NEW DELHI (TIP): Narendra Modi took oath of office and secrecy as the Prime Minister of India for a second consecutive term amid thunderous applause from a select gathering in the sprawling forecourt of the Rashtrapati Bhavan, May 30th evening.

President Ram Nath Kovind administered the oath to Modi, 24 Cabinet colleagues, nine Ministers of State (Independent Charge) and 24 Ministers of State. The loudest cheer was reserved for BJP chief Amit Shah, whose induction means the party will have to elect a new president.

The event was marred by ally Janata Dal (United) deciding not to take oath even as party chief Nitish Kumar marked his presence by attending

JERUSALEM (TIP): Israeli lawmakers on Thursday, May 30, voted to dissolve Parliament and hold fresh elections after Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu failed to form a coalition before a midnight deadline, becoming the first prime minister-designate in the country's history who was unable to form a government. Air India Announces Schedule Change for Chicago Flight

NEW YORK (TIP): India's national carrier Air India announced schedule change for travel to and from Chicago. In its release it stated that effective June 1, 2019, up to June 30, 2019, their daily non-stop flight AI 127/AI 126 Delhi-Chicago-Delhi would operate as Delhi - Stockholm-Chicago -Delhi. AI 127 departs from Delhi at 22:05 hours (local time) and arrives in Chicago at 07:25 hours (local time) the following day. AI 126 departs from Chicago at 12:00 hours (local time) and arrives in New Delhi at 14:15 hours (local time) the following day.

According to media reports, the debt-laden airline recently decided to discontinue direct flight service between Mumbai and New York. The airline is reportedly discontinuing the flights on this route due to poor demand. It may be noted that direct flights between Mumbai and New York were started by the airline in December last year. According to reports, the direct flight operation between Mumbai and New York were causing losses to the airline. The carrier operated Mumbai-New York direct flights thrice a week. The operations were temporarily suspended in February when Pakistan closed its airspace for Indian flights and was expected to resume in June but the airline has decided to discontinue the service.

The Khorana program is named to honor Har Gobind Khorana, a pioneering Chemical-Biologist who deciphered the genetic code, chemically generated the first synthetic gene

and won the 1968 Nobel Prize for Physiology and Medicine while a faculty member at University of Wisconsin - Madison.

Khorana Program is funded by the Government of India's Department of Biotechnology (DBT) and supports students whose research interests are at the interface of biology and physical sciences, medicine, and technology.

The S. N. Bose program honors Satyendra Nath Bose, whose groundbreaking mathematical insights, first on his own in India and then with Albert Einstein underlie the fundamental

principles of quantum physics. His fundamental breakthroughs led to several discoveries with the latest, the Higgs-Boson, being awarded the 2013 Nobel Prize in Physics. The term "Boson" for fundamental particles was coined by the Nobelist Paul Dirac to honor S. N. Bose. The Bose program was launched by the Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB), in collaboration with Indo-US Science and Technology Forum (IUSSTF) and Winstep Forward (WSF) to support scholars from all sciences and engineering disciplines.

Deeply Concerned About Election Results in India, says Indian American Christian Organizations

WASHINGTON (TIP): The Federation of Indian American Christian Organizations (FIACONA) says that they are deeply concerned about the future of Indian Christians and the future of Indian democracy in the wake of just concluded national elections.

In a statement FIACONA has said:

"In a world that is getting more and more polarized on religious grounds, the return to power of a Hindu extremist party is not surprising.

Though all Hindu voters did not vote for extremist views of the Hindu party, many have. The assertion of extremist Hindus to claim a multi religious, multi-cultural and multi-linguistic country like the Union of India to their view of exclusive Hindu ideology is certainly troubling. Now this election has further deepened that to a crisis level.

Though, there are several reliable reports about rigging and large-scale voter fraud combined with voter suppression not to mention the "malfunctioning" of Electronic Voting Machines, EVMs, in many parts of the country during the elections, for a

student of Indian electorate, the margin with which the Hindu party is claiming victory seem very suspicious. (Interestingly, the "malfunctioning" EVM machines tallies votes only to the Hindu nationalist BJP party in every instance)

The fact that the BJP Hindu party and Prime Minister Modi's appeal failed in states like Tamil Nadu and Kerala shows that the level of cooperation and support needed from election officials to use the "malfunctioning" EVMs was not forthcoming easily in all states.

It is our firm belief that the political landscape of the country does not allow such margin of votes in an honest and transparent election.

We urge the world leaders to be cautious in their endorsement of the extremist Hindu ideology. A full endorsement of Modi's claim to victory will jeopardize the future of almost 2000-year-old church in India and will also cause tremendous disruption to the Unity of India as a one nation state envisioned by Mahatma Gandhi.

While we are concerned for the future of the church in India, we are also concerned about the very survival of the

Constitution of the Republic that guarantees equality and freedom of religion, expression and association to every citizen. Under a new "Hindu Constitution" which Modi and his party wants to implement; all these freedoms we take for granted may not exist. The BJP and Mr. Modi needed a two third majority in the Parliament in their scheme to replace the Constitution. They do have that strength in the Parliament now. Other requirements to change the Constitution are already in place.

All 600,000 Indian American Christians have strong ties to their mother churches back in India. Besides that, almost all mainstream and independent churches in the United States have close ties to this 2000-year-old church. An assault on the rights and independence of the church in India by the Hindu nationalist government headed by Modi and his gang would have direct and negative impact across Christendom and particularly among the Evangelical, Catholic and Protestant populations in the United States.

We continue to urge President Trump to re-asses his misplaced endorsement of Modi and his government."

Measles Outbreak in US Poses Serious Threat

WASHINGTON (TIP): There have been 971 cases of measles reported in the United States this year, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Thursday, May 30.

This means 2019, which is not quite half over, now has the greatest number of cases in a single year in nearly three decades. The number of cases in 1994 was 963, which was lower than in 1992 when there were 2,237 cases.

"Measles is preventable and the way to end this outbreak is to ensure that all

children and adults who can get vaccinated, do get vaccinated. Again, I want to reassure parents that vaccines are safe, they do not cause autism. The greater danger is the disease that vaccination prevents," said CDC Director Dr. Robert Redfield. (Read full story on www.theindianpanorama.news)

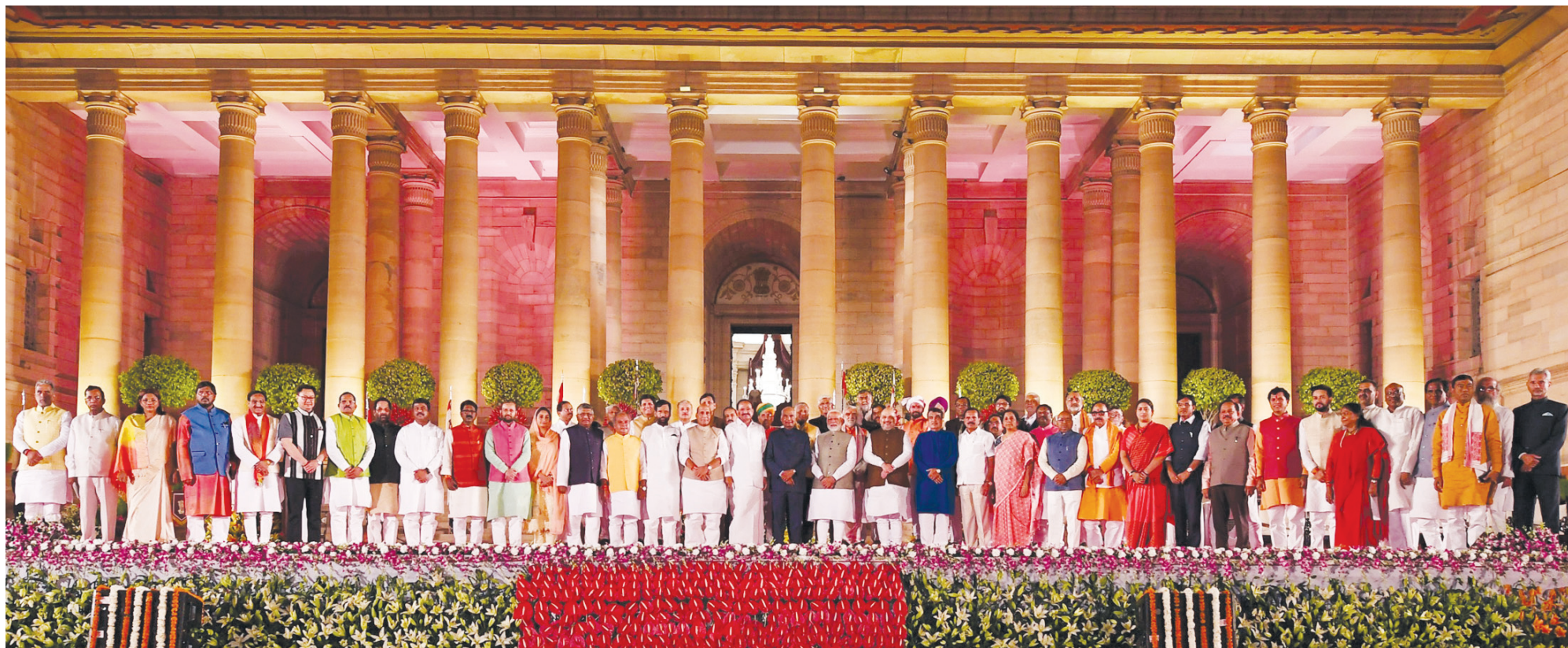

36 MINISTERS SWORN IN FOR SECOND TERM, 20 MPs FIRST-TIMERS

NEW DELHI (TIP): Rajnath Singh, Nitin Gadkari, Smriti Irani, Nirmala Sitharaman and Prakash Javadekar were among the 36 ministers who were sworn in Thursday for a second term, besides 20 MPs who took oath of office as cabinet ministers for the first time.

While 24 cabinet ministers were sworn-in the Modi government, nine took oath as ministers of state (Independent charge) and 24 others as ministers of state.

Ten of the newly-inducted ministers are from the Rajya Sabha and 45 are from the Lok Sabha Home minister in the previous Narendra Modi government, Rajnath Singh was the first to take oath after the prime minister.

Ram Vilas Paswan, DV Sadananda Gowda, Narendra Singh Tomar, Ravi Shankar Prasad, Harsimrat Kaur Badal, Thaawar Chand Gehlot, Harsh Vardhan, Piyush Goyal, Dharmendra Pradhan and Muqtar Abbas Naqvi were among those who got a second chance.

Giriraj Singh, Raj Kumar Singh, Hardeep Singh Puri, Ashwini Kumar Choubey, Sadhvi Niranjana Jyoti, Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Sripad Yaso Naik, Jitender Singh, Kiren Rijiju, Mansukh Mandavia, Arjun Ram Meghwal, Krishan Pal Gurjar, Sanjeev Kumar Balyan, Purshottam Rupala, Ramdas Athavale and Babul Supriyo, were among the ministers of state in the previous government who were retained in the new council.

Ram Vilas Paswan is not a member of either of the Houses and he has been promised a Rajya Sabha seat. Hardeep Puri, who is a Rajya Sabha MP, was reinducted into Modi's council of ministers despite losing the Lok Sabha polls. He was given a ticket by the BJP to contest from Amritsar. Prakash Javadekar who handled four portfolios in the previous regime of the Modi government including Human Resource Development, Environment, Information and Broadcasting and Parliamentary Affairs, was sworn in for a second term.

Mahendra Nath Pandey, who was appointed as the Minister of State for HRD in the Modi government before he was made president of

BJP's Uttar Pradesh unit in 2017, also took oath as a cabinet minister.

Similarly, Fagga Singh Kulaste, a six-time MP from Mandla constituency in Madhya Pradesh, who was Minister of State for Health in the previous government during 2016-17, was inducted in the new council of ministers.

While the inclusion of Amit Shah, seen as BJP's key strategist who helped the party to expand its base after taking over the reins of the party in 2014, was much speculated, former Foreign Secretary S Jaishankar, considered close to Modi, was a surprise pick.

Like Paswan, Jaishankar is also not a member of either of the Houses and he will be also fielded as a Rajya Sabha candidate.

Former Jharkhand chief minister Arjun Munda, former Uttarakhand chief minister Ramesh Pokhriyal, four-time MP from Karnataka's Dharwad-Prahlad Joshi, Shiv Sena's Arvind Sawant, five-time MP from Maharashtra's Jalna-Raosaheb Danve, Gangapuram Kishan Reddy from Telangana, three-time Hamirpur MP Anurag Thakur, were among those who took oath as Union ministers for the first time.

Other first-timers included Debasree Chaudhuri, Kailash Choudhary, Pratap Chandra Sarangi, Rameshwar Teli, Renuka Singh Saruta, V Muraleedharan, Ratan Lal Kataria, Nityanand Rai, Angadi Syresh Channabasappa and Dhotre Sanjay Shamrao.

Prahlad Singh Mulayam Singh Patel who was the Coal Minister in the Vajpayee government also took oath at the glittering ceremony at Rashtrapati Bhavan.

S Jaishankar, India's China expert, is surprise pick in PM Modi's cabinet

NEW DELHI (TIP): Former foreign secretary S Jaishankar, a surprise pick in Narendra Modi's council of ministers, is a seasoned diplomat who was the Indian government's pointsman for China and the US.

Jaishankar, son of late K Subrahmanyam, one of India's leading strategic analysts, was a key member of the Indian team which negotiated the landmark Indo-US nuclear deal.

The deal, initiated in 2005, took several years to craft, and was signed by the UPA government headed by Manmohan Singh in 2007.

Jaishankar's appointment as foreign secretary in January 2015 had evoked a sharp reaction from various quarters over the timing of the government's decision to remove Sujatha Singh.

The 64-year-old had earlier served as India's Ambassador to the US and before that to China.

A 1977-batch IFS officer, Jaishankar played a key role in resolving the crisis

following the incursion in Ladakh's Depsang and the Doklam stand-off, handling the tough negotiations with Beijing.

Among other positions, Jaishankar has been India's High Commissioner to Singapore and Ambassador to the Czech Republic.

Last year, Tata Group appointed Jaishankar, who was Indian foreign secretary from January 2015 to January 2018, as its president for global corporate affairs, within three months of his retirement from the government service.

A graduate of St Stephen's College, Jaishankar has an MA in Political Science and an MPhil and PhD in International Relations from Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU). Jaishankar is married to Kyoko Jaishankar and has two sons and a daughter.

In 2019, Jaishankar was conferred with Padma Shri, the fourth highest civilian award of the country.

BJP PRESIDENT TO UNION MINISTER, AMIT SHAH IN A NEW AVATAR

NEW DELHI (TIP): Hailed as the “Chanakya” of present day Indian Politics, Amit Shah, as the president of ruling BJP, meticulously crafted the handsome return of the Modi regime, has now been charted into the government.

Now with him in the government, Shah is all set to combine his astute political mind with his delivery skills to help his mentor Prime Minister Narendra Modi in implementing his governance agenda in the next five years.

It is broadly understood that Shah’s induction signals that he will now play a crucial role in the government and would remain eyes and ears of the Prime Minister in the government.

However, given the sequence in which the members of the council of ministers took oath, Rajnath Singh appeared to have retained officially the number two position in the government.

For all practical purposes, Shah has been the party’s second most powerful leader after Modi since he became its president in 2014 after the BJP-led NDA assumed power.

Shah made his debut in Lok Sabha with a massive win from Gandhinagar, a seat earlier represented by BJP veteran L K Advani. Shah (54) was a crucial aide to Modi during his near 13-year-old reign as Gujarat chief minister between 2001 and 2014, holding the powerful home portfolio. Though his organisational skills are much-storied since he delivered 71 of 80 Lok Sabha seats of Uttar Pradesh in 2014, prompting Modi to call him “man of the match” of the BJP’s win in that general election. Many in the party say he was instrumental in executing a slew of welfare policies of the party’s government in Gujarat.

He has strongly supported the expansion of National Register of Citizens in different parts of the country to identify and expel illegal immigrants, whom he has termed “termites”, scrapping of Article 370 and 35A, which gives special powers to Jammu and Kashmir, and building of Ram temple in Ayodhya.

Amit Shah likely to be FM

NEW DELHI (TIP): Narendra Modi is set to name Amit Shah, the chief of his Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), as the country’s new finance minister after taking his oath of office for the second time on Thursday, according to several Indian media reports.

As Modi’s right-hand man and long-time strategist, Shah would be in a powerful position to direct financial policy in Asia’s third-largest economy in his first role as a federal lawmaker. Shah masterminded the BJP’s landslide victory in the April-May general election, but there are questions about his lack of central government experience and financial background, especially at a time of growing signs of weakness in the economy.

Modi is expected to announce his ministers’ departments on Friday, after all of them were sworn in on Thursday evening at an open-air ceremony outside the colonial-era presidential palace with some 8,000 guests including Bollywood stars and leaders of neighbours Bangladesh and Sri

Lanka.

Shah is tipped to replace Arun Jaitley, who wrote to Modi on Wednesday asking not to be considered for a ministerial position because of health problems.

Shah would be taking over the finance portfolio at a sensitive time. He will probably need to move quickly to stimulate an economy beset by weak farm incomes, slow jobs growth and falling sales of key consumer goods including cars and motorbikes.

This week, two major industrial bodies called on the new government to take steps to bolster a growth rate that slowed to 6.6% in the three months to December - the lowest in five quarters - and is expected to have dropped further to 6.3 percent between January and March.

Several investors and traders said they did not expect Indian markets to react much if Shah’s appointment was confirmed, believing his ability to get things done would offset his lack of financial experience.

SUSHMA SWARAJ AMONG EX-MINISTERS ABSENT FROM PM MODI’S NEW CABINET

NEW DELHI (TIP): In a major surprise, Sushma Swaraj, one of the senior-most leaders of the BJP, was among seven ministers of the previous Council of Ministers to be dropped as Prime Minister Narendra Modi formed his government for the second term.

The 67-year-old Swaraj who has held key positions in the party and its governments since decades was conspicuous by her absence in the new Cabinet.

Also missing in the new Council of Ministers were Suresh Prabhu, JP Nadda, Mahesh Sharma, Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore and Jayant Sinha.

Although the reasons for Swaraj’s omission were not immediately clear, the main reason possibly could be her ill-health.

Swaraj, who was External Affairs Minister during the previous term of Modi government, did not contest the Lok Sabha elections this time, declaring that her health did not permit her to enter the fray and campaign.

During her tenure as the External Affairs Minister, she was very popular among the Indian diaspora and the compatriots stranded anywhere across the globe. Just one tweet to her about any problem any Indian faced anywhere and she would immediately swing into action and activate the Indian mission in those countries for help.

When the BJP was in Opposition during the UPA government from 2004 to 2014, Swaraj was the Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha and a successful one.

Along with her, Prabhu, who held the key portfolios of Railways and then Commerce and Industry and Civil Aviation, also did not find a place in the new Council of Ministers.

Nadda, who was the Health Minister in the previous term, was also absent from the list of ministers this time. However, there is speculation that he could be made the BJP President to succeed Amit Shah who has been included in the Cabinet.

Rathore, a former Olympian, who was a successful Sports and Information and Broadcasting Minister, also did not figure in the list of ministers.

Gen V.K. Singh, a former Army Chief who was Minister of State for External Affairs earlier, was also dropped this time, as was Mahesh Sharma, the Minister for Tourism and Culture in the previous government.

Jayant Sinha, Minister of State for Finance in the previous government, also was missing in the new Cabinet.

He is the son of former BJP leader Yashwant Sinha, who has been extremely critical of Modi.

Nadda emerges as likely replacement for BJP president

NEW DELHI (TIP): BJP leader JP Nadda has emerged as the likely replacement for Amit Shah as the party president after he was left out of the Union Council of Ministers, which was sworn in on Thursday, according to BJP sources.

With Shah joining the Cabinet of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, he may demit the office of BJP chief as part of the party’s “one-person one-post” principle.

Nadda, a Brahmin leader from Himachal Pradesh, enjoys the confidence of the party’s top brass, is trusted by the Rashtriya Swayamsewak Sangh — the party’s ideological parent — and enjoys a clean reputation.

He was the health minister in the first Modi government.

That Nadda (58) maintains a low profile also goes in his favour as the new party president



will be expected to run the organisation in cohesion with the government and carry on with organisational agenda firmed up by Shah.

He is a member of the BJP’s parliamentary board, its top decision-making body having its most important members, which gives him requisite seniority for the job as well, party sources said.

SIX WOMEN MINISTERS SWORN IN

NEW DELHI (TIP): A number of women ministers were inducted into Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s new Cabinet. Senior BJP leaders Nirmala Sitharaman, Smriti Irani and Harsimrat Kaur Badal are some of the prominent women ministers in the newly elected government.

Defence minister in the Modi government 1.0, Nirmala Sitharaman, 60, is one of the six women who have been sworn in as part of the new government. She is a Rajya Sabha member and the second woman to helm the key ministry after former PM Indira Gandhi who had held the portfolio in the seventies. Giant killer Smriti Irani, 43, who defeated Congress chief Rahul Gandhi from the Gandhi bastion of Amethi, has also taken oath as a Cabinet minister in the new government. Irani has held a number of portfolios earlier.

Harsimrat Kaur Badal, 53, the former union minister for food processing and Member of Parliament from Bathinda is another woman MP who has secured a ministerial berth for the second consecutive term in PM Modi’s new Cabinet.

Sadhvi Niranjani Jyoti, 52, has been sworn in as a Minister of State in the new Cabinet.

Renuka Singh Saruta, 58 was sworn in as a Minister of State in the Modi government. A BJP leader from West Bengal, Deboshree Chowdhury is a first timer in the newly elected government. She has taken oath as a Minister of State.

Get priorities right: Modi 2.0 should address key issues in earnest

The BJP-led NDA rode on PM Narendra Modi's combative nationalism to vanquish the Opposition in the Lok Sabha elections. Now that the new government has taken charge, the PM can't keep harping on national security as a host of issues require immediate attention. The expectations are even higher this time as the NDA has had a stable five-year run, unencumbered by the whims of self-seeking allies. The failure to create enough jobs for the youth has been a huge let-down. India's unemployment rate

reached a 45-year high of 6.1 per cent in 2017-18, according to the National Sample Survey Office's periodic labor force survey. The desperate but futile attempt to keep this report under wraps in the run-up to the elections showed the powers that be in a poor light. An action plan should be readied at the earliest to tackle joblessness, with an eye on energizing the 'Make in India' campaign.

The farming community - a key vote bank that ensures the nation's food security - can't be left to fend for itself. Farmers have been at the receiving end as

the average food prices in 2018-19 were almost the same as these were in 2017-18, a trend not witnessed for almost three decades. Remunerative prices for their produce can help cultivators cope with agrarian distress. The direct income support of Rs 6,000 per year to small and marginal farmers, announced in the 2019-20 Interim Budget, should be hiked substantially.

Environmental issues were conspicuous by their absence from the electoral narrative, but these are too critical to be ignored for long. The

government's roadmap in this regard should go beyond the rejuvenation of Ganga and Yamuna rivers. India can't afford to take climate change lightly anymore. As the PM and BJP president Amit Shah have on Thursday sworn in the name of God to uphold the Constitution, they should at the very outset take up the challenge of maintaining communal amity. A stable and strong government should be synonymous with peaceful co-existence of various communities, not with lynch mobs, self-styled vigilantes and hate-mongers. (Tribune, India)

Expect an Era of Greater Cooperation between USA and India

President Trump, as soon as he was informed of the election results, took to Twitter and wrote:

"Congratulations to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his BJP party on their big election victory! Great things are in store for the U.S.-India partnership with the return of the Prime Minister Modi at the helm. I look forward to continuing our important work together."

The next day, May 24, Trump tweeted:

"Just spoke to Prime Minister Narendra Modi when I congratulated him on his big political victory. He is a great man and leader of the people of India - they are lucky to have him."

What is the meaning of President Trump's tweet: GREAT THINGS ARE IN STORE FOR THE U.S. -INDIA PARTNERSHIP WITH THE RETURN OF THE PRIME MINISTER MODI AT THE HELM. I LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING OUR IMPORTANT WORK TOGETHER.?"

For the first time since India won independence 72 years ago, the United States has decided to support India and upgrade its relations to the highest level. President Trump called India the closest ally of USA, on a par with the United Kingdom. Trump has also allowed India to transfer 100% of all U.S. technologies, hitherto fore restricted. US will be sharing its intelligence and communications with India. It is a well-known fact that modern warfare is won thru sophisticated technology.

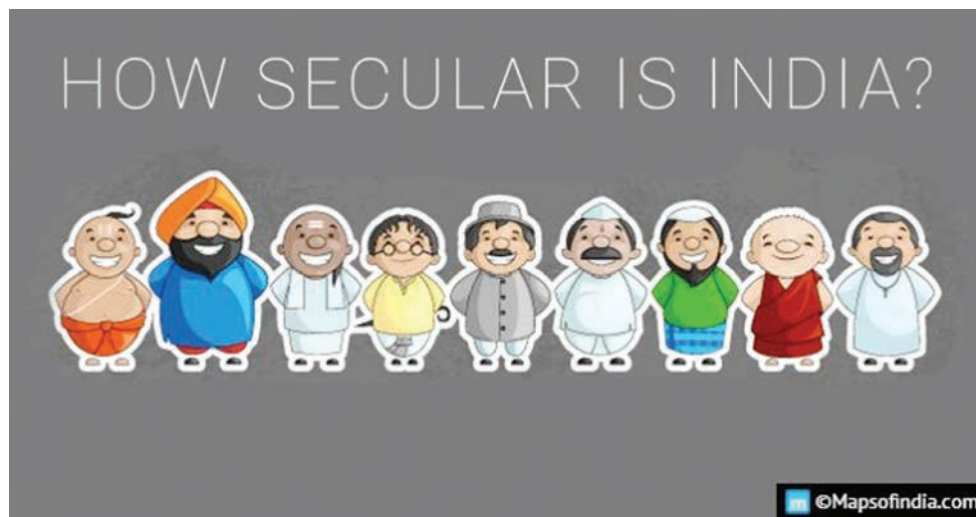
How to rescue genuine secularism

Secularism combats not just discrimination and other worse forms of inter-religious domination such as exclusion, oppression and humiliation. It is equally opposed to intra-religious domination, i.e. the domination (of women, Dalits, dissenters) within every religious community.

One word conspicuous by its absence not only from the election campaign but perhaps from the entire political discourse in recent times was secularism. Prime Minister Narendra Modi brought it back in his victory speech. Most political parties in the last 30 years had practiced a naqli (fake) secularism, he said. His great achievement, he implied, was to have unmasked these fake secularists and single-handedly dismantled secularism. Until now, for Mr. Modi, fake secularism has been the handmaiden of minority appeasement. Next day, however, he spoke of winning back the trust of the minorities, who, he said, have been deceived and cheated by other parties. With this, fake secularism was given a different meaning; it does not pamper but cheats minorities. In other words, it does not satisfy their real needs, but only gives the illusion of doing so. Here, Mr. Modi acknowledges that Muslims are a deprived lot. So, what, according to Mr. Modi, is asli (genuine) secularism? The answer he gives is the inclusion of minorities in 'sabka saath sabka vikas', which is translated by his party as 'justice to all, appeasement to none'. To this he added 'sabka vishwas', winning the trust of all.



Fears of minorities

On the treatment of minorities by other parties, the Prime Minister is partly right and partly wrong. Wrong, because the insecurity amongst minorities is created largely by Mr. Modi's own political supporters. Lynchings in the past few years and the fear such random violence creates are only the tip of this gigantic iceberg. Right, because when in power, most non-Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) parties have done little more than provide security. Now, the condition of feeling safe and secure must not be underestimated. Freedom from fear is important, and to live in the fear of being lynched only because you are a Muslim is a very real unfreedom indeed. Yet, political parties have not helped Muslims with their vikas. Some have even pampered the orthodoxy within their communities and have done little to bring them out of their ghettos. So, this secularism is partly fake because it has often meant tolerating minority communalism and hobnobbing with the most selfish and conservative spokespersons of the multiple Muslim communities of India.

It is very sad indeed that in the election campaign, these 'fake secularists' failed miserably to speak up for Muslims. Perhaps they were terrified that if they spoke of the legitimate interests of Muslims, they would be immediately branded as pro-Pakistan, anti-national or anti-Hindu. Yes, 'fake' secularism has failed the minorities and the people of India, but the BJP and its supporters, particularly the so-called 'fringe', must take a lot of blame for that. This needs course correction and the nation would be grateful to the Prime Minister if he began that process.

But is the secularism propounded or implied by the Prime Minister genuine? At least in theory, 'sabka saath sabka vikas' gets one thing right: no individual citizen should face discrimination on grounds of religion. Basic amenities, good health, education, housing and employment should be available equally to all, regardless of their religion. If he succeeds in this endeavor, he would make great strides towards realizing secularism.

However, secularism combats not just discrimination and other worse forms of inter-religious domination such as exclusion, oppression and humiliation. It

is equally opposed to intra-religious domination, i.e. the domination (of women, Dalits, dissenters) within every religious community. For instance, the fight against the hierarchical caste system in India, quite like the struggle against the church in European history, is integral to the fight for secularism - a point noted by both Ambedkar and Nehru. Equally important for secularism is opposition to religious fanaticism and bigotry. Neither of these is explicitly captured by 'sabka saath, sabka vikas'.

Misunderstanding secularism

That Indian secularism is not anti-religious is widely understood - but not that it is simultaneously against both forms of institutionalized religious domination. How did this misunderstanding develop? First, the struggle against inter-religious domination (a defense of minority rights, opposition to majority and minority communalism) became separated from the fight against intra-religious domination (religion-related patriarchy and caste domination, fanaticism, bigotry and extremism). Then, this intra-religious dimension was jettisoned from the meaning of secularism and, much to the detriment of its overall value, secularism began to be identified, by proponents and opponents alike, exclusively with the defense of minority rights.

This opened the door for viewing secularism first as a tool to protect the interests of Muslims and Christians, of no relevance to Hindus, and then for twisting it to appear as pro-Muslim and anti-Hindu. The strength of Indian secularism - its advocacy of minority cultural rights - was easily made to appear as its weakness and the burden of its defense, rather than be shared by all citizens, fell on the shoulders of minorities and 'pro-minority' secularists. This is unfair. Secularism is needed as much to protect Hindus from intra-religious domination, from their 'fringe elements', as well as from proponents of religion-based caste and gender hierarchies. And required equally to protect minorities from their own orthodoxies and extremisms. Asli secularism plays that role. Naqli secularism protects fanatics and legitimizes gender and caste-based domination.

Secularism today has other problems. One is its intellectual failure to

distinguish communitarianism from communalism. Communitarianism simply notes that an individual is at least partly defined by his or her religious/philosophical commitments, community and traditions. Therefore, it is entirely appropriate to claim that one is a Hindu/ Muslim/ Sikh/ Christian/ atheist etc, and to take legitimate pride in one's community or be ashamed of it when there is good reason to be.

Communalism is different. Here one's identity and the existence and interests of one's community are viewed, even defined, as necessarily opposed to others. It is communal to believe or act in a way that presupposes that one can't be a Hindu without being anti-Muslim, or vice-versa. Communalism is communitarianism gone sour. It is to see each other as enemies locked in a permanent war with one another. Every decent Indian national should be against communalism. But no one should decry legitimate forms of communitarianism. It is simply wrong to conflate communitarianism with communalism.

Attention must also be drawn to another problem of Indian secularism. Our education system often fails to distinguish religious instruction and religious education. No publicly funded school or college should have religious instruction, best done at home or in privately funded schools; but reasonable, decent education should include elementary knowledge of all religious traditions. A deeper understanding of these traditions is vital, for it would enable students to discern their strengths and weaknesses and identify what in them is worth preserving or discarding. But Indians come out of their education system without any critical understanding of their religio-philosophical traditions. As a result, a defense of our own religious traditions or critique of others is shallow and frequently mischievous. This too is fake secularism.

What is to be done?

What then must be expected from real, genuine secularism? Justice to all citizens, affirmation of all reasonable religious identities, rejection of majority communalism, careful defense of legitimate minority rights only when accompanied by a robust critique of minority extremism, and a critical appraisal of religions with a deeper, empathetic grasp of their traditions. The government's primary business is to prevent religion-based violence, oppression and discrimination. Perhaps, those outside the government should attend to its other functions. Together, we may just rescue our genuine secularism.

God has no need for the hunger or thirst of someone who hurts others, violates their dignity, or usurps their rights. The consciousness of behavior and vigilance over action are the most profound dimensions of fasting: the fasting of the heart focuses on the attachment to the divine. That is when Ramadan becomes a source of peace and solace, just as Christmas or Dussehra goes beyond the rituals to bring forth kindness, charity, and caring.

Whether you are an Atheist, Baha'i, Buddhist, Christian, Hindu, Jain, Jewish, Native American, Pagan, Shinto, Sikh, Wicca, and Zoroastrian or from any other tradition, you may feel a sense of connection with the spirit of Ramadan.

Don't we all want to get along and live without tensions and fear? Of course, we do. When we live in a community, we might as well learn about each other. The best way to build cohesive societies is for its members to understand each other's sorrows and joys, and festivities and commemorations. Wouldn't it be nice if you know a little bit about your neighbor's festival and perhaps invite them to your celebrations?

Every human and every religious group celebrate something or the other in their way, each one is different, but the essence is the same, that is celebrations and commemorations.

Festivities bring people together. Here we explore Ramadan, two of the major festivals of Muslims. A simple language is used for most people to get a gist of it.

Rituals signify the milestones of our daily life. Every significant moment of the day is a ritual. Every faith is composed of a set of unique rituals to bring discipline and peace to human life. Fasting is one of the five essential rituals that Muslims around the world observe.

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic lunar calendar and is generally observed with a ritual precision; it is an annual training or a refresher. It requires one to abstain from food, drink, intimacy, ill-will, ill-talk, ill-actions and other temptations from dawn to dusk, every day for the whole month. One has to rise above his or her baser desires. Islam gifts this month to its followers to teach discipline to bring moderation to their daily lives.

Although Ramadan is popularly known in the west for its culinary delicacies and fancy iftars (ceremonial breaking of fast at sundown), the spirit and intent of Ramadan lie in a human transformation in a month-long inner spiritual journey of finding oneself in tune with spirituality.

Hindus can see that transformation in nine days of fasting during Navaratri, the Jains in 8-10 days of fasting during Paryushana, Christians during 40 days of lent, Jews for seven days around Yom Kippur, and likewise you find fasting is a way of life in most traditions.

God has no need for the hunger or thirst of someone who hurts others, violates their dignity, or usurps their rights. The consciousness of behavior and vigilance over action are the most profound dimensions of fasting: the fasting of the heart focuses on the attachment to the divine. That is when Ramadan becomes a source of peace and solace, just as Christmas or Dussehra goes beyond the rituals to bring forth



kindness, charity, and caring.

True fasting is self-purification; and from this comes an abundant inner life that brings about values such as justice, generosity, patience, kindness, forgiveness, mercy, and empathy -- values that are indispensable for the success of the community.

Ramadan will come and go with such stealth that we cannot but be reminded of our mortality. What is it that we value and why? Habits, customs, even obsessive behavior like smoking can be curtailed with relative ease in the face of a higher calling.

For fasting to be truly universal, its benefits must extend beyond the fraternal ties of Muslims and must continue to forging a common humanity with others. Fasting is meant to impart a sense of what it means to be truly human, and its observance reflects its universality in Baha'i, Buddhist, Christian, Hindu, Jain, Jewish, Sikh, Zoroastrian and other faiths.

Eid Rundown!

The number of days one fast corresponds with the Moon cycle, which varies from 29 to 30 days. At the end of the fasting period, it is time to celebrate! It is thanking the creator, living a disciplined life, and rewarding yourselves.

Before you celebrate, the essential duty is to pay fitra, sort of income tax, and it is roughly 2.5% of your earnings. To make your celebration wholesome, and guilt-free, you thank the Lord for your blessings and share a portion with the underprivileged, so they can also celebrate along with you. The idea is to fill the environment with positive energy.

Chand Raat - That is the evening of moon sighting, it is a shopping spree and surprise gifts for children in particular but for all in general.

Eid - festivity. The whole community

gathers up wearing new clothes and thank Allah for completing the blessed month of Ramadan.

Practices differ in each town. In Dallas, Texas, they rented the Auto Exhibit hall in Fair Park that held about 25,000 people with ample parking. I saw a similar happening in Louisville, Kentucky. Back in Yelahanka, a suburb of Bangalore, all of us went to the Eidgah - a place for large congregations.

Back in the late 70's film Actor Mehmood lived near my town, and he invited many actors for Eid celebrations at his home. Amitabh Bachchan, Rajesh Khanna, and other actors joined in the Eid prayers with Mehmood.

Eid is also a day to pray for the deceased; almost all Muslims visit the cemeteries and pray for their loved ones. It is one of the most beautiful prayers that seeks forgiveness for all humanity, for the living, and the deceased.

Typically, it is a day to clean your slate, seek forgiveness from the ones you have hurt or forgive those who have hurt you. When you see Muslims hugging each other, it is washing off ill-will from their hearts for each other.

Now comes the food!

The most popular dessert of Ramadan in South Asia is "Dum ke Saviyan" and "Sheer Qurma" - that is vermicelli's cooked with milk, cashew, raisins, and other dry fruits. My favorite!

Each nation has its food and delicacies. Goat Biryani is the most common item in South Asia.

Most people have an open house on the day of the Eid, check with your Muslim friends and visit them and enjoy the fellowship and food.

Top Afghan officials hold talks with Pak authorities

ISLAMABAD (TIP): A high-level Afghan delegation led by national security adviser has held talks with top civilian and military officers in Pakistan, discussing security issues, peace process with Taliban and also to prepare the ground for a possible visit of President Ashraf Ghani next month.

Hamdullah Mohib – who led a high-powered delegation that included the Afghan interior minister – was the first senior Afghan official to have travelled to Islamabad in months.

The crucial talks with Pakistani authorities, including Army chief Qamar Javed Bajwa, were part of the latest push by the two neighbours to remove irritants in their bilateral ties that have undermined efforts for a peace deal in Afghanistan, officials said on May 29.

Diplomatic officials said that main engagements were with the security officials but foreign secretary Sohail Mahmood also attended delegation level talks on border security, Afghan peace process and political ties.

Army spokesman in brief statement on Wednesday said that Mohib also met Army Chief Qamar Javed Bajwa.

“Matters related to mutual interest, peace and stability in the region, Pak-Afghan border management and



prospects for peace with particular emphasis on reconciliation process in Afghanistan were discussed,” the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) said in a statement.

Diplomatic sources said that Ghani was likely to visit Pakistan next month for which was invited by Prime Minister Imran Khan when the Afghan leader talked over phone with him last month.

Mohib mission was to hold initial talks on key issues to see if progress was possible during visit of President Ghani.

Pakistan’s role is considered as a key to bring peace in Afghanistan.

The Afghan peace initiative has been moving at a snail’s pace due to refusal of the Taliban to sit for talks with the Afghan government officials.

Taliban leader Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar is the co-founder of the Taliban movement with Mullah Omar who remained a synonym for the Taliban

until his death was disclosed in 2015. Mullah Baradar was arrested in 2010 in joint ISI-CIA operation from Karachi but released by Pakistan last year to help jumpstart the peace process.

But there are many irritants undermining such efforts, including the trust deficit between Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Kabul is still wary of Islamabad’s role in the peace process. Pakistan, on the other hand, has its own list of grievances, including Afghanistan’s patronage of certain militant groups that often launch attacks from across the border.

A senior official said the Afghan NSA’s visit was meant to discuss all such issues. The official said Pakistan was trying to improve ties with Afghanistan and the visit of President Ghani could help achieve that goal.

The Taliban are currently holding talks with the US but have so far refused to sit across the table with the Kabul administration. They are in discussion to end more than a 17-year long bloody war in Afghanistan.

The Taliban control nearly half of Afghanistan, and are more powerful than at any time since the 2001 US-led invasion after the 9/11 terror attacks in 2001. PTI

Pak authorities arrest 3 JuD members from Punjab province

LAHORE (TIP): Three members of the Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed-led Jamaat-ud-Dawa have been arrested on the charges of terror financing in Pakistan’s Punjab province, amid pressure from the global community on Islamabad to rein in the militant groups.

In a statement issued here on May 30, the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) of Punjab police said it arrested the three members during a raid on their hideout in Faisalabad, some 150 kilometres from Lahore.

“Millions of rupees have been recovered from their possession which they had collected for terror-financing,” it said.

The CTD also said a report had been submitted to the Anti-Terrorism Court in Faisalabad against them.

Last week, the Pakistani authorities arrested 10 members of the Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) terror group in Punjab on similar charges.

A nation-wide crackdown against terror financing had been under way, police said.

The Pakistan government has launched a crackdown against the outlawed organisations under the National Action Plan 2015 to eliminate militancy and extremism from the country’s soil.

The Imran Khan-led government has also announced the freezing of accounts and seizure of assets linked to organisations banned by the UN Security Council. PTI

Blast hits Afghanistan capital Kabul

KABUL (TIP): A large explosion hit Kabul on May 31, sending a plume of white smoke into the sky, according to Reuters reporters in the Afghan capital.

There was no immediate word on the cause or casualties from the blast, which came a day after Islamic State claimed a suicide attack outside a military training academy that killed at least six people. Reuters

Pak teacher booked for forcing student to eat grass

ISLAMABAD (TIP): A Pakistani school teacher has been booked for forcing a primary school student to eat grass as punishment for not learning his lesson. The incident happened at the Government Primary School in Fatehpur, Lodhran, a small city in Pakistan’s Punjab province, Dawn newspaper reported on May 29.

The video of the school teacher went viral on social media, showing seven-year-old Kashan being forced to either eat grass or read out the lesson in front of his class fellows. The video clip shows Kashan failing to read the lesson and instead ending up eating grass after being forced by his teacher -- identified as Hamid Raza. (PTI)

HIV positive Pak woman murdered by husband after objecting to his second marriage decision

KARACHI (TIP): A 30-year-old HIV positive Pakistani woman was killed by her husband in Sindh province after she objected to his decision to marry again, police said. The incident happened in a village near Larkana district on Wednesday when the husband of Kareema Rind insisted for a second marriage after she was recently tested HIV positive during a blood test.

“The HIV positive woman who had five children refused to allow the second marriage and her husband, Bahadur Rind with the help of his brothers strangled the woman and hanged her from the tree in the village,” Faheem Tunio, a police officer, said.

The body was handed over to relatives after post-mortem examination, the Dawn newspaper reported.

The police registered an FIR against Bahadur, his brother Darya Khan Rind and relative Johar Rind on the complaint of Akbar Rind, brother of the deceased, the paper reported.

Muzaffar Ghangro, a doctor from the district, who was arrested on the suspicion of having spread the HIV virus with infected needles at his clinic has been cleared of “intentionally” spreading the deadly virus in Ratodero town. The virus but it confirmed the doctor was one of the major sources for the virus’ spread. PTI

Maldives ex-President Nasheed elected Parliament Speaker

MALE (MALDIVES) (TIP): The Maldives’ Parliament has overwhelmingly voted the country’s first democratically elected President as the Speaker of the House.

Mohamed Nasheed received 67 votes from among 87 members. His rival received 17 votes past midnight May 28.

The Speaker also has a role in the Judicial Services Commission that regulates the Supreme Court, and is third in line should the positions of the President and Vice-President become vacant.

President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih’s Maldivian Democratic Party has swept the parliamentary elections, winning 65 out of 87 seats. Last year, Solih defeated strongman Yameen Abdul Gayoom in the presidential vote.

The elections paved the way for Nasheed’s return home after years in exile. Nasheed, a former pro-democracy activist was elected President of the Indian Ocean archipelago in 2008, ending a 30-year autocratic government. He resigned in 2012 amid public upheaval over his decision to arrest a senior judge.

He lost the 2013 presidential election to Yameen, and was later jailed over the judge’s arrest following a trial criticised for due process violations. He was granted asylum in Britain when he travelled there for medical treatment.

Nasheed had planned to campaign from neighbouring Sri Lanka but gave

up plans to contest the 2018 election because his candidacy could have become invalid as he was still serving his sentence.

Nasheed and other politicians jailed under Yameen’s government were released after Solih was elected to office while others returned from exile. — AP

Everest logjam fails to thwart climber’s record 14-peak bid

KATHMANDU (TIP): Former Gurkha soldier Nirmal Purja remains on target to conquer the world’s 14 highest mountains in a record-breaking seven months despite death-defying queues on the biggest peak of them all.

Waiting for more than seven hours last week to get to the top of Everest and then back to the safety of his camp -- in a pile-up that he documented in a photo that has gone viral -- injected doubts into Purja’s minute-by-minute strategy.

“My plan was to climb Everest and Lhotse as fast as possible, breaking my own previous record but that day, I was stuck in traffic,” Purja told AFP back in the comfort of Kathmandu. In 2017, the ex-British specialforces member climbed the two mountains in a record 10 hour and 15 minutes. “I sat four hours on the way up and three and half hours on the way down and that kind of made me (worry) like I won’t be able to achieve the record,” he said. - AFP



MOUNI ROY IS HAPPILY SINGLE, 'MY WORK IS KEEPING ME BUSY'

She has been keeping very busy, signing films back-to-back and that has left very little time for Mouni Roy to focus on her personal life. The actor, who was earlier reportedly dating a co-star, Mohit Raina, shares she is enjoying her 'single' phase, more so given that her work is keeping her occupied.

"I am completely, absolutely single and the way they say it, in love with my work now. There is no time for anything else. And I am completely enjoying the phase... once there is someone in my life, everyone will get to know about it," laughs the actor, who has been quite a popular TV star.

Asked about the former co-star she was reportedly dating, she chooses not to answer the question. Rather, Mouni says she would prefer talking about her films. And there are three of them on the list at present — Brahmastra, Made in China and Bole Chudiyaan. Mouni shares that she has got two more offers, but they are still at the discussion stage.

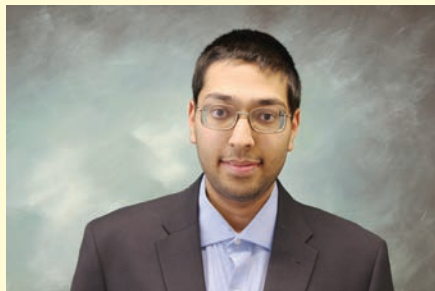

Each year, the Goldwater Foundation seeks scholars committed to a career in science, mathematics or engineering who display intellectual intensity and who have the potential for significant future contribution in their chosen field. Those students are given funding for undergraduate tuition and living expenses.

"I am greatly honored by the Goldwater Scholarship," Bansil said. "I believe that the Goldwater Scholarship will help me pursue my dream to attend graduate school and excel in mathematics."

Bansil is from Farmington Hills, Michigan, and graduated from North Farmington High School.

He has been active in various mathematical research opportunities both at MSU and other institutions. In 2017, he won first place in MSU's Herzog competition, earning him a spot representing MSU in the international Putnam Competition Top 150.

Paris wants a 'Princess Diana Square' at site of her death

PARIS (TIP): Paris City Hall wants to name a small plaza after Princess Diana, at the site of the 1997 car crash that killed the cherished British royal. The site is adjacent to the Alma Tunnel where the accident occurred.

The plaza is currently named after opera singer Maria Callas. A city hall official said on Thursday that the city council would vote next month on a measure to rename it after Diana.

The city noted that Callas already had a nearby avenue named after her, and that the city wanted to honour Diana for her humanitarian work.

The 36-year-old princess, her boyfriend and driver died after their Mercedes crashed into a concrete pillar in the tunnel. AP

Over 7,50,000 EU nationals seek UK residence for Brexit

LONDON (TIP): Britain has received 7,50,000 applications from EU citizens seeking to settle in the UK in the first four months of 2019, with Poles leading the way, official data showed on May 30.

The government's scheme for offering an estimated 3.8 million EU nationals the right to live permanently in Britain after Brexit has been riddled with controversy.

Responding to a public outcry, Prime Minister Theresa May in January scrapped a 65 (USD 82, 74-euro) fee that would have been imposed had a so-called "no-deal Brexit" gone into effect.

The programme's status has been weighed further by uncertainties over when—or even if—Britain pulls out of the EU.

The UK interior ministry said 10,30,000 Polish citizens had applied for permanent residence in the first four months of the year.

Romanians filed 90,000 applications and Italians 71,000, the figures showed. Portugal and Spain rounded out the top five.

The scheme is being overseen by Home Secretary Sajid Javid, who is one of 11 declared candidates in the race to succeed May as government chief in July.

"EU citizens are our friends, neighbours and colleagues who



contribute so much to this country. Whatever the outcome of Brexit we want them to stay," Javid said in a statement.

"Our free and straightforward EU Settlement Scheme has already seen 7,50,000 applications - which is immensely encouraging. I hope this early success continues in the coming months." Economic worries and a desire to limit migration—particularly from eastern European countries such as Poland and Romania—was one of the factors that pushed voters to back Brexit

in 2016.

Britain's split from the other 27 EU nations, originally scheduled for March 29, was delayed until April 12 then postponed until October 31 due to the UK parliament's refusal to approve the sides' separation terms.

London may still ask Brussels to grant it another extension, or decide to walk away without a deal—an option that businesses worry would lead to chaos at the border and across the broader economy. — AFP

Saudi Arabia gathers Arab leaders over attacks on oil assets

JEDDAH (SAUDI ARABIA) (TIP): Arab leaders gather in Saudi Arabia on Thursday for emergency summits that Riyadh hopes will deliver a strong message to Iran that regional powers will defend their interests against any threat following attacks on Gulf oil assets this month.

Saudi and the United Arab Emirates, which have lobbied Washington to contain their foe Iran, have said they want to avoid war after drone strikes on oil pumping stations in the kingdom and the sabotage of oil tankers off the UAE coast.

Riyadh accused Tehran of ordering the drone strikes, which were claimed by Yemen's Iran-aligned Houthi group. A top US security official said Iranian mines were "almost certainly" used in the tanker operation. Tehran denies any involvement.

Saudi Foreign Minister Ibrahim al-Assaf told a gathering of his counterparts in Jeddah ahead of the summits that the attacks must be addressed with "strength and firmness".

"While summit leaders are likely to discuss how best to avoid a war, King Salman is equally determined to defend Saudi and Arab interests amid increasing tensions between the US and Iran," Prince Turki al-Faisal, former Saudi intelligence chief and envoy, wrote in an opinion piece published by Al Arabiya.

He said the meetings of Sunni Muslim

Gulf leaders and Arab leaders at midnight in Mecca would discuss Shi'ite Iran's "interference" in Arab affairs.

Tensions have risen between the United States and Iran after Washington quit a multinational nuclear deal with Iran, re-imposed sanctions and boosted its military presence in the Gulf.

US National Security Advisor John Bolton said on Wednesday that the attack near a UAE bunkering hub was connected to the strike on pumping stations on the kingdom's East-West pipeline—both alternative oil shipping routes to the Strait of Hormuz—and a rocket attack on Baghdad's Green Zone.

"There is no doubt in anybody's mind in Washington who is responsible for this and I think it's important that the leadership in Iran know that we know," Bolton said of the operation against four vessels, including two Saudi oil tankers.

He said the United States was trying to take a "prudent and responsible" approach but warned Tehran against any new attacks.

An Iranian official dismissed Bolton's remarks as "a ludicrous claim". The Islamic Republic has said it would defend itself against any military or economic aggression.

Budapest boat capsizes: Victims weren't wearing life jackets

BUDAPEST (TIP): Initial investigation into the Budapest tour boat capsizing that claimed the lives of seven South Korean tourists had revealed that none of the victims were wearing life jackets, authorities said.

Thirty-five people--including 33 South Koreans--were on board the sightseeing boat when it collided with another vessel in the Hungarian capital on Wednesday night, leading to the capsizing, reports CNN.

The captain of the other boat had been detained and his arrest proposed, Budapest police said in a statement on Thursday. The 64-year-old Ukrainian citizen was first questioned after police found evidence that warranted suspicion during their investigation into the accident's cause.

The police said they were continuing their search for the 21 people who remain missing.

Of the seven who were rescued, six have now been discharged from the hospital. One person remains in hospital with several broken ribs, a doctor told CNN.

Of the seven victims, two have been identified so far.

South Korea's President Moon Jae-in said in a statement on Thursday night that rescue efforts had been hampered by poor weather.

President Moon has ordered a rapid response team to be dispatched to help the rescue effort in Budapest. IANS

If your marriage is in trouble, the chances are that you and your partner are stuck in trying to control rather than learn. Changing your intent can heal your marriage.

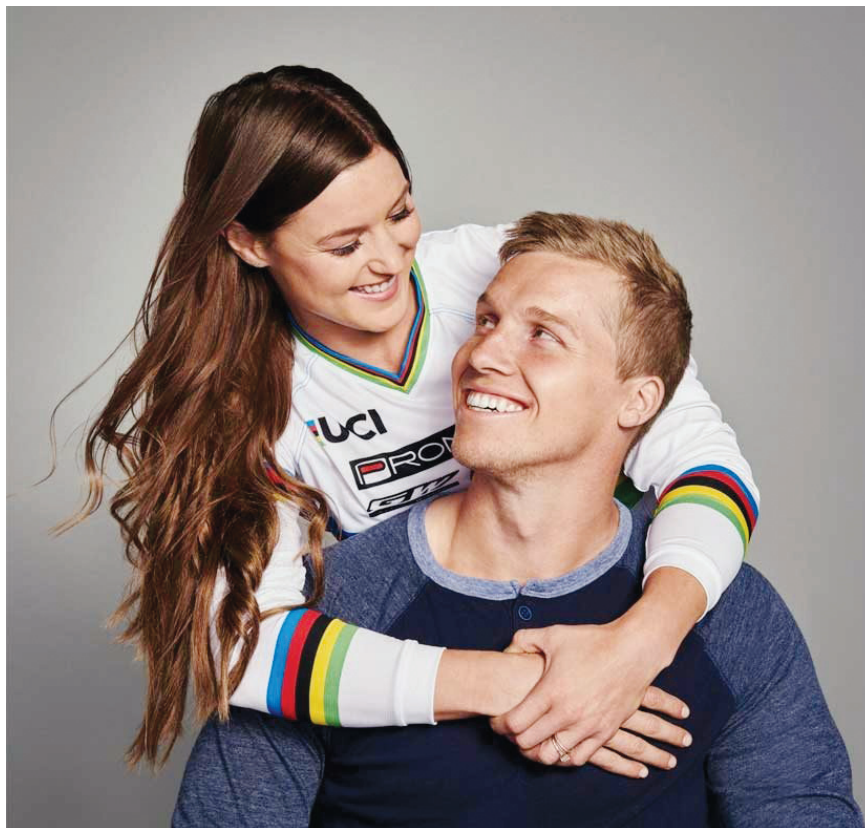
- Be honest with yourself regarding your primary intention. Which category do you fall into - the intent to protect or the intent to learn?

Is your primary intention to protect yourself from your fears with some form of controlling behavior - such as anger, blame, criticism, withdrawal of love, threats, compliance, or resistance? Is having power over your partner and winning more important to you than being loving to yourself and your partner? Do you make your partner responsible for your feelings? Are you more devoted to getting love and avoiding rejection rather than to mutuality, caring, and sharing love?

Is your primary intention to learn about loving yourself and your partner? Are you more devoted to mutuality, caring and sharing love than to being right, winning, having your way, or making your partner responsible for your feelings? Is learning more important to you than whether or not you receive approval?

Basic to all the other rules is being in the intent to learn about loving yourself and others. If your primary intent is to protect yourself from pain and rejection with controlling behavior, you will have no chance of improving your relationship. You will continue to create the very problems you are attempting to avoid with your controlling behavior.

- Let go of the past. Hanging on to old grievances is part of the intent to protect - blaming your partner for your pain rather than taking responsibility for whatever choices you made that resulted in your unhappiness.
- Disengage from conflict as soon as one person is not open to learning. There is no point in trying to talk out problems and issues until both people are open to learning. If you are open and your partner is not, then give up trying to solve problems by talking about them and unilaterally figure out how to



take loving care of yourself in the face of your partner's choices.

- Keep your eyes on your own plate, sharing only about yourself and your own learning. Let go of analyzing or defining your partner. Let go of interrogating questions that are really attacks. These behaviors are controlling and invasive. Your job is to define yourself, not your partner! FOOD CORNER



Mishti doi

Mishti Doi is synonymous with Bengal in East India. The Bengalis are famous for their sweet preparations and Mishti Doi is among their most well-known desserts. Mishti Doi tastes great but is amazingly simple to make.

Ingredients

1 liter full cream/ whole milk, 3-4 tablespoons yogurt, 250 grams sugar,

Method

- Boil the milk in a heavy-bottomed pan, on a medium flame until it is reduced to half its original volume. Stir frequently to prevent the milk from scorching. When done, cool the milk till it is just lukewarm.
- Put the sugar in another pan and heat over a low flame to melt. Allow the sugar to caramelize (brown). Remove from the fire when done, add the reduced milk to this caramelized sugar and mix well to blend.
- When the milk and sugar are thoroughly mixed, add the yogurt to the mixture and stir gently to mix.
- Pour into the desired container and keep in a warm dark spot for the Mishti Doi to set. The best taste results are achieved by setting the Mishti Doi in an earthenware pot.
- When the Mishti Doi has set and is firm, chill for a few hours and serve.

Mango Kulfi

Ingredients

2 fresh, ripe, sweet mangoes (use 3 mangoes if they are not very pulpy), 1 1/2 cups evaporated milk, 2 1/2 cups thickened double cream, 1 3/4 cups sweetened condensed milk, 2 tablespoons almond meal

Method

- Remove the mango pulp carefully. Put all of the ingredients in a blender and mix them until they are completely smooth.
- Pour the ice cream mixture into molds or bowls, or into one large bowl and freeze it until it is almost set.
- Remove the bowl or bowls from the freezer and whisk it thoroughly until all of the lumps are gone. This prevents ice crystals from forming in the kulfi and gives it a smooth texture. Put the ice cream back into the freezer and leave it until it is set.

HORMONAL LINK BETWEEN DIET AND OBESITY FOUND

In a new study researchers have found that low levels of a circulating hormone called adropin predict increased weight gain and metabolic dysregulation during consumption of a high-sugar diet in a nonhuman primate model.

According to the study published in the 'Journal of Biological Chemistry,' these findings will help set the stage to develop new therapies for managing metabolic diseases.

Obesity is a growing public health crisis, bringing with it many serious risk factors, including cardiovascular disease and type 2 diabetes. As the number of people who are either overweight or obese now outnumbers those with a healthy body weight by a ratio of two to one, researchers face an urgent need to better understand how the body burns fuel.

Several years ago, Andrew Butler, professor of pharmacology and physiology discovered the peptide hormone adropin. Research by Butler's lab suggested that adropin regulates whether the body burns glucose or fat.

They also found that young men with high adropin levels had lower body mass index (BMI) levels. Moreover, some studies indicated low adropin is associated with biomarkers of insulin resistance.

In the current study, Butler and his colleagues have conducted studies at California National Primate Research Center in order to explore adropin's role



in metabolic health.

They examined the plasma of 59 adult male rhesus macaques that were fed a high sugar diet.

Overall, consumption of the fructose diet produced a 10 per cent gain in body weight and increases of fasting levels of insulin, indicating insulin resistance, which reduces glucose use and elevated fasting triglycerides which in humans increases the risk of cardiovascular disease.

Animals with low plasma adropin concentrations developed a more severe metabolic syndrome. Interestingly,

development of type 2 diabetes was only observed in animals with low plasma adropin concentrations. These animals also showed more pronounced dysregulation of glucose and lipid metabolism.

Fasting hyperglycemia was also limited to animals with low circulating adropin, indicating glucose intolerance.

"Monkeys with low adropin may therefore not be oxidizing glucose as well, explaining their higher fat content as the glucose is converted to lipids instead of being used as a metabolic fuel," Butler said.



LICORICE TEA MAY HAVE HARMFUL SIDE EFFECTS

Excessive consumption of licorice tea—a popular herbal beverage—may have health risks such as high blood pressure and reduced potassium levels, researchers claim.

According to a case study, published in CMAJ (Canadian Medical Association Journal), consuming tea made from licorice root resulted in severely elevated blood pressure in an 84-year-old man.

"Excessive amounts of some herbal products can have harmful side effects," said Jean-Pierre Falet from the McGill University in Canada.

"Products containing licorice root extract can raise blood pressure, cause water retention and decrease potassium levels if consumed in excess," said Falet.

According to the researchers, the patient visited the emergency department for a high-blood pressure emergency.

His blood pressure was severely elevated, and he was suffering from a headache, light sensitivity, chest pain, fatigue and fluid retention in the calves.

After admission to hospital and treatment, the patient, who had a history of high blood pressure, told physicians he had been drinking one to two glasses daily of homemade licorice root extract called "erk sous" for two weeks prior.

Licorice tea is popular in the Middle East and parts of Europe, and erk sous is especially popular in Egypt during Ramadan. "Physicians should consider screening for licorice root intake in patients with difficult-to-control hypertension," said Falet. *Source: PTI*

FLOWER PESTICIDES LINKED TO HIGH BP IN KIDS

Exposure to flower pesticide may increase blood pressure in children and put them at the risk of hypertension, a study has found.

Researchers at University of California San Diego in the US found a link between higher blood pressure and pesticide exposures in children—especially heightened pesticide spraying period around the Mother's Day flower harvest, a holiday with one of the highest sales of flowers.

The study, published in the journal Environmental Research, involved boys and girls living near flower crops in Ecuador.

According to the researchers, Ecuador is among the largest commercial flower growers in the world, with significant rose exports to North America, Europe and Asia.

Commercial rose production relies on the use of insecticides, fungicides and other pest controls, but little is known about their human health effects.

"These findings are noteworthy in that this is the first study to describe that pesticide spray seasons not only can increase the exposure to pesticides of children living near agriculture, but can increase their blood pressures and overall risk for hypertension," said Jose R Suarez, an assistant professor at UC San Diego.

The team assessed 313 boys and girls,



ages four to nine, residing in floricultural communities in Ecuador. The children were examined up to 100 days after the Mother's Day harvest.

"We observed that children examined sooner after the Mother's Day harvest had higher pesticide exposures and higher systolic and diastolic blood pressures compared to children examined later," said Suarez.

"In addition, children who were

examined within 81 days after the harvest were three times more likely to have hypertension than children examined between 91 and 100 days," he said.

Research regarding the effects of pesticides on the cardiovascular system is limited, but Suarez said there is some evidence that insecticides, such as organophosphates, can increase blood pressure. *Source: ANI*

LESS THAN 7 HOURS OF SLEEP BAD FOR YOUR HEART

People who sleep less than seven hours each night are at higher risk of developing cardiovascular disease (CVD) and coronary heart disease, warn researchers.

The findings, published in the journal Experimental Physiology, show that people who sleep fewer than seven hours per night have lower blood levels of three physiological regulators, or microRNAs, which influence gene expression and play a key role in maintaining vascular health.

"This study proposes a new potential mechanism through which sleep influences heart health and overall physiology," said Christopher DeSouza, Professor at University of Colorado in the US.

For the study, the research team took blood samples from a small group of healthy men and women, age 44 to 62, who had filled out questionnaires about their sleep habits.

While half of the participants slept seven to 8.5 hours nightly, the other half slept five to 6.8 hours every night.

The research team measured the expression of nine microRNAs previously associated with inflammation, immune function or vascular health.

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APPLE SET TO UNVEIL IOS 13, MAJOR UPGRADES

Tech giant Apple is set to unveil a slew of features and tools—from software to hardware along with major updates—on its iOS and MacOS ecosystem.

While iOS 13 is a certainty, Apple could also refresh its Mac Pro and announce interoperability between iOS and MacOS at its annual developer conference WWDC 2019 in San Jose, California, next week, reports CNET.

iOS 13, expected to be part of iPhone 11 this year, would have a new home screen, a system-wide “dark mode” setting, expanded multi-tasking capabilities and an “undo” options.

Apple is also said to be “cultivating greater interoperability” between iOS and MacOS.

“This would ostensibly make it easier for developers to share code among apps written for the iPhone and iPad and Macs,” the report said.

The new MacOS 10.15 may let Mac users use an iPad as a second screen.

According to a Digital Trends report, not all Apple devices may support iOS 13.

“Those rumoured to be cut off from the latest software include the iPhone 6, iPhone 6 Plus, iPhone SE, iPhone 5s, the iPad Mini 2, and the original iPad Air,” said the report.

The company could also debut the updated Mac Pro, which it had pledged to reveal in 2019.

Apple may also reveal its Marzipan project too, which would make iPads easier to use as a full laptop replacement.

Google Search to rank sites on basis of ‘mobile-first indexing’

Google has announced that starting July 1, all new websites would be analysed and ranked on Search on the basis of “mobile-first indexing”.

“Mobile-first indexing” means Google would consider the mobile version of any new website for evaluating, indexing and ranking the site, instead of the desktop version which was used primarily.

“We’re happy to announce that ‘mobile-first indexing’ will be enabled by default for all new, previously unknown to Google Search websites, starting July 1, 2019,” John Mueller, Developer Advocate, Google, wrote in a blog-post on Tuesday.

For older and existing websites, Google would determine their readiness for “mobile-first indexing” based on the parity of content including text, images, videos, links and structured data as well as other meta-data-like titles and descriptions.

“We will notify them through Search Console once they’re seen as being ready. Since the default state for new websites will be ‘mobile-first indexing’, there’s no need to send a notification,” Mueller said.

Google said it is pleased to see that “mobile-first indexing” has come a long way.

“We’re happy to see how the web has evolved from being focused on desktop to becoming mobile-friendly, and now to being mostly crawlable and indexable with mobile user-agents,” Muller said.



FLEXIBLE TEXTILE BATTERY MAY POWER WEARABLE DEVICES

Scientists have developed a thin, highly flexible textile lithium battery that could safely power wearable electronics used in healthcare monitoring, smart clothes and Internet of Things (IoT).

The lightweight Textile Lithium Battery, developed by researchers at the Hong Kong Polytechnic University, has high energy density and excellent flexibility.

The battery, which is less than 0.5 mm thick, possesses fast charging/discharging capability, and also has a long cycle life comparable with conventional lithium batteries.

“Global market revenues for wearable devices are forecasted to grow by leaps and bounds, of over 20 per cent annually, to reach USD 100 billion by 2024,” said Zheng Zijian, who led the research team.

“As all wearable electronics will require wearable energy supply, our novel technology in fabricating Textile Lithium Battery offers a promising solution to a wide array of next-generation applications, ranging from healthcare, infotainment, sports, aerospace, fashion, IoT to any sensing or tracking uses that may even exceed our



imagination of today,” said Zijian.

Lithium battery is currently the dominant rechargeable battery in the market due to its relatively high energy density and long cycle life.

As conventional bulky heavy lithium batteries are hard to use in wearable devices, over the past decade, scientists have put in efforts in developing bendable lithium battery, often by using metal foils as current collectors. The Textile Lithium Battery overcomes the bottlenecks over energy density, flexibility, mechanical robustness and cycling stability, researchers said.

To create the battery, researchers

deposited highly conductive metal, copper (Cu) and nickel (Ni) uniformly onto pre-treated fabrics.

Such fabricated metallic fabrics, featuring low sheet resistance and large surface area, serve as current collectors in battery.

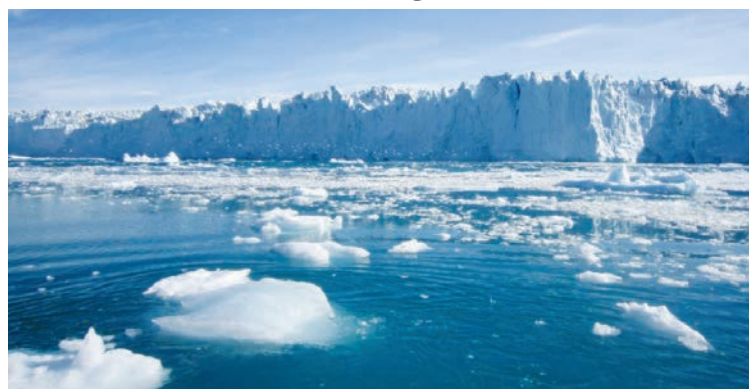
After adding active materials to act as cathode and anode, the metallic fabrics, together with separators and electrolytes, are assembled into the Textile Lithium Battery, researchers said.

Laboratory tests conducted by the team showed the extremely high mechanical stability, durability and safety of the Textile Lithium Battery under deformation.

When the battery is repeatedly folded in half, twisted at different angles or freely crumpled, its voltage window remained unchanged. Bending test showed that the battery can be bent over 1,000 times with marginal capacity degradation.

Safety tests conducted by continuous hammering, trimming with scissors and penetrating with nail proved the battery can stably provide power output for the electronic components with no risk of catching fire or bursting.

Melting glaciers may add 10 inches to sea levels by 2100



Melting glaciers worldwide could result in almost 10 inches of sea level rise by the end of this century, a study warns. The research, published in the Journal of Glaciology, indicates that the smaller glaciers could play a much larger role in sea level rise than researchers had previously thought.

The review is the most comprehensive global comparison of glacier simulations ever compiled, researchers said.

It estimates that glaciers worldwide are likely to lose anywhere from 18 to 36 per cent of their mass by 2100.

“The clear message is that there’s mass loss—substantial mass loss—all over the world,” said Regine Hock, from the University Alaska Fairbanks in the US.

The anticipated loss of ice varies by region, but the pattern is evident. “We have more than 200 computer simulations, and they all say the same thing. Even though there are some differences, that’s really consistent,” Hock said.

This is the only comprehensive and systematic endeavour to date to compare global-scale glacier models and their projections.

The study compared 214 glacier simulations from six research groups around the world and “all of them paint the same picture,” Hock said.

Researchers examined the mass changes for over 200,000 glaciers worldwide, totalling an area equal to the size of Texas.

ORIGAMI-INSPIRED MATERIALS MAY HELP SPACECRAFT SURVIVE COLLISIONS

Inspired by the paper folding art of origami, scientists are designing materials that can withstand high impact collisions—an advance that may be used to build reusable spacecraft.

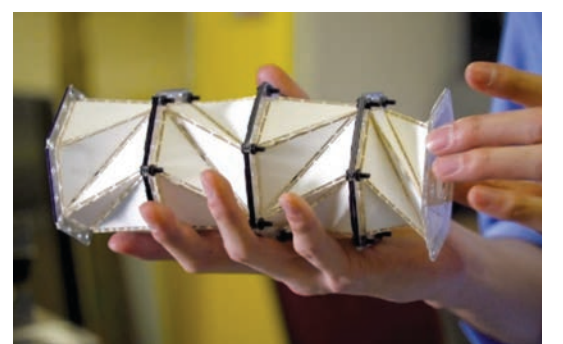
Landing is stressful for reusable rockets because they must handle the force from the impact with the landing pad. One way to combat this is to build legs out of materials that absorb some of the force and soften the blow.

Researchers from University of Washington in the US have developed a novel solution to help reduce impact forces.

Taking inspiration from the Japanese paper-folding art of origami, the team created a paper model of a metamaterial that uses “folding creases” to soften impact forces and instead promote forces that relax stresses in the chain.

“If you were wearing a football helmet made of this material and something hit the helmet, you’d never feel that hit on your head. By the time the energy reaches you, it’s no longer pushing. It’s pulling,” said Jinkyu Yang, an associate professor at University of Washington.

For the research, published in the journal Science Advances, the team designed a metamaterial to have the properties they wanted.



‘Provoking trade disputes is naked economic terrorism’: China on trade war with US

BEIJING (TIP): Provoking trade disputes is “naked economic terrorism”, a senior Chinese diplomat said on Thursday, ramping up the rhetoric against the United States amid a bitter trade war that is showing no signs of ending soon.

Trade tensions between Washington and Beijing escalated sharply earlier this month after the Trump administration accused China of having “renewed” on its previous promises to make structural changes to its economic practices.

Washington later slapped additional tariffs of up to 25% on \$200 billion of Chinese goods, prompting Beijing to retaliate.

Speaking to reporters in Beijing, Chinese Vice Foreign Minister Zhang Hanhui said China opposed the use of “big sticks” like trade sanctions, tariffs and protectionism.

“We oppose a trade war but are not afraid of a trade war. This kind of deliberately provoking trade disputes is naked economic terrorism, economic homicide, economic bullying,” Zhang said, when asked about the trade war with the United States.

Everyone loses in a trade war, he added, addressing a briefing on Chinese President Xi Jinping’s state visit to Russia next week, where he will meet Russian President Vladimir Putin and speak at a major investor forum in St Petersburg.

“This trade clash will have a serious negative effect on global economic development and recovery,” Zhang added.

“We will definitely properly deal with all external challenges, do our own thing well, develop our economy, and continue to raise the living standards of our two peoples,” he said, referring to China and Russia.

“At the same time, we have the



confidence, resolve and ability to safeguard our country’s sovereignty, security, respect and security and development interests.”

From combative missives in state media and patriotic fervour on social media, to a mobilisation of ambassadors around the world to get its message out, China has intensified its criticism of Washington since the United States this month moved to increase tariffs on Chinese imports and blacklisted tech giant Huawei Technologies Co Ltd.

On Thursday, a broadcaster from Chinese state television and a Fox Business host staged an unprecedented live debate about the China-U.S. frictions on the U.S. cable network.

Over the past two weeks, China has hinted that it may use its dominant position as an exporter of rare earths to the United States as leverage in the trade war. Rare earths are a group of 17 chemical elements used in everything from high-tech consumer electronics to military equipment.

On Thursday, the state-run China Daily newspaper said “it would be naive to think that China does not have other

countermeasures apart from rare earths to hand”.

“As Chinese officials have reiterated, they have a ‘tool box’ large enough to fix any problem that may arise as trade tensions escalate, and they are ready to fight back ‘at any cost’,” it said in an editorial.

China has consistently rebuffed U.S. complaints about lack of access to its economy for foreign companies, forced technology transfers and intellectual property protection, and repeatedly promised further economic reforms.

Speaking at a separate forum in Beijing, Wang Zhaoxing, a vice chairman of China’s banking and insurance regulator, said the last four decades of the country’s economic reforms have shown that “openness brings progress, shutting off brings backwardness”.

“It is undeniable that the current economic globalisation has indeed encountered some new problems and new challenges,” Wang said. “However, the solution is not to return to protectionism and unilateralism.”

SUNDAR PICHAI TURNED DOWN A BIG STOCK AWARD AFTER LAVISH PAYOUTS

Sundar Pichai was, for years, one of the world’s highest-paid corporate executives. Now he’s facing the opposite reality: No big paychecks at all.

The Google chief executive officer hasn’t received an equity award in more than two years. A key reason is that Pichai turned down a big new grant of restricted stock in 2018 because he felt he was already paid generously, according to a person familiar with the decision.

It’s unclear how much he passed up. But another giant payday -- on top of hundreds of millions of dollars in previous awards -- could have sparked a new round of controversy for the mild-mannered executive.

Technology companies are being increasingly blamed for all sorts of societal ills -- including rising income inequality. Pichai, given the top job in 2015 for his engineering prowess, has had to address these concerns, while juggling a host of other politically charged issues.

“He may have looked at these numbers and said: ‘I’ve had enough’ -- or he might just be trying to manage the optics of his pay,” said David Larcker, a professor who researches corporate governance at Stanford Graduate School of Business.

The board of Google parent Alphabet Inc. is scheduled to revisit the CEO’s pay later this year, said the person, who asked not to be identified discussing private matters. By then, almost all Pichai’s previous stock awards will have vested. That makes him an anomaly among US corporate leaders, and is even raising questions about what’s next for the 46-year-old.

“Clearly there’s very little retentive effect left for Pichai,” said Fabrizio Ferri, an associate professor at the University of Miami who studies executive pay.

A Google spokeswoman declined to comment, and said the Alphabet board won’t comment either. The company and its directors have said nothing publicly about the CEO leaving any time soon. Pichai has never mentioned moving on either.



Bitcoin climbs to highest in a year amid cryptocurrency comeback

Bitcoin soared to the highest level in a year, extending a run that’s seen prices more than double since March.

The largest cryptocurrency climbed as much as 10% Monday from levels late Friday, and was trading at \$8,847 as of 10:25 a.m. in Tokyo. Rival coins were also stronger at the start of the week. Litecoin added almost 9% and Ether, the second largest digital token, rose 6%.

Crypto proponents are taking encouragement from a string of recent headlines showing greater interest in the space from mainstream firms. Fidelity Investments is finalizing plans to buy and sell the digital asset for institutional customers, and E*Trade Financial Corp. is poised to allow crypto trading. AT&T Inc. said it will permit customers to use payment processor BitPay to settle their online bills.

Bitcoin is up almost 70% this month despite concerns from JPMorgan Chase



& Co. strategists that its price may have surged beyond its “intrinsic value” -- a concept that not all agree applies to a digital currency.

“Easier to spend means a greater-use case and a greater level of adoption,” Mati Greenspan, senior market analyst at eToro, wrote in a note Friday. “The tipping point is likely very close now.”

Bitcoin’s fantastic run this year follows a painful downtrend that lasted the majority of last year and saw the digital currency tumble more than 70%.

HUAWEI ASKS COURT TO DEEM US SECURITY LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL

SHENZHEN (TIP): Chinese tech giant Huawei filed a motion in U.S. court Wednesday challenging the constitutionality of a law that limits its sales of telecom equipment, the latest action in an ongoing clash with the U.S. government.

Huawei’s chief legal officer Song Liuping said at press briefing that Huawei had filed a motion for summary judgment asking the court to rule on whether it is constitutional for the U.S. to implement a military spending provision that bars the government and its contractors from using Huawei equipment.

Huawei is the biggest global maker of network equipment, but it is now fighting to maintain access to major markets for next-generation communications as the U.S. claims the company threatens international cybersecurity.

In March, Huawei launched its suit against the U.S. law in Plano, Texas, the headquarters of its U.S. operations. The summary judgment motion seeks to accelerate the legal process to give U.S. customers access to Huawei equipment sooner, according to a Wednesday statement from Huawei.



Song said the “state-sanctioned campaign” against the company will not improve cybersecurity.

the ceremony. Among the allies, Lok Janshakti Party chief Ram Vilas Paswan retained his place in the Cabinet, as did Harsimrat Kaur Badal of the SAD.

Arvind Sawant, who defeated Milind Deora in South Mumbai, made it from the Shiv Sena quota. There was no representation from Tamil Nadu. Tamil-speaking Nirmala Sitharaman, who took oath as a Cabinet minister, represents Karnataka in Rajya Sabha.

Besides Shah, the new members from the BJP include Prahlad Joshi, former Chief Ministers Ramesh Pokhriyal Nishank and Arjun Munda, while party's UP chief Mahendra Nath Pandey makes a comeback into the Council of Ministers and has been elevated to Cabinet rank, as was Giriraj Singh, who was MoS (Independent Charge) earlier.

Former Foreign Secretary S Jaishankar was the lone surprise inductee into the Cabinet, becoming the second former ranking Indian Foreign Service officer to be drafted into the new team led by Modi. Modi has retained former diplomat Hardeep Singh Puri as Minister of State (Independent Charge).

Missing among the Cabinet ministers from the outgoing government were Arun Jaitley and Sushma Swaraj. While the former opted out, Swaraj did not contest the polls, both citing health concerns.

Similarly, missing from the MoS (Independent Charge) list were Dr Mahesh Sharma, Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore and K Alphans, while Manoj Sinha failed to make the cut as he lost the election.

The new Ministers of State include Nityanand Rai, Suresh Angadi and first-time MPs G Kishan Reddy (Telangana), Debosree Chowdhury (West Bengal) and Pratap Chandra Sarangi (Odisha).

PM Narendra Modi has dropped parliamentarians and key economic ministers in the previous NDA government like Suresh Prabhu, Jayant Sinha and Manoj Sinha. The name of Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore was also missing from the list of ministers who took oath

Fresh calls for Trump impeachment after Mueller's statement

The special counsel reiterated that, bound by Justice

Department policy, charging a sitting President with a crime was "not an option."

But he also stressed he could not exonerate Trump. Instead, he cited that same policy to say, "The Constitution requires a process other than the criminal justice system." With Mueller closing his office and not expected to comment further, it all amounted, for some, to an open invitation for Congress to launch impeachment proceedings.

"He's asking us to do what he wasn't allowed to - hold the President accountable," said Rep. Val Demings, D-Fla., a member of the House Judiciary Committee, the panel with impeachment power.

"We have one remaining path to ensure justice is served," said Sen. Cory Booker of New Jersey, a Democratic presidential candidate.

But top Democrats, with almost no support from Republicans, are hesitant to go it alone on an impeachment inquiry that House Speaker Nancy Pelosi has warned would be divisive for the nation.

In a rare public appearance, special counsel Robert Mueller on Wednesday said his two-year Russia probe had not exonerated Donald Trump, and not indicting him was not equivalent to clearing him

He said Justice Department guidelines prevented him from charging a sitting President, suggesting Congress has both the constitutional powers and the responsibility to pursue the case

'Russia helped me...oops!'

US President Trump briefly acknowledged in a tweet on Thursday, May 30, that Russia helped him get elected but quickly backtracked

"... I had nothing to do with Russia helping me to get elected," Trump said. Quickly recognizing the lapse, he said: "No, Russia did not get me elected."

US administration removes India from its currency monitoring list

among others include China, Japan, South Korea, Germany, Italy, Ireland, Singapore, Malaysia and Vietnam.

"India has been removed from the monitoring list in this report, having met only one out of three criteria-a significant bilateral surplus with the US-for two consecutive reports," the Treasury Department said in its latest semi-annual report on macroeconomic and foreign exchange policies of major trading partners of the US sent to the Congress.

After purchasing foreign exchange on net in 2017, the central bank steadily sold reserves for most of 2018, with net sales of foreign exchange reaching 1.7 per cent of GDP over the year, it said.

India maintains ample reserves according to the IMF metrics for reserve adequacy, it said.

In both Switzerland and India, there was a notable decline in 2018 in the scale and frequency of foreign exchange purchases, the report said.

"Neither Switzerland nor India met the criteria for having engaged in persistent, one-sided intervention in either the October 2018 report or this report. Both Switzerland and India have been removed from the monitoring list," the Treasury said in its report running into over 40 pages.

India for the first time was placed by the US in its currency monitoring list of countries with potentially questionable foreign exchange policies in May 2018 along with five other countries--China, Germany, Japan, South Korea and Switzerland.

In its next report in October 2018, the Treasury had said that India had made improvements and its name would be removed from the currency manipulation list

in the next report.

"India's circumstances have shifted markedly, as the central bank's net sales of foreign exchange over the first six months of 2018 led net purchases over the four quarters through June 2018 to fall to USD 4 billion, or 0.2 per cent of the GDP," the Treasury had said in its October 2018 report. Israel to hold fresh election as Netanyahu fails to form govt

they were elected, Israeli lawmakers voted 74-45 in favor of dissolving the 21st Knesset (Israeli Parliament) and hold an unprecedented repeat general election on September 17.

Netanyahu's remarkable victory in the April 9 polls securing him a record fifth term proved temporary in the face of a logjam between potential coalition partners over a military conscription bill governing exemptions for ultra-Orthodox Jewish seminary students.

Ahead of the vote, taken just after the Wednesday midnight deadline, Netanyahu told the Likud faction that he had not succeeded in reaching a compromise with nationalist Yisrael Beytenu leader Avigdor Lieberman on the controversial Haredi (ultra-Orthodox) conscription bill, and that he had also tried unsuccessfully to woo MKs from the opposition to join his government.

Lieberman, a former defense minister, had made it a condition of allying with ultra-Orthodox Jewish parties that they adopt a law aimed at having ultra-Orthodox Jews serve in the military like their secular counterparts.

The bill, which the Defense Ministry drafted under Lieberman's leadership, sets rising annual targets for Haredi conscription in the Israeli Defense Forces.

Ultra-Orthodox Jews studying in religious seminaries are currently exempt from mandatory military service, a practice many Israelis view as unfair.

Lieberman told reporters just before the vote that Israel was going to the polls because of the "complete surrender of the Likud (ruling party) to the Haredim (ultra-orthodox)".

Without Yisrael Beitenu, Netanyahu could muster support of only 60 lawmakers in the 120-member house, falling short of a majority by just one. Netanyahu launched a diatribe against Lieberman whom he blamed for "dragging the country to unnecessary elections".

"Lieberman is now part of the left. He brings down right-wing governments. Don't believe him again. I will tell you about it tomorrow. Maybe I will tell you some things you don't know," the prime minister told reporters immediately after the Knesset voted to dissolve itself. "We'll run a sharp, clear election campaign which will bring us victory. We'll win, we'll win and the public will win," he said.

"The public in Israel made a clear decision. It decided that I will be Prime Minister, that the Likud will lead the government, a right-wing government," Netanyahu said.

The move by Netanyahu's ruling Likud party to dissolve the Knesset ensured that President Reuven Rivlin would not be able to call some other lawmaker to try to form a new government. Rivlin had asked Netanyahu to form the next government after 65 lawmakers, including five of Lieberman's Yisrael Beitenu party, submitted letters of support for him.

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THE ROLE OF SHAKTI IN CREATION



Shakti in Sanskrit means, power or energy. In Hinduism energy belongs to the domain of Prakriti or the female aspect of Creation. Popularly known as the Mother Goddess, Shakti is worshipped in her various manifestations by millions of Hindus.

God is pure and undivided consciousness. You may even say from a perceptual perspective that He is nothingness. In His purest state devoid of qualities He is Nirguna Brahman, that is (nir+guna) devoid of any distinguished features or appearances. Divisions of time and space and the impurities of ego consciousness created by the gunas do not exist in Him. For inexplicable reasons, as He wakes, He sets in motion Prakriti, the universal energy, that was so far latent in Him, and then enters into it. From this union arises ultimately all this reality that we know as the universe. This is something like the modern theory of the origin of the universe. The big bang is actually what sets in motion the latent energy hidden in the cosmic egg (Hiranyagarbha).

All the matter that exists in this universe, that is tangible, sensible, unstable, with in the domains of sensory world and can be transformed from one state to another, is an aspect of Prakriti only. Matter is energy in its grossest form. (The scientific world took thousands of years to arrive at the same conclusion.). How Shakti manifests things and beings

Now about Her ways of working and how the diversity arises in the manifested universe. According to our beliefs, creation arises out of the union of the Pure Self (Purusha) with matter or energy (Prakriti). Pure Self enters into matter and then awakens the various energies in the matter leading to the formation of a false self called the ego.

This happens over a period of time through the differentiation and combination of the five Mahabhutas (the five gross elements), Panchendriyas (the five sense organs), the karmendriyas (the five organs of action), the tanmantras (the five subtle elements), manas (mind), ahamkara (deluded self) and buddhi (discriminating intelligence).

This is how individual beings come into the world and evolves gradually towards liberation. Before the individual beings are created this way, the same process takes place at macro levels, resulting in the creation of worlds and higher divinities.

Prakriti develops the ego consciousness by this process to make it an important tool in its armory. The ego is driven by the interplay of the three gunas, namely sattva, rajas and tamas, nourished by the activity of the senses and motivated by the force of desires. These things give it a false sense of identity, through the formation of mind and the mind's awareness of the body.

Prakriti, bondage and delusion

Thus the mind and the body become the field in space and time for the ego to distinguish itself from the rest of the creation and act as if it is the real self and as if it is different and separate from the rest of the creation. This is what we call ignorance that leads to the deluded belief that the individual ego is the real self where as in reality it is not.

All the while, the Real Self exists inside, having lost itself in its own reflection in the buddhi or higher intelligence, doing practically nothing, but keeping the body, the mind and the false ego alive and breathing by its mere presence.

The delusion of the individual ego leads to the bondage of the self. The bondage of self does not mean that the Soul suffers. The Self is pure consciousness and there is no suffering in it. No one can touch it and no one can punish it. We say it suffers because it is caught in the cycle of births and deaths and cannot go back to its source. It is a suffering for the soul from our point of view, not for the soul actually. Whether it exists in the heavens or in Timbaktu, for the soul the experience is one and the same. It is eternal, unchanging and pure bliss consciousness.

What actually suffers or believes that it is suffering is the false self or the ego. Suffering however does not prevent the ego from indulging in its desire driven actions unless the suffering becomes too unbearable to force to turn to spiritualism. Normally otherwise, it is so attached to the world that given an opportunity it would not mind to live for thousands of years. But unfortunately this is not possible because of the logistics and the physical limitations.

So at the end of each life, the ego becomes frustrated at the approach of old age and dies against its own wishes. It dies unhappily because it leaves behind a lot of tasks unfinished, dreams unrealized and the fruits of its past actions untasted. Nature too does not seem to like this happening since it would not let the self escape from its clutches and since perpetuation of delusion by all means is its chief design.

So it has worked out a compromise by which each created ego is permitted to come back again to the earth through another rebirth and continue its unfinished work. When a being dies, its ego would not dissolve

completely. A small portion of it survives containing its basic tendencies, desires and impulses, which becomes attached to the soul as a kind of program file and after passing through the doors of death, heaven or hell as a subtle body is reborn again. This is in essence the cycle of Prakriti.

At the human level, Prakriti keeps us in delusion through the combination of elements and through the interplay of the triple gunas. At the higher levels She enacts the same drama by becoming the Shakti of various worlds and divinities. Since these divinities are awakened souls she would not delude them, but become a force in their consciousness to help them in their assigned responsibilities.

Thus in the world of Brahma, She becomes Saraswathi to assist Brahma in his acts of Creation. In the world of Vishnu, She becomes Lakshmi to help him manage the world by providing the required amounts of wealth and resources. In the world of Siva, she becomes a yogini or a siddhi and helps him in his task of

destroying our illusions.

At the same time, being divine in origin and nature, she also helps individuals who worship her directly and seek liberation from bondage through her grace. Since she is the cause of illusion the logic is she is in a better position to relieve us from the bondage. Hence the ascendance of Shaktism as time went by.

Is Shakti really female? Shakti is pure energy, neither male nor female. This interpretation is purely human, figurative and relative and should not be taken literally. It is also wrong to believe that Self is male and the energy is female. Purusha exists in males as well as females and so does Prakriti exists in males also. They are like the two sides of the same truth. It is also difficult to say who is superior to whom. Without energy Self is practically immovable and without Self energy does not have any field for its movements. The Truth at the highest level: pure energy (PRAKRITI) is undivided consciousness (PURUSHA).

ICC World Cup: England beat South Africa by 104 runs in opening match



LONDON (TIP): England made a confident start to their World Cup campaign as they crushed South Africa by 104 runs in the tournament-opener at The Oval.

Ben Stokes top-scored with 89 as the hosts made a competitive total of 311/8 after being sent in to bat. Jofra Archer took two early wickets and South Africa never looked likely to reach their target, bowled out in the 40th over for 207 to give World Cup favourites England the perfect start.

England lost Jonny Bairstow to the second ball of the match, caught by wicketkeeper Quinton de Kock off spinner Imran Tahir, but Jason Roy and Joe Root shared a 106-run partnership to steady the hosts. Roy never threatened to dismantle the bowling as he has done regularly in recent matches, accumulating 54 runs before he skied Andile Phehlukwayo to Faf du

Plessis at mid-off. Three balls later Root departed for 51, playing a loose drive at Kagiso Rabada to give JP Duminy a simple catch at backward point and leave England on 111/3.

South Africa continued to bowl tightly as Morgan and Stokes set about rebuilding the innings. Morgan struck the first six in the 26th over and the captain cleared the ropes twice more in a fourth-wicket partnership of 106. Morgan, on 57, was brilliantly caught off Tahir by Aiden Markram at long-on, the fielder diving forward to catch the ball inches from the turf, and England failed to cut free.

Jos Buttler made a scratchy 18, Moeen Ali three before he too fell to a superb catch on the boundary by Du Plessis and Chris Woakes 13 as the last 10 overs produced 76 runs to leave the match finely poised at the half-way stage.

Amla retired hurt

South Africa opener Hashim Amla was forced to retire hurt after being struck on the helmet by a short delivery from Archer and England took wickets at regular intervals. Markram was caught by Root at slip off Archer for 11 and captain Du Plessis, on five, skied the fast bowler to Moeen at fine leg. De Kock made 68 and Rassie van der Dussen 50, the pair sharing a third-wicket partnership of 85 to keep South Africa in the match.

Spectacular catch

Stokes pulled off a spectacular diving one-handed catch on the boundary to dismiss Phehlukwayo and the last three wickets fell quickly, including Amla who returned to the crease but was out for 13.

ROUND THE CLOCK DRILL TO GET DIRECT THROWS RIGHT

SOUTHAMPTON (TIP): The Indian team has always been considered as a safe catching unit but fielding coach R Sridhar now wants improvement in the conversion rate for direct throws in the World Cup.

Save Ravindra Jadeja, some of the younger Indian players in the current squad, despite their supreme fitness and agility, are not able to get their direct throws on target, a crucial aspect during close games. Trying to beat the monotony, Sridhar introduced a new fielding drill 'Round The Clock', wherein fielders at six different positions will take a shy at the non-striker's end. While the drill seemed to be like an 'old wine in a new bottle', the players seemed to be enjoying the session, which is the key during a big tournament. "We had an interesting fielding session today. The theme of the session was direct hits. The focus was on the boys getting it right from different angles at the non-striker's end. Initially, we started with a drill called 'Round the Clock' where there were six different fielding positions from where they had to hit the stumps 20 times," Sridhar said.

Last man standing

After a brief session where Sridhar spoke about the importance of having a "correct arm path" in order to get the execution right, he arranged for a competition where the last man standing was certainly not the 'best man standing'. "Then we introduced a game where those who get a successful direct hit are out of the session and those who fail have to come back again. Finally, there was only one guy who was left in the end. The boys were rolling on the floor laughing," Sridhar said.

Kohli's off-spin

The other notable aspect of Thursday's training session was skipper Virat Kohli trying a bit of off-spin at the nets but the batsmen facing him had no problems dispatching the friendly tweaks. With no off-spinner in the squad and Kedar Jadhav hardly bowling with his dodgy hamstrings, it seemed like it was more about providing a bit of knocking for the batsmen.
