UNITED NATIONS (TIP): Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in his address to the 74th UNGA, September 27, was not the man the world saw and heard at Howdy Modi, Houston on September 22. 'Abki Baar Trump Sarkar': Modi endorses Donald Trump for 2020 US Presidency

Amid chants of "Modi, Modi", Prime Minister endorsed Trump for 2020 US Presidency when he said "Abki Baar Trump Sarkar", reminding the gathering of Indian Americans of the chant during recent general elections in India earlier this year where the chant was "Abki baar Modi Sarkar". Modi a little later, inviting Trump to address the gathering said that Trump had introduced his family to him when he had visited the White House during his last visit to the US, and he was now presenting to him "my family of 50,000", to the great delight of the man who loves crowds and applause.

At hand were about 60 lawmakers belonging to both the Republican and the Democratic Party.

An estimated 50,000 strong crowd went hysteric whenever Trump praised Modi or later, when Modi spoke about India's strength and resolve to deal with a hostile Pakistan.

Defended his government's actions in Kashmir and, in thinly veiled remarks, Modi accused Pakistan of harboring terrorists and promoting terrorism in the region.

Trump sat in the front row as the Indian

prime minister told cheering crowds his decision to remove all autonomy from Indian-administered Kashmir would bring progress and better rights for its people.

India has faced international criticism over its actions in Kashmir. Thousands of people have reportedly been detained, and access to mobile or internet services has been severed for millions of people in a communications blackout, part of a security clampdown in the wake of Delhi's decision.

The rally, on Sunday, marked the first time Modi had discussed the decision to remove Kashmir's special status on a world stage, and followed months of fierce rhetoric from Pakistan, which also claims the disputed region and has sought to raise the issue with the UN.

Without directly naming Pakistan, Modi accused the country of "hatred towards India" and of supporting terrorism.

"Whether it is the 9/11 attack in America or the 26/11 attack in Mumbai, where are its conspirators found?"

"The time has come for a decisive fight against terrorism and those who support terrorism," he said. "I want to stress here that President Trump is standing firmly against this."

Trump, who was given a rapturous welcome at the event, said he was committed to protecting "innocent civilians from the threat of radical Islamic terrorism".

About 50,000 Indian Americans attended the "Howdy Modi!" rally, where crowds chanted "Modi! Modi! Modi!" as he took to the stage, following a 90-minute cultural program featuring 400 dancers.

Trump, introduced by Modi as "my friend, a friend of India, a great American president", was given a standing ovation at the event in Houston, a Democratic stronghold in Republican-dominated Texas. Houston is expected to be a critical battleground in Trump's 2020 re-election bid.

Modi, who was re-elected this year with a thumping majority, enjoys wide support among Indians both at home and abroad, especially among the middle classes, said Manoj Joshi, a fellow at the Observer Research Foundation, a New Delhi-based thinktank. "He is extremely popular, particularly when it comes to the Indian

diaspora in the US where there is a lot of Gujarati diaspora, from his home state," he said.

The rally was held as Kashmir remains under a security crackdown, apparently to prevent unrest. Outside the stadium, protesters accused Modi's government of human rights abuses against Kashmiris.

Iltija Mufti, the daughter of the former Jammu and Kashmir chief minister Mehbooba Mufti, said on Twitter: "While people in Kashmir have been gagged, mass hysteria is orchestrated elsewhere to justify this decision." Her mother was among thousands reportedly detained as part of a crackdown by security services.

Modi's speech came just days before the UN general assembly's meeting in New York, where the Pakistani prime minister, Imran Khan, is expected to accuse Modi of being complicit in torture and mass detention in Indian-administered Kashmir. Michael Kugelman, a south Asia expert at the Wilson Center, in Washington DC, said while Modi generally preferred to keep quiet about Kashmir with global audiences, it was unsurprising that he had raised the issue in Texas.

"I think he wanted to try to blunt international criticism by demonstrating just how popular the move [to remove Kashmir's special status] was among Indians - including Indian Americans in the US," said Kugelman. "And indeed his comment got louder applause than just about anything he or Trump said during the whole event."

Though the scrapping of Kashmir's special status faces major opposition within the region, it is widely supported elsewhere in India.

It was unsurprising an Indian leader would criticize Pakistan in a political speech, said Kugelman, but he added: "It is significant that Modi did so with Trump seated right in front of him, and at a moment when the US-Pakistan relationship has enjoyed a renaissance thanks to Islamabad's help with Taliban talks in Afghanistan."

Two Indian American SBU Students Chosen for Selective Millennium Fellows Program

PFP calls all students to take part in a 21-day challenge uniquely designed to help them develop eco-conscious lifestyle habits to tackle today's most pressing environmental issues, especially ocean pollution, with the opportunity to win prizes and awards.

Launched in 2018, the selective Millennium Fellowship is a semester-long leadership development program. Students receive the fellowship based on their leadership on sustainable development-related projects that

Indian American Physician charged for unlawfully distributing opioids

NEW YORK (TIP): The Justice Department announced Sept 24 the second coordinated law enforcement action of the Appalachian Region Prescription Opioid (ARPO) strike force, resulting in charges against 13 individuals across five Appalachian federal districts for alleged offenses relating to the over prescription of controlled substances through "pill mill" clinics. Of those charged, 12 were charged for their role in unlawfully distributing opioids and other controlled substances and 11 were physicians. The alleged conduct resulted in the distribution of more than 17 million pills.

Dr. Sriramloo Kesari, 77, of Charleston, West Virginia, was charged with allegedly unlawfully distributing controlled substance without a legitimate medical purpose. This case was investigated by the DEA, HHS-OIG and Hurricane Police Department. These cases are being prosecuted by Assistant Chief Kilby Macfadden and Trial Attorney Sean O'Connell of the Fraud Section.

This action follows the first such takedown in April of this year, which involved charges against 60 defendants, including 53 medical professionals, in 11 federal districts, alleging the illegal distribution of more than 23 million pills. The charges brought in April have already resulted in 11 guilty pleas in seven federal districts, including guilty pleas by nine medical professionals, including seven physicians.

Indian American doctor pleads guilty to running pill mill

CINCINNATI (TIP): An Indian origin owner and operator of a Hamilton pain clinic pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court Sept 23 to illegal distribution of controlled substances, health care fraud and violating the anti-kickback statute.

Nilesh Jobalia, 54, of Cincinnati, entered a guilty plea before U.S. District Judge Susan J. Dlott.

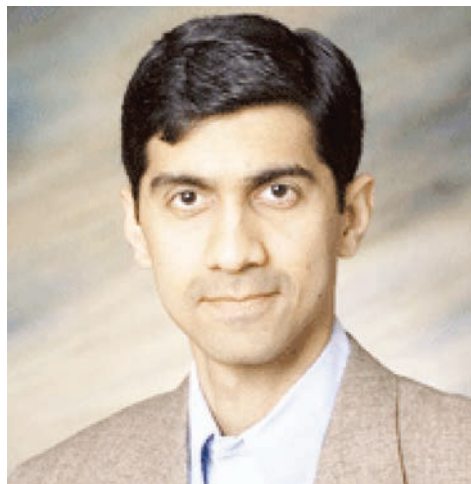

Glassman, United States Attorney for the Southern District of Ohio; Lamont Pugh III, Special Agent in Charge, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Inspector General; Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost; Anthony Groeber, Executive Director, State Medical Board of Ohio; Steven Schierholt, Executive Director, State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy; and Stephanie B. McCloud, Administrator, Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation, announced the plea. "Today Dr. Jobalia accepted responsibility for trafficking drugs by means of a prescription pad, health care fraud, and receiving kickbacks," U.S. Attorney Glassman said.

Indian American Honored with Under-40 Innovators Award at Design Automation Conference

LAS VEGAS (TIP): Vijay Raghunathan, Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, Purdue University has recently been conferred the Under-40 Innovators Award, sponsored by Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). The award recognizes the top young innovators, who have made a significant impact in the field of design and automation of electronics. Raghunathan, along with four others was honored at 56th Design Automation Conference at the Las Vegas Convention Center, Las Vegas.

Vijay Raghunathan is a professor of electrical and computer engineering at Purdue University and the director of the Embedded Systems and IoT Lab, which he founded in 2006. He received his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in electrical engineering from UCLA and his B. Tech. degree in electrical engineering from IIT Madras, India. At Purdue University, his team investigates the design of new hardware and software architectures for next-generation embedded systems, IoT edge devices, and wearable/implantable electronics, with an emphasis on ultra-low power design, micro-scale energy harvesting, edge analytics, and reliable/secure system design. Vijay also

holds an appointment as the Anand Rajaraman and Venky Harinarayan Visiting Chair Professor of Computer Science and Engineering at the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Madras. Vijay has co-written more than 100 journal and conference papers (several of which have won best paper and best design awards) and has presented numerous keynotes, invited talks, and tutorials on the above topics.

Indian National with Altered German Passport intercepted by Dulles CBP

STERLING, VA (TIP): U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officers intercepted an Indian national in possession of a fraudulent German passport Monday at Washington Dulles International Airport. The man was refused admission to the United States.

Authorities declined to prosecute the Indian man. Privacy laws prevent CBP from releasing his name because he was not criminally charged.

The 28-year-old Indian national arrived from Accra, Ghana, Sept 15 Monday morning and presented the German passport to a CBP officer during inspection. The CBP officer detected discrepancies in the passport's biographical page and referred the man to a secondary examination.

During the secondary examination, CBP officers were unable to access the passport's electronic chip and suspected the chip to be altered or damaged. Under questioning, the man admitted to purchasing the passport in Ghana. CBP officers seized the passport and refused the Indian national admission to the United States.

CELEBRATING 150 YEARS OF THE MAHATMA

Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi was an eminent freedom activist and an influential political leader who played a dominant role in India's struggle for independence. Gandhi is known by different names, such as Mahatma (a great soul), Babuji (endearment for father in Gujarati) and Father of the Nation. Every year, his birthday is celebrated as Gandhi Jayanti, a national holiday in India, and also observed as the International Day of Nonviolence. Mahatma Gandhi, as he is most commonly referred to, was instrumental in liberating India from the clutches of the British. With his unusual yet powerful political tools of Satyagraha and non-violence, he inspired several other political leaders all over the world including the likes of Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King Jr and Aung San Suu Kyi. Gandhi, apart from helping India triumph in its fight for independence against the English, also led a simple and righteous life, for which he is often revered. Gandhi's early life was pretty much ordinary, and he became a great man during the course of his life. This is one of the main reasons why Gandhi is followed by millions, for he proved that one can become a great soul during the course of one's life, should they possess the will to do so.

Childhood

M. K. Gandhi was born in the princely state of Porbandar, which is located in modern-day Gujarat. He was born into a Hindu merchant caste family to Karamchand Gandhi, diwan of Porbandar and his fourth wife, Putlibai. Gandhi's mother belonged to an affluent Pranami Vaishnava family. As a child, Gandhi was a very naughty and mischievous kid. In fact, his sister Raliat had once revealed that hurting dogs by twisting their ears was among Maohandas' favorite pastime. During the course of his childhood, Gandhi befriended Sheikh Mehtab, who was introduced to him by his older brother. Gandhi, who was raised by a vegetarian family, started eating meat. It is also said that a young Gandhi accompanied Sheikh to a brothel, but left the place after finding it uncomfortable. Gandhi, along with one of his relatives, also cultivated the habit of smoking after watching his uncle smoke. After smoking the leftover cigarettes, thrown away by his uncle, Gandhi started stealing copper coins from his servants in order to buy Indian cigarettes. When he could no longer steal, he even decided to commit suicide such as Gandhi's addiction to cigarettes. At the age of fifteen, after stealing a bit of gold from his friend Sheikh's armllet, Gandhi felt remorseful and confessed to his father about his stealing habit and vowed to

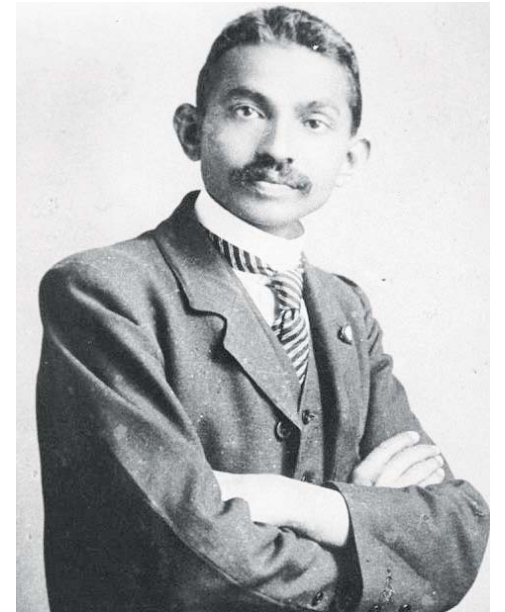
him that he would never commit such mistakes again.

Early Life

In his early years, Gandhi was deeply influenced by the stories of Shrivana and Harishchandra that reflected the importance of truth. Through these stories and from his personal experiences, he realized that truth and love are among the supreme values. Mohandas married Kasturba Makhanji at the age of 13. Gandhi later went on to reveal that the marriage didn't mean anything to him at that age and that he was happy and excited only about wearing new set of clothes. But then as days passed by, his feelings for her turned lustful, which he later confessed with regret in his autobiography. Gandhi had also confessed that he could no more concentrate in school because of his mind wavering towards his new and young wife.

Education

After his family moved to Rajkot, a nine year old Gandhi was enrolled at a local school, where he studied the basics of arithmetic, history, geography and languages. When he was 11 years old, he attended a high school in Rajkot. He lost an academic year in between because of his wedding but later rejoined the school and eventually completed his schooling. He then dropped out of Samaldas College in Bhavnagar State after joining it in the year 1888. Later Gandhi was advised by a family friend Mavji Dave Joshiji to pursue law in London. Excited by the idea, Gandhi managed to convince his mother and wife by vowing before them that he would abstain from eating meat and from having sex in London. Supported by his brother, Gandhi left to London and attended the Inner Temple and practiced law. During his stay in London, Gandhi joined a Vegetarian Society and was soon introduced to Bhagavad Gita by some of his vegetarian friends. The contents of Bhagavad Gita would later have a massive influence on



his life. He came back to India after being called to the bar by Inner Temple.

Gandhi in South Africa

After returning to India, Gandhi struggled to find work as a lawyer. In 1893, Dada Abdullah, a merchant who owned a shipping business in South Africa asked if he would be interested to serve as his cousin's lawyer in South Africa. Gandhi gladly accepted the offer and left to South Africa, which would serve as a turning point in his political career.

In South Africa, he faced racial discrimination directed towards blacks and Indians. He faced humiliation on many occasions but made up his mind to fight for his rights. This turned him into an activist and he took upon him many cases that would benefit the Indians and other minorities living in South Africa. Indians were not allowed to vote or walk on footpaths as those privileges were limited strictly to the Europeans. Gandhi questioned this unfair treatment and eventually managed to establish an organization named 'Natal Indian Congress' in 1894. After he came across an ancient Indian literature known as 'Tirukkural', which was originally written in Tamil and later translated into many languages, Gandhi was influenced by the idea of Satyagraha (devotion to the truth) and implemented non-violent protests around 1906. After spending 21 years in South Africa, where he fought for civil rights, he had transformed into a new person and he returned to India in 1915.

Gandhi and the Indian National Congress

After his long stay in South Africa and his activism against the racist policy of

the British, Gandhi had earned the reputation as a nationalist, theorist and organiser. Gopal Krishna Gokhale, a senior leader of the Indian National Congress, invited Gandhi to join India's struggle for independence against the British Rule. Gokhale thoroughly guided Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi about the prevailing political situation in India and also the social issues of the time. He then joined the Indian National Congress and before taking over the leadership in 1920, headed many agitations which he named Satyagraha.

Champan Satyagraha

The Champan agitation in 1917 was the first major success of Gandhi after his arrival in India. The peasants of the area were forced by the British landlords to grow Indigo, which was a cash crop, but its demand had been declining. To make the matters worse, they were forced to sell their crops to the planters at a fixed price. The farmers turned to Gandhiji for help. Pursuing a strategy of nonviolent agitation, Gandhi took the administration by surprise and was successful in getting concessions from the authorities. This campaign marked Gandhi's arrival in India.

Non-cooperation Movement

Non-cooperation Movement was one of Gandhi's most important movements against the British. Gandhi urged his fellow countrymen to stop co-operation with the British. He believed that the British succeeded in India only because of the co-operation of the Indians. He had cautioned the British not to pass the Rowlatt Act, but they did not pay any attention to his words and passed the Act. As announced, Gandhiji asked everyone to start civil disobedience against the British. The British began suppressing the civil disobedience movement by force and opened fire on a peaceful crowd in Delhi. The British asked Gandhiji to not enter Delhi which he defied as a result of which he was arrested and this further enraged people and they rioted. He urged people to show unity, non-violence and respect for human life. But the British responded aggressively to this and arrested many protesters.

On 13 April 1919, a British officer, Dyer, ordered his forces to open fire on a peaceful gathering, including women and children, in Amritsar's Jallianwala Bagh. As a result of this, hundreds of innocent Hindu and Sikh civilians were killed. The incident is known as 'Jallianwala Bagh Massacre'. But Gandhi criticized the protesters instead of blaming the English and asked Indians to use love while dealing with the hatred of British. He urged the Indians to refrain from all kinds of non-violence and went on fast-to-death to pressure Indians to stop their rioting.

Swaraj

The concept of non-cooperation became very popular and started spreading through the length and breadth of India. Gandhi extended this movement and focused on Swaraj. He urged people to stop using British goods. He also asked people to resign from government employment, quit studying in British institutions and stop practicing in law courts. However, the violent clash in Chauri Chaura town of Uttar Pradesh, in February 1922, forced Gandhiji to call-off the movement all of a sudden. Gandhi was arrested on 10th March 1922 and was tried for sedition. He



was sentenced to six years imprisonment, but served only two years in prison.

Dandi March

During the period of 1920s, Mahatma Gandhi concentrated on resolving the wedge between the Swaraj Party and the Indian National Congress. In 1927, British had appointed Sir John Simon as the head of a new constitutional reform commission, popularly known as 'Simon Commission'. There was not even a single Indian in the commission. Agitated by this, Gandhi passed a resolution at the Calcutta Congress in December 1928, calling on the British government to grant India dominion status. In case of non-compliance with this demand, the British were to face a new campaign of non-violence, having its goal as complete independence for the country. The resolution was rejected by the British. The flag of India was unfurled by the Indian national Congress on 31st December 1929 at its Lahore session. January 26, 1930 was celebrated as the Independence Day of India.

But the British failed to recognize it and soon they levied a tax on salt and Salt Satyagraha was launched in March 1930, as an opposition to this move. Gandhi started the Dandi March with his followers in March, going from

Ahmedabad to Dandi on foot. The protest was successful and resulted in the Gandhi-Irwin Pact in March 1931.

Negotiations over Round Table Conferences

Post the Gandhi-Irwin Pact, Gandhi was invited to round table conferences by the British. While Gandhi pressed for the Indian independence, British questioned Gandhi's motives and asked him not to speak for the entire nation. They invited many religious leaders and B. R. Ambedkar to represent the untouchables. The British promised many rights to various religious groups as well as the untouchables. Fearing this move would divide India further, Gandhi protested against this by fasting. After learning about the true intentions of the British during the second conference, he came up with another Satyagraha, for which he was once again arrested.

Quit India Movement

As the World War II progressed, Mahatma Gandhi intensified his protests for the complete independence of India. He drafted a resolution calling for the British to Quit India. The 'Quit India Movement' or the 'Bharat Chhodo Andolan' was the most aggressive movement launched by the Indian

national Congresses under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi. Gandhi was arrested on 9th August 1942 and was held for two years in the Aga Khan Palace in Pune, where he lost his secretary, Mahadev Desai and his wife, Kasturba. The Quit India Movement came to an end by the end of 1943, when the British gave hints that complete power would be transferred to the people of India. Gandhi called off the movement which resulted in the release of 100,000 political prisoners.

Freedom and Partition of India

The independence cum partition proposal offered by the British Cabinet Mission in 1946 was accepted by the Congress, despite being advised otherwise by Mahatma Gandhi. Sardar Patel convinced Gandhi that it was the only way to avoid civil war and he reluctantly gave his consent. After India's independence, Gandhi focused on peace and unity of Hindus and Muslims. He launched his last fast-unto-death in Delhi, and asked people to stop communal violence and emphasized that the payment of Rs. 55 crores, as per the Partition Council agreement, be made to Pakistan. Ultimately, all political leaders conceded to his wishes and he broke his fast.

Assassination

The inspiring life of Mahatma Gandhi came to an end on 30th January 1948, when he was shot by a fanatic, Nathuram Godse, at point-blank range. Nathuram was a Hindu radical, who held Gandhi responsible for weakening India by ensuring the partition payment to Pakistan. Godse and his co-conspirator, Narayan Apte, were later tried and convicted. They were executed on 15th November 1949.

Mahatma Gandhi's Legacy

Mahatma Gandhi proposed the acceptance and practice of truth, non-violence, vegetarianism, Brahmacharya (celibacy), simplicity and faith in God. Though he would be remembered forever as the man who fought for Indian independence, his greatest legacies are the tools he used in his fight against the British. These methods inspired several other world leaders in their struggle against injustice. His statues are installed all over the world and he is considered the most prominent personality in Indian history.

RAJYA SABHA BYPOLL FOR SEATS HELD BY JAITLEY, JETHMALANI ON OCT 16

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Election Commission of India (ECI) on Thursday said by-elections to one Rajya Sabha seat each from Uttar Pradesh and Bihar would be held on October 16.

The UP seat fell vacant on August 24 following the death of former Union Minister Arun Jaitley while the Bihar seat, held by another former Union minister Ram Jethmalani fell vacant following his death on September 8.

The ECI said October 4 would be the last day for filing the nomination; scrutiny would be held on October 5, and October 9 would be the last day for withdrawal of candidature. Voting will be held on October 16 between 9 am and 4 pm and the counting will be held the same day from 5 pm. The tenure of the seat held by Jaitley is till April 2, 2024 while that of Jethmalani is till July 2, 2022.

Mukesh Ambani richest Indian for 8th year in row



MUMBAI (TIP): Reliance Industries' Chairman Mukesh Ambani has topped the list of richest Indians for the eighth consecutive year with a net worth of Rs 3,80,700 crore, according to the latest IIFL Wealth Hurun India Rich List.

London-based SP Hinduja and family, with assets worth Rs 1,86,500 crore, retained the second rank in the list, followed by Wipro founder Azim Premji at the third place with wealth of Rs 1,17,100 crore.

According to the latest IIFL Wealth Hurun India Rich List, the number of Indians having a net worth of more than Rs 1,000 crore has grown to 953 this year from 831 in 2018; while the number of billionaires in terms of US dollar has reduced to 138 from 141.

"The combined wealth of top 25 in the list equates to 10 per cent of India's GDP and that of 953 accounts for 27 per cent," it said.

Haryana Polls: 'Betrayed' Akali Dal to fight elections alone

AMRITSAR (TIP): The Shiromani Akali Dal on Thursday lashed out at the BJP for taking in its lone Haryana MLA, saying it was against the principle of "coalition dharma" and announcing that it will contest the state elections next month on its own. In a strong statement issued after a meeting in Amritsar chaired by party chief Sukhbir Singh Badal, the SAD said its old ally had "betrayed" it, news agency PTI reported.

Kalanwali MLA Balkaur Singh joined the BJP in New Delhi on Thursday, where he praised Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar for providing an "honest" government to the state.

"To protest this unethical step of making our MLA join their party at a time when we were in talks with them over seat sharing, we have called off the alliance with them in Haryana," SAD spokesperson Dr Daljit Singh Cheema told PTI.

Noting that the SAD had always stood through thick and thin with the BJP in national interest, the meeting in Amritsar said it was the BJP which had committed to contest the Haryana elections jointly with the SAD. Haryana Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar had even held a press conference on the eve of the Lok Sabha elections and announced that the BJP and the SAD would contest the assembly elections jointly while soliciting support for BJP candidates, the panel said.

Intensify anti-militancy ops in J&K, target key militants: Doval

JAMMU (TIP): National Security Advisor (NSA) Ajit Doval has called upon all security agencies to ensure that the people are able to carry out their daily routine works in Kashmir without any fear of militants and lauded security forces that no complaints of human rights violations were reported from any part of the Valley during past over one and a half month since scrapping of special Constitutional provisions of the State.

He was also reported to have issued directions to security forces to intensify anti-militancy operations but ensure that there was no collateral damage. Anti-militancy operations have been hit since August 5 as security forces were mainly concentrating on maintenance of law and order situation in the Valley.

Doval issued the directions at high-level security review meetings in Srinagar, the summer capital of the State, before returning to the Union capital after his second visit to the Valley since August 5 when the Central Government had scrapped Articles 370 and 35-A and bifurcated Jammu and Kashmir into two Union Territories of J&K and Ladakh.

The National Security Advisor had yesterday visited South Kashmir towns of Awantipora and Pulwama and inter-acted with police officials to take first hand review of situation.

Complimenting the State administration and security forces for their good work and



maintaining law and order in the entire State, Doval called upon security forces to ensure that the common people in Kashmir are able to carry out their daily routine works without any fear of the militant groups.

He was reported to have told security agencies to instill confidence among the people that the militant groups won't be able to harm them which will help people to resume their normal routine.

Doval's direction assumed significance as there had been reports that in some areas the militants and their Over Ground Workers (OGWs) had been threatening the shopkeepers and transport operators for not yielding to their strike calls.

In view of reports that Pakistan sponsored militant outfits may carry out some demonstrative and sensational acts of terror, Doval directed that security of vital installations must be ensured and all arrangements regarding strict vigilance and keeping troops on alert be made a priority.

In his inter-action with Army and BSF, the NSA stressed that in view of reports of large-scale infiltration attempts, the Anti-Infiltration Grid along the border should be put on high alert and wherever attempts of infiltration are reported, strong action must be taken against the militants.

Doval called upon para-military forces, police and civil administration to win hearts and minds of the people and immediately respond to the emergencies and issues raised by the people. He was briefed that Pakistan sponsored militant outfits were committing excesses on the people, killing shopkeepers, threatening and intimidating fruit growers. He directed concerned departments and agencies to take strict action against such elements and facilitate common masses as much as possible.

Doval enquired about law and order situation and position of essential services and supplies in the Kashmir valley from the civil and police administration and security and Intelligence agency officials. He was reported to have issued certain guidelines for further improvement of situation and return or complete normalcy in the Valley in the next few days.

He appreciated that no complaints regarding the human rights violations were reported from any part of Kashmir valley during the past over one and half month. He urged the security forces to keep maintaining good conduct and peace in the State.

As bad air season nears, India lags behind on AQI monitoring

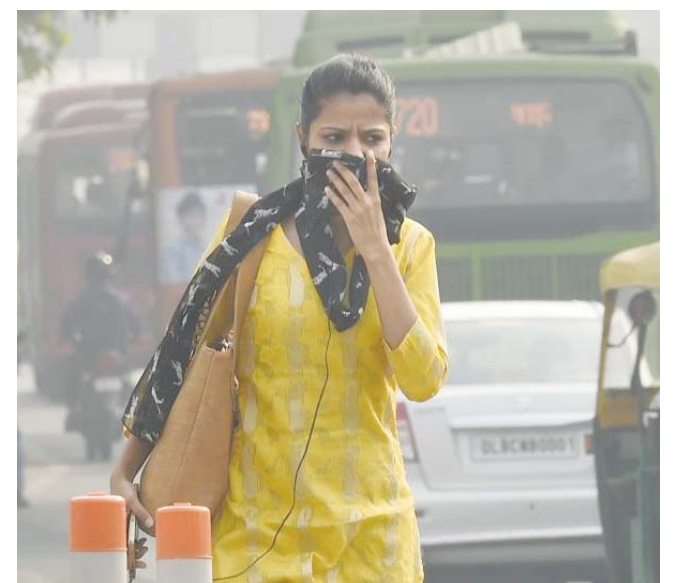
NEW DELHI (TIP): India has one air quality monitoring station for every 7 million people while China has over eight times that number, according to top environmental scientists who believe that the scale of the air pollution problem affecting Indians may be more severe than understood due to lack of adequate monitoring.

India will need at least 1,600 more monitoring stations to make up for the shortfall, according to a projection by a team made up of scientists from Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Delhi, IIT Kanpur and Indian pollution research group UrbanEmissions.info, and Canadian academicians.

"What we cannot monitor we cannot maintain — be it health, economy or air quality. At present the number of air quality monitoring stations is inadequate in India and therefore it is very difficult to get a proper picture," said SN Tripathi, head of the civil engineering department at IIT-Kanpur and one of the scientists involved in the report.

Much of north India, especially the Indo-Gangetic plains, reels under hazardous levels of pollution for most of the winter months. The air pollution in the national capital of Delhi, where the crisis triggered closure of schools and advisories to avoid the outdoors in recent years, has been linked to shorter life spans by several studies.

The condition in other cities may also be alarming. "Only about 5% of our census towns are monitored



now. Alternative methods such as satellite monitoring and low-cost monitoring can help us do better mapping of pollution and exposure to inform action. But cities will still need some reference regulatory monitors to assess trend and compliance with clean air targets," said Anumita Roy Chowdhury, executive director (research and advocacy), of Centre for Science and Environment.

AYODHYA CASE

Will be a miracle to deliver verdict in 4 weeks: SC to lawyers

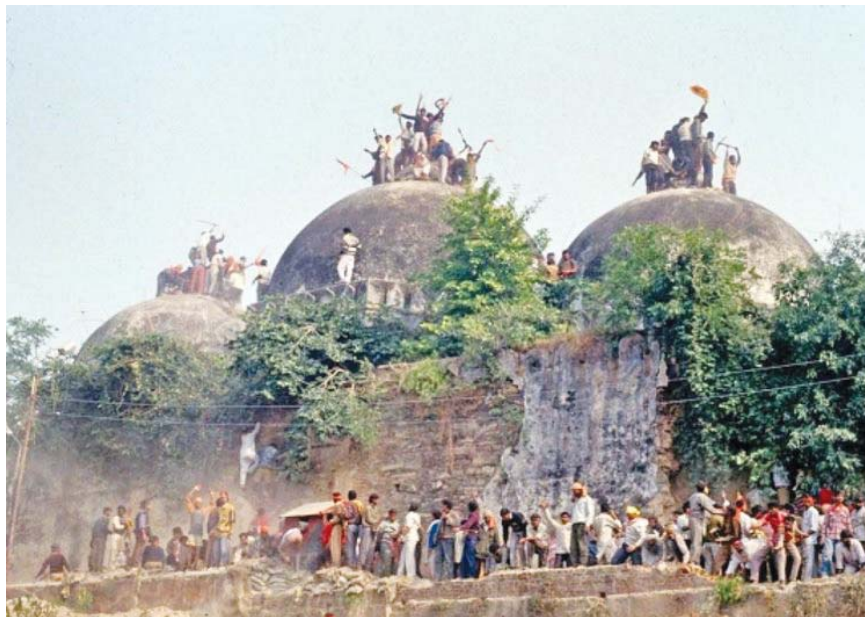
NEW DELHI (TIP): The Supreme Court on Thursday once again stressed on the need to complete arguments in the Ayodhya land dispute case by October 18. "If arguments can't get over by October 18, there won't be extra day," Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi told both sides arguing the case.

The CJI said the bench will have only four weeks to write the judgment and it will be a "miracle" if the court delivers the judgment in four weeks. Justice Gogoi retires as the CJI on November 17.

The five-judge bench comprising Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi, and justices SA Bobde, DY Chandrachud, Ashok Bhushan and S Abdul Nazeer had last week set October 18 target to complete hearing in the Ram Janmabhoomi-Babri Masjid land title case. The CJI had called for a joint effort from all parties.

The mediation panel comprised former SC judge FMI Kalifulla, spiritual guru and founder of Art of Living founder Sri Sri Ravishankar and senior advocate Sriram Panchu, a renowned mediator.

The panel had conducted negotiations between Hindu and Muslim litigants for over four months to explore the possibility of an out-of-court settlement. The



panel was initially given eight weeks to explore the possibility of a settlement, but on May 10, after the panel submitted an interim report to the court, the SC granted it an extension of three months, till August 15.

The bench started holding daily hearings from August to fast-track the case that has been pending for decades after a Supreme Court appointed mediation committee failed to develop a consensus among the parties for a solution.

The mediation proposal was

opposed by the Uttar Pradesh government and the Hindu parties, except the Nirmohi Akhara, one of the main parties to the civil suit. The mediation suggestion was however welcomed by the Muslim side.

More than a dozen appeals were filed against the 2010 Allahabad High Court judgment, delivered in four civil suits, that the 2.77-acre land in Ayodhya be partitioned equally among the three parties—the Sunni Waqf Board, the Nirmohi Akhara and Ram Lalla.

Vikram had hard-landing; NASA releases images of Chandrayaan 2 landing site

WASHINGTON (TIP): Vikram had a "hard landing", NASA said on Friday, as it released high-resolution images captured by its reconnaissance orbiter of the Moon's uncharted south pole where the Chandrayaan 2 lander attempted to soft-land during the ambitious mission three weeks ago.

The module had attempted a soft landing on a small patch of lunar highland smooth plains between Simpeliuss N and Manzinus C craters before losing communication with ISRO on September 7.

The site was about 600 km from the south pole in a relatively ancient terrain, according to the US space agency.

"Vikram had a hard landing and the precise location of the spacecraft in the lunar highlands has yet to be determined," the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said.

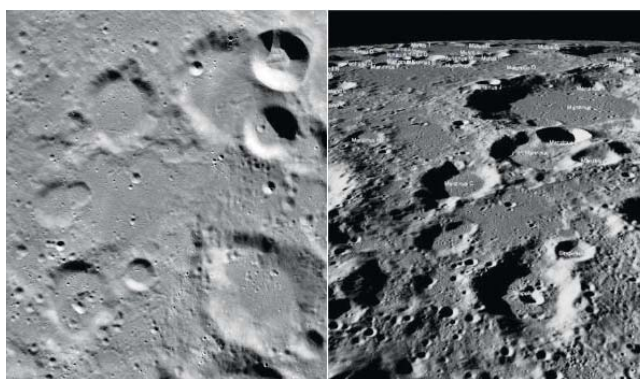
"The scene was captured from a Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter Camera (LROC) Quickmap fly-around of the targeted landing site image width is about 150 kilometres across the centre."

Vikram was scheduled to touch down on September 7. This event was India's first attempt to soft land on the Moon and could have propelled it into a select club of countries to have landed on the lunar surface.

After Vikram lost contact with ground stations, just 2.1 km above the touchdown site, the possibility of establishing contact with the lander had a deadline of September 21, because after that the region entered into a lunar night.

ISRO had said the mission life of the Vikram lander and the Pragyan rover it carried will be one lunar day, which is equal to 14 Earth days.

The lunar nights can be very cold, especially in the south polar region where Vikram is lying.



Temperatures could drop to as low as minus 200 degrees Celsius during the lunar night.

The instruments aboard the lander are not designed to withstand that kind of temperature. The electronics would not work in absence of solar energy and would get permanently damaged.

The NASA orbiter passed over the Vikram landing site on September 17 and acquired a set of high-resolution images of the area; so far the LROC team has not been able to locate or image the lander.

"LRO will next fly over the landing site on October 14 when lighting conditions will be more favourable," John Keller, Deputy Project Scientist Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter Mission, Goddard Space Flight Centre, told PTI via email.

"It was dusk when the landing area was imaged and thus large shadows covered much of the terrain; it is possible that the Vikram lander is hiding in a shadow. The lighting will be favourable when LRO passes over the site in October and once again attempts to locate and image the lander," NASA said.

PM MODI TO FLAG OFF 1ST BATCH OF KARTARPUR PILGRIMS ON NOV 9

CHANDIGARH (TIP): Prime Minister Narendra Modi will inaugurate the integrated check post (ICP) in Kartarpur Sahib on November 9, three days before the 550th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev, and flag off the first Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC)-led group of pilgrims from India to Nankana Sahib, the birthplace of the guru, which is now in Pakistan.

Union minister for food processing, Harsimrat Kaur Badal announced on Thursday that the PM will also visit Sultanpur Lodhi, another important city in the life of the first Sikh guru to take part in a function organised by SGPC.

The main event is scheduled for November 12 when the guru's 550th birth anniversary falls.

"I am grateful to Narendra Modi Ji for committing to attend 550th parkash purab celebrations," tweeted the Union minister.

The work on the four-lane highway, a bridge and a passenger terminal as part of the Kartarpur corridor, from Dera Baba Nanak Sahib (Punjab, India) to Gurdwara Darbar Sahib Kartarpur (in Punjab, Pakistan), is in full swing on the Indian side, with Pakistan too recently announcing that it would complete work on its part of the corridor October.

According to Sukhjinder Singh Randhawa, a Punjab cabinet minister, the state government's functions to commemorate the anniversary will start from November 1 in Sultanpur Lodhi.

Money laundering case: ED seeks Vadra's custody

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Enforcement Directorate (ED) told the Delhi High Court that it wanted custodial interrogation of Robert Vadra because the "money chain" in money laundering case was "directly linked to him".

Vadra, Congress chief Sonia Gandhi's son-in-law, was not cooperating in the investigation, the agency added before Justice Chandra Shekhar. Vadra is facing allegations of money laundering in the purchase of a London-based property estimated at £1.9 million (over Rs17 crore).

"We need his custodial interrogation as the money chain is directly linked to him," the agency's lawyer told the judge. Denying the ED claims, Vadra's lawyer said his client had cooperated in the investigation by appearing before the agency whenever summoned. He said his client answered the questions put to him by the ED. "Not confessing" to allegations against him does not mean he was not cooperating, he said. The court listed the matter for final arguments on November 5. It was hearing the ED plea challenging the anticipatory bail granted to Vadra by a trial court.

Manmohan turns 87, Modi sends wishes in Punjabi

NEW DELHI (TIP): Former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh today turned 87 with greetings pouring in from all quarters. PM Narendra Modi wished Singh on Twitter and followed up his greetings with a letter in Punjabi.

The acclaimed economist-turned-politician received a range of phone calls including from President Ram Nath Kovind, Vice-President M Venkaiah Naidu, former President Pranab Mukherjee, Congress president Sonia Gandhi, Union Minister Harsh Vardhan and former Sri Lankan President Mahinda Rajapaksa on his special day. Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot also called.

Former Congress president Rahul Gandhi wished Singh on Twitter, "On his birthday, let us acknowledge Dr Manmohan Singh ji's selfless service, dedication and incredible contribution to the cause of nation building. My best wishes to him on his birthday. I pray for his good health and happiness in the years to come."

Incumbent Congress chief Sonia Gandhi, however, lavished generous praise on Singh in a statement.

Another Chance in Afghanistan



US soldiers in Afghanistan

It is perhaps for the best that the U.S.-Taliban talks were called off earlier this month. The Taliban leadership's proposed visit to Camp David in the United States would have led to a slew of significant geopolitical changes with implications for the region and beyond.

Perhaps the Taliban became far too greedy and impatient, or the U.S. President has pulled out what he thinks is the Trump card to gain a negotiating advantage especially given that the American establishment is not too happy with the deal. There were misgivings about the deal that the chief U.S. negotiator to Afghanistan, Zalmay Khalilzad, was about to ink with the Taliban.

Back to square one

The Taliban, having fought against and displaced the powerful coalition forces over the past 18 years, has the luxury of time on its side, even as it is steadily increasing its political legitimacy within Afghanistan. Recall that this is not the first time U.S.-Taliban talks are breaking down, and every time the Americans have had to come around to negotiating again. Mr. Donald Trump on the other hand may not have the luxury of time. As for the international community, it has grown tired of the Afghan story.

In any case, we are back to another season of heavy fighting in Afghanistan with devastating attacks being mounted by the Taliban far more frequently than before.

What implications does the cancellation of U.S.-Afghan talks have for the volatile South Asian region in general and for India in particular?

Implications for Afghanistan

The direct fallout from the American pullout from the negotiations is more bloodshed in the country. The gloves are now off (not that the Taliban was greatly restrained earlier) and the Taliban has already started carrying out major attacks with the American troops fighting back. However, the current dispensation in Afghanistan, led by President Ashraf Ghani, might not be too displeased with the outcome. The September 28 elections are likely to go ahead, and Mr. Ghani has a chance to continue as President without having to share power with the Taliban - a prospect Kabul has been uneasy about for

a long time - to the extent that he actively discouraged all talks with the Taliban that did not involve Kabul. The Ghani government will also be pleased with the fact that U.S. troops are likely to continue in the country, for if left alone the government will not survive long.

The larger question that should concern the Afghan people is whether the Taliban is a changed lot or not. The Taliban has been making direct and indirect assertions about how they are a much-evolved group on the question of girls' education, treatment of women and minorities, among others. But these are claims at best and that is precisely why a deal with the Taliban should include commitments on its domestic behavior.

What it means for India

Even with a properly negotiated deal, the ascent of the Taliban in Afghanistan would have meant a certain amount of regional uncertainty and geopolitical recalibration. Pakistan, for instance, has been counting on the return of the Taliban in Afghanistan which it deeply believes gives it strategic depth vis-à-vis India. Pakistani triumphalism in the context of Afghanistan would have meant pinpricks for India. Now that there is no deal between the Taliban and the U.S., there is likely to be more violence internally within Afghanistan while the external implications would be more or less contained. This calculus might change if and when the Taliban returns to power and foreign troops withdraw.

India's best bet in Afghanistan would be a negotiated withdrawal of foreign troops from Afghanistan, for this would check the Taliban's proclivity to engage in

trouble-making outside Afghan territory.

A non-negotiated withdrawal of U.S. forces would be the worst-case scenario for India even though that is unlikely to happen. This will mean little check on the Taliban's behavior at home and in the neighborhood. It will also enhance Pakistan's ability to control elements of the Taliban for tactical or strategic anti-Indian uses.

Once the Taliban returns to power in Afghanistan, on its own or as part of a power-sharing arrangement, Indian civilian assets and interests in Afghanistan could come under increased pressure. Today, with the Pakistani side up in arms against India, thanks to New Delhi's Kashmir decision, the possibility of the Taliban going against Indian interests is much higher, if we were to assume Pakistan to be a major influence on the Taliban's actions.

The Kashmir question

Kashmir in many ways will continue to be at the center of how the emerging geopolitical situation in Afghanistan will impact India. While it is true that a repeat of the late 1980s, when scores of unemployed Afghan fighters turned up in Kashmir at the behest of the Pakistani agencies, is unlikely to happen today for a number of reasons, including due to physical barriers and the amassing of Indian troops on the border, some presence of the Taliban fighters cannot be

ruled out. More significantly, however, if a non-negotiated withdrawal of the U.S. forces takes place, it could lead to an open season for Taliban's regional engagement which could potentially be influenced by Pakistan's strategic calculations. Even if there is a deal between the U.S. and the Taliban, the fact that the Taliban will have "forced" the Americans out of Afghanistan would provide a shot in the arm to Pakistan, and young Kashmiris who are willing to take up arms against the Indian state. "If a superpower like the U.S. can be pushed out of Afghanistan by the Taliban with help from Pakistan, would it be too difficult to beat India?" is the argument doing the rounds among sections of aggrieved Kashmiri youth.

The manner in which talks between the Taliban and the U.S., were being conducted would have led to negative consequences for New Delhi. To that extent, the breakdown of the Trump-Taliban talks is advantage India. The U.S. and the international community, while picking up the threads of negotiations in the days ahead, will need to ensure that there are enough guarantees built into a deal to disincentivize undesirable external behavior by the Taliban.

India, on its part, needs to reach out to the Taliban, not to recognize it but to engage with it, in its own national interest. In fact, we are already pretty late in this game, and with the Chinese, Pakistanis and even the Russians converging on the importance of the return of the Taliban to the Afghan scheme of things, one wonders whether India will ever be able to make inroads into the higher echelons of the Taliban. In any case, any outreach from the Indian side would make the government in Kabul led by Mr. Ghani, unhappy. This leaves India in a difficult situation. Hence, such an outreach will also need to be carefully calibrated and discreetly executed.

Fouzia Azeem, better known as Qandeel, was strangled to death at her home in Multan in the Punjab province on July 15, 2016. Her brother Muhammad Wasim confessed to the murder of his 26-year-old sister and said she had brought "disrepute" to the "family's honour" with her risqué videos and statements posted on social media. Sessions Court Multan Judge Imran Shafi announced the verdict in the case in the presence of all suspects and parents of Baloch. PTI

ICG: 'Dangerous' actions against Muslims risk Sri Lanka peace

COLOBO (TIP): A "harsh and dangerous" crackdown on Sri Lankan Muslims following deadly bombings on Easter Sunday poses a major threat to the Indian Ocean nation's peace and security, a think-tank has warned.

The assailants behind the church and hotel bombings in April were fringe actors, but politicians and Sinhalese nationalists have used the attacks to "justify actions that have harassed and humiliated the broader Muslim community", the International Crisis Group (ICG) said in a new report on Friday.

The attacks, which killed more than 250 people, were claimed by the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL or ISIS). But Sri Lankan police said members of an offshoot of a local Muslim group, National Thowheed Jamath, were responsible.

It was the deadliest single day of violence in the country, which is still recovering from a bloody civil war with ethnic Tamil separatists, and the first experience of Muslim-on-Christian mass violence, the report said.

Since then, more than 1,800 Muslims were arrested under emergency laws and nearly 300 remain in custody, it said. Muslims account for 10 percent of Sri Lanka's Sinhalese Buddhist-dominated population.

Families of those arrested told the ICG that many of those imprisoned had no connections to the attacks, but had been reported to the authorities out of fear and bigotry.

Toll rises to 38, over 452 injured in quake in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD (TIP): The death toll in the devastating earthquake that rattled Pakistan-occupied Kashmir and several north-eastern cities in the country rose to 38 on Wednesday as authorities stepped up rescue operations to save people trapped in debris of several toppled buildings.

The epicentre of the powerful 5.8-magnitude earthquake, which occurred at around 4 pm on Tuesday at a depth of only 10 kilometres, was near Mirpur city in the Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), roughly 20 kilometres north of Jhelum in Punjab, according to the US Geological Survey.

The earthquake resurrected the haunting memories of a monster tremor that had wrecked the region 14 years ago.

The quake — which also jolted several cities of Punjab and Khyber-Pakthunkhwa province — killed 38 people, with the most number of victims belonging to the Mirpur district, Dawn reported, citing a situation report released by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA).

The number of casualties was likely to increase as around 100 of the injured were admitted to different hospitals in a critical condition.

The areas worst hit were Mirpur city, a small town Jatlan and two villages Manda and Afzalpur, where buildings and homes collapsed, trees were uprooted and cracks appeared on roads large enough to swallow cars.

Other cities where the tremors were felt included Islamabad, Lahore, Sialkot, Sargodha, Mansehra, Gujrat,



Chitral, Malakand, Swat, Sahiwal, and Rahim Yar Khan.

The quake was powerful and created panic as people ran out of buildings, eyewitnesses said.

"I lost my house. I lost everything," Abdullah Khan, whose home in Jatlan village on the outskirts of Mirpur was flattened by the quake, was quoted as saying by the Express Tribune.

The affected people are also experiencing water and food shortages amid reports of looting of relief material in the Sang and Sanwal Sharif area. Army chief Gen Qamar Javed Bajwa on Wednesday visited quake affected areas of PoK and reviewed the repair efforts at Jatlan Canal Road.

National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) Chairman Lt Gen Mohammad Afzal said at a briefing in

Islamabad that trucks loaded with relief items, including 200 tents, 800 blankets, 200 kitchen sets, and 100 medical kits would reach the people affected by the earthquake soon.

"The NDMA is already providing medicines, food items and tents, which were in its stock in the affected areas, to the victims," he added.

Afzal said 452 people were injured, including 160 are in serious condition and 450 houses were also damaged.

Special Assistant of PM on Information Firdous Ashiq Awan said that government would compensate the families of dead and injured and also help them to rebuild damaged houses.

"An initial assessment is being done and soon a relief package will be announced by the government of Pakistan," she said. PTI

Pak, Turkey, Malaysia to jointly launch Islamic TV channel: Imran Khan

NEW YORK / LAHORE (TIP): Pakistan, Turkey and Malaysia have decided to jointly launch an English language Islamic television channel to correct misperceptions and confront the challenges posed by Islamophobia, Prime Minister Imran Khan has said.

Prime Minister Khan, who is in New York to participate in the 74th session of the United Nation General Assembly, said the channel will telecast series and films produced on Muslims to educate and inform the world on the Islamic history.

"President Erdogan, PM Mahatir and myself had a meeting today in which we decided our 3 countries would jointly start an English language channel dedicated to confronting the challenges posed by Islamophobia and setting the record straight on our great religion - Islam," Khan said in a tweet.

"Misperceptions which bring people together against Muslims would be



corrected; issue of blasphemy would be properly contextualized; series and films would be produced on Muslim history to educate/inform our own people and the world; Muslims would be given a dedicated media presence," he said.

The prime minister attended a high-level, round table discussion on 'Countering Hate Speech' co-hosted by Pakistan and Turkey, according to a media report.

In his address, Khan called for effective measures to counter hate speech and Islamophobia, asserting that there was a need to address both the causes and consequences of these phenomena.

The prime minister pointed out that marginalisation of any community could lead to its radicalisation.

President Erdogan termed hate speech as among the worst crimes against humanity. PTI

Trump 'sought Ukraine's help' for 2020

Whistleblower says White House tried to 'lock down' details of phone call to Prez Zelenskiy

WASHINGTON (TIP): A whistleblower report released by a congressional panel on Thursday, Sept 26 said President Donald Trump used his office to solicit Ukraine's interference in the 2020 election to advance his personal political interests, risking US national security.

The Trump administration officials tried to "lock down" all details of US President Donald Trump's phone call to his Ukrainian counterpart Volodymyr Zelenskiy, it said.

The Democratic-led US House of Representatives Intelligence Committee released a declassified version of the report made by the whistleblower, which triggered weeks of controversy and prompted House Speaker Nancy Pelosi to launch a formal impeachment inquiry into the Republican President.

"I am deeply concerned that the actions described below constitute 'a serious or flagrant problem, abuse, or violation of law or executive order' that 'does not include differences of opinion concerning public policy matters', consistent with the definition of an 'urgent concern'," the report said.

Trump pressed Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy to investigate Democratic presidential front-runner Joe Biden, in coordination with US Attorney General William Barr and Trump's personal lawyer Rudy Giuliani, according to a call summary released by the Trump administration.

Moments after the whistleblower report was made public, the committee began a hearing at which acting Director



of National Intelligence, Joseph Maguire, was set to testify about the document after refusing for weeks to share the report with Congress. Saying that more than six White House officials had made contact about Trump's communication with Ukraine, the report cited concerns that efforts to put pressure on Ukraine "pose risks to US national security", undermining efforts "to deter and counter foreign interference in US elections". Trump has denied wrongdoing and accused Democrats of trying to destroy him politically.

A federal law required that the report be sent to lawmakers after an inspector general determined that it was urgent

and credible. Shortly before the hearing, the intelligence committee's chairman, Democratic Representative Adam Schiff, announced that it had received the declassified complaint and released it to the public. "This complaint should never have been withheld from Congress. It exposed serious wrongdoing and was found both urgent and credible by the Inspector General," he said.

Trump denounced the report. "The democrats are trying to destroy the republican party and all that it stands for," he tweeted.

What the complaint says

The whistleblower received info from US officials that Trump used his office to solicit interference from a foreign country ahead of the 2020 US election. The interference included pressuring a foreign country to investigate one of Trump's "main domestic political rivals"

Trump's personal lawyer Rudy Giuliani is a central figure in the interference report, and Attorney General William Barr also appeared to be involved. The complaint cites concerns that efforts to pressure Ukraine "pose risks to US national security" and undermine efforts "to deter and counter foreign interference in US elections"

White House lawyers directed that an electronic transcript of the Trump-Zelenskiy call be removed from a computer system. About one dozen White House officials listened to the Trump-Zelenskiy call.

OCI Application Process Simplified

WASHINGTON (TIP): The Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) application process in USA has been simplified with effect from September 20, 2019.

Instead of a two-step application process, the applicant will now submit the OCI application form and upload related documents directly at the Government of India website (<https://ociservices.gov.in/welcome>).

Now there is no restriction of Consular Jurisdiction for OCI applicants. The applicant will be free to apply at Indian Embassy Washington DC or any of the Consulates General of India (CGI) in Atlanta, Chicago, Houston, New York or San Francisco. While submitting the application on the Government of India website, the applicant will need to select the location where he/she wants the OCI application to be processed.

On completion of online application process, the applicant should print the form, related documents and affidavits and submit them at the Outsourcing Partner, Cox & Kings Global Services (CKGS) office in the selected location.

US House backs release of Trump whistleblower complaint 421-0

WASHINGTON (TIP): The US House of Representatives voted 421-0 on Wednesday, Sept 25 for a resolution calling on President Donald Trump to release a whistleblower complaint to Congress, despite the administration letting them view the classified document at secure locations in the US Capitol.

Two House members voted present and 10 did not vote.

The document is central to the impeachment inquiry into the Republican president announced on Tuesday by the Democratic House Speaker, Nancy Pelosi, after reports that Trump had tried to put pressure on Ukraine's president to help smear a political rival.

The Senate passed a similar resolution by unanimous voice vote on Tuesday, Sept 24.

Republicans joined Democrats in backing the release of the document, after many lawmakers argued that Trump's associates were defying a law calling for whistleblower complaints to be sent to Congress if they are found to be credible.

Saudi Arabia to offer tourist visas for first time

RIYADH / WASHINGTON (TIP): Saudi Arabia said on Friday, September 27, it will offer tourist visas for the first time, opening up the ultra-conservative kingdom to holidaymakers as part of a push to diversify its economy away from oil.

Kickstarting tourism is one of the centerpieces of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's Vision 2030 reform program to prepare the biggest Arab economy for a post-oil era.

The announcement comes just two weeks after devastating attacks on Saudi Arabia's oil infrastructure -- blamed by Washington on Iran -- which roiled global energy markets.

"Opening Saudi Arabia to international tourists is a historic moment for our country," tourism chief Ahmed al-Khateeb said in a statement.

will be surprised... by the treasures we have to share -- five UNESCO World Heritage Sites, a vibrant local culture and breathtaking natural beauty." Saudi Arabia will open applications for online tourist visas to citizens of 49 countries

on Saturday, Bloomberg News quoted Khateeb as saying.

The austere kingdom, which forbids alcohol and has a strict social code, is seen by many as a hard sell for tourists.

Prince Mohammed is seeking to change that through a sweeping liberalization drive that has brought new cinemas, mixed-gender concerts and sporting extravaganzas to Saudi Arabia.

International criticism of the kingdom's human rights record, including the gruesome murder last year of critic Jamal Khashoggi and a crackdown on female activists, could further put off foreign visitors, observers say.

Fears of a regional conflict after the September 14 attacks on state oil giant Aramco may also dampen the kingdom's appeal to holidaymakers.

Visas are currently restricted to expat workers, their dependents and Muslim pilgrims travelling to holy sites in Mecca and Medina.

Saudi Arabia last year began issuing visas to visitors to attend sporting and

cultural events in a bid to kickstart tourism.

The government, reeling from low oil prices, says it hopes tourism will contribute up to 10 per cent of the gross domestic product by 2030, compared to three percent currently.

It says by 2030 it aims to attract up to 100 million annual visits by both domestic and foreign tourists.

The sector is expected to create up to one million tourism jobs, the government says, as the kingdom battles high youth unemployment.

Saudi Arabia has splurged billions in an attempt to build a tourism industry from scratch.

In 2017, the kingdom announced a multi-billion-dollar project to turn 50 islands and other pristine sites on the Red Sea into luxury resorts. The country is also developing historic sites such as the centuries old Mada'in Saleh, home to sandstone tombs of the same civilization which built the Jordanian city of Petra.

AMITABH BACHCHAN TO BE HONoured WITH DADA SAHEB PHALKE AWARD

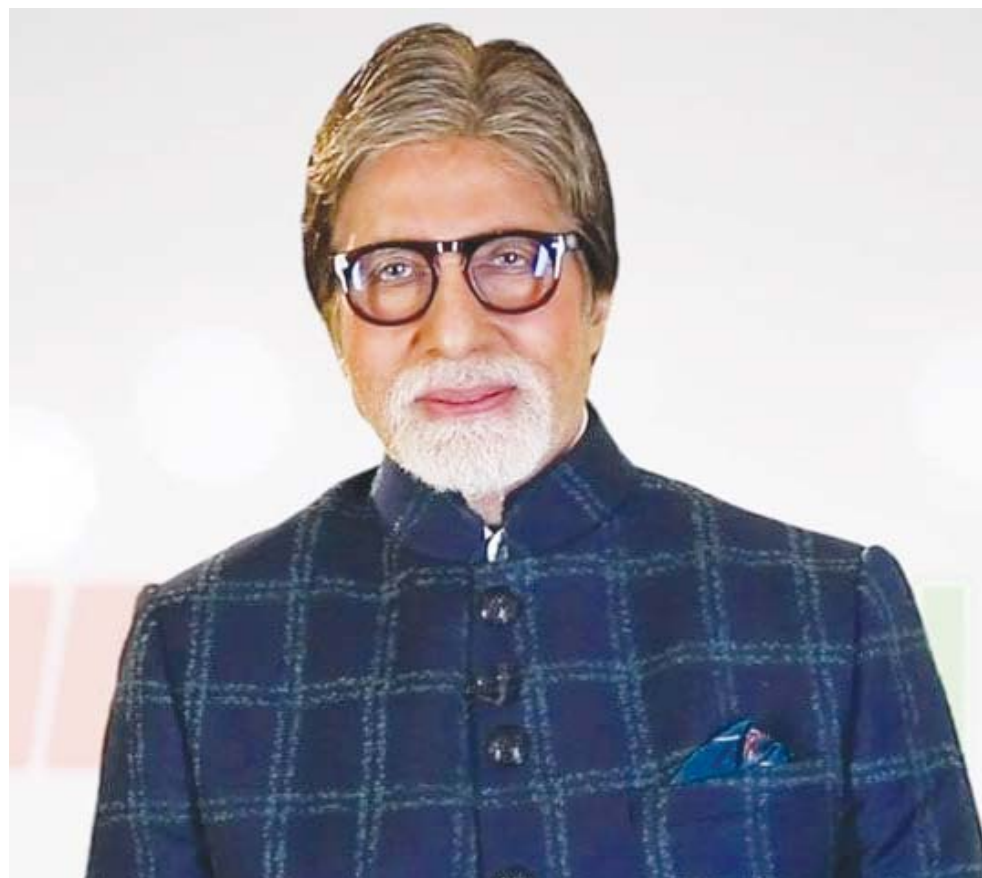

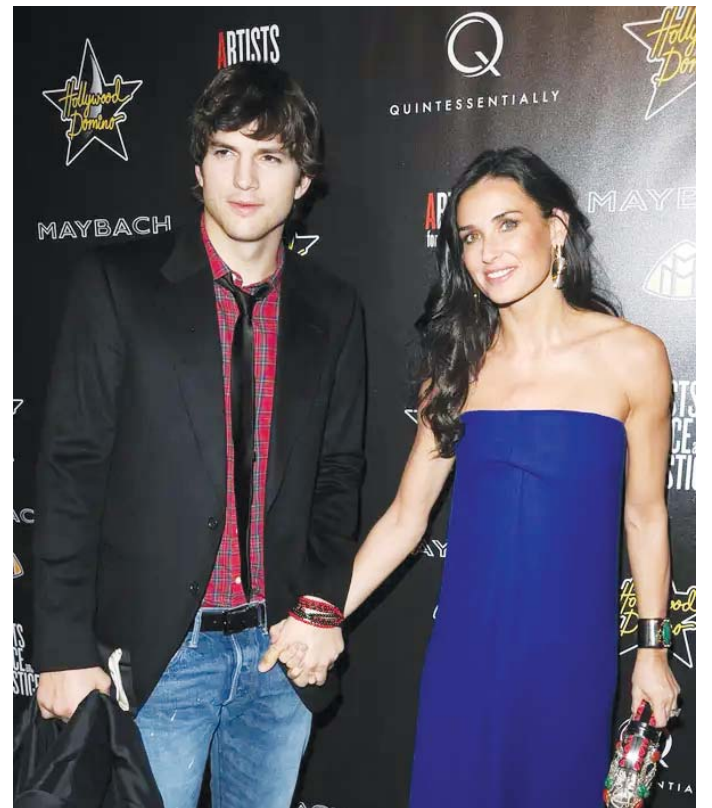

"They were good people, but it was still a mistake. I was strangely flooded with shame, I couldn't shake the feeling that this whole thing was somehow my fault," Moore wrote.

The actress claims that the openness in their relationship was the cause of Kutcher ultimately straying. "Because we had brought in a third party into our relationship, Ashton said, that blurred the lines and, to some extent, justified what he's done."

The real-life inspiration for Jennifer Lopez's character in "Hustlers" is threatening to sue the movie's production company claiming that it never paid her for her life story.

Samantha Barbash was the alleged mastermind behind a ring of strippers who took it upon themselves to go after some of Wall Street's elite men in one of the most provocative scams in recent memory. The ring's exploits were the subject of a 2015 *New York Magazine* article titled "The Hustlers at Scores."

The article was adapted into the hit film, which scored STX Entertainment its biggest opening weekend of all time, reports *Forbes*.

According to *Variety*, Barbash's attorney Bruno Gioffre sent STX a letter Monday demanding it works out a deal to compensate his client within 10 days or face a lawsuit. In response, the outlet reports STX defended its right to make movies about actual events. "We will defend our right to tell factually based stories based on the public record and look forward to resolving this matter before a judge," an STX spokesperson said.

Barbash spoke to *TMZ* last week and she explained that producers did approach her to see if she would sign away her rights. However, she says the offer was low and she was already reluctant to sign away her story, so she declined.

Megan Fox said being constantly viewed as a sex symbol in Hollywood led her to have a psychological breakdown. Best known for films such as 'Jennifer's Body' and 'Transformers' series, the actor said the typecasting created a fraught relationship with the media so much so that she developed a fear of public appearances.

"It wasn't just that movie, it was every day of my life, all the time, with every project I worked on and every producer I worked with. It preceded a breaking

point for me. I think I had a genuine psychological breakdown where I wanted just nothing to do. I didn't want to be seen, I didn't want to have to take a photo, do a magazine, walk a carpet, I didn't want to be seen in public at all because of the fear, and the belief, and the absolute certainty that I was going to be mocked, or spat at, or someone was going to yell at me, or people would stone me or savage me for just being out, so I went through a very dark moment after that," Fox told an *American* entertainment television newsmagazine.

China, Kiribati establish diplomatic relations

BEIJING (TIP): China and Kiribati have established diplomatic relations, Chinese state media reported on September 28, days after the tiny Pacific island nation severed ties with Taiwan.

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi and Kiribati's President Taneti Mamau on Friday signed a joint communique to establish diplomatic relations between the two countries on the sidelines of the UN climate summit, Xinhua reported.

The move is a coup for Beijing just days before it marks the 70th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China, and comes a week after the Solomon Islands also dropped diplomatic ties with Taiwan.

And it leaves the self-ruled island more isolated than ever with just 15 states left that recognise it. Taiwan has been a de facto sovereign nation since the end of a civil war in 1949, but China still views the island as its territory and has vowed to seize it-by force if necessary.

Over the decades, as China's economic and military power has grown, most countries, including the United States and most Western nations, switched recognition to Beijing. Only a handful still recognise Taiwan, largely in Latin America and the Pacific. Taipei has accused Beijing of using "dollar diplomacy" to buy off its few remaining allies. AFP

US airstrike kills 17 IS militants in southwestern Libya

TRIPOLI (TIP): The United States Africa Command (AFRICOM) said it carried out an airstrike that killed Islamic State (IS) militants in southwestern Libya, in coordination with the UN-backed government.

"In coordination with the Libyan Government of National Accord, US Africa Command conducted an airstrike targeting ISIS-Libya terrorists in southwest Libya on September 26," AFRICOM said in a statement on Friday, Xinhua news agency reported.

The statement assessed that 17 terrorists were killed in the airstrike, causing no civilians casualties.

"This ongoing campaign against ISIS-Libya demonstrates that US Africa Command persistently targets terrorist networks that seek to harm innocent Libyans," said AFRICOM's Director of Intelligence Heidi Berg.

"We will continue to pursue ISIS-Libya and other terrorists in the region, denying them safe haven to coordinate and plan operations in Libya," Berg added. AFRICOM stressed continued support for diplomatic efforts to stabilise the political situation in Libya "in order to maintain our common focus on disrupting terrorist organisations that threaten regional stability," the statement said. IANS

US offered to remove all sanctions on Iran in exchange for talks: Iranian Prez

GENEVA (TIP): The United States offered to remove all sanctions on Iran in exchange for talks but Tehran has not yet accepted the offer due to the current "toxic atmosphere", Iranian President Hassan Rouhani said on September 27.

Rouhani, speaking on his return from the United Nations General Assembly in New York, said he met there with US officials at the insistence of Germany, Britain and France.

"It was up for debate what sanctions will be lifted and they (the United States) had said clearly that we will lift all sanctions," Rouhani said, according to his official website.

Iran was ready for negotiations but not in an atmosphere of sanctions and pressure, the Iranian president said.

"This action wasn't in a manner that was acceptable, meaning that in the atmosphere of sanctions and the existence of sanctions and the toxic atmosphere of maximum pressure, even if we want to negotiate with the Americans in the 5+1 framework, no one can predict what the end and result of this negotiation will be," he said.

Crude slipped on the report, adding to earlier losses caused by a faster-than-



expected recovery in Saudi output, slowing Chinese economic growth, a Wall Street Journal report saying that Saudi Arabia had agreed a partial ceasefire in Yemen.

Brent crude was trading below \$62 a barrel. Rouhani did not meet US President Donald Trump in New York and European and Gulf officials expect Washington to keep tightening the vice

on Iran's economy.

The United States and Iran are at odds over a host of issues, including the US withdrawal from the 2015 Iran nuclear deal, US accusations — denied by Tehran — that Iran attacked two Saudi oil facilities on September 14, and Iran's detention of US citizens on what the United States regards as spurious grounds. Reuters

More than 100 dolphins die on island beach off West Africa

LISBON (TIP): Authorities in the Cape Verde islands off West Africa are waiting for experts from Spain to help determine why more than 100 dolphins died on a local beach. Local media report that around 200 melon-headed dolphins were found on a beach on Boa Vista island on September 26. Officials, residents and tourists managed to drag some of them back out to sea, but many returned. Bulldozers buried 136 dead dolphins. BIOS Cape Verde, a volunteer environmental association in the former Portuguese colony, said on its Facebook page Friday it took samples from 50 dolphins and four others were placed in deep freeze by the local council. The group said veterinarians from the University of Las Palmas in Spain's Canary Islands are due in the coming days to perform tests. — AP

Facebook hides 'likes' in Australia trial to ease anxiety

SYDNEY (TIP): Facebook on Friday said it began hiding the number of "likes" for posts in Australia, a trial designed to ease social pressure that could be rolled out worldwide. Account holders across the country will also be blocked from viewing the number of reactions and video views on other people's posts from Friday, but will still be able to see how people respond to their own. "We don't want Facebook to feel like a competition," the company said in a statement. AFP

UK PM Johnson says will obey the law, confident of Brexit deal



LONDON (TIP): British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said on Friday his government will obey the law and remains confident the country can leave the European Union with a deal.

Johnson has vowed that Britain will leave the bloc on October.

31 with or without a divorce agreement, but parliament has passed a law to compel him to seek an extension if he has not got an agreement by October 19.

He was asked on Friday if he was looking for ways to delay or get around

the new law, which he has dubbed a "surrender act".

"We will obey the law, but we're confident we can come out on October 31 and the best way to do that is to get a deal," Johnson told reporters.

"That's why the surrender act is so damaging," he added. "It has had the effect with our European friends making them think: 'maybe parliament can block this thing, maybe they will be forced to extend.' If you're in a negotiation that obviously makes it more difficult." Reuters

Among the many festivals celebrated here, Navratri or Mysore Dasara is the most grandly celebrated festival in the month of September-October by decorating the goddess in 9 ways to depict the 9 different aspects of the Goddess. It's one of the oldest temples in Mysore and one among the 18 Maha Shakti Peethas. During Dasara, the whole city lights up and twinkles like a crown jewel. Food Melas, exhibitions and the royal procession of the idol of the Goddess in a Gold Mantapa consorted by the majestic elephants and horses on the streets of Mysore are the main attractions during the festival. Nearby you can also see the Lakshminarayana Temple and Jwalamuki Thirupurasundari Temple.

The Mysuru Palace

It is located in the center of the city facing the Chamundi Hill. It's a historical heritage and the seat of the royal kingdom of Mysore. It is a three-story stone structure with Marble domes. Its unique architecture is what attracts the tourists to this Palace. During the day tourists are allowed to enter a part of the Palace and the gardens. At night the whole Palace and its three gateways light up for about an hour making it the most beautiful sight in Mysore.

The Mysuru Zoo

The Mysore zoo is a 4 km walk and a nice place to spend a day with kids. It has various animals and birds most fascinating of them being the White Peacock, the Royal Bengal tiger, Ostriches, and Owls. It's a plastic-free zone with a small eatery inside. Best time to visit is early in the morning as soon as it opens at 8:30 am. It is closed on Tuesdays!

Karanji Lake

Just beside the zoo is a small lake surrounded by lush greenery called the

Karanji Lake. Boating is allowed in the lake and there is a walk-through aviary where you can see birds of various kinds and a butterfly park. The lush green nature park with a lake view makes it an ideal location to spend the day relaxing in nature's lap.

Ranganathitoo Bird Sanctuary

This bird sanctuary is located 16 km from Mysore in the Mandya district. It comprises of islets on the banks of the Kaveri river. You can enjoy a variety of flora and fauna here. Roughly 170 species of birds are found here including the painted stork, black-headed ibis,

spoonbill, pelican, egret, Asian open bill stork, etc. Boating is available throughout the day where you can spot, up close, crocodiles basking in the sun on the rocks or swimming beside you. Best time to visit is June to November.

Brindavan Gardens

Situated on the KRS dam road, this is the second most famous place in Mysore after the Palace. This garden lies adjoining the Krishnarajasagara Dam across the river Kaveri. This terraced garden was built in 1927 - 1932 spread across 60 acres speckled with trees, fountains and colorful ornamentation.

The main attraction is the light and sound show which starts at 7 pm.

St. Philomena's Cathedral

It is a beautiful Catholic church constructed in 1936 inspired by the Cologne Cathedral in Germany. It is Asia's second largest church with twin spires of about 175 feet. It has stained glass windows depicting scenes from the bible and can seat up to 800 people in the main hall.

The entire filter might not fit in your pot, so soak each side separately if necessary. Once one side is clean, turn the filter around and let the other side soak.

Honey

BANANA BURFI

INGREDIENTS

5 banana, 100 gm sugar, 1/4 cup butter, 1 teaspoon pistachios, 1/4 cup milk powder, 1 tablespoon cocoa powder, 1 teaspoon crushed lightly cashews, 50 gm ghee

METHOD

- To make this delicious Navratri special recipe, heat 1 tsp ghee in a pan over moderate flame. Add crushed pistachios and cashews to the pan. Lightly fry them till they turn golden in colour.
- Now take another heavy bottomed pan and heat it over medium flame. Add the remaining ghee and the bananas in it. Mix well. Add sugar and stir well. After a minute, add cocoa powder, milk powder and butter. Reduce the flame and gently stir till all ingredients are evenly combined.
- When the mixture starts to leave the sides of the pan and the bananas are well mashed, remove and transfer to a greased plate. Allow it cool. Before the mixture hardens completely, cut it into desired shapes and garnish with cashewnuts and pistachios.



4 VITAMINS YOU NEED TO NOURISH YOUR SKIN

Vitamins play a crucial role in nourishing the body and the skin, and their deficiency leads to maladies like dark spots, redness, wrinkles, rough patches and excessive dryness.

Fitness expert and Vitabiotics Vice President Rohit Shelatkar lists the most important vitamins for a healthy skin and their sources.

Vitamin A

Also called Retinol, this is a compound which stimulates the production of new skin cells and actively works to counter acne and signs of ageing like formation of wrinkles and lines. Vitamin A is found naturally in foods like carrots, sweet potatoes, eggs, dairy products and spinach.

Vitamin B3

Niacinamide or nicotinamide - a form of vitamin B3 - is among the eight vitamins responsible for maintaining good health. This is a water-soluble vitamin known for its anti-inflammatory properties, which is used to treat skin ailments like acne, spots, hyperpigmentation and rosacea - a skin condition characterised by spreading of redness due to rashes. Chicken breast, tuna, salmon, peanuts, green peas, mushrooms and potatoes are some foods rich in vitamin B3.

Vitamin C

The anti-oxidant properties of



vitamin C help prevent acne and protect the skin from the effects of free radicals and creation of collagen structures. Taking adequate Vitamin C can help repair skin and reduce wrinkles. Citrus fruits, strawberries, tomatoes, mangoes, bell peppers, broccoli and Brussel sprouts are some sources of vitamin C.

Vitamin E

Also known as Tocopherol, vitamin E is a powerful anti-oxidant

that protects skin from free radicals. Free radicals are generated by internal and external factors.

Their internal generation happens when the body converts food into energy, while externally, the skin gets them through pollution, exposure to UV rays, and excessive smoking and drinking. Natural sources of Vitamin E include almonds, hazelnuts, sunflower seeds, olive oil, spinach, corn and mangoes.



GREEN TEA COMPOUND MAY HELP FIGHT 'SUPERBUGS'

A natural antioxidant commonly found in green tea may help eliminate antibiotic resistant bacteria or superbugs, according to a study.

The study, published in the Journal of Medical Microbiology, found that the antioxidant epigallocatechin (EGCG) can restore the activity of aztreonam, an antibiotic commonly used to treat infections caused by the bacterial pathogen *Pseudomonas aeruginosa*.

P. aeruginosa is associated with serious respiratory tract and bloodstream infections and in recent years has become resistant to many major classes of antibiotics, according to the researchers from the University of Surrey in the UK.

Currently, a combination of antibiotics is used to fight *P. aeruginosa*.

However, these infections are becoming increasingly difficult to treat, as resistance to last line antibiotics is being observed, researchers said.

To assess the synergy of EGCG and aztreonam, the team conducted in-vitro tests to analyse how they interacted with the *P. aeruginosa*, individually and in combination.

Dengue virus is becoming resistant to vaccines

The mosquito-borne deadly dengue virus that infects about 400 million people globally every year—especially in the tropic and sub-tropic regions of the world—is undergoing changes that are helping it evade vaccines and therapeutics, according to a study.

The research, published in the journal PLOS Pathogens, notes that one of the strains of the virus, DENV2 has smooth spherical surface particles while growing at the carrier mosquito's physiological temperature of 29 degrees Celsius.

According to the researchers including Professor Pei-Yong Shi from the University of Texas Medical Branch in the US, the smooth particles transform into bumpy ones at the human physiological temperature of 37 degrees Celsius.

This ability to morph helps the virus evade the immune system of the human host, and understanding the mechanism behind this transformation is important for therapeutics and vaccine development, the researchers mentioned.

"We found that in laboratory-developed DENV2 strains, mutations in the virus' E protein caused its transformation into bumpy particles," said Xin-Ni Lim, the study's lead author who is from the Duke-National University of Singapore Medical School.

High sugar consumption in childhood increases risk of adult obesity: Study

The high obesity rates currently observed among adults in the US may have been due to dietary changes that took place decades ago, according to a study.

The research, published in the journal Economics and Human Biology noted that while many health studies identified sugar as a major factor in the obesity epidemic, its consumption in the US began to decline in the late 1990s, even when the obesity rates continued to rise well into the 2010s.

The researchers, from the University of Tennessee (UT) in the US, said that the changes we see now in adult obesity rates may have started decades ago with high-sugar diets in childhood, when those grown-ups were children.

"While most public health studies focus on current behaviours and diets, we took a novel approach and looked at how the diets we consumed in our childhood affect obesity levels now that we are adults," said Alex Bentley, lead researcher of the study from UT.

The researchers noted that in Tennessee alone, the adult obesity rate more than tripled, from about 11 per cent in 1990 to almost 35 per



cent in 2016.

According to the researchers, by 2016, nearly 40 percent of all adults in the US, which was about 93 million people, were affected by obesity.

Excess sugar consumption, particularly those in sugar-sweetened beverages, is a well-known contributor to both childhood and adult obesity, the researchers said.

"Since the 1970s, many available

infant foods have been extremely high in sugar," said Hillary Fouts, coauthor of the study from UT.

Fouts added that sugar consumption during pregnancy was known to cause an increase in fat cells in children.

"Up to this point, no studies had explicitly explored the temporal delay between increased sugar consumption and rising obesity rates," said Damian Ruck co-author of the study.

WHATSAPP QUIETLY ROLLS OUT TOOL TO SHARE STATUS ON FACEBOOK

Facebook-owned instant messaging app WhatsApp has begun rolling out a feature for Android users to let them share their status stories directly on Facebook Story and other apps.

Just like Instagram, WhatsApp's status Stories let users post images, text and videos on your profile that disappear after 24 hours.

WhatsApp hasn't made an official announcement yet but several users reported this on Twitter.

"So WhatsApp has a new feature, you can share your story on WhatsApp to Facebook. For me, this is quite interesting, a centralized mode of communicating to various platforms," posted one user.

"The New #WhatsApp update allows you to share your statuses on to your #FacebookStory as well," wrote another.

To use this feature, tap on share button which will show you the apps you can share your WhatsApp status with. Tapping on "Share to Facebook Story" will let you share WhatsApp Status to Facebook Story.

Currently, there was no option to have WhatsApp status automatically shared to another service and the instant messaging app intends that the feature should be an active decision on the part of the user.

The roll out appears to be part of Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg's plan to create a unified app combining WhatsApp, Facebook and Instagram to let over 2.6 billion users communicate with each other cross-apps by 2020.

The move could let the social networking giant tout higher user engagement to advertisers, thus, ramping up its advertising division at a time when growth has slowed down.

Google wins in 'right to be forgotten' fight with France

Google won its fight against tougher "right to be forgotten" rules after Europe's top court said on Tuesday it does not have to remove links to sensitive personal data worldwide, rejecting a French demand.

The case is seen as a test of whether Europe can extend its laws beyond its borders and whether individuals can demand the removal of personal data from internet search results without stifling free speech and legitimate public interest.

"Currently, there is no obligation under EU law, for a search engine operator who grants a request for de-referencing made by a data subject... to carry out such a de-referencing on all the versions of its search engine," the European Court of Justice (CJEU) said.

"However, EU law requires a search engine operator to carry out such a de-referencing on the versions of its search engine corresponding to all the (EU) member states," it added. The case arose after France's privacy watchdog CNIL in 2016 fined Google 100,000 euros (\$109,790) for refusing to delist sensitive information from internet search results globally upon request in what is called the "right to be forgotten." Google took its fight to the French Council of State which subsequently sought advice from the CJEU.

These included a satirical photomontage of a female politician, an article referring to someone as a public relations officer of the Church of Scientology, the placing under investigation of a male politician and the conviction of someone for sexual assaults against minors.

VENUS MAY HAVE BEEN HABITABLE FOR BILLIONS OF YEARS: NASA STUDY

Venus may have hosted liquid water for 2-3 billion years, until a dramatic transformation starting over 700 million years ago resurfaced around 80 per cent of the planet, according to a NASA study.

The research gives a new view of Venus's climatic history and may have implications for the habitability of exoplanets in similar orbits.

Forty years ago, NASA's Pioneer Venus mission found tantalising hints that Earth's 'twisted sister' planet may once have had a shallow ocean's worth of water.

To see if Venus might ever have had a stable climate capable of supporting liquid water, researchers from NASA Goddard Institute for Space Studies (GISS) in the US created a series of five simulations assuming different levels of water coverage.

In all five scenarios, they found that Venus was able to maintain stable temperatures between a maximum of about 50 degrees Celsius and a minimum of about 20 degrees Celsius for around three billion years.

A temperate climate might even have been maintained on Venus today had there not been a series of events that caused a release, or 'outgassing', of carbon dioxide stored in the rocks of the planet about 700-750 million years ago.

"Our hypothesis is that Venus may have had a stable climate for billions of years. It is possible that the near-



global resurfacing event is responsible for its transformation from an Earth-like climate to the hellish hot-house we see today," said Way.

Three of the five scenarios studied by researchers assumed the topography of Venus as we see it today and considered a deep ocean averaging 310 metres, a shallow layer of water averaging 10 metres and a small amount of water locked in the soil.

For comparison, they also included a scenario with Earth's topography and a 310-metre ocean and, finally, a world completely covered by an ocean of 158 metres depth. To simulate the environmental conditions at 4.2 billion years ago, 715 million years ago and today, the researchers

adapted a 3D general circulation model to account for the increase in solar radiation as our Sun has warmed up over its lifetime, as well as for changing atmospheric compositions.

Although many researchers believe that Venus is beyond the inner boundary of our solar system's habitable zone and is too close to the Sun to support liquid water, the new study suggests that this might not be the case.

"Venus currently has almost twice the solar radiation that we have at Earth. However, in all the scenarios we have modelled, we have found that Venus could still support surface temperatures amenable for liquid water," said Michael Way from GISS.

Amazon's new initiative: Bring access to Cortana, Alexa and other assistants from single device

Amazon.com Inc has launched an initiative that would allow users to access its Alexa, Microsoft Corp's Cortana and multiple other voice-controlled virtual assistant services from a single device.

The move comes as competition has intensified among global technology companies to dominate the market for voice assistants, which are commonly housed in smart speakers and mobile devices.

The notable exclusions from Amazon's 'Voice Interoperability Initiative' are Alphabet Inc's Google Assistant, Apple Inc's Siri and Samsung Electronics Co's Bixby.

Google was approached by Amazon but only over the weekend, giving it a very small time frame to evaluate the proposal, a source familiar with the matter said.

"We just heard about this initiative and would need to review the details, but in general we're always interested in participating in efforts that have the broad support of the ecosystem and uphold strong privacy and security



practices," a Google spokesperson said.

The initiative, which has been supported by more than 30 companies, also includes Salesforce.com's Einstein.

Chip companies including Intel Corp, Qualcomm Inc, MediaTek Inc and NXP Semiconductors NV will develop the related hardware, Amazon said.

Spotify, Tencent, Baidu, BMW,

Bose, Harman, Orange, Sonos, Sony Audio Group are also supporting the partnership.

Microsoft and Amazon have collaborated in the past. The two companies two years ago announced that their voice assistants will be able to talk to each other, a rare move in itself as most virtual assistants are known to use data from their own ecosystems and not talk to one another.

ADB lowers India's GDP growth forecast to 6.5%

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Asian Development Bank (ADB) today sharply lowered India's growth forecast from 7.2% to 6.5% for the current fiscal, though it indicated that the country will grow faster than China.

The multi-lateral lending agency in its Asian Development Outlook (ADO) Update for 2019 cut the growth projection for India, which recorded an over six-year low growth of 5% in April-June quarter this fiscal.

"India's growth forecast for fiscal year 2019 is lowered to 6.5% after growth slowed markedly to 5% in the first quarter, April-June. Abrupt declines in manufacturing and investment reflect uncertainty ahead of General Election, subdued lending by banks and other financial institutions, stress in the rural economy, and a weakening external outlook," the agency said.

However, India is expected to rebound to 7.2% growth in fiscal 2021 and join most other sub-regional countries in performing at or near their ADO 2019 growth forecasts for next year, it added.

The Manila-headquartered funding agency had projected



India's economy to expand at 7.2% in its ADO for 2019-20 released earlier in April this year and cut it down to 7% in the supplement to the ADO in July.

As regards China, it has projected that growth will slip from 6.6% last year to 6.2% in 2019, and 6% in 2020 — below previous projections — with increased government spending and a strong housing

market partly offsetting the impact of the trade dispute with the US and sluggish manufacturing investment.

"In Hong Kong, China, recent political tensions, spillover from the trade conflict, and the global electronics downturn will slow growth in 2019 and 2020 well below ADO 2019 projections," it said further.

Oil extends losses after Donald Trump douses trade talk optimism

SINGAPORE (TIP): Oil prices fell on Wednesday for a second day on worries that fuel demand could fall after US President Donald Trump doused recent optimism over China-US trade talks and reignited concerns about global economic growth.

Brent crude futures fell 47 cents to \$62.63 a barrel by 0442 GMT, while US West Texas Intermediate crude dropped to \$56.94, down 35 cents.

Both benchmarks have fallen to their lowest level since before the attack on Saudi Arabian oil facilities on Sept. 14.

"What really pulled the rug from underneath oil was Donald Trump's comments on trade last night ... He's still maintaining quite a belligerent position," said Jeffrey Halley, senior market analyst for Asia Pacific at OANDA.

Trump criticised China's trade practices at the United National General Assembly on Tuesday and said he would not accept a "bad deal" in US-China trade negotiations.

China is the world's largest oil importer and second-largest crude user. The United States is the largest consumer of oil.

Trump also said he saw a path to peace with Iran even as he denounced Iran for "bloodlust", cooling other risk premiums built into oil prices.

Oil rallied last week following a crippling attack on Saudi Arabia's oil installations that has disrupted supplies from the world's top exporter. To meet its supply obligations to Saudi refineries overseas, Saudi Aramco is buying oil from other Middle East producers.

"Right now, the market is very concerned about the demand side of the equation, but I would caution against being complacent about what's happening in the Middle East," said Howie Lee, an OCBC economist.

SPICEJET PLANS TO BUY 100 AIRBUS PLANES, WORTH \$13 BILLION



India's SpiceJet Ltd. is weighing an order for at least 100 Airbus SE planes as Boeing Co. grapples with the fallout over its grounded 737 Max.

The budget carrier, a major global customer for the Max, may buy a "sizable" number of Airbus A321LR and XLR jets to accommodate a planned expansion, SpiceJet Chairman Ajay Singh said Tuesday. No decision has been made, he said, and the airline would consider a competing midrange jetliner if Boeing decides to build one.

Airbus has "pushed us hard since the day we started flying Boeing aircraft, and of course with the current problems, they've pushed us harder," Singh said in an interview at Bloomberg's headquarters in New York. "They have made us a commercial offer and we are evaluating it."

The discussions with Airbus threaten Boeing with a high-profile defection at a time when the US planemaker is enmeshed in one of the biggest crises in its 103-year history. SpiceJet, India's second-largest airline, has 13 Max jets already in its fleet and has committed to buy as many as 205 of the single-aisle workhorses as it expands capacity to handle the nation's fast-growing demand for air travel.

While Singh didn't specify the exact size of a potential transaction, he said "any aircraft order that SpiceJet places would at least be 100 aircraft." That would value the deal in excess of \$13 billion, based on 2018 list prices before customary discounts for the A321neo.



ECONOMY TO START LOOKING UP IN H2 OF CURRENT FISCAL, SAYS FM SITHARAMAN

NEW DELHI (TIP): Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman today hoped the economy will start looking up in the second half of the current financial year as consumption rises and banks increase their lending operations.

Weeks after meeting public sector bankers, the Finance Minister met private sector lenders and financial institutions that, according to her, categorically stated they are not facing liquidity crisis. They also said there is enough demand for loans, she added.

She indicated that economic slowdown seems to have bottomed out and the coming festive season will help the economy start looking up. She said the private sector banks and financial institutions told her that the slump in commercial vehicle sales is "cyclical" and likely to pick up in the next one or two quarters.

Thomas Cook collapse sparks Britain's largest repatriation since World War II



LONDON (TIP): British travel firm Thomas Cook collapsed on Monday, leaving hundreds of thousands of holidaymakers stranded and sparking the UK's biggest repatriation since World War II.

The 178-year-old debt-plagued group, which had struggled against fierce online competition for some time and blamed Brexit uncertainty for a recent drop in bookings, declared bankruptcy after failing to secure £200 million (\$250 million, 227 million euros) from private investors.

Monday's bankruptcy, which followed a lengthy period of chronic financial turmoil after a disastrous 2007 merger deal, left around 600,000 tourists stranded worldwide according to Thomas Cook, while its 22,000 staff are out of a job.

Maruti slashes prices of select models by Rs 5,000

NEW DELHI (TIP): The country's largest car maker Maruti Suzuki India on Wednesday reduced the prices of select models by Rs 5,000 (on ex-showroom prices).

These models include all variants of Alto 800, Alto K10, Swift Diesel, Celerio, Baleno Diesel, Ignis, Dzire Diesel, Tour S Diesel, Vitara Brezza and S-Cross, MSI said.

The new prices will be applicable from September 25 across the country. This price cut will be over and above the current promotional offers.

Indian American among 24 arrested in attempted child sex crimes in metro Atlanta

ATLANTA (TIP): The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office along with 13 law enforcement agencies finished an undercover operation called "Operation Just Cause" which resulted in 24 arrests including an Indian origin man for attempted child sex crimes in metro Atlanta.

Mahesh Kumar Saroj, W/M, Alpharetta, GA, 35, is an Information Technology professional who was arrested along with other 23 individuals.

These individuals traveled or were willing to travel to the county for criminal sexual

encounters with young children. The operation took several months of planning and was aimed at child predators and other suspects targeting children for human trafficking and other criminal acts in the state of Georgia.

Sikh American Deputy Sheriff shot and killed in the line of duty in Texas

Dhaliwal was a 10-year veteran on the force, and the agency's first Sikh deputy. "He was a hero," Gonzalez said. "Deputy Dhaliwal was a trailblazer."

NAVRATRI: THE NINE-DAY FESTIVAL OF GODDESS DURGA

SEPTEMBER 29 TO OCTOBER 7, 2019

Navratri is the festival of nine-day, which holds immense significance for the Hindus. It is also one of the most ancient festivals. The festival of Chaitra Navratri was held in its most elemental form even in prehistoric times as Mata Shakti Durga was worshipped. In order to have the blessings of Maa Durga Shakti in human life, Hindus worship Maa Durga and all her feminine aspects of divine femininity over nine days and nine nights.

The Navratri 2019 dates of the Ashwin month are from September 29 until October 7. It is one of the festivals celebrated across the length and breadth of India, though the celebrations in one part of the country are quite different than the other. With various customs and traditions, each region of India has its unique way of celebrating the Navratri by honouring the multiple forms of Mother Goddess with their rituals and ceremonies.

Performing rituals of Navratri is the most significant way of experiencing the essence of this Hindu festival. In the auspicious and awe-inspiring occasion, divine love pervades through all devotees who emerge more courageous and wiser through the nine-day rigor. In the vein of all vedic traditions, Navratri customs help to inculcate spiritual habits. Hence, prayers, chants, 'bhajans' and reading of important religious texts make up a significant portion of this festival. Devotees pay obeisance to this feminine divine energy that is believed to maintain the balance of the universe.

Navratri is one of the most anticipated festivals in India with social and spiritual connotations. Navratri Hindu festival is spread out over nine consecutive days in the Chaitra and Ashwin months to consecrate the divine aspects of Ma Shakti as Goddess Durga, Goddess Lakshmi and Goddess Saraswati. The festival is associated with their symbolic connotation as epitome of courage, wealth and skill respectively.

Broadly, on the first three days, devotees venerate Goddess Durga as she represents power in its divine form that removes negativity and proclivity towards immoral behavior. She is, invoked as Kumari, Parvati and Kali which are aspects of Ma Durga and represent her adolescence-to-maturity stage. During the next three days, Goddess Lakshmi blessings for material and spiritual prosperity are sought with puja and powerful mantra chantings. Over the next three days, Goddess Saraswati is invoked to seek blessings for erudition and skills in the arts. The devotee puts books and musical instruments near the deity to acquire true knowledge and wisdom to see him/her through this life and beyond. The ninth day of 'Mahanavami', the concluding day of Navratri puja, is considered an auspicious day for conducting pujas such as 'Aparajita' puja and 'Kanya Puja'. The tenth day celebrates the momentous events associated with Lord Rama as well as Ma Durga, who killed the demon



'Mahisasura'.

Rituals of Navratri

Customs of Navratri which stand out prominently in terms of strict observance include the following:

On the very first day, barley or 'jowar' seeds are sown in a decorated clay pot and by the tenth day, the tender shoots are distributed among the devotees. A photograph or an idol of the eight-armed Goddess seated on a lion, along with the 'yantra' is installed.

'Kalash Sthapna' is done which involves installing a water pot or 'kalash', sprinkled with holy water and filled with mango leaves and coconut.

The morning 'puja' is performed after a bath, and the day-long fast is broken after doing the evening puja.

During the puja, 'shankh' is blown, fresh flowers, 'doob' or sacred grass, 'paan' and fruits are offered to the deity, chapters from the sacred 'Durga Saptshati' and 'Chandipath' are recited, followed by 'arti' and prasad distribution.

A very significant ritual is performing 'Kanya Puja' on 'Ashtami' and 'Navami', which involves worshipping nine young girls, in pre-puberty stage, representing the nine forms of goddess Durga. Each girl is treated to a meal comprising puri, sweet bread, halwa, a sweet dish, made of semolina and Bengal gram curry. After washing their feet, the devotees break their fast.

Ayudha or Astra Puja is held on the eighth/ninth day. Tools, vehicles and equipments are worshipped on this day.

Among some communities, it is also considered an auspicious time to initiate learning for children by invoking Goddess Saraswati. Hence, Lalita-puja and Saraswati-puja is done ritualistically to start formal education of children.

A Garba performance precedes 'aarti' conducted in honor of Maa Durga.

Fasting or 'vrat' from sunrise till

sunset is undertaken for night days.

In the Navratri Hindu festival, the devotee should observe abstinence and austerity.

On the eight day, a 'yagna' is performed with offerings of ghee and til for mental and spiritual cleansing.

Lemon or bhasma or ash is used for cleaning substances for 'abhishek'.

In Gujarat, a garbh-deep or a lamp is lit within an earthen pot with several perforations representing the unison of body and soul.

Customs of Navratri

Since all the nine days are dedicated to different incarnations of Ma Durga, it is customary to wear colors that symbolize the qualities of the deity. The first day venerates Shailputri Devi who embodies aspects of Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva. On this day, red clothes are worn. The second day is dedicated to Brahmacharini Devi who represents a life of abstinence. Wearing blue colored clothes is considered auspicious on this day. On the third day, Chandraghanta Devi, the bestower of glory and beauty, is

invoked. On the fourth day, Kushmanda Devi is worshipped and yellow is the color to honor her. The fifth day is in honor of Skandmata Devi. Grey is the color to be worn on the sixth day and is dedicated to Katyayani Devi, while orange is the color for protection symbolized by Kalratri Devi on the seventh day. On the eighth day, pink clothes are worn to honor Mahagauri Devi. The ninth day is dedicated to Siddhidatri Devi, whose blessings earn devotees all 'siddhis'.

On all these nine days, devotees should meditate on the different forms of Ma Durga and seek her grace.

Some of the Navratri customs carry a lot of significance for married women. This Navratri Hindu festival sees heavy involvement of married women who seek blessings of prosperity and a long married life. Some of the customs of Navratri include showing complete devotion through actions such as doing 'bhajans' and 'japa', eating vegetarian food and staying away from negative influences to be able to soak in the wisdom and inner strength gained thus.

INDIA VS SOUTH AFRICA

One more on-field aggression may get Virat Kohli banned from international cricket

NEW DELHI (TIP): Indian skipper Virat Kohli has reached a dicey situation as he, who received an official warning and one demerit point for breaching ICC Code of Conduct in India's third T20 match against South Africa on Sunday, is just one demerit point away from getting banned from international cricket. On Sunday, Kohli had an inappropriate shoulder contact with pacer Beuran Hendricks in the fifth over of the Indian innings while taking a run.

This was after Kohli was found guilty of a Level 1 breach of the ICC Code of Conduct during Sunday's third T20I against South Africa in Bengaluru. In a statement released, the ICC said: "Kohli was found to have breached Article 2.12 of the ICC Code of Conduct for Players and Player Support Personnel, which relates to "Inappropriate physical contact with a Player, Player Support Personnel, Umpire, Match Referee or any other person (including a spectator)" during an International Match."

The Indian skipper tally of demerit points has increased to three after securing one demerit point each during the Pretoria Test against South Africa on in 2018 and against Afghanistan in the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019.

Now the aggressive Indian captain needs to keep his aggression in check as India have just started a hectic home season. India will now play three Test matches with South Africa cricket team. Later, India will host Bangladesh for three T20Is and two



Tests in November, and then go for bilateral series with West Indies, Zimbabwe, Australia and New Zealand.

As per cricket rule book, when a player reaches four or more demerit points within a 24-month period, the player is suspended. It means if Kohli receives another demerit point before January 16 next year – two years from the Centurion Test – he will get a suspension.

What does ICC rule-book say?

- When a player reaches four or more demerit points within a 24-month period, they are converted into suspension points and a player is banned
- Two suspension points equate to a ban from one Test or two ODIs or two T20Is, whatever comes first for the player
- Demerit Points to remain on a Player or Player Support Personnel's disciplinary record for a period of twenty-four (24) months from their imposition following which they will be expunged.



BUMRAH OUT OF SA TESTS WITH STRESS FRACTURE IN BACK, UMESH CALLED

NEW DELHI (TIP): Jasprit Bumrah, India's top pace bowler across formats for the last two years, has been ruled out of the three-Test series against South Africa due to a stress fracture in his lower back.

Bumrah has been replaced in the Indian squad by pacer Umesh Yadav. The Test series against South Africa begins in Visakhapatnam on October 2.

The injury could force Bumrah out of next month's T20I and Test series against Bangladesh as well. Since making his Test debut against South Africa in January 2018, Bumrah has picked up 62 wickets in 12 Tests at an average of 19.24. He is yet to play a Test series in India, but he did very well on the tours of South Africa, England, Australia and the West Indies over the last 21 months.

Bumrah's injury is a big setback to India and a warning sign as well, because it raises questions asked about managing his workload in the light of his slingy, unconventional bowling action. Bumrah has bowled a staggering 724.3 overs in international cricket since January 1, 2018.

"The injury was detected during a routine radiological screening. He will now undergo rehabilitation at NCA and will be monitored by the BCCI Medical Team. The All-India Senior Selection Committee has named Umesh Yadav as Bumrah's replacement," the Indian cricket board (BCCI) said in a media statement.

ROHIT'S OPENING GAMBIT

VIZIANAGARAM (TIP): Rohit Sharma will begin a last-ditch effort to save his start-stop Test career with a trial run in the unfamiliar opener's slot when he leads the Board President's XI in a three-day warm-up game against South Africa.

The national selection committee and the team management have decided to promote Rohit as an opener due to his attractive strokeplay. India's next five Tests — three against South Africa at home and two against New Zealand away early next year — could make or break the 32-year-old's Test career. He will open with Mayank Agarwal for the Board President's XI, and the two will look to strike an understanding before the first Test, which begins in Visakhapatnam on October 2.

From the Indian point of view, the second player to watch with interest in the game is fast bowler Umesh Yadav, who has been drafted into the Test side as the replacement of the injured Jasprit Bumrah. Yadav, who played the last of his 41 Tests in late 2018, will be keen to rattle the likes of Faf du Plessis and Aiden Markram in order to make a statement.



MESSI, RAPINOE STARS OF NIGHT

MILAN (TIP): Lionel Messi won the FIFA Men's Player of the Year award on Monday with Megan Rapinoe bagging the women's prize to cap a historic year for the United States' World Cup icon.

Barcelona striker Messi's victory in Milan was a surprise as he edged out Virgil van Dijk, who won the UEFA player's award last month after helping Liverpool to the Champions League last season. Juventus' forward Cristiano Ronaldo had also been shortlisted for the award, but did not attend the ceremony as he lost out to his rival in the famous La Scala opera house.

Both Messi, 32, and Van Dijk, 28, are now in the running for the coveted Ballon d'Or which will be announced on December 2.

Rapinoe beat fellow World Cup winner Alex Morgan and England's Lucy Bronze to the women's title, with US coach Jill Ellis winning women's coaching award. The 34-year-old Rapinoe won the Golden Boot for being top scorer and the Golden Ball for the best player at the World Cup, and also became the face of the tournament for her outspoken views on US President Donald Trump.

Messi was top scorer in the Champions League last season with 12 goals before Barcelona were dumped out by Liverpool in the semifinals. The Argentine also won the European Golden Shoe after scoring 36 goals, won



La Liga title with Barcelona and helped Argentina to bronze at 2019 Copa America.

Van Dijk had been bidding to become just the second defender — after Italian Fabio Cannavaro in 2006 — to be recognised by FIFA as the world's best player. And he missed out on completing a treble for Liverpool with manager Jurgen Klopp winning the men's coach of the year award and Alisson Becker the goalkeeper prize.

Two-time women's World Cup-winning coach Ellis beat Dutch coach Sarina Wiegman, runners-up in France 2019, and England's Phil Neville for the award.
