PILOT BLAMES BAD GAS IN CALIFORNIA SMALL PLANE CRASH



LOS ANGELES, CA (TIP): A pilot who said on Wednesday he was forced to ditch his newly purchased aircraft in the ocean off California during a photo shoot believes bad gasoline caused the plane to malfunction.

Pilot David Lesh said he had siphoned particulate matter out of the gas but doesn't think he got all of it.

"This definitely was more stuff than I was used to seeing," he said.

The Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board are investigating. FAA spokesman Ian Gregor said investigators had not yet spoken to Lesh.

The 34-year-old pilot said he had taken his single-engine Beechcraft Bonanza propeller plane out on Tuesday for an aerial photo shoot over Half Moon Bay, south of San Francisco, when it lost power.

NEW DELHI / NEW YORK (TIP): After the high drama that followed former Finance and Home Minister of India P Chidambaram on August 21 and a night Chidambaram spent in CBI custody, a Delhi court on Thursday, August 22, sent him to CBI custody till August 26 in the INX Media case.

The CBI produced Chidambaram before the court and sought his five-day custodial interrogation saying there was a need to unearth a larger conspiracy.

US to allow indefinite detention of migrant children



WASHINGTON (TIP): President Donald Trump's administration has announced that it would remove tough legal limits on how long migrant children can be detained as part of its broader crackdown on undocumented immigrants.

The Department of Homeland Security said it was terminating the 1997 Flores Settlement Agreement, a binding legal ruling that said the government could not hold migrant children in detention for more than 20 days.

A new policy, to be implemented in 60 days, will not limit how long children or their families can be detained.

The move is aimed at deterring migrant expectations that they will be released after being arrested by the US border authorities and able to disappear into the US population.

"To protect these children from abuse, and stop this illegal flow, we must close these loopholes. This is an urgent humanitarian necessity," Trump said in a statement.

Kevin McAleenan, the acting DHS secretary, cited the challenge of "an unprecedented flow of family units" crossing the southern US border this year, most of them from Central America.

TRUMP 'VERY FOCUSED' ON SITUATION IN KASHMIR: US OFFICIAL

WASHINGTON (TIP): Donald Trump is "ready to assist" India and Pakistan on the Kashmir issue if both sides ask for it, a top White House official has said, underlining that the US President is "very focused" on the situation in the Valley in view of its "broader implications".

Tensions between India and Pakistan spiked after New Delhi abrogated provisions of Article 370 of the Constitution to withdraw Jammu and Kashmir's special status and bifurcated the state into two Union Territories on August 5.

"The United States is watching the situation in Kashmir very closely. We are continuing to call for calm and restraint, including on rhetoric," a senior administration official said on Thursday ahead of the bilateral meeting between Trump and Prime Minister Narendra Modi on the sidelines of the G7 Summit in France over the weekend.

India has categorically told the international community that the scrapping of Article 370 to revoke the special status of Jammu and Kashmir was an internal matter and also advised Pakistan to accept the reality.

According to the official, Trump is "very focused" on the situation in Kashmir.

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US to allow indefinite detention of migrant children

The Flores Settlement "has generally forced the government to release families into the country after just 20 days, incentivizing illegal entry," he said.

"Human smugglers advertise, and intending migrants know well, that even if they cross the border illegally, arriving at our border with a child has meant that they will be released into the United States to wait for court proceedings that could take five years or more."

Trump told reporters at the White House he was also considering ending birthright citizenship, repeating a previous administration pledge to end the policy of automatically designating babies born in the United States as American nationals.

"We're looking at that very seriously, birthright citizenship. Where you have a baby on our land—you walk over the border, have a baby. Congratulations, the baby is now a US citizen," Trump said.

He dismissed the process-guaranteed under the 14th Amendment to the US Constitution as "frankly ridiculous." The Flores rule was the result of a lawsuit citing chronic abuse of migrants in detention.

It required they receive adequate, humane care and that migrant children be released within 20 days and placed in the custody of their parents or relatives.

Pilot blames bad gas in California small plane crash

"I just did everything I could to get the motor going again," he said. "Nothing was working." Lesh said the plane "skipped along the water" for a few hundred feet without much of an impact before he and his passenger, a friend, grabbed anything they could use to float.

A man in another plane piloted by Owen Leipelt had been taking photos of his friend's aircraft when it went down.

"David radios to me that he's lost engine power," Leipelt said. "When you hear that, you think 'whoa, whoa, whoa, what did I just hear, say that again.'" Leipelt, 20, of San Jose called air traffic control for help and circled over the two people in the water.

Meanwhile, Lesh filmed himself and his friend with his water-resistant cellphone as their plane quickly sank.

"We got lucky with the conditions," he said. "The seas were very calm, it was daytime." The Coast Guard dispatched two aircraft, a cutter and a patrol boat. A helicopter hoisted the two men out of the chilly water that was teeming with jellyfish.

Lesh, the founder of Denver-based outerwear company Virtika, said he bought the plane nearly three months ago for more than \$2,000,000 and spent about \$40,000 for upgrades. He said Tuesday's flight was its first real trip.

Addressing online speculation that he had staged the water landing, Lesh said anyone who believed he would spend so much money on a plane only to sink it

must have "lost their mind."

Lesh is described on Virtika's website as a thrill-seeker and skier who lived in Chicago, India and Wisconsin before moving to Colorado.

His Instagram profile shows him flying, skiing and snowmobiling in picturesque locations across the globe.

Lesh said he plans to leave Friday on a cross-country flight to deliver his other plane to a buyer on the East Coast. He said he's not worried about the trip. "I'll always fly," he said. (Source: Agencies)

Trump 'very focused' on situation in Kashmir: US official

"We note the broader implications of the developments in Kashmir and the potential for increased instability in the region. So the president is very focused on this situation," the official said.

"What he (Trump) has indicated that he is ready to assist if both sides are interested in helping to reduce their tension. But we just know that India has not requested any formal mediation," the official said, requesting anonymity.

The official said that President Trump, during his meeting with Modi in France will likely want to hear how he intends to calm regional tensions in the aftermath of his decisions on Kashmir.

"The president will likely want to hear from Prime Minister Modi on how he plans to reduce regional tensions and uphold respect for human rights in Kashmir, as part of India's role as the world's largest democracy," he said.

Trump on Tuesday said that he was

willing to either mediate or do something to resolve the Kashmir issue between India and Pakistan. But New Delhi has made it clear to the US that Kashmir is a bilateral issue between India and Pakistan and there was no role for a third party.

According to the official, in light of this significant move by Modi on Kashmir, the president is likely to stress the need for dialogue among all sides of the conflict and he hopes that India will lift communication and movement restrictions in Kashmir and exercise utmost restraint in dealing with potential protests.

Trump has said that he is friends with both the leaders of India and Pakistan and "stands ready to assist if they both would like him to do so", the official said.

"Certainly, president Trump is also calling on Pakistan to prevent infiltration of militants across the Line of Control and to crackdown on groups on its territory that have attacked India in the past," said the official.

Trump, the official said, is very much looking forward to his meetings with Prime Minister Modi where they will discuss the strategic partnership and how they can cooperate more closely on issues like defense cooperation, counterterrorism and trade.

"We expect the two leaders to build on a very productive discussion they had in Osaka at the G-20 as well as the phone call that they held earlier this week. They will look for solutions on the trade front. The US is looking to India to reduce tariffs and open its market," said the official. (Source: PTI)

US deficit to exceed \$1 trillion next year: Report

WASHINGTON (TIP): The federal budget deficit is expected to balloon to more than USD 1 trillion in the next fiscal year under the first projections taking into account the big budget deal that President Donald Trump and Congress reached this summer, the Congressional Budget Office reported on Wednesday, August 21.

The return of USD 1 trillion annual deficits comes despite Trump's vow when running for office that he would not just balance the budget but pay down the entire national debt.

"The nation's fiscal outlook is challenging," said Phillip Swagel, director of the nonpartisan CBO. "Federal debt, which is already high by historical standards, is on an unsustainable course."

The office upped this year's deficit projection by USD 63 billion and the cumulative deficit projection for the next decade by USD 809 billion. The higher deficit projections come even as the CBO reduced its estimate for interest rates, which lowers borrowing costs, and as it raised projections for economic growth in the near term.

The number crunchers at CBO projected that the deficit for the current fiscal year will come to USD 960 billion. In the next fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1, it will exceed USD 1 trillion.

The CBO said the budget deal signed into law earlier this month, which took away the prospect of a government shutdown in October and the threat of deep automatic spending cuts, would boost deficits by USD 1.7 trillion over the coming decade.

Increased spending on disaster relief and border security would add USD 255 billion. Downward revisions to the forecast for interest rates will help the picture, trimming USD 1.4 trillion.

Swagel said the federal debt will rise even higher after the coming decade because of the nation's aging population and higher spending on health care.

To put the country on sustainable footing, Swagel said, lawmakers will have to increase taxes, cut spending or combine the two approaches.

The CBO projects that the economy will expand more slowly, from 2.3 per cent this year to 1.8 per cent on average in the next four years. The assumption reflects slower growth in consumer spending and government purchases, as well as the effect of trade policies on business investment.

It also projects the unemployment rate will remain close to its current level of 3.7 per cent through the end of 2020 and then rises to 4.6 per cent by the end of 2023.

The CBO's estimate is the first to reflect the hard-won budget and debt deal signed into law earlier this month.

"The recent budget deal was a budget buster, and now we have further proof. Both parties took an already unsustainable situation and made it much worse," said Maya MacGuineas, president of the private Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget. MacGuineas said lawmakers should ensure the legislation they enact is paid for and redouble efforts to control the growth in health care costs and restore the solvency of the Social Security program. Her organization is focused on educating the public on issues with significant fiscal policy impact.

Senior White House adviser Kellyanne Conway pivoted to the president's desire to fund the military and other programs when asked about the report. "We're always concerned about the deficit," Conway said. "We also need to fund a lot of the projects and programs that are important to this country." (Source: Agencies)



The panel began with a historical overview of the use of the term "hate crime" and the history of legislating these crimes. The discussion then moved to the sociological effects of hate crimes on communities and what

has been the faith-based resistance to these hate movements. The panel then examined the context in which hate movements are emerging now and what communities could do to stop them. SALDEF Regional Director Navtej S. Khalsa highlighted the increase of hate crimes against members of the Sikh community and what SALDEF has been doing to help bring about change through education and Seva (community service). According to government statistics, since 2016, there has been an overall increase in hate crimes by 17 percent.

IMRAN SHUTS DOOR ON TALKS WITH INDIA

NEW DEHLI (TIP): In a hardening of stance, Pakistan PM Imran Khan has ruled out any more overtures to India for a dialogue even as five UN rapporteurs described the blackout in Kashmir as "a form of collective punishment to the people of Jammu and Kashmir, without even the pretext of a precipitating offence". The Pakistan PM told the New York Times that "there is no point in talking to them (India). Unfortunately, all the overtures that I was making for peace and dialogue, I think they took it for appeasement. There is nothing more we can do."

Two days after PM Modi and Khan spoke with US President Donald Trump, Khan raised the spectre of a nuclear exchange, which was rejected by the Indian envoy.

Pak 'plans' to push afghan ultras at Loc

Pakistan plans to push 100 terrorists from Afghanistan into Kashmir in the next few weeks, security sources said on Thursday. At least 15 Jaish terrorists are waiting at terror launch pads in Lipa valley along the LoC, they said citing Intelligence reports. Mufti Rauf Asghar, brother of JeM chief Maulana Masood Azhar, held meetings with outfit commanders at its Bahawalpur HQ on August 19 and 20 on pushing terrorists into Kashmir, sources said.

Ready to open Kartarpur Corridor, says Pakistan



NEW DELHI (TIP): Pakistan on Friday said that despite tensions with India, it stands ready to open the Kartarpur Corridor and welcome the Sikh pilgrims to take part in celebrations in connection with the 550th birth anniversary of Baba Guru Nanak.

Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi said this while speaking to a delegation of civil society and parliamentarians of Afghanistan, which is currently visiting Pakistan for the 'Track-II dialogue'. Beyond Boundaries' Tension between India and Pakistan has escalated after New Delhi revoked Article 370 of the Constitution which gave special status to Jammu and Kashmir and bifurcated the state into two Union Territories on August 5. "Despite our tensions with India, we have decided go ahead with Kartarpur Corridor and we stand ready to welcome the Sikh pilgrims for the 550th anniversary of Baba Guru Nanak," Qureshi told the delegation.

French prez supports India on Kashmir after talks with Modi

EMMANUEL MACRON SAYS WILL TELL IMRAN TO SETTLE ISSUE BILATERALLY

CHANTILLY (TIP): Echoing India's stand on Jammu and Kashmir, French President Emmanuel Macron Thursday said India and Pakistan should resolve the Kashmir issue bilaterally and no third party should "interfere or incite" violence in the region, after his marathon one-on-one talks with Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The two leaders reviewed the entire gamut of the dynamic and multi-faceted bilateral relationship during their more than 90-minute long one-on-one meeting at Chateau de Chantilly, one of the finest jewels of French cultural heritage, located about 50 kms north of Paris. The one-on-one interaction was followed by the delegation-level talks. After the talks, the two countries signed four MoUs.

In a joint press statement after the talks, Macron said that he had discussed Kashmir with Modi, and called for stability while stressing that no one should incite violence over this issue. He also called for the rights of people to be maintained. "I told him that India and Pakistan will have to find a solution to the issue and no third party should interfere or incite violence in the region," Macron said.

He said that peace should be maintained in the region and peoples' rights should be protected. "I will also speak to Pakistan Prime Minister after a few days and tell him that the talks should be held bilaterally," the French president said.

He also said that France will deliver 1st of the 36 Rafale fighter jets to India next month.

Speaking after Macron, Prime Minister Modi said the relationship between India and France is not based on any selfishness, but on solid ideals of 'Liberty, Equality and Fraternity'.

He said India and France will expand cooperation in counter terrorism and security. "Both our countries are constantly facing terrorism. We thank President

Macron for the valuable support that France has received in combating cross-border terrorism. We intend to broaden cooperation on security and counter-terrorism," Modi added.

He said France and India stand firm together to meet the challenges of climate change, environment, and technology inclusive development. "Together we can pave the way for a safe and prosperous world," Modi said.

In a joint statement issued after the talks, the two leaders reiterated their strong condemnation of terrorism in all its forms and manifestations including cross-border terrorism and terror-related incidents in France and India.

"Both leaders reaffirmed that terrorism cannot be justified on any grounds whatsoever and it should not be associated with any religion, creed, nationality and ethnicity," it said.

Recalling the joint statement on terrorism adopted by the two countries in January 2016, the two leaders reaffirmed their strong determination to eliminate terrorism wherever it is to be found

and urged the international community to strengthen the efforts to counter and prevent terrorist financing.

"Both the leaders agreed to work for early convening of the Global Conference, proposed by India, to tackle the threat of terrorism around the world," the statement said.

They called upon all UN member countries to implement the UNSC Resolution 1267 and other relevant resolutions designating terrorist entities. The leaders also agreed to work together on early adoption of the Comprehensive Convention on International Terrorism (CCIT) in the UN.

The two leaders also agreed to enhance their operational cooperation and launch fresh efforts to prevent and fight radicalisation, especially online radicalisation.

Identifying defence industrial cooperation as one of the mainstays of the strategic partnership between India and France, the two leaders reaffirmed their commitment to further strengthen cooperation in this field.

Hackers 'steal' health data of 68 lakh Indians

NEW DELHI (TIP): In a startling revelation, US-based cyber security firm FireEye said on Thursday that China-based hackers broke into a leading Indian healthcare website, stealing 68 lakh records containing key patient and doctor information and credentials.

Without naming the portal, FireEye said cyber criminals are directly selling data stolen from healthcare organisations and web portals globally, including in India, in the underground markets for under \$2,000.

"In February, a bad actor that goes by the name 'fallensky519' stole 6,800,000 records associated with an India-based healthcare website that contains patient information and personally identifiable



information, doctor information and PII and credentials," FireEye said in its report. Cyber espionage actors can leverage this data for intelligence collection purposes, to further target high-profile individuals or those who may have access to valuable information, cautioned the report.

Between October 1, 2018, and March 31, 2019, FireEye Threat Intelligence observed multiple healthcare-associated databases for sale on underground forums, many for under \$2,000.

According to Luke McNamara, Principal Analyst at FireEye Intelligence, healthcare-focused Internet of Things (IoT) devices such as inventory-tracking "smart" storage,

remote patient monitoring and tracking systems, and remote data access devices similarly increase the theoretical attack surface for healthcare organisations.

"Compromise of these devices could be used for a variety of purposes, such as to sow confusion by creating false patient alerts, facilitate theft by changing inventory data," McNamara said.

Restrictions in Srinagar after march call to UN office

SRINAGAR (TIP): Restrictions were imposed in Srinagar city on Friday after posters issued by the separatists called on people to march to the local United Nations military observer group office, officials said.

Restrictions were eased in most areas of Kashmir this week, with barricades being lifted and the movement of people and traffic increasing gradually, but markets remained shut and mobile and Internet services suspended for the 18th day on Thursday.

Posters had appeared in certain localities of the city, in which the Joint Resistance Leadership (JLR) conglomerate have asked people to march to the UN military observer group to protest against the abrogation of Jammu and Kashmir's special status. The separatists have claimed that the Centre's move to scrap Article 370 was an attempt to change the demography of the Muslim-majority state.

Barricades and concertina wires were



erected at many places to prevent people from marching to Lal Chowk and Sonawar, where the UN office is located, the officials said, adding that the security forces had been deployed at strength at many places to maintain law

and order. Several leaders in the Valley have been kept in preventive custody after the Centre had on August 5 revoked almost all the provisions of Article 370, which gave special status to the state, and bifurcated it into Union territories.

Indigenous light combat aircraft Tejas Mk II targeted by 2022



NEW DELHI (TIP): The Aeronautical Development Agency (ADA) of the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) will unveil the Tejas Mark II with a heavier stand-off weapon capacity in the 75th year of India's independence, in 2022, and the long-awaited indigenous fighter, which will be manufactured by the state-owned Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd (HAL), will go into production by 2025-2026, two senior defence officials said on condition of anonymity.

DRDO's ADA finalised the design of the 17.5 ton Tejas Mark II (Mk-II) in December 2018, and is expected to lock in the design of the fifth generation twin-engine stealth fighter for Indian Air Force (IAF) by the end of the year. ADA officials said the Mk II will have the same weight as the Mirage, Jaguar and Gripen but with a heavier GE 414 engine. The qualitative requirements were frozen in late 2018, in full consultation and with the approval of the IAF, two years after the project was redesigned. The 4.5 generation fighter will go into production after the Tejas LCA (light combat aircraft) order of 123 aircraft to replace the air force's ageing MiG-21s is completed.

Sanctioned by the government in 2009, the Mk II will be equipped with state-of-the-art AESA radar with the indigenously developed air-to-air missile Astra, which has a range of 70km. The beyond visual range missile is currently being tested on the IAF's Su-30 MKI fighters.

ADA and IAF are also moving rapidly on the development of the advanced medium combat aircraft (AMCA). The 25-ton fighter will have all weapons in its belly and be powered by two engines capable of super-cruise speeds. AMCA will have complex S-shaped serpentine intakes. These hide the spinning turbine blades in the engine and are a key stealth feature. The super cruise feature allows the aircraft to accelerate without the use of after burners. Both features ensure minimum radar signatures.

NSA AJIT DOVAL VISITS MOSCOW, INDIA-RUSSIA TO INTENSIFY COUNTER TERRORISM COOPERATION

NEW DELHI (TIP): NSA Ajit Doval visited Moscow on August 21, 2019 after being invited by Nikolai Patrushev, Secretary of the Russian National Security Council.

NSA's talks with his Russian counterpart covered preparations for PM's visit to Vladivostok for the Eastern Economic Forum in early September, bilateral cooperation between the two National Security Councils (NSCs) as well as regional and international issues.

The discussions based on mutual trust and confidence showed identical or close positions on various issues characteristic of the special and privileged strategic partnership between the two countries. Both sides reaffirmed their intention to intensify counter terrorism cooperation.

The longstanding position of both sides on importance of their bilateral consultations and mutual support for principles of sovereignty and territorial integrity and non-interference of third parties was reiterated.

Doval also met Director of ROSCOSMOS Dmitry Rogozin to review ongoing cooperation in the space field and the Gaganyaan programme.



ECONOMY IN ICU, GOVT ISSUES 'LOOKOUT NOTICE' FOR THOSE DEFENDING CIVIL LIBERTIES, SAYS SIBAL

NEW DELHI (TIP): Senior Congress leader Kapil Sibal on Friday took a swipe at the government, saying the "economy is in ICU" and the Modi dispensation had issued a "lookout notice" for all those defending civil liberties.



His jibe of government issuing lookout notice was an obvious reference to the probe agencies issuing such a notice for party colleague P Chidambaram and arresting him.

The special CBI court on Thursday sent former finance minister Chidambaram to the CBI custody till August 26 in the INX Media corruption case.

"The events of the last few weeks have shown that both the economy and the cause of liberty need a stimulus package," said Sibal, who also represented Chidambaram in court.

"The economy is in ICU and government has issued a 'lookout notice' for all those defending civil liberties," he said in a tweet.

Always said demonising Modi wrong, says Congress leader Abhishek Singhvi

NEW DELHI (TIP): Senior Congress leader Abhishek Singhvi on Friday backed party leader Jairam Ramesh's remarks on Narendra Modi, saying demonising the Prime Minister was "wrong" and acts must be judged issue-wise, not person-wise.



Speaking at a book launch on Wednesday, former Union minister Ramesh had said Modi's governance model was "not a complete negative story", adding that not recognising his work and demonising him all the time was not going to help.

Echoing Ramesh's views, Singhvi tweeted: "Always said demonising Modi wrong. Not only is he PM of nation, a one way opposition actually helps him."

"Acts are always good, bad and indifferent—they must be judged issue wise and not person wise. Certainly, Ujjawala scheme is only one amongst other good deeds," he said.

Ramesh had also cited how successful the Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana (PMUJ) had turned out for Modi.

6 LeT terrorists enter Tamil Nadu through Sri Lanka: Intel

NEW DELHI (TIP): An alert has been issued in Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu after a group of six Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) terrorists have entered Tamil Nadu through Sri Lanka, according to an intel report.

The alert, which has been issued in the city, says that the group consists of one Pakistan national and five Sri Lankan Tamils.

Based on this alert, Chennai has also increased its patrolling forces.

The Chennai Commissioner of Police has said that based on this alert, patrolling forces have been increased and necessary precautions have been put in place. The DGP has instructed that in the entire state, storming operations should be conducted.

Earlier, intelligence reports had suggested that Pakistan was planning to deploy Afghan terrorists in Kashmir. After the abrogation of Article 370 in Jammu and Kashmir, intelligence reports suggested that these terrorists are ready to infiltrate Kashmir from terror launchpads in Pakistan occupied Kashmir (PoK).

Good diplomacy is extreme flexibility. Prime Minister Narendra Modi, after smarting from US President Donald Trump's offer of mediation, took a big step forward by talking to the White House. This was his first interaction with Trump after the abrogation of Article 370. China's move at the United Nation's Security Council last Friday had cornered India. After over 50 years, the two countries that had carved up a disputed territory were using the United Nations forum to embarrass India over an internal

legislative and administrative measure. The new status of Jammu and Kashmir does not alter the Line of Control or the Line of Actual Control, yet Pakistan and China have decided to internationalize it, virtually making a claim for Pakistan as a spokesperson for J&K, simply because of the state's religious composition. The United Kingdom still has not officially denied the allegation that it had helped China call for the UN consultative meeting.

It was in this context that Modi spoke to Trump about 'the extreme rhetoric and incitement to anti-India violence' being done by Pakistan Prime Minister

Imran Khan, who has been labelling India 'fascist and racist' and using terms like 'ethnic cleansing, genocide and Nazi ideology'. In fact, this sort of incitement is the prime reason for the lockdown in J&K. Soon after talking to Modi, Trump asked Khan to moderate the rhetoric. And tweeted later: 'A tough situation, but good conversations! For a change, it sounded truly Presidential and has the potential to normalize the situation.

This crisis is an opportunity for India to have a relook at the way it has been conducting business and diplomacy. After India's liberalization we had thrown open our economy for foreign

companies - private and state-run - to make billions, without getting any R&D or manufacturing facilities in return. Now, a beneficiary nation has dragged us to the UNSC for repealing our own laws through Parliament - democratically. India needs to leverage its domestic market and external buying power to safeguard its national interests. A closed-door, consultative meeting of the UNSC does not cause irreparable damage if it ends with just that. But it has definitely dented our relationship with China.

The advent of the 21st century marked the turning point in India's economic growth. The end of Western sanctions, imposed after our nuclear tests in 1998, led to an economic boom, triggered by the economic liberalization ushered in by the then PM Narasimha Rao. The economy experienced an over 9% rate of growth during three consecutive years: 9.48% in 2005-2006, 9.57% in 2006-2007 and 9.32% in 2007-2008. The rate of growth, thereafter, reached 8.59% in 2009-2010. The growth rate has been lower in the present decade, varying between 6.7% and 7.4%, with an unusual fall to a mere 3.2% in 2013. While they are relatively high by global standards, they do not match the levels China continuously achieved for over two decades, when Deng Xiaoping's reforms began paying rich dividends.

The growth in India's global merchandise trade during the first decade of the present century far exceeded the country's domestic growth figures. Merchandise exports expanded significantly in the first decade, rising from \$44.2 billion in 2001-2002 to \$306 billion in 2011-2012. The same can't be said of our exports of goods in the second decade. Merchandise exports remained almost stagnant in this period, at around \$300 billion annually, while our annual imports have now gone past \$500 billion. Service exports, spearheaded by information technology, however, rose from \$137 billion in 2011-2012 to \$205 billion in 2018-2019. But, continually high deficits in world trade of goods and services are neither desirable nor sustainable.

PM Modi has set an ambitious goal of building a \$5-trillion economy by 2025. This will necessitate an economic growth of over 8% per annum - a target we have achieved for a few years during the past two decades. Modi recently alluded to initiatives to boost the capital

of public sector banks, promote productivity and exports of agricultural products, boost industrial production and incentivize the services sector, while fostering the ease of doing business. He expressed understanding of concerns of the business community and assured that honest taxpayers would not be harassed. Foreign investors, however, note that setting up new industries in India is often frustrating.

The external challenges in promoting trade and industry today are more formidable. Globalization is now virtually a swear word in the US and parts of the EU, where industries, unable to face foreign competition, especially from China, are crying foul. India is losing its competitive edge in traditional industries like textiles to countries like Bangladesh and Vietnam. President Trump's protectionist policies have hurt America's friends, allies and foes alike. His moves against globalization commenced as soon as he assumed office by US withdrawal from participation in the Trans-Pacific Partnership. This grouping linked major economies across the Asia-Pacific, from the US, Canada and Mexico to Australia, Japan and members of ASEAN. He

unilaterally raised protectionist walls against major partners, including Canada, Mexico, China, Japan and South Korea.

The US has also clamped additional duties on a wide range of products from allies. The most wide-ranging trade sanctions have been imposed on China, though Chinese trade practices have not exactly been ethical. China had a massive trade surplus with the US - \$420 billion last year. Trump's actions have triggered the biggest trade war in contemporary history, with China retaliating on some US exports, with little or no impact. While the US trade deficit has reduced after the imposition of sanctions, China is already feeling the impact on its economic growth. This dispute has global repercussions.

India, like many others, has been hit hard by enhanced US duties on a range of products like aluminum and steel, and measures to end trade preferences it enjoyed as a developing country. India has retaliated, with its own sanctions on a number of US products. Trump has indicated that like China, India will get no benefits available traditionally to developing countries. New Delhi also recognizes that its own trade practices are now seen as being excessively protectionist, with a large number of countries prepared to seek remedial measures by reference to the WTO. Negotiations have commenced with the US, which remains concerned by existing and new Indian protectionist tariffs/restrictions on items like medical devices, apart from electronics and telecom products. There is going to be serious bargaining ahead, before we can conclude a satisfactory trade pact. India must realize that it can't become a significant, modern economic power unless it develops a vibrant electronics industry, with an indigenous capability for research and development, and a substantial manufacturing capability to produce crucial items like semiconductors and computer chips.

India's 'Act East' policy has included Free Trade Agreements with ASEAN, Japan and South Korea. These

agreements have brought us trade benefits. We need to improve our use of these arrangements. We face difficult choices in dealing with negotiations, now underway, for an Indo-Pacific economic community labelled as the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP), which includes ASEAN members, together with Japan, China, South Korea, New Zealand and Australia. There are serious misgivings about joining the RCEP, given our concerns about China's trade practices and our huge trade deficit with Beijing. These challenges have to be faced and overcome.

Maryam Nawaz's remand extended by 14 days in Chaudhry Sugar Mills case

LAHORE (TIP): An accountability court here on August 20 extended Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz vice president Maryam Nawaz's remand by 14 days in the alleged money laundering and income beyond means case.

Maryam, 45, and her cousin Yousuf Abbashad appeared before the accountability court in connection with the Chaudhry Sugar Mills case, where she is a major stakeholder.

The duo, arrested on August 8, was presented in the court, where judge Naeem Arshad heard the National Accountability Bureau's (NAB) request for a 15-day extension in their physical remand, the Dawn newspaper reported.

Both Maryam and Abbashad have been ordered to appear before the court on September 4.

NAB's lawyer said the investigations with Maryam had not yet been completed and requested an extension in remand, the report said.

Maryam had appeared before the NAB on July 31 to record her statement in the Chaudhry Sugar Mills (CSM) case.

The statement was regarding "dubious" business transactions of the CSM of which she was one of the major shareholders.

On August 8, she was taken into custody by the NAB authorities from the Kot Lakhpat Jail, where she was visiting her jailed father and former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif.

Sharif, 69, has been serving a seven-year prison term at the Kot Lakhpat Jail in Lahore since December 24, 2018 when an accountability court convicted him in one of the three corruption cases filed in the wake of the apex court's July 28, 2017 order in the Panama Papers case.

Nepal bans single-use plastics in Everest region

KATHMANDU (TIP): Nepal will make the Everest region a plastic-free zone by 2020 by banning single-use plastics, a move that will curb excessive pollution on the highest point of the Earth's surface.

The executive council of Khumbu Pasang Lhamu Rural Municipality in Solukhumbu district reached this decision on Wednesday, the Efe news reported.

The new rule will come into effect from January 1, 2020.

Nepal is also marking the "Visit Nepal" campaign next year which aims to draw 2 million foreign visitors.

International environmentalists have expressed their concern that Nepal has not done enough to protect the fragile environment of the world's highest peak.

Ganesh Ghimire, the Chief Administrative Officer of the rural municipality, said that plastic items fewer than 30 microns thickness had been banned.

These items include plastic bags, straws, soda and water bottles and most food packaging.

"Popular soft drink items like Coke, Fanta, Sprite, Mirinda and other beverages in plastic bottles will not be allowed," he said. "But beverages in metal cans will be allowed." Ghimire said that no penalty had been agreed on for people violating the rule yet.

"We will be working with the local body, trekking companies and the Mountaineering Association of Nepal to enforce the ban," he said, adding that awareness would be created among locals and foreign visitors about the negative effects of plastic on the environment.

Local households residing in the Khumbu region will be provided with five plastic bags of different types and sizes which they can use for daily activities, said Ghimire.



Last year, 56,303 foreign trekkers and mountaineers visited the Everest region.

Hundreds of foreign mountaineers spend thousands of dollars to conquer the world's tallest peak every spring season, which normally begins in early April and lasts until May.

As they go on the treacherous climb they leave behind a stream of litter.

In 2014, the government introduced a rule forcing each member of an expedition to bring back at least 8 kilograms (17.6 pounds) of collected garbage, in addition to the trash they generate themselves.

Each expedition team has to make a \$4,000 deposit which is refunded if each climber returns with the 8 kg of waste.

But there are no such rules for trekkers.

The deposit is refunded only if the Sagarmatha Pollution Control Committee certifies that they have collected all their trash and brought it back down with them.

But many commercial expeditions still

end up leaving trash scattered among the gelid snow.

"As the trekker numbers in the Everest region has been growing each passing year, it's a good move from the local authority to impose a ban on the use of plastic," Sitaram Sapkota, former President of Trekking Agencies Association of Nepal said.

In recent times, Everest has often earned the moniker of the world's highest garbage dump.

Several tonnes of old equipment, oxygen cylinders, rubbish and human waste litter the iconic mountain.

Last May, the Nepal government concluded a clean-up drive of Everest collecting nearly 11 tons of trash that had piled up for decades.

The clean-up initiative, the first of its kind since Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay Sherpa conquered the summit 66 years ago, was launched in mid-April and involved an elite team of 12 high-altitude Sherpa climbers who spent over a month collecting the waste. — IANS

Qureshi dials French counterpart over Kashmir

ISLAMABAD (TIP): Pakistan Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi held a telephonic conversation with his French counterpart Jean-Yves Le Drian and discussed the situation in Kashmir on August 19. "Foreign Minister Drian stated that France was extremely concerned at the situation and urged both sides to engage in a bilateral dialogue. He emphasised the need to ensure that there was no further escalation," the Foreign Office said in a statement.

"The French Foreign Minister underscored that they would have the same message for India," it claimed. Tensions between India and Pakistan spiked after India abrogated provisions of Article 370 of the Constitution to withdraw Jammu and Kashmir's special status and bifurcated it into two Union Territories. India has categorically told the international community that the scrapping of Article 370 of the Constitution to revoke

the special status of Jammu and Kashmir was an internal matter and also advised Pakistan to accept the reality.

Qureshi hoped that France, as a permanent member of the UN Security Council, would play its due role to ensure peace and stability in the region. "The two leaders agreed to remain in contact and continue to work together for peace and stability in the region," the FO said. Qureshi made contact after reports France was not supportive of Pakistan during UN Security Council meeting on Kashmir. — PTI

Death toll from Afghan wedding blast rises to 80

KABUL (TIP): The death toll from a suicide bomb attack on a wedding reception in Afghanistan's capital, Kabul, has risen to 80, two senior officials said on August 20.

The initial death toll after the Saturday night blast was 63, but some of the wounded had died in hospital, said Nasrat Rahimi, a spokesman at the interior ministry.

"Seventeen others have succumbed to their injuries in hospital and over 160 are still being treated either in hospitals or at home," Rahimi said.

The Islamic State militant group claimed responsibility for the attack. — Reuters

'N Korea says US cruise missile test, military moves 'dangerous', still committed to dialogue'

SEOUL (TIP): A North Korean spokesman said on August 22 the United States' recent mid-range cruise missile test and plans to deploy F-35 jets and offensive military equipment around the Korean peninsula were "dangerous" moves that would "trigger a new cold war" in the region.

North Korea remains unchanged in its position to resolve all issues through dialogue and negotiation, a North Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman said, but "dialogue accompanied by military threats is of no interest to us," according to state media KCNA.

"Dangerous and unusual military moves are now on the horizon, which would trigger a new cold war on the Korean peninsula and in the region," the statement added.

Working-level talks between the United States and North Korea have yet to restart since they were stalled by the failed second summit between US President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un in Hanoi in February.

Trump and Kim met again in June at the inter-Korean border and agreed to reopen negotiations.

U.S. envoy Stephen Biegun, who leads working-level talks with North Korea, has been in Seoul since Tuesday after a stop



in Japan to discuss the denuclearisation of North Korea.

"We are prepared to engage as soon as we hear from our counterparts in North Korea," Biegun said on Wednesday.

The KCNA statement also echoed North Korea's repeated protest against high-tech weapons being imported by South Korea such as F-35 stealth jets, calling them "grave provocations." The Pentagon

said on Monday it tested a ground-launched cruise missile with a range of more than 500 km (310 miles), the first such test since the United States pulled out of the Intermediate-range Nuclear Forces Treaty (INF).

North Korea has fired several short-range missiles in recent weeks, citing the need to strengthen its own security. Reuters

UK, France discuss Brexit

PARIS (TIP): French leader Emmanuel Macron backed the idea of a month of further talks to find a solution to Brexit while ruling out major compromises as he met British PM Boris Johnson for talks on August 22.

"We need to try to have a useful month," Macron said alongside Johnson who insisted that solutions were "readily available" to prevent checkpoints returning in divided Ireland. But Macron has rejected Johnson's calls to scrap a key arrangement for Ireland negotiated between the EU and British ex-premier Theresa May. — AFP

China launches unmanned warship

BEIJING (TIP): China has launched an unmanned warship, which, its developer claims, is combat-ready.

The warship, jointly developed by No. 716 and No. 702 research institutes under China's state-owned China Shipbuilding Industry Corporation (CSIC), has a length of about only 15m and a displacement of 20 tonne.

The JARI multi-purpose unmanned combat vessel held its launch ceremony on Wednesday at an undisclosed location, state-run Global Times reported on Thursday, quoting a statement issued by the CSIC. — PTI

As Amazon fires rage, Brazil's President Bolsonaro blames NGOs

SALVADOR (TIP): Wildfires in the Amazon rainforest in northern Brazil have ignited a firestorm on social media, with President Jair Bolsonaro on August 20 suggesting green groups started the blazes.

Images of fires purportedly devouring sections of the world's largest rainforest have gone viral on Twitter. #PrayforAmazonas is the top trending hashtag in the world on Wednesday, with more than 249,000 tweets.

"No matter how successful we are, if our Earth dies, we all die," posted one Twitter user.

Another wrote: "Send your prayers to the Amazon and to the planet, we will need it."

Some of the images, however, showed fires in the Amazon dating as far back as 1989 or even in other countries such as the United States or India, AFP's fact-check service found.

Official figures show nearly 73,000 forest fires were recorded in Brazil in the first eight months of the year—the highest number for any year since 2013. Most were in the Amazon.

That compares with 39,759 in all of 2018, according to the embattled National Institute for Space Research (INPE), which has been in Bolsonaro's cross-hairs since it released data

showing a surge in deforestation in recent months.

The head of INPE, the agency tasked with monitoring forest clearing, was sacked over the figures.

While it was not possible Wednesday to measure the size of the area affected by fires, thick smoke in recent days has blanketed several cities, including Sao Paulo, and caused a commercial flight to be diverted.

Forest fires tend to intensify during the dry season, which usually ends in late October or early November, as land is cleared to make way for crops or grazing.

But the WWF has blamed this year's sharp increase on accelerating deforestation in the Amazon, which is seen as crucial to keeping climate change in check.

"Historically, in this region, the use of fire is directly linked to deforestation as it is one of the techniques for tree clearing," WWF said in a statement.

Bolsonaro hit back Wednesday, saying "criminal action by those NGOs, to call attention against me, against the Brazilian government" following funding cuts may be the reason for the forest fires.

"This is the war that we are facing," Bolsonaro told reporters.— AFP

Vietnam says 'deeply concerned' about developments in South China Sea

HANOI (TIP): Vietnam is "deeply concerned" about recent developments in the South China Sea, the Southeast Asian country's prime minister, Nguyen Xuan Phuc, said on August 23.

Vietnamese and Chinese vessels have since early July been locked in a tense standoff in Vietnamese-controlled waters in the South China Sea, where a Chinese vessel appeared to have been conducting a seismic survey.

The United States also said on Thursday it was deeply concerned about China's interference in oil and gas activities in waters claimed by Vietnam, and that the deployment of the vessels was "an escalation by Beijing in its efforts to intimidate other claimants out of developing resources in the South China Sea."

Phuc was speaking at a press conference alongside his Australian counterpart Scott Morrison, who is in Hanoi for a three-day visit. —Reuters

Students in HK to boycott new term

HONG KONG (TIP): Hong Kong student leaders on August 22 announced a two-week boycott of lectures from the upcoming start of term, as they seek to keep protesters on the streets and pressure on the government. The financial hub has been rocked by three months of unrest, with students making up a large number of the pro-democracy protesters taking to the streets almost daily.

Leaders said students will miss lectures between September 2 — the planned start of the new term — and September 13. They threatened further action if the government does not adequately respond to the protesters' five demands, which include spiking a controversial extradition bill, universal suffrage and an independent inquiry into alleged police abuses during the protests.

"Two weeks should be enough for the government to really think through how to respond," said Davin Wong, acting president of the Hong Kong University Students' Union. "As the situation has gotten more intense, we believe the social situation will bring more students into the boycott." — AFP

Trudeau's comments infuriate China

BEIJING (TIP): China has accused Ottawa of worsening bilateral relations after Canadian PM Justin Trudeau vowed to stand up to China amid disputes. Both have been locked in a feud since Canada detained Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou and — in apparent retaliation — China detained two Canadians over espionage-linked accusations. AFP

"Quick learner," he captioned the picture, which has been geo-tagged to South Africa. This is not the first time that the two have sparked dating rumours.



KIRSTEN DUNST: NOT DIRECTING 'THE BELL JAR' ADAPTATION



And Peruvians have special affinity for India for its rich history and cultural heritage. It may be the reason for the popularity of not only Indian cinema but also movements like Rama Krishna.

To accelerate its economic growth further, Peru needs infrastructure, machinery, manpower and technology. True to the adage "gold mine of natural resources", Peru has abundance of gold, silver, other precious metals and natural gas. Going by the size and magnitude of the nation, it has tremendous potential for solar energy.

Holding of Pan Am Games has brought Peru to limelight. It is not only Its fiscal health is better than most of the South American countries, it has the ability and nearly stable political system to sustain such global challenges where it can successfully showcase its potential. Peru started the Games with a "double gold" by winning the grueling marathon event, both for men and women. In all there were more than 20 Peruvian athletes who got the apartments in the Games village allotted to them.

Peru was successful in showcasing its progress through opening and closing ceremony. The closing ceremony was specially designed to depict "Dance in Diversity".

Three things about Peru surprises everyone most. Bars in most of the hotels here remain open for 24 hours. The capital city is also dotted with 24-hour

Casinos. Other than three main recognized Casinos, there are 40 others operating in different parts of the city and attract not only expatriates but also affluent tourists and the local business leaders.

Speed breakers, too, are common. Every km you have a speed breaker. Roadside vendors selling eatables, daily use items are equally common. At major traffic intersections, you have young and old people swarming with eatables, soft drinks and other daily use products, exactly the way you find them in India.

Those who are into small trade and practices are from Venezuela or Colombia. There are nearly 2 million immigrants from other South American countries trying to settle down in Peru.

Holding of games gave Peru a great opportunity to develop infrastructure, especially roads, bridges, motorways, hotels, stadiums and convention centers. While the Games were in progress, lot of construction activity was going on in the streets, towns, cities and districts of the capital Lima. Interestingly, among the major engineering companies engaged in infrastructure development are from India.

Other than construction companies, Indian business houses holding expertise in mining, oil and natural gas exploration and solar energy have got a big market share. Besides, leaders of India auto industry, including Bajaj,

bank towers escaped any damage.

Like any other developing economy, Peru is grappling with various problems, including provision of basic civic amenities. Solid waste and garbage disposal are the main problems. Garbage dumps are at street corners. The garbage is then carefully scanned for organic and inorganic waste, plastics, metals and paper as is being done by rag pickers, garbage collectors or junk or Kabarri merchants in India.

In the absence of public transport, private operators, with vehicles similar to Maruti or slightly bigger vans, take care of needs of commuters. The conductor of the vehicle hangs out making shouts to attract commuters for destinations his vehicle touches.

And in Lima you have localities, avenues, towns and major roads named after all American nations, cities and even provinces. While in Lima you can travel to Canada, Brazil, Mexico, and El Salvador in a van or a bus. Each local public carrier carries on its sides the names of localities or avenues it touches. You do not have to remember the route number to go to a particular destination.

Sun is a rarity. There is a common saying that there is a fold of clouds between Sun and Peru. Only lucky few see sunlight here. Most of the time weather remains overcast with chilly breeze blowing throughout the day. In summer months, temperature touches past 30 degrees Celsius while in winter the maximum is around 19 degrees Celsius.

India's interest in Peru is significant. It is seventh largest trade partner from

South America. Lots of Indian companies trading in precious metals, especially gold and silver, frequent Peru. Balance of trade lies in favor of Peru.

India and Peru hope to sign Free Trade Agreement any time though many have doubts about it. Of late, Indian Vice-President V. Naidu visited Peru last year.

Another common feature of India and Peru has been immigrant destination. While India continues to grapple with the problem of refugees or illegal immigrants from Bangladesh, Peru has been a signatory to an agreement where anyone from the signatory seven nations can go to any member country with legal travel documents, including passport, to settle there. This has brought influx of Venezuelans and Columbians to Peru.

Though bilateral relations between India and Peru were established in early 60s, Peru has been supporter of not only for India's seat in Security Council but also on Kashmir issue.

As of now there are about 500 Indians in Peru and nearly 200 Peruvians living permanently in India. Indians in Peru are into business, especially export and import of minerals, autos and auto parts.

There is a lot of potential for strengthening the bilateral trade further and a Free Trade Agreement may act as a catalyst. It also holds the potential for hardworking Punjabi youth looking for green pastures overseas.

A GOOD NIGHT'S SLEEP MAY BE THE SECRET TO A HAPPIER MARRIAGE

A study suggests yet another reason to get some shut-eye, finding that husbands and wives who get a good night's sleep are more satisfied with their marriage the next day.

Conducted by researchers from Florida State University, the study looked at the importance of sleep on self-regulation, which is the ability to move focus away from undesirable experiences when making an evaluation of a relationship, and can influence how satisfied couples are with their partner.

Self-regulation requires energy, which can be replenished when our bodies sleep, with previous studies showing that even just partial sleep deprivation can have a negative effect on processes that require self-regulation. The researchers commented in their paper that "Up to one-third of married or cohabiting adults report that sleep problems burden their relationship."

The study looked at 68 newlywed couples over a seven-day period. Each day couples were asked to record the number of hours they slept and then answer two sets of questions.

The first set measured overall relationship satisfaction with questions such as, "How satisfied were you with your marriage today?"

The second set looked at relationship experiences in nine areas including chores, the amount of time spent together and how the couple resolved conflict.

Participants rated their answers using a scale of 1



(not satisfied at all) to 7 (extremely satisfied).

The results showed that couples were more satisfied with their relationship on the days after which they had slept for a longer period of time.

In addition, the team also found that husbands, although not wives, were less negatively affected by bad experiences in the nine areas assessed, and better able to remain satisfied with their relationship, when they got more sleep.

FOOD CORNER

CHEESY POTATO WEDGES

INGREDIENTS

6 potato, 2 teaspoon mixed herbs, 2 teaspoon chilli flakes, 1 cup chopped onion, 1 tablespoon dijon mustard, 1/2 cup fresh cream, 4 teaspoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, water as required

Method

- Wash potatoes, peel and slice them into thick wedges. Then, add the potatoes in a deep-bottomed pan and pour water in it, put this pan on high flame and boil the potato slices in it. Once the wedges turn tender, drain the water and keep them aside.
- Next, put a non-stick pan on medium flame and melt butter in it, and quickly add the chopped onions and saute till they get translucent and pink.
- To the sauteed onions, add the boiled potato wedges and stir once. Then, add chili flakes in the pan followed by adding fresh cream, mustard sauce, mixed herbs, and salt. Mix well all the ingredients and cook for another two minutes.



NICOTINE-FREE E-CIGARETTES MAY DAMAGE BLOOD VESSELS

A single dose of e-cigarettes may be harmful to the body's blood vessels—even when the vapour is entirely nicotine-free, a study claims.

Smoking e-cigarettes, also called vaping, has been marketed as a safe alternative to tobacco cigarettes and is rising in popularity among non-smoking adolescents, researchers said.

To study the short-term impacts of vaping, the researchers at the University of Pennsylvania in the US performed magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) exams on 31 healthy, non-smoking adults before and after vaping a nicotine-free e-cigarette.

Comparing the pre- and post-MRI data, the single episode of vaping resulted in reduced blood flow and impaired endothelial function in the large (femoral) artery that supplies blood to the thigh and leg, according to the study published in the journal Radiology.

The endothelium, which lines the inside surface of blood vessels, is essential to proper blood circulation.

Once the endothelium is damaged, arteries thicken and blood flow to the heart and the brain can be cut off, resulting in heart attack or stroke.

"While e-cigarette liquid may be relatively harmless, the vaporisation process can transform the molecules—primarily propylene glycol and glycerol—into toxic substances," said Felix W Wehrli, a professor at the University of Pennsylvania.

"Beyond the harmful effects of nicotine, we've shown that vaping has a sudden, immediate effect on the body's vascular function, and could potentially lead to long-term harmful consequences," said Wehrli.

E-cigarettes are battery-operated devices that convert liquid into aerosol, which is inhaled into the



user's lungs. Typically, the liquid contains addictive nicotine, as well as flavours.

More than 10 million adults in the US use e-cigarettes, and vaping has become especially popular among teenagers, researchers said.

They examined the impact of an e-cigarette that contained propylene glycol and glycerol with tobacco flavouring, but no nicotine, which study participants took 16, three-second puffs from.

To evaluate vascular reactivity, the group constricted the vessels of the thigh with a cuff and then measured how quickly the blood flowed after its release.

Using a multi-parametric MRI procedure, researchers scanned the femoral artery and vein in the leg before and after each vaping episode to see how vascular function changed.

They then performed a statistical analysis to determine group differences in vascular function before and after vaping.

The team observed, on average, a 34 per cent reduction in the femoral artery's dilation.

E-cigarettes exposure also led to a 17.5 per cent reduction in peak blood flow, a 20 per cent reduction in

venous oxygen, and a 25.8 per cent reduction in blood acceleration after the cuff release—the speed at which the blood returned to the normal flow after being constricted.

These findings suggest that vaping can cause significant changes to the inner lining of blood vessels, said study lead author Alessandra Caporale, a post-doctoral researcher at University of Pennsylvania.

"E-cigarettes are advertised as not harmful, and many e-cigarette users are convinced that they are just inhaling water vapour," Caporale said.

"But the solvents, flavourings and additives in the liquid base, after vapourisation, expose users to multiple insults to the respiratory tract and blood vessels," he said.

Wehrli noted that they observed these striking changes after the participants (all of whom never smoked previously) used an e-cigarette a single time.

More research is needed to address the potential long-term adverse effects of vaping on vascular health, but he predicts that e-cigarettes are potentially much more hazardous than previously assumed.

New drug to treat TB approved by US regulator

The US drug regulator has approved a new tuberculosis (TB) drug for treating hard-to-treat drug-resistant TB that makes the treatment regimen shorter and simpler.

Pretomanid, a novel compound developed by the non-profit organization TB Alliance, was approved by the US Food & Drug Administration (FDA) on August 14.

TB is the leading infectious cause of death worldwide, killing at least 1.6 million people annually. There are more than half a million cases of multi drug-resistant TB (MDR-TB) annually, with about 6% of those cases being extensively drug-resistant TB (XDR-TB) cases. India accounts for nearly a quarter of the global TB cases.

The new drug was approved under the Limited Population Pathway for Antibacterial and Antifungal Drugs (LPAD pathway) as part of a three-drug, six-month, all-oral regimen for the treatment of people with XDR-TB or MDR-TB, who are treatment-intolerant or non-responsive.



The LPAD pathway was established by FDA as a tool to encourage further development of antibacterial and antifungal drugs to treat serious, life-threatening infections that affect a limited population of patients with unmet needs.



WOMEN WITH SLEEP APNEA AT INCREASED RISK OF CANCER: STUDY

Women with obstructive sleep apnea (OSA) appear to be at an elevated risk of getting cancer than men with the condition, warn researchers.

The study, published in the European Respiratory Journal, is based on analyses of registry data, collected in the European database ESADA, on a total of some 20,000 adult patients with obstructive sleep apnea (OSA). About 2 per cent of them also had a cancer diagnosis.

"It's reasonable to assume that sleep apnea is a risk factor for cancer or that both conditions have common risk factors, such as overweight. On the other hand, it is less likely that cancer leads to sleep apnea," said Ludger Grote, Professor at the University of Gothenburg in Sweden.

According to the researchers, advanced age was associated with elevated cancer risk, but adjusting the data for age, gender, body mass index (BMI), smoking and alcohol consumption nevertheless showed a possible link between intermittent hypoxia at night and higher cancer prevalence.

The connection applied mainly to women and was weaker in men.

AIR POLLUTION LINKED WITH RISK OF MENTAL DISORDERS

Exposure to air pollution may be associated with an increased risk of developing bipolar disorder and depression, according to a study.

Researchers at the University of Chicago in the US suggest a significant link between exposure to environmental pollution and an increase in the prevalence of neuropsychiatric disorders.

"Our studies in the US and Denmark show that living in polluted areas, especially early in life, is predictive of mental disorders," said computational biologist Atif Khan, the first author of the new study published in the journal PLoS Biology.

"These neurological and psychiatric diseases -- so costly in both financial and social terms -- appear linked to the physical environment, particularly air quality," Khan said.

Khan and Andrey Rzhetsky, a professor at Chicago used a US health insurance database of 151 million individuals with 11 years of inpatient and outpatient claims for neuropsychiatric diseases.

They compared the geo-incidence of claims to measurements of 87 potential air pollutants from the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

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APPLE 'BUG' PUTS IPHONES WITH IOS TO HACKING RISK

Apple has reportedly unpatched a bug in the latest iOS update 12.4 that it had fixed in the earlier iOS 12.3 update -- leaving its most up-to-date iPhones vulnerable to hacking risk.

According to Motherboard, security researchers have already exploited the vulnerability in iOS 12.4 and released a public "jailbreak" on open-sourced software development platform Github -- the first free public jailbreak for a fully-updated iPhone that's been released in years.

As a result of the mistake, all iPhones running iOS 12.4 can now be jailbroken and several iPhone users have already tweeted that they are successfully running the "jailbreak".

Jailbreaking an iPhone lets people customise their iOS devices and run unsupported apps.

Apple never allows unsupported apps on its iOS platform, which makes its devices extra secure.

The Cupertino-based tech giant was yet to respond to this.

Apple had fixed this flaw, found by a Google hacker, in the earlier iOS 12.3 version.

"Due to 12.4 being the latest version of iOS currently available and the only one which Apple allows upgrading to, for the next couple of days (till 12.4.1 comes out), all devices of this version are jailbreakable and vulnerable to what is effectively a 100+ day exploit," a Jonathan Levin, a security researcher was quoted as saying.



TWITTER TO REMOVE SPAM, ABUSE FROM YOUR DIRECT MESSAGE INBOX

Micro-blogging platform Twitter is testing a new feature to filter spam and abusive messages from your Direct Message (DM) inbox.

"Unwanted messages aren't fun. So we're testing a filter in your DM requests to keep those out of sight, out of mind," Twitter Support posted on Friday.

Currently, Twitter allows users to set their DM inbox open to receive messages from anyone.

"This new experiment will test a filter that will move unwanted messages, including those with offensive content or spam, to a separate tab," reports TechCrunch.

Twitter this week announced several changes coming to its platform, including a way to follow topics, a search tool for the Direct Message inbox, as well as support for iOS Live Photos as GIFs.

The new option would allow users search for a particular message by a specific person through a dedicated tab in their DM inbox.

LIFE MAY HAVE EXISTED ON WARM, RAINY ANCIENT MARS

Mars was once warm enough to host pouring rainstorms and flowing water, which would have created an environment that could support simple life, according to a study.

The study compared Earth data to Martian minerals detected using the NASA CRISM spectrometer, currently orbiting Mars, which can remotely identify surface chemicals where water once existed.

The researchers from Purdue University in the US also took data from the Mars Curiosity rover.

They suggest that the climate on the Red Planet 3 to 4 billion years ago was warm enough to provoke substantial rainstorms and flowing water, followed by a longer cold period where the water froze.

This may have implications on the conditions for the development of life on Mars, according to the findings presented at the Goldschmidt Geochemistry Conference in Barcelona, Spain.

Scientists have long known that water was abundant on ancient Mars, but there has been no consensus on whether liquid water was common, or whether it was largely frozen in ice.

Warm conditions make it much more likely that life would have developed independently on the surface of ancient Mars, researchers said.

Now, a new comparison of patterns of mineral deposition on the Red Planet with similar depositions on Earth lends weight to the idea that early Mars had one or more long periods dominated by rainstorms and flowing water, with the water later freezing.

"We know there were periods when the surface of Mars was frozen; we know there were periods when water flowed freely," said Professor Briony Horgan from Purdue University.



"But we don't know exactly when these periods were, and how long they lasted. We have never sent unmanned missions to areas of Mars which can show us these earliest rocks, so we need to use Earth-bound science to understand the geochemistry of what may have happened there."

"Our study of weathering in radically different climate conditions such as the Oregon Cascades, Hawaii, Iceland, and other places on Earth, can show us how climate affects pattern of mineral deposition, like we see on Mars," said Horgan.

On Earth, silica deposition is found in glaciers which are characteristic of melting water.

On Mars, similar silica deposits can be identified in younger areas, but older areas can also be seen which are similar to deep soils from warm climates on Earth.

"This leads us to believe that on Mars 3 to 4 billion years ago, we had a general slow trend from warm to cold, with periods of thawing and

freezing," Horgan said.

If this is so, it is important in the search for possible life on Mars, researchers said.

The building blocks of life on Earth developed very soon after the Earth's formation, and that flowing water is essential for life's development.

The evidence that we had early, flowing water on Mars, will increase the chances that simple life may have developed at around the same time as it did on Earth, according to the researchers.

Analysis of the surface geology of Mars supports a trend from a warm to a cold climate, but the climate models themselves don't support this, due to the limited heat arriving from the young Sun, they said.

"If our findings are correct, then we need to keep working on the Mars climate models, possibly to include some chemical or geological, or other process which might have warmed the young planet," said Horgan.

FACEBOOK LAUNCHES TOOL TO LET USERS CONTROL DATA FLOW

Facebook, under pressure to ramp up privacy rules across its platform, said on Tuesday it was rolling out a tool allowing users to control data that it receives from other apps and websites about their online activity.

The new tool is to give clients access to their so-called "off-Facebook activity"—fed back to Facebook with the aim of targeting advertisements—and give them the option of deleting it.

"Off-Facebook Activity lets you see a summary of the apps and websites that send us information about your activity, and clear this information from your account if you want to," it said in a statement.

"This is another way to give people more transparency and control on Facebook," it said.

Currently, commercial websites visited by a customer who also has a Facebook account may send Facebook details of that visit, prompting the social network to show that person ads related to any product they may have searched for.

With the new Facebook tool, users will be able to see a summary of information that other apps and websites have sent Facebook through business tools such as



Facebook Pixel or Facebook Login.

They then have the option of disconnecting this information, or all future off-Facebook activity, from their account. The new feature will be rolled out first in Ireland, South Korea and Spain, and then everywhere else over the coming months, Facebook said.

"We expect this could have some impact on our business, but we believe giving people control over their data is more important," it said.

Donald Trump 'not ready' for China trade deal, dismisses recession fears

WASHINGTON (TIP): U.S. President Donald Trump and top White House officials dismissed concerns that economic growth may be faltering, saying on Sunday they saw little risk of recession despite a volatile week on global bond markets, and insisting their trade war with China was doing no damage to the United States.

"We're doing tremendously well, our consumers are rich, I gave a tremendous tax cut, and they're loaded up with money," Trump said on Sunday.

But he was less optimistic than his aides on striking a trade deal with China, saying that while he believed China was ready to come to an agreement, "I'm not ready to make a deal yet."

He hinted that the White House would like to see Beijing resolve ongoing protests in Hong Kong first.

"I would like to see Hong Kong worked out in a very humanitarian fashion," Trump said. "I think it would be very good for the trade



deal." White House economic adviser Larry Kudlow said trade deputies from the two countries would speak within 10 days and "if those deputies' meetings pan out... we are planning to have China come to the USA" to advance negotiations over ending a trade battle that has emerged as a potential risk to global economic growth.

Even with the talks stalled for

now and the threat of greater tariffs and other trade restrictions hanging over the world economy, Kudlow said on "Fox News Sunday" the United States remained "in pretty good shape."

"There is no recession in sight," Kudlow said. "Consumers are working. Their wages are rising. They are spending and they are saving."

India complying with Iran sanctions, says US

WASHINGTON (TIP): The US has no evidence that India is running afoul of American sanctions on Iran through the Chabahar port, a top US diplomat said yesterday. India said it stopped importing oil from Iran after American waivers granted to eight buyers expired in May. India at that time had hoped that US sanctions would not affect its partnership in developing Iran's Chabahar port.

"We have no evidence that India is running afoul of US sanctions," Special US Representative to Iran, Brian Hook, told reporters at the Foreign Press Centre.

Hook was responding to a reporter's questions alleging that India is violating the US sanctions through the Chabahar port which it is building in Iran for the purpose of Afghanistan.

"I'm not familiar with the evidence that you are citing," Hook said, adding India was not violating the US sanctions. US President Donald Trump last year withdrew from the 2015 nuclear deal between Iran and world powers and revived a range of sanctions against the Persian Gulf nation. It, however, granted a six-month waiver from sanctions to eight countries — China, India, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Turkey, Italy and Greece, but with a condition that they would reduce their purchases of Iranian oil. The Trump administration in April decided not to renew waiver that let countries like India buy Iranian oil without facing US sanctions.

India had agreed to restrict its monthly purchase to 1.25 million tonne (300,000 barrels per day), down from 452,000 barrels per day bought in 2017-18 financial year.

Biscuit maker Parle may lay off 10,000 workers amid economic slowdown



MUMBAI (TIP): Popular Indian biscuit maker Parle Products may cut up to 10,000 jobs owing to the prevailing macro-economic situation, according to a company executive.

Rural distress has taken a heavy toll on fast-moving consumer goods (FMCG) sales for the past few quarters. Companies like Hindustan Unilever and Nestle have reported weak growth owing to the slowdown in consumption.

According to reports, Mayank Shah, category head at Parle Products, has said that if there is no tax relief in the form of a GST rate cut, the company may have to lay off 8,000 to 10,000 people.

Apart from the auto sector, FMCG companies are also facing strong headwinds. Hindustan Unilever, which saw a significant decline in its sales volumes during the June quarter, had said that "the near-term demand will remain subdued given the macroeconomic conditions."

The stressed rural sector, which comprises one-third of the company's market, is the key factor behind the company's tepid performance. The revival of the distressed agriculture sector would be a positive for the FMCG industry.

Announcing its latest quarterly results, ITC had said: "The FMCG-Others segment delivered a resilient performance during the quarter amidst a marked slowdown in the FMCG industry across urban and rural markets".



Amazon opens biggest global campus in Hyderabad

Amazon.com Inc. today opened its largest campus building globally in the south Indian city of Hyderabad as it prepares for a furious expansion and battle with nemesis Walmart Inc. in one of the world's fastest-growing retail markets.

The Seattle-headquartered company is making an ambitious push in India, the last major retail frontier still primarily reliant on small-scale neighborhood and mom-and-pop stores. "E-commerce is so small in India relative to the total consumption, less than 3%," said Amit Agarwal, Amazon's country manager for India.

The largely untapped country is critical to the global domination plans of both Amazon and Walmart, the latter of which spent \$16 billion last year to buy India's biggest startup, retailer Flipkart Online Services Pvt. Amazon founder Jeff Bezos has so far pledged \$5.5 billion for its India operations.

Built in Hyderabad over three years, the new campus is Amazon's first owned building outside of the United States, spans 1.8 million square feet of office space and will accommodate 15,000 workers. "The largest buildings in Seattle house about 5,000 employees," remarked John Schoettler, vice president of Amazon's Global Real Estate and Facilities. He said the campus was Amazon's largest in the world but has plenty more room to grow.

Maruti sees new launches, govt steps putting sales back on track

Maruti Suzuki India Ltd expects vehicle sales to recover in the forthcoming festival season buoyed by new product introductions and expectations of some favourable government decisions.

"At this stage, everybody is hoping that this festive season will be better than last year and at this stage, one can only hope. The new launches will not be able to turn the market around but will be able to make some changes," said R.C. Bhargava, chairman, Maruti Suzuki. "How the festive season turns out will also depend on some measures taken by the centre and state governments."

A roll back of the proposal of the Union government to raise registration charges of new vehicles within a few days will be a boost to the industry, Bhargava said. "The bigger challenge is the road taxes being imposed by state governments and that needs to be reviewed," he added.

India's largest passenger vehicle maker on Wednesday launched new multipurpose vehicle XL6—a six-seater premium version of its existing Ertiga model. XL6 will be sold through Maruti's Nexa chain of premium dealerships.

Court sends Chidambaram to CBI custody till Aug 26 in INX Media case

He was produced before Special Judge Ajay Kumar Kuhar where Chidambaram's advocates opposed the CBI plea on the ground that all the other accused, including his son Karti, have already been granted bail in the case.

Pronouncing the order, the court said medical test of Chidambaram has to be conducted in accordance with law.

"Considering all facts and circumstances, I am of view that police custody of Chidambaram is justified," the judge said. Lawyers and family of Chidambaram will be allowed to meet him for half-an-hour every day, the court added.

Senior advocate Kapil Sibal, appearing for Chidambaram, argued that the first arrest in the case was of Bhaskar Raman, chartered accountant of Karti, who is presently out on bail.

Besides, Peter and Indrani Mukherjea, also accused in the case, are out on default bail as they are in jail in connection with another matter, Sibal said.

He contended that grant of bail was a rule and the issue before the court was of personal liberty.

Sibal was countering the 5-day custodial interrogation of Chidambaram sought by CBI which said it needed to unearth the larger conspiracy.

Solicitor General (SG) Tushar Mehta, appearing for CBI, told the court that the agency was not extorting confession but it had the right to reach the root of the case.

Sibal, senior advocate Abhishek M Singhvi also appeared for Chidambaram and opposed CBI's plea by saying that the former Union Minister was not a flight risk.

Singhvi said the entire CBI case was based on the statement of Indrani Mukherjea, who has turned approver in the case.

He said Chidambaram cannot answer what CBI wants to hear and added that the agency cannot seek remand on the ground of evasive replies.

He also argued that there was no allegation of tampering of evidence by CBI.

Singhvi further contended that police remand can only be granted in special circumstances and this was a case where there was no new development.

He said the agency was asking Chidambaram only old questions since his arrest on Wednesday night.

Mehta countered the arguments made on behalf of Chidambaram, saying that everybody was equal before the court.

He said certain facts about the case

cannot be narrated in an open court and also opposed the plea that Chidambaram be allowed to argue for himself, saying he has able lawyers representing him.

Mehta, during his initial arguments, said Chidambaram entered into a criminal conspiracy with others in the scam.

"He is not cooperating in the investigation," Mehta said, adding that he has been evasive in replies and grave offence was committed.

Mehta said it is a serious and monumental case of money laundering.

He also said Chidambaram's custodial interrogation was necessary to unearth the "quid pro quo and larger conspiracy" and he is required to be confronted with documents.

Opposing CBI's arguments, Sibal contended that what the agency has said should not be taken as "gospel truth".

He said Chidambaram was asked 12 questions and he had already answered six of them previously.

Investigators don't know what to ask and they don't have questions ready with them, Sibal told the court, adding that after his arrest on Wednesday night, Chidambaram was interrogated only on Thursday morning at 11 am.

During the arguments, Chidambaram said he has not slept for the last 24 hours.

Sibal further argued that CBI could have written a letter to Chidambaram for producing the documents alleged to be in his possession and the agency cannot say he was evasive during the investigation.

He also contended that what has been stated in the CBI case diary was not the truth and cannot be considered as evidence.

Mehta, during his arguments, placed the Delhi High Court's judgement dismissing Chidambaram's anticipatory bail plea and also referred to the observations made in it.

He said charge sheet has not been filed in the case yet and the case is at pre-charge sheet stage, therefore, "we need material which Chidambaram is holding".

"Effective investigation is possible only in custodial interrogation," he argued.

Mehta contended that serious, active and informed role of the accused is made out and money trail is made out and has to be probed.

Chidambaram's custodial interrogation required to get answer to certain questions for effective probe, he said.

Soon after entering the courtroom, 73-year-old Chidambaram was seen having discussion with his party leaders and senior advocates Kapil Sibal, Abhishek Manu Singhvi and Vivek Tankha.

Chidambaram's family members, including his wife Nalini and son Karti, were also in the courtroom along with other senior advocates, including Dayan

Krishnan.

The CBI had registered an FIR on May 15, 2017, alleging irregularities in the Foreign Investment Promotion Board (FIPB) clearance granted to the INX Media group for receiving overseas funds of Rs 305 crore in 2007 during Chidambaram's tenure as the Finance Minister.

Thereafter, the ED lodged a money laundering case in this regard in 2018.

Life has come full circle for Congress leader P Chidambaram and that too in less than 10 years.

The Congress-led UPA-II was in power at the Centre and Chidambaram was the Union home minister.

Investigating agency CBI had alleged that the then Gujarat home minister Amit Shah was evading arrest in the encounter case of Sohrabuddin Sheikh. Sheikh was a criminal, who had several pending cases against him, and had been killed in police custody in an alleged encounter in 2005.

Allegations against Shah included that the encounter had been staged at his behest.

After lying low, in 2010, Shah made a dramatic entry at the State BJP headquarters for a press conference where he claimed innocence and political vendetta against him. He slammed the Congress and the CBI and called all charges against him "fabricated".

At this point, he was whisked away to the residence of a CBI judge, who remanded him to judicial custody for 13 days. Earlier, he had submitted his resignation as home minister from the Cabinet of then Gujarat chief minister Narendra Modi.

Shah is now the Union Home Minister in charge of the key North Block ministry.

The Congress called Chidambaram's arrest a political vendetta. This is the same charge the BJP had levelled against the Manmohan Singh government when Shah was investigated in the Sohrabuddin case.

On the direction of the Supreme

Court, the case was transferred to the CBI in January 2010. In July 2010, Shah was arrested by the CBI on the charges of murder, extortion and kidnapping.

When he applied for bail, the CBI opposed the move in the Gujarat High Court arguing that he would use political influence to tamper with the evidence and threaten witnesses. Three months later Shah was granted bail and subsequently extorted from Gujarat, barred from entering the State where he had been home minister for two years.

Though the BJP declared that Shah was innocent and was being harassed by the Congress-led government to hit back at the saffron party, he did not have many people he could turn to in those days," says a political analyst.

Shah was cleared of all charges after the Narendra Modi government swept to power in 2014. (With input from Agencies)

'Seriously looking' to end birthright citizenship, says President Trump

Trump said responding to a question on the birthright citizenship, which grants automatic citizenship to those born in the US.

"Birthright citizenship where you have a baby on our land, you walk over the border, have a baby, congratulations, the baby is now a US citizen. We're looking at it very, very seriously," Trump said.

During his 2016 presidential campaign, Trump had said that he would end the birthright citizenship.

The 14th Amendment of the US Constitution guarantees birthright citizenship and states: "All persons born or naturalized in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside."

The move is likely to invite legal challenges.

Rahane's 81 saves India the blues after top-order collapse

NORTH SOUND (TIP): Ajinkya Rahane battled his way through a shaky start to score a fighting half-century taking India to 190/6 in 61 overs on the opening day of their inaugural World Test Championship encounter against the West Indies.

The Indian vice-captain scored the 18th half-century of his career and was out on 81. Rishabh Pant (9) and Ravindra Jadeja (1) held fort for India.

Rahane and Hanuma Vihari added 41 runs for the unbroken fifth wicket stand before umpires called for an early tea after heavens opened up. The other significant contribution came from opener KL Rahul (44), who did all the hardwork before frittering it away after the lunch session. Wicketkeeper Shai Hope took a smart catch down the leg-side off Jason Holder's bowling to dismiss the opener. This was after Rahul along with Rahane added 68 runs for the fourth wicket.

Earlier, Rahul looked composed in the first session after India were reduced to 25/3 inside the first eight overs on a track that offered bounce and lateral movement for new ball bowlers Roach (2/24) and Gabriel (1/38). Mayank Agarwal (5), Cheteshwar Pujara (2) and skipper Virat Kohli (9) were back in the pavilion in the first hour after Jason Holder put the visitors in on a bouncy track. Rahul and Rahane added 42 runs for the unbroken fourth wicket and stemmed the rot after 24 overs were bowled during the opening session.

Agarwal got one from Roach that held its line and the opener didn't fully commit forward with resultant nick being gobbled by Shai Hope behind the stumps. Pujara did not last long as he got a delivery from Roach that moved a shade away after pitching with India's No. 3 lunging forward. The edge was



taken low down by Hope. But it wasn't his day despite a promising start that included a drive past point and another past mid-on.

Shanon Gabriel made the fifth

ball of the eighth over climb at Kohli from short of a length, and the Indian captain fended it off awkwardly, only to be caught at gully by Shamar Brooks.

Shubman Gill reveals advice from Dravid which he never forgot

NEW DELHI (TIP): His strokes bear a striking resemblance to Virat Kohli but Shubman Gill's approach to cricket is influenced by Rahul Dravid, who has asked the youngster to stick to his natural game come what may.

Just two weeks shy of his 20th birthday, Gill is making waves despite having played just two ODIs with former captain Sourav Ganguly among those left surprised by his omission from the senior team's ongoing tour of the West Indies.

The youngster spoke to PTI about handling the limelight, the comparisons, "that cover drive" where he looks like Kohli and protips from the likes of Dravid and



Yuvraj Singh in dealing with the hype surrounding him.

"Rahul sir has been my coach

since the India U-19 days and then India A. There is one basic advice from him which I always keep in mind. He would tell me that come what may, never change your basic game that got you success," said Gill, who became the youngest Indian to score a first-class double hundred earlier this month.

"I would certainly rate my double hundred against the West Indies A as one of my best knocks in red ball (cricket) considering the opposition, surface and match situation," Gill said.

Gill also top-scored for India A in the unofficial one-day series against the same opposition, accumulating 218 runs, including three half-centuries.



ASHES 3RD TEST

Archer takes 6, Oz out for 179

LEEDS (TIP): Jofra Archer's first five-wicket haul in Test cricket put England in command on a weather-affected opening day of the third Ashes test at Headingley on Thursday as they bowled Australia out for 179.

Only four overs were possible in the morning session, but there was time for Australia opener Marcus Harris to fall to Archer for eight and Usman Khawaja was out shortly after lunch.

David Warner (61), who played and missed at 16 of his first 30 balls faced, settled to lead the Australia recovery after another break in play before falling to Archer and Travis Head and Matthew Wade departed for ducks.

Tim Paine and James Pattinson were dismissed cheaply and Pat Cummins became Archer's fifth victim. Marnus Labuschagne was out for 74 and Nathan Lyon was trapped lbw by Archer in the last over of the day. Archer completed figures of 6/45 in his second Test match.

RATHOUR TO REPLACE BANGAR AS BATTING COACH; ARUN, SRIDHAR STAY

NEW DELHI (TIP): Former Punjab captain Vikram Rathour, who played six Tests and seven ODIs for India, is set to become India's batting coach. Rathour, who has been a national selector in the past, is set to replace Sanjay Bangar, the incumbent.

But the current bowling coach Bharat Arun and fielding coach R Sridhar are set to retain their positions for more years.

The Indian nation team's selection panel, headed by MSK Prasad, has shortlisted three candidates each for all the positions for which interviews have been held in the recent days. Rathour heads the list for the batting coach's job, followed by Bangar and former England batsman Mark Ramprakash.

Prasad said that his panel was looking for 'freshness' in the batting department.

"In the last five years, there is definitely some amount of improvement. Looking ahead, with the Test Championship coming up and two T20 World Cups, we thought that there should be freshness in the department," he said. "That's the reason why we went ahead with Vikram Rathour as first choice. He was the director of HPCA (Himachal Pradesh Cricket Association), he was also the coach of Punjab Cricket Association, he was also an assistant coach with Kings XI Punjab, so he's got enough experience behind him. Apart from that, he has been doing a lot of assignments with the National Cricket Academy so we are convinced with his skill-sets and we thought that he'd be our first preference."

Rathour is the brother-in-law of Aashish Kapoor, an Under-19 selector, and a possible conflict of interest possibility was discussed. However, BCCI CEO Rahul Johri said there was no possibility of a conflict of interest. "This was discussed at the CoA meeting also because the CoA was presented with the shortlist," Johri said.
