar-e Jhangvi.

"Al-Qaida operatives in Bangladesh were particularly active, conducting a range of attacks. In addition, al-Qaida in the Indian subcontinent conducted a steady propaganda campaign from its media arm As-Sahab," he said.

However, the group conducted few attacks in Afghanistan or Pakistan and was largely irrelevant in the Taliban-led insurgency, Jones said.

In September 2014, al-Qaida leader Ayman al-Zawahiri had announced the creation of regional affiliate al-Qaida in the Indian subcontinent, taking advantage of sanctuaries in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Bangladesh.

"A new branch of al-Qaida was established - Qaida al-Jihad in the Indian subcontinent, seeking to raise the flag of jihad,...and



return the Islamic rule across the Indian subcontinent," al-Zawahiri had said.

The group was led by Asim Umar-- an Indian and former member of Harkat-ul-Jihad al-Islami - a Pakistan-based terrorist group with branches across the Indian subcontinent. Umar was flanked by Abu Zar, his first deputy.

In October 2015, US and Afghan forces targeted a large training camp in Kandahar Province, killing over one hundred operatives linked to al-Qaida in the Indian Subcontinent, Rhodes said.

According to Katherine Zimmerman, research fellow, American Enterprise Institute, the al-Qaida presence in the Indian subcontinent remains weak after Ayman al-Zawahiri announced the launch of a new affiliate in September 2014.

Monsoon session

Oppn to corner govt on GST, farm suicides

NEW DELHI (TIP): The government will face a united Opposition in Parliament as the monsoon session begins this Monday.

Led by the Congress, 17 Opposition parties, which recently fielded Gopalkrishna Gandhi as their joint candidate for the August 5 Vice-Presidential poll, will also coordinate on Parliament strategy issues mainly on "political vendetta against non-NDA leaders and the grim internal and border security situation".

TMC leader in the Rajya Sabha Derek O'Brien said the Opposition discussed the need to corner the government on vendetta, GST consequences and demonetisation, farmers' suicides, lynchings, and security scenario in the coming session from July 17.

"The meeting of 18 Opposition parties to discuss the VP poll candidate lasted 90 minutes on July 11. Of the 90 minutes, 15 minutes went in finalising the name of Gopalkrishna Gandhi. Later, we discussed the ongoing political and security situation, vendetta against Opposition leaders, GST, and farmers' suicides. It was decided to coordinate a floor strategy inside Parliament and attack the government outside through the social media on these issues," Derek O'Brien said.

SC gives govt a week to decide on giving voting rights to NRIs

NEW DELHI (TIP): Pulling up the Centre, the Supreme Court on July 14 allowed one last chance that is to tell by next Friday as to how it planned to allow 25 million Non-Resident Indians (NRIs) across the world to participate in Indian elections through e-vote.

A bench of Chief Justice J S Khehar and Justice D Y Chandrachud asked the Centre to make it clear within one week if it planned to amend the Act or concerned Rules under the Representation of People's Act.

"This is a petition of 2014. Every year you keep saying we will amend we will amend. You said this in 2014, 15, 16 and again..this is not the way a government works", an angry CJI Khehar told the Central government's counsel.

At the outset, former Attorney General Mukul Rohatgi, appearing against the Centre for the first time after quitting the AG post questioned the Centre's delay in making the necessary changes to allow NRIs to vote and said 'they are only buying time by saying they need to amend the Act while they only need to change the rules which is a simple process.'

"They allow Armed forces personal to vote other defence personal all through postal ballot etc only to NRIs most of them from Kerala they say you come to India and vote" Rohatgi told the bench. In December last a bench headed by then Chief Justice T S Thakur enquired about the latest stand of the union government after senior advocate Kapil Sibal appearing for a petitioner said one and a half years ago the Centre had accepted the Election Commission's (EC) proposal in this regard, claimed it formulated a draft bill and told the court that steps are being taken to get the Representation of People Act 1951 amended but things have not moved much.

"Senior counsel appearing for the Union of India seeks time to take instructions whether any amendment to the Representation of People



Act, 1950 and 1951 is proposed in terms of the recommendations received from the Election Commission in so far as the Notification of NRI's as special voters is concerned, if so, the status of such process may be informed within 8 weeks", the CJI said in the order.

Once e-vote is allowed, NRIs will not have to fly home to vote.

Responding to the PILs, the EC had ruled out the possibility of allowing NRIs to vote through the Internet or at diplomatic missions abroad for the time being. But it said e-postal ballot system has almost no risk of manipulation, rigging or violation of secrecy.

The government had on July 8, last year told the court that it has "in principle" approved e-ballot voting for Indian passport holders abroad, recommended by the Election Commission in a report, and it would have the process in place after making necessary amendments to the Representation of the Peoples Act, 1951, that dealt with elections in the country.

"The recommendation has been accepted in letter and spirit, and a committee had been set up to devise the modalities of its implementation", Additional Solicitor General P L Narasimha representing the Centre had said on that day.

SC then directed the government to enable e-voting by NRIs within two months after effecting the amendments.

EXPLOSIVE RECOVERED FROM UP ASSEMBLY, YOGI CLAIMS 'TERROR CONSPIRACY'

NEW DELHI (TIP): Uttar Pradesh chief minister Yogi Adityanath said on July 14 (Friday) that the "white powder" recovered from the state Legislative Assembly on July 12 was an explosive substance and claimed there may be a "terror conspiracy" afoot.

Citing a forensic report which confirmed that the white powder was the extremely powerful plastic explosive Pentaerythritol Tetranitrate or PETN, Yogi Adityanath called the incident a major security lapse and demanded an National Intelligence Agency (NIA) probe into the matter.

"This is PETN, a highly explosive substance was found in the assembly. Action must be taken against those involved. How can we allow anyone to compromise the security of 403 MLAs? NIA must investigate this," the chief minister said in the state assembly on Friday.

"Strong security system must be established as this could be a terror conspiracy," he said.

Earlier, Yogi Adityanath had called a high level meeting to review the security measures in the assembly in light of Thursday's incident. He told all MLAs present that everyone needs to be cautious and make sure to follow security guidelines. He also said that police should carry out background checks for all workers in the state assembly.

SILVERSTONE (TIP): Missing India, and pining for a pit lane he can visit only once a year? Not a bit of it, says embattled Formula One team owner Vijay Mallya.

The flamboyant businessman, currently fighting a high-profile Indian extradition request, speaks instead of 'enjoying the fruits' of his labours on track and planning high-flying Force India's next decade.

He is also, despite the court appearances and travel restrictions, still living the good life and enjoying a summer of sport.

Horse racing at Royal Ascot, the Wimbledon tennis championships and Champions Trophy cricket have all been on his social diary, along with Wednesday's Formula One promotional event in London.

"There's nothing to miss," the 61-year-old told Reuters at the British Grand Prix when asked if he missed India.

"All my immediate family is either in England or the US. Nobody in India at all. As far as my step-siblings are concerned, they are all UK citizens. So there's nothing family-wise to miss." India is seeking Mallya's extradition over \$1.4 billion that the authorities say he owes as a result of loans tied to his defunct Kingfisher Airlines. Mallya has dismissed the charges against him.

INDIA TO PURSUE DIPLOMATIC CHANNELS WITH CHINA

NEW DELHI (TIP): India on Thursday said it would continue to use "diplomatic channels" with China to resolve the face-off between soldiers from the two nations in western Bhutan.

As the face-off continued for the 26th day, Spokesperson of the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) Gopal Baglay said, "We have diplomatic channels available and we will continue to use those channels."

Baglay noted that the MEA had issued a press release on June 30, articulating its views on the way to resolve the face-off. New Delhi's position has not changed, he said on Thursday, adding that Prime Minister Narendra Modi, too, had a conversation with Chinese President Xi Jinping during the G20 summit at Hamburg and they had covered "a range of issues". "I can certainly say that the approach that we had underlined and put out at the end of the last month continues," Baglay said.

National Security Advisor Ajit Doval is likely to be in Beijing on July 27 and 28 to attend a meeting with his counterparts from other BRICS (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa) nations.

Indian scientists discover supercluster of galaxies

NEW DELHI (TIP): A team of Indian astronomers has discovered an extremely large supercluster of galaxies, as big as 20 million billion suns, which they have named Saraswati, Pune-based Inter University Centre for Astronomy and Astrophysics (IUCAA) said on July 13.

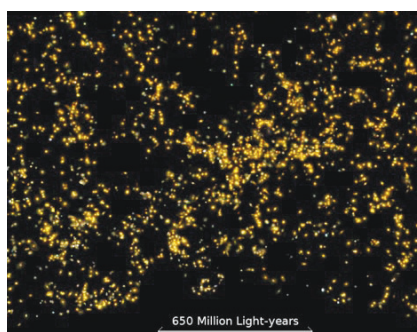
This is one of the largest known structures in the neighbourhood of the universe, 4,000 million light-years away from Earth and roughly more than 10 billion years old, IUCAA said.

Its mass extends over the scale of 600 million light years, it said.

Scientists of this institute were also involved in the path-breaking discovery of gravitational waves last year.

The supercluster was discovered by Shishir Sankhyayan, a PhD student at the Indian Institute of Science Education and Research (IISER), Pune, Pratik Dabhade, IUCAA research fellow, Joe Jacob of the Newman College, Kerala, and Prakash Sarkar of the National Institute of Technology, Jamshedpur.

Their findings were published in the latest issue of The Astrophysical



Journal, the premier research journal of the American Astronomical Society.

"Superclusters are the largest coherent structures in the cosmic web. They are a chain of galaxies and galaxy clusters, bound by gravity, often stretching to several hundred times the size of clusters of galaxies, consisting of tens of thousands of galaxies," the IUCAA said in a statement.

Sankhyayan said this "newly-discovered Saraswati supercluster" extends over a scale of 600 million light-years and may contain the mass equivalent of over 20 million billion suns.

A cluster could roughly have galaxies ranging from 1,000 to 10,000. A supercluster could have clusters ranging from 40 to 43, he added.

"Our own galaxy is part of a supercluster called the Laniakea supercluster," the IUCAA said.

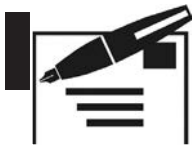
Joydeep Bagchi from IUCAA, the lead author of the paper in the journal, and co-author Sankhyayan said they were "astonished to spot this giant wall-like supercluster of galaxies", visible in a large spectroscopic survey of distant galaxies, known as the Sloan Digital Sky Survey.

Sankhyayan said the data was then analysed, following which the discovery was made.

"This supercluster is clearly embedded in a large network of cosmic filaments traced by clusters and large voids," Bagchi said.

He said previously "only a few comparatively large superclusters" had been reported, such as the Shapley Concentration or the Sloan Great Wall in the nearby universe.

CENSOR BOARD ON RAMPAGE: POLICING CONTENT INCONVENIENT TO GOVT

The template for the Censor Board was set a few months after the BJP stormed to power in Delhi. So, it should be no surprise that Amartya Sen, one of the earliest critics of the government's alternative vision of India, should find himself at the receiving end of its ministrations. A documentary on the Nobel laureate has been asked to mute all words anathema to the Modi government: cow, Gujarat and Hindutva. Pahlaj Nihalani's appointment as the Censor Board chief was payback time for a loyal home boy. After all, his CV boasts of a six-minute campaign video "Har Modi, Ghar Modi" for the 2014 general election.

Since then Nihalani has not disappointed his mentors and played their political game, albeit with unapologetic stupidity ever since he took over from Leela Samson. It needs to be recalled that Leela Samson quit protesting against "unbearable pressure" to clear a movie by self-proclaimed saint Gurmit Ram Rahim who paid back with crucial political support to the BJP in Haryana and the Akali-BJP in Punjab. In a blatant act of door-keeping for the government, Nihalani had earlier stopped the certification of a film on the 2013 Muzaffarnagar riots that paved the way for the BJP's electoral sweep in western UP. The Modi government appointee is not just policing political content. He is also bearing down on liberal and broader exploration of issues of gender, sexuality, religion and communalism.

In other words, the Censor Board's axe can fall on any view that strays from the Sangh Parivar's narrow definition of an ideal society. So, Lipstick Under My Burqa was deemed "too lady oriented" and Oscar-nominate Danish Girl "unsuitable for children." Besides the danger of the government discouraging a scrutiny of its actions, which is the lifeblood of any democracy, technology has outpaced censorship. Documentaries, unlike Bollywood movies, pick up their audiences from online views and the film circuit in Western Europe. Even if the Amartya Sen documentary was completely banned, it would still be viewed and should recoup the investment. The only upshot is that India starts looking like a pale shadow of the countries it criticizes.

Institutional equilibrium weakens: A dangerous arrogance of power sets in

Quietly and perhaps unsuspectingly we are entering a potentially dangerous period in our polity. Not because we have reason to entertain continuous anxiety on our nation's borders, not because the external environment is deteriorating to our disadvantage, but because internal institutional equations are about to change in a manner that would upset the democratic polity's equanimity.

To begin with, in another seven days we shall know who would be the new Head of our Republic. Barring potential subversion on an extremely large scale, Ram Nath Kovind should be the new tenant of that sprawling real estate property atop the Raisina Hill. The change of tenancy will have its consequences. The equation between the President and the Prime Minister has always been subject to considerable modification and negotiation after every change of players; and, though Rashtrapati Bhavan is not a rival center of power, its occupant -any occupant - can be a source of irritation and frustration for any Prime Minister. Hence, the importance of next week's presidential poll on the quality of the Prime Minister's control and power of the Delhi sultanate.

It is widely accepted by New Delhi's political cognoscenti that Ram Nath Kovind is Prime Minister Narendra Modi's personal choice; moreover, it is further suggested that in opting for him, the Prime Minister has cocked a snook at the RSS impresarios, who had different ideas. The RSS-Narendra Modi relationship is up for a revision.

Like Atal Bihari Vajpayee before him, Modi too has sought to gain a kind of upper hand in the patron-client relationship that defines the RSS-BJP symbiosis. The heart of the matter is that there is an inherent conflict between a prime minister's constitutional obligations and a swayamsevak's oath of allegiance to this "cultural body", with its headquarters in Nagpur. Prime Minister Vajpayee was clear from the very beginning that his constitutional responsibilities and duties would take precedence over the RSS' expectations and demands; but he had to pay a certain price for clarity and conviction. Modi has played a subtler hand of cultivated ambiguity, humoring the RSS once in a while. But then it is in the nature of office that, sooner or later, a prime minister has to draw a line - for himself and for the Nagpur bosses.

In opting for Kovind, Modi has drawn a line. This has not gone unnoticed or unresented by the parent body. For a BJP prime minister, the RSS is the elephant in the room and it cannot be ignored. From a different perspective it would appear to be rather ironic that a hope ought to be pinned on a body like the RSS to keep in check a rampant prime minister.

dealing with friends and foes. Though Pranab Mukherjee was not a difficult President for Prime Minister Modi, nonetheless he could not be called a rubber stamp. Prime Minister Modi or his advisers certainly could not take President Mukherjee for granted - an option that is now open to the Prime Minister. A vital equation in the national power grid will stand definitely tilted, in favor of the Prime Minister.

Not only a pocket President, next month the Prime Minister will also be able to get a Vice-President of his choice. Whatever little space the Opposition was able to claim for itself in the Rajya Sabha would get drastically curtailed. And, all said and done, Hamid Ansari did not deny himself the pulpit, from where he spoke out in defense of republican values and democratic sensibilities. This minor source of irritation would also stand taken care of in less than a month's time.

And then, later in August, there will be a change of guard at the Supreme Court of India. Institutionally, the higher judiciary remains the only power center that is not easily amenable to the government's blandishments or brandishments. Of late certain mutedness seems to have crept in the judicial voice. Like any other institution, the judiciary's spunk is vitally dependent upon the moral fortitude of those who come to man the bench. On this count, there are rumors. Those who believe that a robust and vibrant judiciary remains a necessary condition for a functioning democracy do not feel all that sanguine. The ruling coterie will have less and less reason to worry about a judicial disapproval or rebuff.

Of course, there is the ruling party itself. For all its appearances as a modern political party, the BJP remains a closed affair. Since 2013, when Narendra Modi crowbarred his way to dominance with the BJP and then went on to graft democratic legitimacy over his leadership by winning the 2014 Lok Sabha poll, the party has allowed itself to be content with a very subordinate voice. The BJP president has no political persona outside Narendra Modi's shadow. There is no leader left who can be remotely thought of as a potential

challenger to Prime Minister Modi's hegemonic stewardship. Neither Vajpayee nor LK Advani ever enjoyed this kind of sway over the BJP; their leadership was collegiate and they found themselves constrained to share authority. Narendra Modi feels no such handicap.

Three other democratic institutions - Cabinet, bureaucracy, media - stand cheerfully self-emasculated. Never before was such a convergence of timidity and opportunism seen as now among these three institutions; there seems to be a veritable race to reduce themselves to the role of a spear-carrier for the Prime Minister.

The sum total of reconfiguration of these institutional equations can only set in motion objective conditions in which an authoritarian temptation becomes a tempting proposition. The Modi government is approaching a difficult phase, when all the promises and pretensions have not exactly worked out. Economically, the jobless growth has a very limited potential for electoral dividends. The entire business community - the corporates, traders, shopkeepers and consumers - is yet to regain its breath after being buffeted twice - first by the demonetization drama and now by the GST tantrums.

Politically, the Modi establishment has proved itself extremely competent and clever; it feels it has reduced the Gandhis and the Congress and other opposition parties to an ineffectual bunch; it feels doubly sure of its cleverness after having sold the demonetization joke to the masses; it feels it has the momentum - and, history - behind it.

There is a dangerous edge to this overconfidence. It is morphing itself into a sense of entitlement. Strong-headed leaders tend to arrogate to themselves an aura of inevitability and infallibility. A robust democracy should have available to itself institutions of accountability that ensure that no leader, however powerful and however popular, trips over his own web of megalomania.

Dilemma of a two-front war

"Obsessed with Pakistan, India has grossly neglected the real adversary. In point-to-point skirmishes and standoffs, battle-hardened Indian soldiers will deter, if not defeat, the PLA. However, across a broad front spectrum in an unlikely all-out war, it is advantage China", Says the author.

At a time when China is threatening to teach India another lesson and warning not to engage in a two-front conflict over the standoff in Doklam, our Service Chiefs, it seems, are not on the same page about fighting a two-front war especially as Beijing might try to emulate the New Delhi-Thimpu alliance in "disputed territory" with one with Islamabad in PoK. While General Bipin Rawat has more than once asserted the Army's preparedness for a two-front war, Air Chief Marshal BS Dhanoa has highlighted the critical shortfall in the number of fighter squadrons - 32 against the required 42 squadrons - to dominate a two-front conflict, saying: "It is akin to a cricket team playing with seven players instead of 11". The deficiency in air assets has existed for decades but this is the first time an Air Chief has related it to a two-front war.

The Chief of Naval Staff, Sunil Lanba, when asked about the disparity in preparedness of the services, said: "The way national security is being handled is not commensurate with the security environment which is extremely serious at the moment". Recently, Gen Rawat told a military audience that the military was not getting enough funds for modernization - repeated ad nauseum by every Chief - due to the perception that expenditure on defence is a burden on the economy. This set the cat among the pigeons as Finance Minister Arun Jaitley, a regular fill-in for Defence Minister, is believed to have told Gen Rawat: "Don't worry about funds. When you run out, call me". In the mid-1990s, when the Naval Shipyard order books had gone dry, CNS, admiral Vijay Shekhawat went public about the Navy's operational deficiencies, prompting Defence Minister Mulayam Singh Yadav to invite him to discuss dwindling fleet numbers. Ad hocism has become the hallmark of modernization of the military.

Power differential

The Chinese are constantly reminding India about the power differential - military, economic and infrastructural - between them. Being obsessed with Pakistan, India has grossly neglected the real adversary. The reason for this is the institutionalized absence of strategic thinking and higher political direction of war and conflict in the face of growing threats and challenges to internal

and external security. Prime Minister Modi's boast about big defence reforms is hollow: had he been serious about defence, he would have named a full-time Defence Minister. The appointment of a Chief of Defence Staff has not overcome the hesitation of history - read bureaucracy. The country has never produced a "Defence White Paper" or done a "Strategic Defence and Security" review. Something called the "Raksha Mantri's Directive" masquerades as higher political direction on deterrence and war. This bit of literature drafted by the military has its origin in 1983, with periodic face-lifts to make it contemporary.

The Parrikar doctrine covering surgical strikes was included in the Joint Military Doctrine, scripted by the Integrated Defence Staff, which attracted extraordinary flak from the defence community for being substandard. In its present organization, each service essentially fights single-service combat. In the last border skirmish at Kargil, the Army's operation was called Vijay while the IAF campaign in support was named Safed Saagar. So much for jointness. So the

Raksha Mantri's Directive passes off as political guidance by the highest echelons of government. When I once asked a former Air Chief how he evolved his service's span of responsibility, he replied: "Most of the time, from speeches made by the Prime Minister during the Combined Commanders' Conferences."

Are we surprised that while President Xi Jinping who heads the Central Military Commission, has personally ordered and supervised the reorganization of the combat formations facing India, reducing them from three commands to one command - a single Western Theatre Command headed by the powerful Gen Xhao Zongqi - the China front in India is managed by four Army and three Air commands deployed at seven locations.

Integrated command

A forward-looking proposal made by a defence committee recommending three integrated operational commands - North, West and South instead of 17 single service commands - was shot out of hand by (no guesses) the Air Force. The CDS and

accompanying Joint Staff ordered by the UK in 1984 was a fait accompli. It was introduced by a political class which understood defence and strategic security. In India, countless defence reforms are languishing for want of decision making.

It is instructive to recall how the two-front strategy was formally enunciated in December 2009 by the Army Chief Gen Deepak Kapoor. It followed the 2008 Mumbai terrorist attack, after Prime Minister Manmohan Singh ordered the Service Chiefs to prepare for war. Defence Minister AK Antony then had "preparation for a two-front war" added in his Directive but did little to implement it. Both in 1965 and 1971 wars with Pakistan despite the collusive threat from China, there was no cross-border intervention by China though sizeable formations of the Eastern Command remained deployed against it and forces could not be switched to the west or east for fighting in East Pakistan in 1971. In a real two-front war, swing forces in east and west will not be able to reinforce either front and only dedicated formations will fight the war. Given the paucity in current force levels, inadequate sophistry of combat support and terrain and infrastructure handicaps, it will be an uphill task to match the PLA's strength and versatility across a 3,488-km front of undefined borders.

In point-to-point skirmishes and standoffs, battle-hardened Indian soldiers will deter if not defeat the PLA. Across a broad front spectrum in an unlikely all-out war, it is advantage China unless India is prepared to rethink its "no first use" nuclear doctrine. As an offset in the western front, Gen Rawat has suggested creating a two-front situation for Pakistan: either in Afghanistan or Iran. Doklam may go the 1986 Sumdorong Chu way; the 10-month-long standoff challenging the Chinese intrusion at Thandrong, west of Tawang over the interpretation of watershed, without a shot being fired. India need not invoke its doubtful capacity to fight a two-front war; instead, speedily augment its deterrence against China. This may not win votes for Modi but it will prevent Chinese pinpricks that he famously called "toothache".

The new coaches: Zaheer, Dravid fine complements to Shastri

After some uncertainty and confusion, Ravi Shastri has been appointed the head coach of the Indian cricket team. Shastri's appointment was a foregone conclusion because of the good vibes he shares with captain Virat Kohli; the icing on the cake is the appointment of Zaheer Khan as the bowling consultant and Rahul Dravid as the batting consultant for overseas Test series. In his playing days, Shastri was a very intelligent cricketer, considered by many as the best captain India never had. As a coach, his main quality is the optimism and confidence he brings in - as the master of hortatory speeches, he has no equal.

The selection of Zaheer as the bowling coach and Dravid as the batting consultant on tours are inspired choices. The three men who made this decision - Sourav Ganguly, Sachin Tendulkar and VVS Laxman - have all played a lot of cricket with both Zaheer and Dravid. Zaheer was a very fine pace bowler who lost his way in the initial part of his career before becoming a very skillful bowler. Even as a player, he was a fine mentor to the fast bowlers in the Indian team. Dravid, the most technically adept Indian batsman since Sunil Gavaskar, has shown a great appetite for coaching, finding success with India's junior and A teams. As India play a lot of Test cricket away from home in the

next couple of years, Dravid can play a very important role in mentoring the batsmen.

A word about the selection of the coaches - the process was muddled and confused. Anil Kumble, the previous head coach, was simply chucked out despite a fine record with the team. Ganguly did not wish to name the replacement coach/coaches "in a hurry", making a mockery of the process and deadlines. It was left to the Supreme Court-appointed Committee of Administrators to direct BCCI to end the confusion. Hopefully, all associated with the process have learnt their lessons, which they would bear in mind when the time comes to repeat this exercise.

Guest Iin London goes against everything the movie industry has been trying to accomplish in the recent past. It spends 2 hours and 18 minutes hitting CTRL+Z on the kind of experimental storytelling, fresh writing and gender balance that the industry has been striving towards.

Instead, it gives us men talking down to women, nonchalant racism, forced gay humour and a buttload of fart jokes. So much so that Paresh Rawal's character

recites a minutes-long "ghazal" about farts. The movie covers toilet humour extensively from poop and pee jokes, right up to kidney stones.

The first Ajay Devgn-Konkona Sensharma movie, Atithi Tum Kab Jaoge? hit a home run owing to its charming, unassuming execution. It turned the atithi devo bhava sentiment on its head and became an outlet for our collective rogue-guests rage. However, the paper-thin plot was already used to its fullest in that movie. A sequel wasn't needed. But it is unleashed on us anyway.

This time, Paresh Rawal returns as the unwanted guest, in London, with a wife (Tanvi Azmi) by his side. Their unwilling hosts are Aryan (Kartik Aaryan) and his wife (Kriti Kharbanda), who have their own sham-marriage side track which gets lost halfway through the runtime. Quickly, the movie slips into Atithi mould but with witless gags that are so unwatchable, they seem to make time stop.

Every line, every scene gives you an impression that it was written by an ill-informed man-child who primarily believes in three things: farting is funny, women belong in the kitchen and all Pakistanis are thieves. 90 per cent of the jokes from the movie can be classified under one of those three categories.

The funniest thing about this comedy is just how angry it can make you. Guest iin London, like its titular protagonist, is a burden no one should have to bear.

26/11 case: Pak court releases another LeT suspect on bail

LAHORE (TIP): Sufayan Zafar, a Lashkar-e-Taiba suspect in the 2008 Mumbai terror attack case, has been released on bail by a Pakistani anti-terrorism court due to 'lack of evidence' against him, a court official said on July 13.

The prime suspect in the case, LeT operations commander Zakiur Rehman Lakhvi, is already out on bail since April 2015.

"Former LeT militant Sufayan Zafar who was arrested last year for his alleged involvement in 26/11 attack has been freed on bail. The ATC which held the hearing at Adiala Jail Rawalpindi recently has granted Zafar bail as no evidence against him was found during investigation," a court official told PTI.

The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) told the court that it had found 'no evidence' against Zafar during investigation therefore his involvement in the case cannot be established, the official said.

Zafar is accused of providing Rs 3.98 million to co-accused Shahid Jameel Riaz prior to the attack.

He also deposited Rs 14,800 to the bank account of his brother (another



suspect in the case).

He was declared a proclaimed offender in the Mumbai attack case in 2009. He was arrested in August last year from his hideout in Kyber-Pakhtunkhwa province.

A resident of Gujrawala district of Punjab, some 80km from Lahore, Zafar was among 21 other (absconding) suspects wanted in this high-profile case.

Six other suspects in the case -- Abdul Wajid, Mazhar Iqbal, Hammad

Amin Sadiq, Shahid Jameel Riaz, Jamil Ahmed and Younus Anjum -- have been lodged in Rawalpindi's Adiala Jail since 2009 for abetment to murder, attempted murder, planning and executing the Mumbai attack.

A total of 166 people were killed in the attack carried out by 10 LeT men. Nine terrorists who carried out the attack were killed while lone survivor Ajmal Kasab was captured alive and later executed in 2012 in Pune. (PTI)

Considering visa plea of Jadhav's mother: Pakistan Foreign Office

ISLAMABAD (TIP): Pakistan said on July 13 that it was considering a visa application of the mother of Kulbhushan Jadhav for a visit to meet her son who was sentenced to death by a military court.

India had requested Pakistan to allow Avantika Jadhav to meet her son.

"Pakistan is considering the Indian request for the grant of visa to the mother of Kulbhushan Yadav," Pakistan Foreign Office Spokesperson Nafees Zakaria was quoted as saying by state-run Radio Pakistan.

Zakaria's remarks came two days after External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj in New Delhi said that she had written a "personal letter" to Adviser to the Prime Minister on Foreign Affairs Sartaj Aziz asking for approval of Avantika's visa application so that she may travel to Pakistan.

She also said that Aziz did not even respond to her letter. "I wrote a personal letter to Mr Sartaj Aziz for the grant of her visa to Pakistan. However, Mr Aziz has not shown the courtesy even to acknowledge my letter," she had tweeted. (PTI)

Sri Lankan navy rescues elephant washed out to sea

COLOMBO (TIP): Sri Lanka's navy has rescued an elephant that got into difficulties after being washed out to sea, a spokesman said July 12, calling it a "miraculous escape".

Chaminda Walakuluge said the navy mounted the 12-hour rescue after spotting the elephant struggling to stay afloat around eight kilometres (five miles) off the island's northeast coast.

Divers aided by wildlife officials approached the distressed animal and tied ropes to it before towing it gently to shallow waters near the coast, where it was released late on Tuesday.

Walakuluge said the animal had likely got swept into the sea while crossing the Kokkilai lagoon, a large stretch of water that lies between two areas of jungle.

"They usually wade through shallow waters or even swim across to take a short cut," he said.

"It is a miraculous escape for the elephant."

Photos posted on the navy's website show the animal trying to keep its trunk above the water as divers approached it.

The rescue came six weeks after the navy and local residents saved a pod of 20 pilot whales who became stranded in nearby Trincomalee, a natural harbour that is popular for whale watching.

The waters around Trincomalee, which was used by Allied forces as a staging post during World War II, have a high concentration of blue and sperm whales, while the surrounding jungles have herds of wild elephants. (AFP)

Bangladesh police arrest key suspect in Dhaka cafe attack

NEW DELHI (TIP): Police in northwestern Bangladesh have arrested a suspected key supplier of explosives in last year's attack on a Dhaka cafe that left 20 dead, including 17 foreigners.

Police say Sohel Mahfuz was arrested along with three other suspected members of the Jumatul Mujahedeen Bangladesh.

The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the July 1, 2016 attack on the Holey Artisan Bakery, but authorities blamed the domestic group.

Five militants from the banned group who stormed the cafe and took patrons hostage also died, along with two police officers. (AP)

Indonesia's president signs decree to ban radical groups

JAKARTA, INDONESIA (TIP): Indonesia's president has signed a decree giving the government the power to ban radical organizations, in a move aimed at outlawing groups behind an apparent rise in the political clout of hard-line Islam. The measure announced Wednesday by the country's top security minister follows months of sectarian tensions in the world's most populous Muslim nation that shook the government and undermined its reputation for practicing a moderate form of Islam. It amends an existing law regulating mass organizations, allowing the government to sidestep a potentially lengthy court process to implement a ban. It is likely that Hizbut Tahir, a group that campaigns for Indonesia to adopt Shariah law and become a caliphate, is among the targets of the decree after the government announced in May that it planned to ban the group. (AP)

Can not overlook what is happening in Myanmar, Nikki Haley says



UNITED NATIONS (TIP): Myanmar should let the UN fact-finding mission probe the alleged human rights violations by the country's military and security forces, US Ambassador to the UN Nikki Haley has said, underlining that the international community cannot overlook the situation there.

Myanmar said late last month that it would not grant visas to members of a commission appointed by the UN Human Rights Council to investigate human rights violations by the country's state security forces, including the recent abuses in Rakhine State.

The US mission to the UN said violence in Rakhine State against ethnic and religious communities continues to claim lives and there are allegations of sexual violence against women and children.

"No one should face discrimination or violence because of their ethnic background or religious beliefs. It is

important that the Myanmar government allow this fact-finding mission to do its job," Indian-origin Haley said in a statement here.

She said the international community cannot overlook what is happening in Myanmar and "we must stand together and call on the government to fully cooperate with this fact-finding mission".

"The total number of victims will be unknown unless the fact-finding mission is allowed to proceed," the UN mission said.

Geneva director at global rights group Human Rights Watch John Fisher said denying visas to the members of the fact-finding mission would be "a slap in the face" to victims who suffered grave human rights violations by Myanmar's state security forces.

"Does Aung San Suu Kyi's government really want to be included in a very small and ignominious club of

countries that reject Human Rights Council decisions? North Korea, Eritrea, Syria, and Burundi are human rights pariah states that obstructed the work of independent, international investigations into alleged rights abuses, and it would be a travesty for a democratically elected, National League for Democracy-led government in Myanmar to do the same," Fisher said.

The rights group said the Myanmar government should immediately announce they will issue visas to the fact-finding mission and fully cooperate with its investigation.

"Otherwise, the governments that pushed to set up this fact-finding mission need to stand up for it and impose a political consequence on Myanmar for blocking its work," Fisher added.

The UN estimates that more than 90,000 Rohingya have been forced to flee their homes in northern Rakhine State since last October. (PTI)

UK sets out Brexit bill to end EU membership

LONDON (TIP): The British government on July 13 published a draft law that would formally put an end to Britain's membership of the European Union, as a top official warned the country was unprepared for Brexit in less than two years' time.

The new bill will repeal the 1972 law in which Britain became an EU member and convert an estimated 12,000 existing EU regulations into British law, ending the supremacy of EU law in Britain.

"This bill means that we will be able to exit the European Union with maximum certainty, continuity and control," Brexit secretary David Davis said in a statement.

But Prime Minister Theresa May is braced for a battle over the bill, which also gives ministers powers to amend the EU laws as they are transferred without full parliamentary scrutiny.

These so-called "Henry VIII" powers will be limited for two years, but opposition parties have warned they will not allow the government to use the bill to push through policy changes.

May's Conservative Party lost its majority in the June 8 election, leaving it dependent on the small Northern Irish Democratic Unionist Party to win votes in parliament.

The prime minister, who on Thursday marks one year since taking office after last year's referendum to leave the EU, remains vulnerable and questions remain over how long she can stay.

As the bill was published, opposition Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn was in Brussels to offer his own Brexit vision to EU chief negotiator Michel Barnier.

May's government began the two-year withdrawal process on March 29, setting Britain on an uncharted journey.

Extricating Britain from four decades of membership of the bloc is no small task: the new European Union (Withdrawal) Bill is one of eight Brexit bills the government will introduce.

But Labour's Brexit spokesman Keir Starmer warned his party would not



support the legislation as it stood.

"We have very serious issues with the government's approach, and unless the government addresses those issues, we will not be supporting the bill," he told The Guardian.

As well as concerns about the expansion of executive power, Labour fears an erosion of basic and workers' rights and plans to submit amendments when the bill is debated in the autumn.

"This will be hell," added Tim Farron, leader of the pro-European Liberal Democrats.

With the help of the 10 DUP lawmakers, May's government has a majority of just 13 in the 650-member parliament.

Formal Brexit negotiations with the EU began last month and the two sides have already clashed over the future rights of European citizens living in Britain. Ahead of the next round of talks starting next week, Britain on Thursday published three new papers setting out its position on nuclear cooperation, the European Court of Justice and privileges afforded to EU employees in Britain.

Barnier had warned Wednesday that

the EU was waiting for more information from Britain.

"We need to know on which points we agree and on which points we disagree, so that we can negotiate in earnest," he said.

"We cannot remain idle as the clock is ticking."

Britain confirmed it would leave European Atomic Energy Community but said it wanted to continue working closely with Euratom to help ensure a smooth exit.

"The UK and the Euratom community have a strong mutual interest in ensuring close co-operation," the position paper said.

London and Brussels disagree on whether the European Court of Justice will continue to have jurisdiction in Britain after Brexit.

Labour said Corbyn's meeting with Barnier marked its growing importance in the Brexit process — although Barnier insisted he would only negotiate with the government.

The Frenchman was also due to meet Scottish First Minister Nicola Sturgeon and Welsh First Minister Carwyn Jones for private talks. (AFP)

China detains 35 Japanese for alleged telephone fraud

TOKYO (TIP): Chinese authorities have detained 35 Japanese nationals in the southeastern province of Fujian for alleged fraud, the Japanese foreign ministry said on Wednesday, in what was probably one of the worst cases of telephone scams targeting the elderly.

Phone-based fraud targeting senior citizens is widespread in Japan, with an impostor, usually posing as a child or grandchild desperately in need of cash, asking an elderly person to make a bank transfer or hand money to a friend or colleague. "We were informed that local authorities notified Japanese consulate-general in Guangzhou on July 3 that they had taken 35 Japanese nationals into criminal custody on suspicion of fraud," a foreign ministry official, who asked not to be identified, told Reuters.

The official declined to give further details because of the investigation being conducted by Chinese authorities.

In Beijing, Chinese Foreign Ministry



spokesman Geng Shuang said China had informed Japan about the 35 people detained on June 30 on suspicion of fraud. He gave no other details.

The Nikkei business daily said the Japanese nationals were accused of involvement in telephone scams targeting residents of Chiba prefecture east of Tokyo, the Japanese capital.

The group is the largest Japanese telephone fraud group discovered to be

operating in China so far, in terms of the numbers detained, the Nikkei said.

Such groups have increasingly been making calls from China in recent years to evade crackdowns by Japanese authorities, the paper added.

The detained Japanese nationals were alleged to have played the role of callers in the fraud, it said, adding that it was up to Chinese authorities to decide whether to hand them over to Japan. (AP)

Actress Charlize Theron said Hollywood is 'caveman-like' for not allowing women to helm big-budget movies.

"I am ashamed that I'm part of an industry that has never allowed a woman to work with a budget higher than what the budget has been on 'Wonder Woman.' That's so f***ing caveman-like," Theron said.

SPIDER-MAN: HOMECOMING

STORY

It's been a while since Captain America: Civil War, where an ecstatic and starstruck teen Spider-Man/Peter Parker (Tom Holland) rubbed shoulders with the mighty Avengers. Months later, Peter yearns for the heroic experience once again. But mentor Tony Stark aka Iron Man (Robert Downey Jr) advises him to go back to school and patiently wait for his moment of glory, when he can assist the Avengers.

However, patience is certainly not the boy's virtue.

Desperate to earn a sensational 'job offer' from Stark, the trainee masked crusader curbs petty robberies and scouts for a crime worthy enough to fight. He soon runs into 'Vulture' (Michael Keaton), a man who poses real threat to lives. Can Spider-boy take him down?

Jon Watts starts his film with a clean slate. Unlike the previous outings, his Spider-Man reboot doesn't necessarily have the aura of a superhero epic. He gives it a quirky campus-caper twist, which evokes mixed views initially. His Peter is solely focussed on being an A list (Avengers like) superhero. There are no sob stories of Uncle Ben or Aunt May either. May in fact, is a hottie (Marisa Tomei)! Once you warm up to Watts' vision, this Spidey film, replete with humour and thrilling stunt scenes, grows on you and tugs at your heartstrings eventually.

What also works is Holland's effortless earnestness. The British actor is no looker unlike a Tobey Maguire or Andrew Garfield, nor does he carry their character's emotional turmoil or bewilderment. But that makes him the most relatable Spider-Man, till date. You feel his need to prove himself to Stark; heartbreak, when that dream falters and him discovering himself at the end of it all.

Other than Robert Downey's recurring special appearances (even at an Indian wedding), it is Michael Keaton's formidable screen presence as the anti-hero, that holds the film together, when Parker's goofing around gets a tad tiresome.

LOSE WEIGHT WITHOUT LOSING BREAST SIZE

PANEER TANDOORI

INGREDIENTS

400 gm paneer
1 tablespoon refined oil
1 tablespoon salt
For Marination
1 tablespoon ginger paste
3 tablespoon meat masala
4 pinches kasoori methi powder

METHOD

- Wash the paneer lightly and cut it into cubes. Then, mix the paneer cubes with ginger, garlic paste, curd, meat masala and kasoori methi. Marinate it for about 20 minutes

SPROUTS SALAD

INGREDIENTS

METHOD

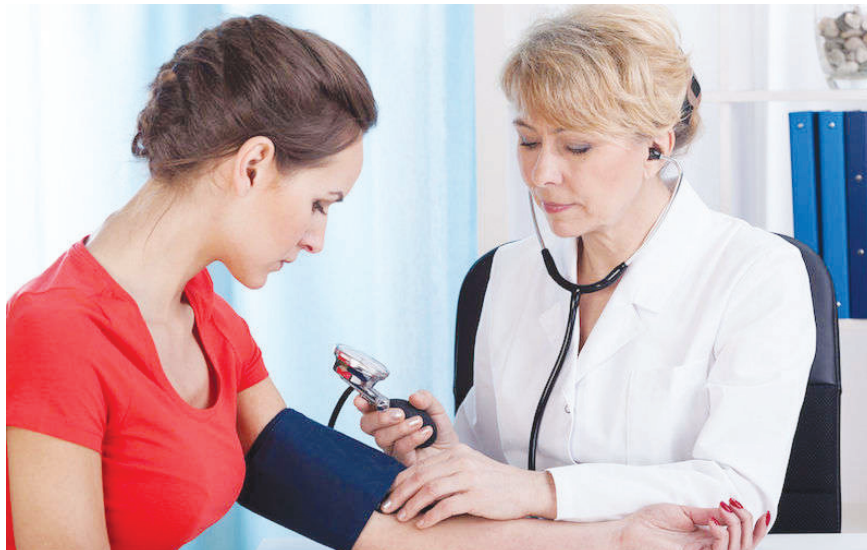
SHOULD YOU BE WORRIED ABOUT LOW BLOOD PRESSURE?

Recently, a sudden diagnosis of low blood pressure alarmed me. Discussing it with colleagues over lunch, one mentioned, "There is nothing serious about low blood pressure. You should be thankful it isn't high blood pressure." This statement got me thinking if that's really the case.

While it is clearly documented as to who will fall under the high blood pressure category, there is no such quantification for low blood pressure. It can vary from individual to individual. Delhi-based Dr Suranjit Chatterjee, an Internal Medicine Doctor at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital clarifies, "Honestly, low blood pressure has immense importance to no importance. An incidental finding of low blood pressure may ideally not be a cause of worry. A lot of young people come to me with a 90/60 BP and I tell them it's normal, especially when the person walks inside my clinic on his own and is normally talking, walking and working. However, there are a lot of doctors who mislead people into believing that they should worry about low blood pressure."

Having said that, low blood pressure can have alarming causes too. If a person with a history of stroke, cardiac event or an infection reports low blood pressure, it is indeed worrisome. Or if along with low blood pressure, the person is also complaining of vomiting, loose motions and severe bleeding, it needs to be checked.

Dr Behram S Pardiwala, consultant - medicine, Wockhardt Hospital, Mumbai central reiterates, "A blood pressure of 90/60 is not really low blood pressure. When a patient is symptomatic with low blood pressure, that's when we need to look at it seriously. If low blood pressure is impacting vital organs (brain, kidney, liver, heart), then it becomes extremely



FOR RELIEF

- Drink a glass of salt water. Mix half tablespoon of table salt in a glass of water.
- Have small but regular cups of caffeinated drinks such as tea and coffee.
- Keep yourself hydrated - have a minimum of 8 glass of water and increase intake of other fluids.
- Be cautious while rising from lying or sitting position. Try to pump feet and ankles to enable circulation before rising. Also, try to sit on the edge of the bed before standing.
- Have smaller, frequent meals.

important to identify the cause for appropriate treatment."

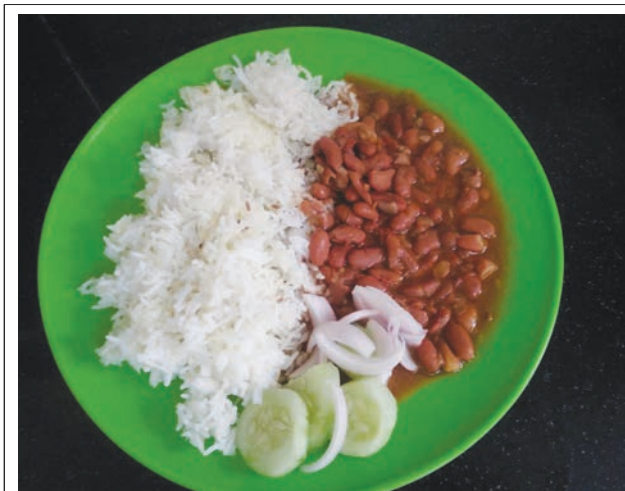
"I can mostly tell when my patient steps in with low blood pressure. If the nose, toes, fingers are cold or the lips are white, I instantly know they have low BP. I don't normally worry when the patient walks in reporting low blood pressure but is sitting comfortably, talking normally and walking without any problem," adds Dr Pardiwala.

Also, if low blood pressure reading persists, it becomes important to find

out the cause. Patients are recommended to monitor blood pressure for a couple of days. Sometimes it is also assessed if there was an abnormal cardiac rhythm to rule out an underlying cause. Some patients may also be advised to check for anemia or blood sugar levels.

It is notable that there are even some medications that can cause slight lowering of blood pressure such as diuretics and certain anti-depressants.

HERE'S WHY RAJMA CHAWAL IS HURTING YOU

A Punjabi get-together isn't complete until they have platefuls of Rajma Chawal. It is time already that it should be declared the staple food for them. So, here is a bummer. They may hate this story and put its author on their to-kill radar, but we will still risk writing it. That's for the sake of our health, of course. The story isn't about rajma chawal, though, but only rajma. That's some relief?

Full disclosure

Rajma, or kidney beans, are harmful or even poisonous, when you consume them raw or undercooked. In fact, they may still be harmful when they are cooked at a temperature that's lesser than 100 degree Celsius. However, they are safe when they are properly cooked in a certain way. Here, we will talk about all the scenarios.

The toxin

Kidney beans have a toxin that is called Phytohaemagglutinin. It is contained in many other varieties of beans but its concentration is particularly high in red kidney beans. And so, less than a handful, or even mere 4 to 5 raw or undercooked beans are potent enough to make you fall sick.

Symptoms

It is reported that 20 per cent of the annual food poisoning cases happen after consuming kidney beans! The symptoms that can develop after consuming beans that are not properly cooked can be diarrhoea, stomach pain and vomiting within two to three hours of consuming them.

When you eat them raw or undercooked

When you eat them raw or undercooked: This is most likely to happen when you eat them in salads or sandwiches, though it can also happen when you consume them as a curry and they remain undercooked. The study which stated the harms of undercooked or raw beans was published in the journal "Epidemiology and Infection". It found that eating them without cooking them properly can lead to the symptoms such as mentioned above.

When you cook them at low temperatures

When you cook them at low temperatures: If your kidney beans have been cooked at a temperature that is below 180 degree Fahrenheit or 83 degree Celsius, you still run the risk of catching a gastro-infection.

When you soak the beans but don't boil them enough

When you soak the beans but don't boil them enough: Many follow the habit of soaking the beans overnight and boiling them for 2 to 3 minutes before cooking them. This is also harmful as it doesn't kill the haemagglutinin that is present in them. Such beans can also lead to stomach problems.

When they are thoroughly cooked and boiled for at least 10 minutes

When they are thoroughly cooked and boiled for at least 10 minutes: This is the perfect way to go about if you are a kidney bean lover and want to keep stomach infections at bay. Only soaking the beans overnight isn't enough. They need to be boiled for at least 10 minutes to completely destroy the haemagglutinin traces in it. This way they are perfectly healthy to be had.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES KEEP HEART DISEASES AT BAY

A new Swedish study has found that lutein, a nutrient in brightly coloured fruit and vegetables, can reduce inflammation in patients with coronary artery disease.

The study, carried out by researchers at Linköping University, looked at the levels of six of the most common carotenoids in blood from 193 patients with coronary artery disease.

"A considerable number of patients who have experienced myocardial infarction still have low-level chronic inflammation in the body, even after receiving effective treatment with revascularisation, drugs and lifestyle changes. We know that chronic inflammation is associated with a poorer prognosis," explained study



leader Lena Jonasson.

Carotenoids are the mainly red, orange, and yellow pigments which give the bright colour to plants, vegetables, and fruits, such as ripe tomatoes, or

dark-green leafy vegetables such as spinach. Previous research has already suggested that carotenoids, such as the more well known beta-carotene and lycopene, could be linked with inflammation, which is a key factor in many types of coronary artery disease, such as myocardial infarction and angina.

To look at their potential anti-inflammatory effect, the team also measured the level of inflammation in the blood using the inflammatory marker interleukin-6, IL-6. They discovered that lutein was the only carotenoid whose level correlated with IL-6, finding that the higher the level of lutein in the blood, the lower the level of IL-6.

NEW TOOL TURNS AUDIO CLIPS INTO REALISTIC VIDEO

WASHINGTON (TIP): Scientists have developed new computer algorithms that can turn audio clips into a realistic, lip-synced video of the person speaking those words.

The researchers successfully generated highly-realistic video of former US President Barack Obama talking about terrorism, fatherhood, job creation and other topics, using audio clips of those speeches and existing weekly video addresses that were originally on a different topic.

"These types of results have never been shown before," said Ira Kemelmacher-Shlizerman, an assistant professor at the University of Washington (UW) in the US.

"Realistic audio-to-video conversion has practical applications like improving video conferencing for meetings, as well as futuristic ones such as being able to hold a conversation with a historical figure in virtual reality by creating visuals just from audio," said Kemelmacher-Shlizerman.

In a visual form of lip-syncing, the system converts audio files of an individual's speech into realistic mouth shapes, which are then grafted onto and blended with the head of that person from another existing video.

The team chose Obama because the machine learning technique needs available video of the person to learn from, and there were hours of presidential videos in the public domain.

"In the future video, chat tools like Skype or Messenger will enable anyone to collect videos that could be used to train computer models," Kemelmacher-Shlizerman said.

Because streaming audio over the internet takes up far less bandwidth than video, the new system has the potential to end video chats that are constantly timing out from poor connections.

"When you watch Skype or Google Hangouts, often the connection is stuttery and low-resolution and really unpleasant, but often the audio is pretty good," said Steve Seitz, professor at UW.

"So if you could use the audio to produce much higher-quality video, that would be terrific," he said.

By reversing the process - feeding video into the network instead of just audio - the team could also potentially develop algorithms that could detect whether a video is real or manufactured, researchers said.

The new machine learning tool makes significant progress in overcoming what is known as the "uncanny valley" problem, which has dogged efforts to create realistic video from audio.

When synthesised human likenesses appear to be almost real - but still manage to somehow miss the mark - people find them creepy or off-putting.

"People are particularly sensitive to any areas of your mouth that don't look realistic," said Supasorn Suwajanakorn, a doctoral graduate at UW's Allen School of Computer Science & Engineering.

"If you do not render teeth right or the chin moves at the wrong time, people can spot it right away and it is going to look fake. So you have to render the mouth region perfectly to get beyond the uncanny valley," Suwajanakorn said. *Source: PTI*

SOON, YOUR SMARTPHONE MAY BE CHARGED WITHIN SECONDS

WASHINGTON (TIP): Scientists, including one of Indian origin, have developed a new electrode design that may allow smartphone batteries to be charged within seconds.

Researchers in Drexel University in the US used highly conductive, two-dimensional material called MXene to design the electrodes.

The design could make energy storage devices like batteries just as fast as the speedy supercapacitors that are used to provide energy in a pinch - often as a battery back-up or to provide quick bursts of energy for things like camera flashes.

"This paper refutes the widely accepted dogma that chemical charge storage, used in batteries and pseudocapacitors, is always much slower than physical storage used in electrical double-layer capacitors, also known as supercapacitors," said Yury Gogotsi, professor in Drexel's College of Engineering, who led the study.

"We demonstrate charging of thin MXene electrodes in tens of milliseconds. This is enabled by very high electronic conductivity of MXene," said Gogotsi.

"This paves the way to development of ultrafast energy storage devices than can be charged and discharged within seconds, but store much more energy than conventional supercapacitors," he said.

Electrodes are essential components of batteries, through which energy is stored during charging and from which it is disbursed to power our devices.

The ideal design for these components would be one that allows them to be quickly charged and store more energy. To store more energy, the materials should have places to put it.

Electrode materials in batteries offer ports for charge to be stored. In electrochemistry, these ports, called "redox active sites" are the places that



hold an electrical charge when each ion is delivered.

If the electrode material has more ports, it can store more energy - which equates to a battery with more "juice." Researchers produced a hydrogel electrode design with more redox active sites, which allows it to store as much charge for its volume as a battery.

This measure of capacity, termed "volumetric performance," is an important metric for judging the utility of any energy storage device.

To make those plentiful hydrogel electrode ports even more attractive to ion traffic, researchers including graduate student Sankalp Kota from Drexel designed electrode architectures with open macroporosity - many small openings - to make each redox active

sites in the MXene material readily accessible to ions.

"In traditional batteries and supercapacitors, ions have a tortuous path toward charge storage ports, which not only slows down everything, but it also creates a situation where very few ions actually reach their destination at fast charging rates," said Maria Lukatskaya, first author of the study published in the journal *Nature Energy*.

"The ideal electrode architecture would be something like ions moving to the ports via multi-lane, high-speed 'highways,' instead of taking single-lane roads," said Lukatskaya.

"Our macroporous electrode design achieves this goal, which allows for rapid charging - on the order of a few seconds or less," she said. *Source: PTI*

Google Earth to let users post stories, photos

RIO DE JANEIRO (TIP): Alphabet Inc wants users to post millions of stories, video and photos on its Google Earth platform in the next few years, the programme chief said at a launch event in Brazil for content focused on showcasing the Amazon rainforest.

The "Voyager" tool allows internet surfers to take interactive tours of exotic destinations on Google Earth led by the likes of primatologist Jane Goodall, with photos, information and maps.

However, regular users will be able to create their own unedited content for private or public use within two to three years, Google Earth Director Rebecca Moore told Reuters.

"The story of your family history, the story of your favorite hiking trip - it could be anything. It doesn't have to be profound," she said at the event in Sao Paulo.

Moore took the stage at an event in Sao

Paulo to unveil the "I am the Amazon" project, which has mapped 11 sites to document the relationship between the rainforest and its people, touching on topics like food, water and cultural origins.

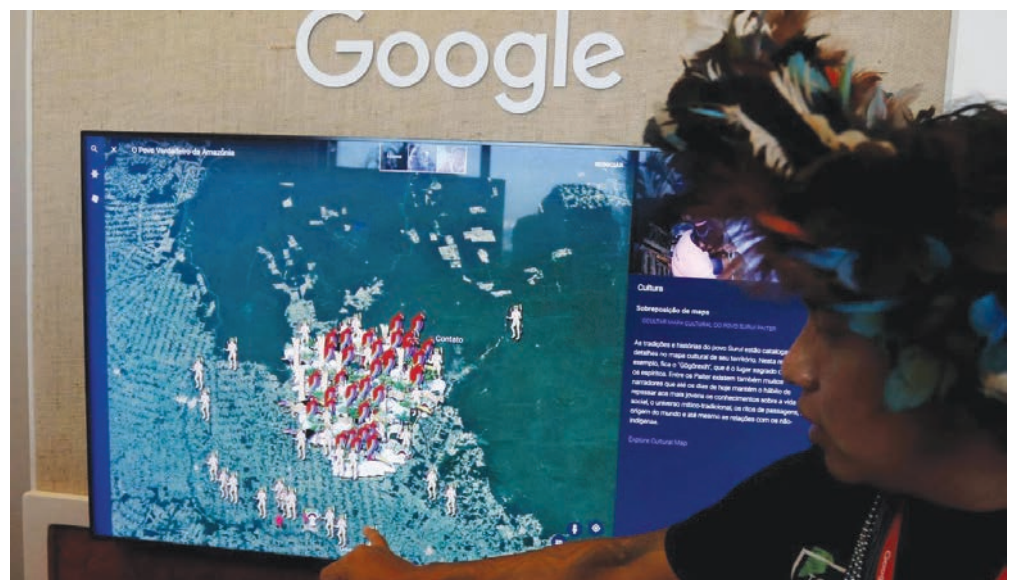
To tell the stories of communities such as the Yanomami people, Cinta Larga and the Boa Vista Quilombola, Google and partners used tools like 3D cameras to accompany satellite images with videos and text.

Moore did not reveal the budget for the project but she ruled out the idea of advertising on the platform and said it is not Google's intention to turn a profit from the venture.

"Google Earth is our gift to the world," she said.

"In terms of budget, Google has nice revenue from advertising, and not everything Google does has to make money."

SENSEX PAST 32K, NIFTY AT NEW PEAK

'First-time-ever' records continue to tumble as rally continues on BSE and NSE

Mumbai, July 13

The Sensex today went past the 32,000-mark for the first time ever, soaring over 232 points, and the Nifty closed at a new peak of 9,892 as inflation hit a record low, offering the RBI leeway for a lower policy rate.

The 30-share BSE index took 33 sessions to rise 1,000 points before it finally went beyond the psychologically significant 32,000.

Higher Asian and European stocks provided fodder after the US Fed chief, in a House testimony, signalled that the approach to higher rates would be steady, prompting investors here to buy more.

Retail inflation for June hit a historically low 1.54 per cent and industrial output growth for May slumped to 1.7 per cent, boosting chances of a rate reduction by the Reserve Bank at its upcoming August policy meet. The macro numbers were released after market hours yesterday.

The BSE Sensex settled at a new peak of 32,037.38, up 232.56 points, or 0.73 per cent. It surpassed its previous record of 31,804.82 touched yesterday. In the past four days, the index has gained 676.75 points.

The broader 50-issue NSE Nifty spurred 75.60 points, or 0.77 per cent, to close at a fresh lifetime high of 9,891.70, bettering its earlier record 9,816.10 hit yesterday.

Both indices rose for the fourth consecutive session.

Traders said ample liquidity in the market was driving the current phase of the rally amid optimism over earnings

from blue-chip companies.

Consumer goods and banking stocks had a good day. The FMCG index rose the most by surging 1.58 per cent, followed by capital goods and banking.

Foreign investors have been pumping in sizeable money into domestic markets. Foreign portfolio investors bought shares worth a net Rs 361.25 crore yesterday.

Top CEOs vote to take US India Business Council out of US chamber

WASHINGTON (TIP): The board of the US-India Business Council comprising CEOs of some top American companies has voted to sever ties with the powerful US Chamber of Commerce, laying bare years of simmering tensions, including over clashing policy priorities.

The rupture has left the fate of the USIBC and its staff uncertain for the time being since the US Chamber of Commerce has no intention of letting go of it, as was stated by its president and CEO Tom Donahue in a letter on Tuesday.

"The USIBC is a part of the Chamber, and the Chamber does not plan to transition it anywhere," Donahue wrote in the strongly worded letter. He added sternly: "The USIBC has no separate existence and its board has no legal authority."

If reconciliation efforts slated for next week don't succeed, members of the USIBC appear prepared to start a separate body. "We are ready to form an alternate entity, with far more independence and autonomy," said a source.

Donahue went on to announce that USIBC president Mukesh Aghi had left last month and that the chamber had launched a search for his successor. Khush Choksy, a senior vice president at the chamber, will serve as interim president until then.

Aghi quit late last month, the day 29 members of the USIBC board voted to split with the chamber. They included Indra Nooyi of Pepsi, John T Chambers of Cisco, Ajay Banga of MasterCard and Warburg Pincus co-chief executive Charles R "Chip" Kaye.

Started in 1975, the USIBC has emerged as a leading advocacy body on India-US trade, and is acknowledged so by the private sectors and the governments of the two countries. It has hosted Prime Minister Narendra Modi twice during his US visits, and US vice presidents Joe Biden and Mike Pence.

Hosting Pence at its annual leadership summit on June 27, the day after Modi met President Donald Trump, is understood to have provided the flashpoint that triggered the rupture.

The chamber was also keen to host Pence but at a separate event and the USIBC beat the chamber to it. Tensions simmering between the two bodies "reached boiling point" with differences over the dispute, according to a source.

The chamber and the council had serious differences over some policy issues, going back several years — especially on market access, free trade issues and intellectual property rights, according to several past and present affiliates of the USIBC.

The chamber joined a group of business bodies that called on the new Trump administration and Congress in February to "use all available channels to ensure fair play for businesses, investors and entrepreneurs across the United States, and to support Indian efforts that align with these goals".

Several past and present USIBC officials have said they felt "uncomfortable" by the chamber's aggressive position on these issues, which has included asking the US trade representative to designate India for punitive trade measures.

Differences between the chamber and the USIBC go back many years, and attempts were made to come to an understanding that would allow each other independence on policy issues and operational autonomy. That had become frayed lately.

The chamber did not respond to request for comment on these questions, and pointed to Donahue's letter for all those and other issues.

FLIPKART COULD OFFER \$900-950 MILLION FOR SNAPDEAL

NEW DELHI (TIP): E-commerce major Flipkart is expected to make a revised offer of USD 900-950 million for buying rival Snapdeal, according to sources.

The new offer almost matches the initial asking price of USD 1 billion for acquisition of the beleaguered e-commerce marketplace, sources privy to the development said.

They did not wish to be identified as discussions are still on and the deal has not been signed yet.

One of the sources said a new offer of USD 900-950 million is likely to be made by early next week.

When contacted, Snapdeal, SoftBank and Flipkart declined to comment.

Snapdeal's board has already rejected a takeover offer of USD 800-850 million (around Rs 5,500 crore) from Flipkart as it felt the amount undervalued the company given that the due diligence report was clean.

SoftBank, Snapdeal's largest investor, has been proactively mediating the sale for the past few months. The board of Snapdeal also has representation from its founders (Kunal Bahl and Rohit Bansal), Nexus Venture Partners and Kalaari Capital.

Snapdeal is also engaged in separate discussions for selling Freecharge (mobile wallet operations) and Vulcan Express (logistics arm).

These deals are also likely to be closed over the next few weeks.

The deal between Snapdeal and Flipkart, if completed, would mark the biggest acquisition in the Indian e-commerce space.

One of the leading contenders in the Indian e-tailing segment, Snapdeal has seen its fortunes failing amid strong competition from Amazon and Flipkart.

Snapdeal's valuations have also plummeted from about USD 6.5 billion in February 2016. SoftBank has already written off over USD 1 billion on valuation of its investment in Snapdeal.

SECURITY AGENCIES' ALERT CALL ON 100% FDI IN DOMESTIC AIRLINES

NEW DELHI (TIP): The security agencies, including the Intelligence Bureau (IB), have raised concerns over the Centre's decision to allow 100% foreign direct investment (FDI) in domestic airlines' operations.

Recently, Union Home Secretary Rajiv Mehrishi chaired a meeting to discuss the matter, where sources said, the IB and other agencies expressed concerns over the government's decision on allowing 100% FDI for running domestic airlines.

Sources said, the meeting, which was attended by senior officials from the Civil Aviation Ministry and the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), including the IB, was called to discuss issues related to proposed amendments to the Aircraft Rules, 1937.

It is learnt that the amendments are required to operationalise the framework for allowing foreign non-airline players to own up to 100% stake in domestic carriers. "As the government had decided to put in place liberal FDI policy last year only, this can become reality only once the relevant rules are put in place," a senior MHA official said.

Noting that aviation is a "highly sensitive sector", the IB, during the meeting, suggested that it would be prudent to allow 100% FDI in the sector. To justify its claim, the IB also contended that even developed countries such as the US and Canada have permitted foreign entities to have only up to 25% stake in their respective domestic carriers.

"Recent disclosures by Donald Trump Jr indicate that Trump's campaign was eager to receive assistance from Russia. It now seems likely that the President had something to hide when he tried to curtail the investigation of National Security Advisor Michael Flynn and the wider Russian probe," Sherman said after introducing the article of impeachment against Trump. "I believe his conversations with, and subsequent firing of, FBI Director James Comey constitute Obstruction of Justice," he said.

Everyday Democrats, Republicans, and the entire world are shocked by the latest example of America's "amateur President", he said. "Lack of impulse control, accompanied by a refusal to have his staff control his impulses. We're no longer surprised by any action, no matter how far below the dignity of the office—and no matter how dangerous to the country," Sherman said.

"But the Constitution does not provide for the removal of a President for impulsive, ignorant incompetence. It does provide for the removal of a President for High Crimes and Misdemeanors," he asserted. As the investigations move forward, additional evidence supporting additional articles of impeachment may emerge, he noted. "However, as to the Obstruction of Justice...the evidence we have is sufficient to move forward now. And the national interest requires that we do so," the Democratic lawmaker said. (Source: PTI)

US decision to delay 'startup'...

and are key members of either management or product development teams in more than 70% of these companies, according to a 2016 study by the National Foundation for American Policy (NFAP), a US-based non-profit nonpartisan public policy think tank. Out of these, people of Indian origin have founded almost 30%.

Indian-American technology entrepreneur and academic Vivek Wadhwa called the policy "brain-dead" and a "lose-lose" for the US. "Without doubt, bringing in entrepreneurs creates American jobs and expands the economy, it is the closest thing there could be to a free lunch for the United States. This is a lose-lose for the US and for the entrepreneurs who would have come here but it will benefit the countries where they would have come from."

Wadhwa, who is a Fellow at Carnegie Mellon University Engineering in Silicon Valley, added that countries such as India and the rest of the world could gain from this. "This is the type of brain-dead policy that is becoming a hallmark of the Trump administration. They are pandering to anti-immigrant groups rather than focusing on US competitiveness and economic growth," said Wadhwa.

As per the NFAP study, 14 Indian-origin entrepreneurs have started billion dollar companies in the US which are collectively valued at \$19.6 billion. The foundation had evaluated 87 startup companies valued at over \$1 billion as of January 1, 2016, for the study. The Obama administration's idea was to keep high-caliber talent who come to the US for studies but return to their countries and start businesses that become huge successes.

Puru Vashishtha, a Valley-based Indian entrepreneur-investor

who studied at Stanford University, said the startup visa would have been great for Indian and Israeli students. "Imagine if Vinod Khosla had to come back to India to work in Infosys. That would have been a big loss for innovation. Unfortunately, it's already happening now, due to difficulties faced by international students and immigrants to become entrepreneurs. Countries like Canada are taking advantage of it, but they don't have big enablers that Silicon Valley provides and a big market that US readily provides," he said.

Vashishtha added that he has witnessed the struggle of many of his Stanford friends without the startup visa. "These were highly trained, best minds in the world. They wanted to do product startup in the Valley. Unfortunately, because of being a foreign national, even a top university graduate does not get the same options as rest of her US classmates. This is regressive and it deprives the US from significant value creation and job creation. startup visa was a big hope."

According to a 2012 study, companies founded by immigrants in the US have created more than 10 million jobs and over \$4.5 trillion in annual revenue.

On Monday, July 10, the US Department of Homeland Security issued a memo saying that the rule will now be launched on March 14, 2018 and it will solicit comments from the public about rescinding the rule, and "may ultimately eliminate the program."

"Given the real shortage of tech talent in the US, this startup visa would have been a great enabler. It has the potential to take the innovation to the next level. This move to cancel it is a big setback," said Vashishtha.

Qatar gets first boycott-busting cows

AL KHOR, QATAR (TIP): A first herd of boycott-busting cows has been airlifted to Qatar to boost milk supplies five weeks after neighbouring Gulf states cut links with the emirate.

The several dozen Holsteins were flown in from Budapest, the first of 4,000 cattle to be imported by August.

The bemused bovines took to their new surroundings at a farm 80 kilometres (50 miles) north of Doha on Wednesday, despite being the centre of attention from journalists and the pride of Qatar, which sees their arrival as a sign of its defiance in the Gulf crisis.

"We brought in 165 Holsteins, all highly bred Holsteins, especially for dairy," said John Dore, a senior manager at Baladna Livestock Production.

"There are 35 milking cows, that are in milk at present and there's 130 that will calve in the next two-to-three weeks."

Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt cut all ties with Qatar last month, closed the only land border and halted all exports of food to the emirate.

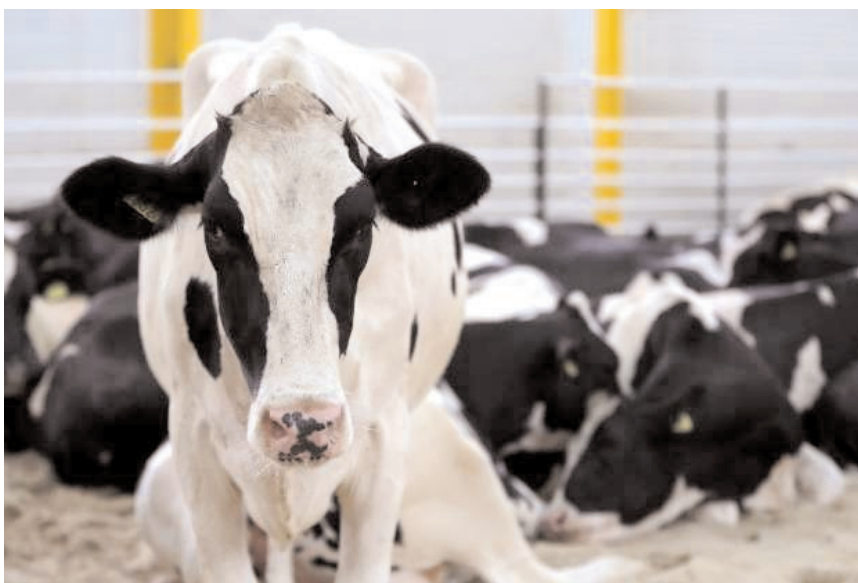
The Gulf states accuse Qatar of supporting extremism, a charge it denies.

Prior to the crisis, Qatar largely relied on dairy imports from Saudi Arabia, especially of milk.

Its population of 2.7 million was dependent on foodstuffs from Gulf countries, which made up almost half of all imports.

However, since the political crisis began Qatar has resorted to importing food from different countries including Turkey, Iran and Morocco.

Qatar aims to increase by five-fold the number of cattle it has in the country as



it looks to lessen its food dependency on imports because of the ongoing crisis.

Dore said the livestock were the first steps in Qatar trying to become "self-sufficient in beef", and it aims to boost cattle numbers in the country from a current 5,000 to some 25,000 in the near future.

The cattle will be farmed for both milk and meat.

"Local supply covers between 10 and 15 percent at present" of Qatar's needs, Dore told reporters at the farm, as the cows quietly munched on grass laid down next down to the large pens in which they are housed.

Despite their journey of more than 3,700 kilometres and adjusting to new heats of 41 degrees Celsius (106 Fahrenheit), the animals seemed unworried by their new surroundings, and certainly unaware of their political

significance.

"Before, most of the milk in Qatar was imported from Saudi Arabia and the UAE," said Dore.

"At the moment the gap is being filled by Turkish imports, which are welcome for the present but the quality won't compare with local produce."

Qatari officials have confidently claimed they can withstand the boycott "forever".

The cows were brought in by a Qatar Airways cargo plane on Tuesday.

Moutaz al-Khayyat, the chairman of Qatari firm Power International which bought and imported the cows, told Bloomberg News that once all the 4,000 cows arrive in Qatar, they will meet around 30 percent of the country's dairy needs.

He said it could take up to 60 flights to bring all the cattle into Qatar. (AFP)

Britain's first pregnant man gives birth to girl!

LONDON (TIP): A 21-year-old man has become the first in Britain to give birth after he put his sex transition on hold to get pregnant by a sperm donor.

Hayden Cross, who made headlines around the world earlier this year when he announced he was pregnant by a sperm donor, has given birth to a girl.

Cross told The Sun that daughter Trinity-Leigh is his "angel". Cross gave birth by caesarean.

The girl was born on June 16 at Gloucestershire Royal Hospital.

He had been living legally as a man for three years and was already part-way through hormone treatment to transform from a woman to a man.

But the full transition was paused after the UK's state-funded National Health Service (NHS) refused to carry out a 4,000-pounds process to freeze his eggs — which he hoped would enable him to have children in the future.

The former supermarket worker instead found a sperm donor via Facebook and became successfully pregnant.

"She's perfect in every way... she is so good. I'm so lucky," Cross was quoted as saying.

Following the birth, Cross now plans to return to complete his gender realignment as soon as possible.

The proud father was born a girl named Paige, 21 years ago.

Cross, from Gloucester, had said earlier, "I faced the prospect of not becoming the man I'm supposed to be, physically, or a dad. So I didn't feel like I had any choice but to have a baby now then get back to transitioning."

"In September I got pregnant by a sperm donation. I found the donor on the internet. I looked on Facebook for a group and found one -- it's been shut down now. I didn't have to pay," Cross had said.

Cross, who used to work for Asda and in a clothes shop, aims to find a job once the baby is aged one. (AP)

Turkey detains 44 in anti-terrorist operations, including bomb attack planners

ISTANBUL (TIP): Turkish police have detained 44 suspects in anti-terrorist operations, including the planners of two suicide bomb attacks in Istanbul last year, the city's governor said on Thursday.

Twin bombs — one planted in a car and the other strapped to a suicide bomber — exploded in an attack outside the stadium of Besiktas soccer club in central Istanbul on Dec. 10, killing 44 people and wounding 155.

"One of the suspects detained in the operation had carried out reconnaissance work before the December 2016 bombing, and had jumped and fled the car shortly before it was detonated," Istanbul governor Vasip Sahin told reporters.

The other suspect detained has been identified as the organizer of a July 2016 attack against a police bus that killed 11 people, including civilians and police officers, and left 36 people wounded.

The Kurdistan Freedom Hawks (TAK), an offshoot of the militant Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK), claimed responsibility for both attacks. The PKK, listed as a terrorist organization by Turkey, the EU, and the US, has fought a three-decades-old insurgency in Turkey in which more than 40,000 people have been killed. (Reuters)

China bears 'heavy responsibility' for Liu Xiaobo's death: Nobel committee

OSLO (TIP): The Norwegian Nobel Committee said on Thursday that China bears a "heavy responsibility" for the "premature" death of 2010 Peace Prize winner Liu Xiaobo.

The prominent democracy advocate, 61, died while still in custody following a battle with cancer.

Officials ignored international pleas to let him spend his final days free and abroad. Germany and the US had offered to take him in for treatment.

"We find it deeply disturbing that Liu Xiaobo was not transferred to a facility where he could receive adequate medical treatment before he became terminally ill," Berit Reiss-Andersen, who chairs the Norwegian Nobel Committee, said in a statement. "The Chinese government bears heavy responsibility for his premature death."

Liu was transferred from prison to a heavily guarded hospital to be treated for late-stage liver cancer more than a month ago. (AFP)

Syria monitor says IS chief Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi dead

BEIRUT (TIP): The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights war monitor said July 11 it had information from top Islamic State group leaders confirming the death of the jihadist organisation's chief Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi.

"Top tier commanders from IS who are present in Deir Ezzor province have confirmed the death of Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi, emir of the Islamic State group, to the Observatory," director Rami Abdel Rahman told AFP.

"We learned of it today but we do not know when he died or how."

Deir Ezzor, in eastern Syria, remains largely under IS control even as the group is losing territory elsewhere in the country and in neighbouring Iraq.

Abdel Rahman said Baghdadi "was present in eastern parts of Deir Ezzor province" in recent months, but it was unclear if he was killed in the area or elsewhere.

There have been persistent rumours of Baghdadi's death in recent months, and Russia's military said in mid-June that it was seeking to verify whether it had killed the IS chief in an air strike in Syria in May.

Russia's army said Sukhoi warplanes carried out a 10-minute raid on May 28 at a location near the IS stronghold of Raqa, where group leaders had gathered to plan a pullout from the area.

The US-led coalition fighting the jihadist group in Syria and Iraq said at the time it could not confirm whether the Russian strike had killed Baghdadi.

The 46-year-old Iraqi-born leader of IS has not been seen in public since making his only known public appearance as "caliph" in 2014 at the Grand Mosque of Al-Nuri in Mosul.

IS destroyed the highly symbolic site before Iraqi forces could reach it as they pushed the jihadist group from Mosul, where Iraq's government formally declared victory on Monday. With a \$25-million US bounty on his head, Baghdadi has kept a low profile and was rumoured to move regularly throughout IS-held territory in the area straddling Iraq and Syria. (AFP)

Ex-Brazil President Lula sentenced to nearly 10 years for corruption

BRASILIA (TIP): Former Brazilian leader Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, a top contender to win next year's presidential election, was convicted on corruption charges on July 12 and sentenced to nearly 10 years in prison.

The ruling marked a stunning fall for Lula, one of the country's most popular politicians, and a serious blow to his chances of a political comeback. The former union leader, who won global praise for policies to reduce stinging inequality in Brazil, faces four more corruption trials and will remain free on appeal.

The verdict represented the highest-profile conviction yet in a sweeping corruption investigation that for over three years has rattled Brazil, revealing a sprawling system of graft at top levels of business and government.

Judge Sergio Moro found Lula, 71, guilty of accepting 3.7 million reais (\$1.2 million) worth of bribes from engineering firm OAS SA, the amount of money prosecutors said the company spent refurbishing a beach apartment for Lula in return for his help winning contracts with state oil company Petroleo Brasileiro.

Federal prosecutors have accused Lula, Brazil's first working-class president from 2003 to 2011, of masterminding a long-running corruption scheme that was uncovered in a probe into kickbacks around Petrobras.

Lula's legal team said in an emailed statement that he was innocent and they would appeal.

"For over three years, Lula has been subject to a politically motivated investigation," they wrote. "No credible evidence of guilt has been produced, and overwhelming proof of his innocence blatantly ignored."

Lula's lawyer Cristiano Martins has repeatedly accused judge Moro of being biased against his client, which Moro strongly denies. Moro wrote in his ruling that he "took no personal satisfaction in this conviction, quite to the contrary."

"It's lamentable that a president of the republic is criminally convicted," Moro said. "No matter how important you are, no one is above the law." (Reuters)

FEDERER STANDS TALL AS RIVALS SHOW FRAILTY



LONDON (TIP): Roger Federer insists he is only slightly surprised to find himself tantalisingly within touching distance of a record eighth Wimbledon title despite his 36th birthday fast approaching.

The Swiss star reached the Wimbledon semifinals for the 12th time on July 12 (Wednesday) with a 6-4 6-2 7-6(4) win over Milos Raonic. It was his 100th match at the All England Club and the 50th Grand Slam quarterfinal of his career.

At 35, Federer is the second oldest man to reach the semifinals after Ken Rosewall who finished runner-up in 1974 at the age of 39.

With 'Big Four' rivals Andy Murray and Novak Djokovic suffering injury-hit exits on Wednesday and Rafael Nadal having lost in the fourth round, Federer is favourite to reclaim the Wimbledon title and break the tie for seven he has shared with Pete Sampras since 2012.

"The plan was always to hopefully be strong later on in my career," said Federer, who will face Tomas Berdych in Friday's semifinals.

"I don't see myself playing better than a few years ago. I always hope to improve every year. I'm just very happy that I'm still doing so well. Am I surprised? Maybe a little bit."

The contrast between Federer and Murray and Djokovic on Wednesday was impossible to ignore.

Defending champion and world No. 1 Murray lost in five sets to Sam Querrey, hobbled by a long-standing right hip injury. Djokovic, the three-time winner, quit after two games of the second set of his quarterfinal against Berdych with a right elbow injury. Like Murray's hip, the elbow problem plaguing Djokovic has been a constant menace for many seasons.

Federer has already trimmed back his schedule, skipping the 2016 and 2017 French Opens which were won by Djokovic and Nadal.

After losing to Raonic in the Wimbledon semifinals last year, Federer shut down his season to rest a knee injury which had already required surgery earlier in 2016.

He came back in January this year, won the Australian Open for his 18th Slam, added the Indian Wells-Miami Masters double before

hibernating again through the claycourt season.

"Once you hit 30, you've got to look back and think of how much tennis have I played, how much rest did I give my body over the years, how much training have I done, did I do enough, did I overdo it or not enough," he explained.

"It's always calibrating the whole thing. For me it worked out. Sometimes the body and the mind do need a rest."

VENUS ECLIPSES HOME FAVOURITE KONTA, TO MEET MUGURUZA IN FINAL



LONDON (TIP): Five-time champion Venus Williams rolled back the years to reach her first Wimbledon final since 2009 with a clinically executed 6-4 6-2 victory over British hope Johanna Konta on July 13 (Thursday).

Konta was looking to become the first woman on home soil to reach the Wimbledon final since Virginia Wade in 1977, but she was picked off at crucial times by the 37-year-old Williams, who will face Garbine Muguruza in Saturday's final.

Williams, who claimed the last of her Wimbledon titles nine years ago, was too strong for her opponent from the baseline and was able to produce booming serves whenever the Briton threatened.

After initially going toe-to-toe with the seven-time Grand Slam winner, Konta was unable to put Williams under sustained pressure and ended the contest a clear second best, losing eight of the final 10 games.

Konta saved two match points before Williams finally ended her resistance, smashing a forehand that flew past the Briton and left the American to twirl in celebration on Centre Court. "I've played a lot of finals here. One more win will be amazing. It won't be a given but I'll give it my all," Williams said.

"The crowd were very nice to me. The crowd were so fair, I know they love Jo."

Shastri, Zaheer, Dravid in India's new coaching team

MUMBAI (TIP): Ravi Shastri, the former India allrounder and team director, has been appointed head coach of the national side until the 2019 World Cup. Zaheer Khan has been named bowling consultant for the same tenure, while Rahul Dravid will be India's batting consultant for overseas Test series.

The confirmation came late on Tuesday night after the CoA impressed upon the BCCI's Cricket Advisory Committee (CAC), comprising Sourav Ganguly, Sachin Tendulkar and VVS Laxman, the urgent need

to end the uncertainty over the next India coach. The vacancy arose because Anil Kumble resigned after the Champions Trophy in June, stating that his partnership with India captain Virat Kohli had become "untenable". India went to the West Indies to play a limited-overs series without a head coach.

Shastri was one of five candidates the CAC interviewed for the role, along with Virender Sehwag, Tom Moody, Richard Pybus and Lalchand Rajput. He had not applied when the

BCCI invited applications for the first time, but did so after Kumble was no longer in the fray.

Shastri had applied for the role in 2016 as well, and was disappointed to lose out to Kumble, because India had done well during his tenure as director.

He had been appointed team director in August 2014 and under him, India made it to semi-finals of successive global events - the 2015 World Cup and the 2016 World T20 - and also climbed to No. 1 on the Test rankings for a period of eight weeks until February 2016.
