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
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


NEW DELHI (TIP): UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson will visit India at the end of April, his first major international tour after London's exit from the EU.

ATLANTA (TIP): Eight people were killed in shootings at three businesses in the Atlanta area on Tuesday, March 16. Six of the eight victims were Asian women, authorities said.

The attacks began at around 5 pm Tuesday, March 16afternoon. Atlanta police officers first responded to a crime scene at Young's Asian Massage, where four people were killed, in Cherokee County, just north of Atlanta. The victims were Delaina Ashley Yaun, Paul Andre Michels, Xiaojie Tan, and Daoyou

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Indian - Origin Small Business Owner Attends Round Table with Kamala Harris

WASHINGTON (TIP): An Indian - origin businesswoman, who imports goods and supports widowed women in India, has participated in a round table with Kamala Harris and asked the US Vice President to back a global plastic policy.

Lalitha Chittoor, the owner of Eco All Trading LLC, a small micro business involved in wholesale trading of sustainable products such as stainless steel, bamboo, birch wood attended the round table with Harris in Denver, Colorado on Tuesday along with her daughter.

Ms Harris brought up the administration's climate change efforts and said a policy staffer would follow up with her. Ms. Chittoor's business founded in 2019, is women-owned and imports goods from India and supports widowed women in India.

She told the round table that the small businesses were really part of the

heartbeat of every community.

"Our small business leaders are not only business leaders, you are civic leaders, community leaders, role

models," she said.

"It is our small businesses that hire from the community, that uplift the community, that have regular customers

who come in and you can recognize if they're having a bad day and you already know what they want to they don't even have to put in an order," she said.

Ms Harris said those in need of assistance have been opening up their car trunks to pick up food boxes but leave handwritten notes and sometimes a tip thanking the volunteers.

"These families who have nothing because they've lost so much, tipping the volunteers for their generosity and recognizing the dignity of their work," she said

Born in Chennai and a naturalized citizen of the US, Ms Chittoor started her business at the behest of her daughter. Her primary customers are restaurants, federal government, state government, school cafeterias, prison cafeterias, hospital cafeterias.

Two Indian-origin South African women won International accolades for their exemplary leadership

JOHANNESBURG (TIP): Two young Indian-origin women from South Africa's Pretoria city, a 21-year-old beauty products entrepreneur and a 30-year-old architect, have won international accolades for their exemplary leadership this week.

Beauty products entrepreneur, Rabia Ghoor, received the Forbes Woman Africa 'Young Achievers' Award for 2021, while architect Sumayya Vally, was included in the 2021 Times100 list that acknowledges leaders who are shaping the future.

Ghoor's award was announced during a virtual Forbes summit to celebrate African women leaders who are committed to economic and social transformation on the continent. Ghoor started 'Swiitch Beauty', her make-up and skincare online beauty store at just 14, dropping out of school two years later to concentrate full-time on the business, which was inspired after she spotted a gap for the African market.

"American, European or Asian brands that are unavailable here in South Africa were constantly innovating and evolving, especially in the digital space, while South African brands lagged behind or just straight up didn't exist.

"I began researching product sourcing, formulation, e-commerce, packaging, manufacturing, design with the end goal in mind being to create a beauty brand that firstly, didn't break the bank and secondly - made things that people would actually use in real life - things that did what they said they were going to do," Ghoor said.

"After being announced as the winner, I received tones of emails for



collaborations. That is exposure for my brand and myself. I think winning opened networking opportunities," she added.

Vally became the youngest ever architect to make in the Times100 list for her role in the design of the pavilion for London's Serpentine Galleries. She joins such internationally celebrated architects as Frank Gehry and Zaha Hadid.

Vally established the company Counterspace five years ago in partnership with a group of friends while still lecturing at the Graduate School of Architecture at the University of Johannesburg. She said the company was formed with the aim of developing a design language that acknowledges and celebrates the African continent.

"It is an absolute privilege to be on a list with so many artists, innovators and leaders who I look up to. It has deepened the sense of responsibility to our histories, our hybrid identities and our futures that I strive to embody in my work, and the sense of responsibility that I have to my communities," Vally told the website *Laudium Today* in her hometown.

Indian-origin man charged for cyber-stalking

WASHINGTON (TIP): A 31-year-old Indian-origin computer security consultant has been charged in the US for allegedly engaging in cyber-stalking campaign against a woman and threatening multiple people, including a deputy prosecutor and a police officer investigating him.

Sumit Garg from Seattle was indicted on Wednesday, March 17 by a federal grand jury for conspiracy to engage in cyber-stalking, three counts of cyber-stalking in violation of criminal order, and two counts of cyber-stalking, Acting US Attorney Tessa M Gorman announced.

Garg was transferred to federal custody last week and was ordered detained at the Federal Detention Centre at SeaTac on March 15, 2021, the US Department of Justice said in a statement.

He will be arraigned on the indictment on March 25.

According to a detailed criminal complaint and the indictment in the case, Garg has been involved in an extensive campaign of threats and sexually explicit messaging and posts about a woman who used to share an apartment with his spouse.

Using her personal information, Garg threatened and tormented the former roommate in violation of court order.

He allegedly also used his computer



skills to threaten multiple people in the former roommate's life, including her uncle who represented her in obtaining a civil protection order; her current boyfriend; the Seattle Police Detective who investigated the threats; and even the Deputy Prosecuting Attorney who filed charges against Garg for his illegal stalking conduct.

He used his computer skills to try to hide who was sending the threats or making the posts.

The case is being investigated by the United States Secret Service with assistance from the Seattle Police Department.

Indian-origin crypto investor buys \$69.3 million artwork

SINGAPORE/ NEW DELHI (TIP): Singapore-based Indian Cryptocurrency investor Metakovan has bought an artwork by digital artist Beeple for \$69.3 million.

Various media reports cited that Metakova is a pseudonym of the investor, which means King of Meta in the Tamil language. His real identity is not known, but the investor is the co-founder of the NFT collection called Metapurse.

The investor successfully acquired the piece, titled-Everydays: The First 5,000 Days-for \$69,346,250 (Rs 504 crore approximately), according to the auction house Christie's.

According to reports, the price jumped from the \$20 million range to over \$50 million in the last minutes of the auction.

The work in question is a mosaic of 5,000 artworks made over the last 13 years by Mike Winkelmann, who goes by the artist name Beeple.

It's by far the largest known sale of an NFT, a special type of token

that lives on the Ethereum blockchain and proves digital ownership of its associated media.

According to the New York Times, the most expensive painting ever sold was a Leonardo da Vinci that went for \$450.3 million in 2017.

The Art Newspaper reported that

Twobadour, the steward of Metapurse whose real identity is also unknown, said he understands that valuation might sound like a "fantastical number, but we do believe that down the line this has the potential to become the most valuable piece of art ever".

Indian American Republican 'JD' Diganvker running for highway commissioner in Illinois Township

CHICAGO (TIP): Indian American Republican Jitendra "JD" Diganvker is no stranger to politics and public service. A small business owner, he ran against Rep. Raja Krishnamoorthi, D-IL, from Illinois' 8th congressional district in 2016.

Now Diganvker, known as "JD," is taking another stab at electoral politics. This time he is running for the post of Highway Commissioner in the Maine Township, a suburb of Chicago.

The long time Illinois resident, who is running on a Republican slate, told the American Bazaar that the commissioner's job would provide him with the right platform to address local issues. Diganvker said his candidacy is important as the Maine Township is home to many minority communities "who are entirely unrepresented."

Born in India, Diganvker immigrated to the United States in 1999. A US citizen since 2003, he made Des Plaines and Maine Township his home. In 2003, he launched a small business, along with his wife. It employed five people and grew by 230 percent over the next seven years.

Diganvker is not the only Indian American Republican on ballot in the April 6 local elections. Smitesh Shah is running for the Maine Township clerk. The presence of two Indian Americans on GOP slate is a first, according to old-timers.

Early voting for the local elections begins on March 22.

Diganvker told the American Bazaar

that, through his candidacy, he wants to send a message to all Indian Americans to concentrate on local offices. "More voices at a local level, bring in real issues to the center stage," he said.

Speaking about the increasing Indian American presence in US politics, he said, "Americans are more welcoming to all candidates who come forward to represent them on a local level and they have high regard for Indian Americans."

Diganvker said if he goes on to win, it will increase representation for the community. "This will also be our chance to represent our community in local government," he said "The Maine Township Highway Commissioner

focuses primarily on maintaining roads and bridges in the unincorporated areas of township. Unincorporated Maine Township is also home to many minority communities who are entirely unrepresented on the Maine Township Board. As a resident of unincorporated Maine Township and a member of its ethnic community, I think I will be able to do just representation."

Diganvker said he wants to keep roadways open and safe while also acting as a strong steward of hard-earned taxpayer funds.

"I plan to lower the tax over the next four years to reduce the excess accumulated by my predecessors through over-taxation," he said. "I also plan to regularly meet with residents of various neighborhoods in the township to brainstorm about how to improve our government and make it more efficient and inclusive."

Diganvker spoke about his priorities if he gets elected. "My first issue would be to make sure all our citizens receive their Covid-19 vaccine as soon as possible," he said. Secondly, we had a particularly bad winter this year so I will be on road to review our roads and bridges and do the needful."

Lastly, he added, "With COVID-19 taking a toll on all aspects of life, every family is affected and has somehow lost a loved one. At this time, healing and safety is of paramount importance to me." (Source: American Bazar)

SACRAMENTO (TIP): Indian American high school basketball phenom Ryan Agarwal has committed to Stanford University.

Agarwal made the announcement Tuesday, March 16 afternoon via a commitment video posted on his social media.

"It's truly a blessing to have experienced this recruitment process, a process that I will never forget" Agarwal said in the video. "However, it can only be one."

Agarwal thanked his coaches, family, and friends in the five-minute video.

The four-star signee also received offers from Harvard, Princeton, Oklahoma State, and Rice University, among others.

In a recent interview with the American Bazaar, prior to his commitment, Agarwal said there were three things he was looking at most when considering a school to play for:

"A relationship with the head coach is huge," said Agarwal. That's who he will be playing for; putting him in games, and teaching him the most, Agarwal noted; a role he seems to trust with Stanford Head Coach Jerod Haase.

Play style was also an important factor according to Agarwal.

"Me being a shooter and a guy who spreads the floor more, and tries to get out in transition and shoot, I wouldn't want to play on a team that just [has the ball] stay in the guard's hands or goes to the bigs and they score inside all the time. I'd rather be on a team that spreads the floor, moves the ball well and shoots the ball a lot."

One of the best long-range snipers in his class, Agarwal should look to have plenty of opportunities to light the ball fly playing alongside five-star point forward and McDonald's All-American Harrison Ingram and four-star guard Isa Silva next season.

At the end of the day, it's also about development Agarwal told The American Bazaar. While playing Division I basketball was a goal of his, the 6'6 wing has his sights set on the NBA in the future.

"I know I'm not an NBA athlete right now, so college at the end of the day is gonna have to take me to that point where I want to be and so the development and how they train, not just team wise, but personally is gonna be huge."




Shanti Bhavan to launch High School Chapter program in the US

Boris, beware the Ides of March!

It is indeed a cause of some concern that some mischievous, anti-India elements in the UK have an unambiguous agenda of pushing their country's relationship with India on a downward spiral. These include Khalistan supporters and Kashmiri activists who have the backing of Pakistan's ISI. A series of unfortunate developments engineered by such elements have been threatening to derail the bilateral relationship.

On the Ides of March (15th March), India's External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar made a strong statement in the Indian Parliament which set the tone for the ensuing period of Indo-UK relations. Jaishankar's statement came after a question about racism in the UK by an MP Ashwini Vaishnaw who alleged that Rashmi Samant, a student from Karnataka and the former president-elect of the Oxford University Student Union, was "cyberbullied to the point that she had to resign (from the post)." Jaishankar said in his reply: "As the land of Mahatma Gandhi, we can never ever turn our eyes away from racism wherever it is. Particularly so when it is in a country where we have such a large diaspora."

Through this statement, the Indian government sent out a message that if the British parliament can debate India's internal affairs, so can the Indian parliament debate the internal affairs of Britain. Thus, the clear message sent by New Delhi to London is that the trend being witnessed in Britain to interfere in India's internal affairs must be brought to an end or else it will adversely affect the growth of bilateral ties.

agenda of pushing their country's relationship with India on a downward spiral. These include Khalistan supporters and Kashmiri activists who have the backing of Pakistan's ISI. A series of unfortunate developments engineered by such elements have been threatening to derail the bilateral relationship.

A quick review of recent events is needed to put matters in the correct perspective. Tension has slowly built up between some British political groups and the Indian Government in regard to the farmers protests in India. When British PM Boris Johnson was slated to come to India in January this year as the Chief Guest for the Republic Day celebrations, more than a hundred members of the British Parliament had signed a letter asking him to raise the concerns of India's protesting farmers in his discussions with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, as also the "brute force" employed against them. However, Johnson had to cancel his visit due to the surge in the Coronavirus cases in the UK.

Later, as a follow up of a petition which was started by a UK Sikh activist Gurch Singh and signed by more than 1 lakh persons, the House of Commons had assigned 90 minutes for a debate on March 8, 2021 on matters relating to the farmers' protests in India. During this debate, several MPs from the Liberal Democrats, Labour Party and the Scottish National Party expressed concern about the safety of the farmers protesting against the agricultural laws on Delhi's borders and the targeting of journalists covering the agitation. They



made adverse comments against India over press freedom, freedom of speech and domestic values.

The Indian High Commission in London issued a strong statement against these British Parliamentarians over their comments. The High Commission said that it would "normally refrain from commenting on an internal discussion involving a small group of Parliamentarians in a limited quorum. However, when aspersions are cast against India by anyone, there's a need to set the record straight."

To further underline India's displeasure, Foreign Secretary Harsh Shringla summoned the British High Commissioner and conveyed strong opposition to the unwarranted and tendentious discussion on India's agricultural reforms in the British Parliament. The Foreign Secretary made it clear that this represented a gross interference in the politics of another democratic country. He advised that the British MPs should refrain from practicing vote bank politics by misrepresenting events, especially in relation to another fellow democracy.

Thus Jaishankar's 'Ides of March' statement in Parliament was a firm signal that the demarche made recently by the Foreign Secretary with the UK high commissioner last week was more than just a passing phenomenon. However, Jaishankar went on to say during the very same statement that "as a friend of the UK, we also have concerns about its reputational impact," adding "What I do want to say is that we have strong ties with the UK (and) we will take

up such matters with great candor when required." The use of the expressions 'a friend of the UK' and 'strong ties with the UK' indicates that having made known his displeasure, he perhaps signaled the Indian Government's willingness to put the relationship back on track.

Notably, within a few hours of making his statement in Parliament yesterday, Minister Jaishankar and Foreign Secretary Harsh Shringla held talks covering bilateral ties and global cooperation with Lord Tariq Ahmad, the visiting UK Minister of State for South Asia. The talks assume a great deal of significance in view of the fact that British Prime Minister Boris Johnson will visit India at the end of next month in what will be his first major international trip after Britain's exit from the European Union and will be part of his efforts to boost the UK's opportunities in the Indo-Pacific region.

It is a truism that in diplomacy, overcoming the main threats to national interests must always override other concerns. India's national interests are threatened by serious challenges such as the ongoing stand-off with China, the unending tension with Pakistan and the Covid-19 pandemic with its resultant slowing-down of the economy. No doubt, at this critical juncture, India can ill-afford a deterioration in its relationship with the UK, but the latter must also realize that the reverse is equally true. Hopefully, the combination of tough posturing and deft diplomacy by India will perhaps be able to put things back on track.

Did monopoly power reduce food prices?

In the past 40 years, average food prices in America have shot up by more than 200%, while the earnings of the bottom 90% have increased by less than 25%.

Joe Maxwell, who leads a campaign group called Family Farm Action, told us about entrenched rural poverty, child hunger, and food-insecure homes. Not what you'd expect to hear about the most powerful nation. Today, rural America feels abandoned, its dignity stripped away. As we drove home, one thing had become clear to us: far from being a panacea, the opening up of US agriculture, the elimination of MSP-like parity schemes, and the rise of contract farming has been a lose-lose proposition for everybody other than Big Ag.

India had better learn from American experience.

When the vast expanse of rural Iowa was carved up for settlers in the 19th century, it was often divided into 160-acre lots. Four farms made a square mile, with a crisscross of dead-straight roads marking the boundaries like a sprawling chess board.

Within each square, generations of families tended pigs and cattle, grew oats and raised children, with the sons most likely to take over the farm. That is how Barb Kalbach saw the future when she left her family's land to marry and begin farming with her new husband, Jim, 47 years ago.

"When we very first were married, we had cattle and calves," she says. "We raised hogs from farrow to finish, and we had corn, beans, hay and oats. So did everyone around us."

Corporate agriculture evolved to take control of the entire production line from "farm to fork", from the genetics of breeding to wholesalers in the US or far east. As factory farms spread, their demands dictated the workings of slaughterhouses. Smaller abattoirs, which offered choice and competitive prices to family farmers, disappeared, to be replaced by huge operations that were further away and imposed lower prices on small-scale breeders such as the Kalbachs.

Half a century later, Kalbach surveys the destruction within the section of chessboard she shared with other farms near Dexter in southwestern Iowa. Barb and Jim are the last family still working the land, after their neighbors were picked off by waves of collapsing commodity prices and the rise of factory farming. With that came a vast transfer in wealth as farm profits funneled into corporations or the diminishing number of families that own an increasing share of the land. Rural communities have been hollowed out.

And while the Kalbachs have hung on to their farm, they long ago abandoned livestock and mixed arable farming for the only thing they can make money at any more - growing corn and soya beans to sell to corporate buyers as feed for animals crammed by the thousands into the huge semi-automated sheds that now dominate farming, and the landscape, in large parts of Iowa.

Kalbach comes from five generations of farmers and suspects she may be the last. As she drives the roads around her farmhouse, she ticks off the disappearances.

"That's the Shoemiths' place," she said. "Two years ago, it had cattle, pigs and pasture."

Now the land is rented out and is all given over to corn. A little further along, the Watts family's farmhouse stands empty, its roof falling in. There are a few relics of the old farm at the place that used to be owned by the Williamses - an abandoned hen house and a bit of machinery - but the land is all corn and soya beans. The Denning house, on Walnut Avenue, was bulldozed after the land was sold and rolled into a bigger operation.

It's a story replicated across America's Midwest, with the rapid expansion of farming methods at the heart of the row over US attempts to erode Britain's food standards and lever open access to the UK market as part of a post-Brexit trade deal. Last weekend, the US ambassador to Britain, Woody Johnson, appealed to the UK to embrace US farming, arguing that those who warned against practices such as washing chicken in chlorine had been "deployed" to cast it "in the worst possible light".

His message was greeted with anger by campaigners. Nick Dearden of Global Justice Now warned: "It is really an animal welfare issue here. If UK farmers want to compete against American imports, they will have to lower their standards or go out of business." His words would come as no surprise to Rosemary Partridge, who farms in Sac County, western Iowa. She grew up on an Iowa family farm and then moved with her husband in the late 1970s to raise pigs and grow crops.

"In the past 20 years, where I am, independent hog farming just silently disappeared as the corporates came in," says Partridge. "I live on a hilltop. I can see seven farm families, people my kids went to school with. They're all gone now. My county has 11 small towns, and it's almost like I could look back in slow motion and just see the businesses change and disappear. We've become poorer. Our communities are basically shattered and in more than just an economic way - in a social way too."

This collapse has in good part been driven by the rise of concentrated animal feeding operations, or Cafos. In these industrial farming units, pigs, cows and chickens are crammed by the thousand into rows of barns. Many units are semi-automated, with feeding run by computer and the animals watched by video, with periodic visits by workers who drive between several operations.

"That's how I end up with 40,000 hogs around me," says Partridge. Cafos account for only a small proportion of America's 2 million farms, but they dominate animal production and have an outsize influence on crop growing, particularly in the Midwest. By one calculation, the US has around 250,000 factory farms of one kind or another. They have their roots in the 1930s, with the mechanization of pig slaughterhouses. By the 1950s, chickens were routinely packed

into huge sheds, in appalling conditions.

In the early 1970s, US agriculture secretary Earl Butz pushed the idea of large-scale farming with the mantra "get big or get out". He wanted to see farmers embrace what he regarded as a more efficient strategy of growing commodity crops, such as corn and soya beans. Some farmers invested heavily in buying land and new machinery to increase production - taking on large amounts of debt to do so.

A decade later, the farm crisis hit as overproduction, the US grain embargo against the Soviet Union and high interest rates dramatically drove up costs and debt for family farms. Land prices collapsed and foreclosures escalated.

"Every blow to independent farming made it more of an opportunity for large corporations to come in," said Partridge.

In 1990, small and medium-sized farms accounted for nearly half of all agricultural production in the US. Now it is less than a quarter.

As the medium-sized family farms retreated, the businesses they helped support disappeared. Local seed and equipment suppliers shut up shop because corporations went straight to wholesalers or manufacturers. Demand for local vets collapsed. As those businesses packed up and left, communities shrank. Shops, restaurants and doctors' surgeries closed. People found they had to drive for an hour or more for medical treatment. Towns and counties began to share ambulances.

Corporate agriculture evolved to take control of the entire production line from "farm to fork", from the genetics of breeding to wholesalers in the US or far east. As factory farms spread, their demands dictated the workings of slaughterhouses. Smaller abattoirs, which offered choice and competitive prices to family farmers, disappeared, to be replaced by huge operations that were further away and imposed lower prices on small-scale breeders such as the Kalbachs.

"By the time you paid to transport them the extra distance, and they were paying you less than they paid the corporations because you weren't bringing the big numbers, there was really no money in it," says Kalbach.

The buying power of the Cafos also helps drive farmers' decisions on which crops to grow. With no livestock, the Kalbachs were forced into growing corn and soya beans to sell to factory farms as animal feed or to corporations for ethanol.

Iowa is not alone. Missouri, to the south, had 23,000 independent pig farmers in 1985. Today it has just over 2,000. The number of independent cattle farms has fallen by 40% over the same period.

Tim Gibbons of Missouri Rural Crisis Center, a support group for family farmers set up during the 1980s farm crisis, says the cycle of economic shocks has blended with government policies to create a "monopolization of the livestock industry, where a few multinational corporations control a vast majority of the livestock".

Gibbons explains: "They are vertically integrated, from animal genetics to grocery store. What they charge isn't based upon what it costs to produce, and it's not based on supply and demand, because they know what they need to make a profit. What they have done, through government support and taxpayer support, is to intentionally overproduce so that the price stays low, sometimes below the cost of production. That kicks their competition out of the market. Then they become the only player in town.

"Over time, it has extracted wealth and power from communities. We can see how that has impacted rural main streets. You can see the boarded-up storefronts. You can see the lack of economic opportunity."

Gibbons says that corporations game the system by obtaining low-interest, federally guaranteed loans to build Cafos that then overproduce. But they know the government will buy up the surplus to stabilize prices.

"The system has been set up for the benefit of the factory farm corporations and their shareholders at the expense of family farmers, the real people, our environment, our food system," he adds.

"The thing that is really pervasive about it is that they control the rules of the game because they control the democratic process. It's a blueprint. We're paying for our own demise.

"It would be a different argument if it was just based upon inevitability or based on competition. But it's not based upon competition: it's based upon squelching competition."

There are about 70 million pigs in the US at any time, most of them destined for the dinner plate. But one in 10 are

breeding sows, and the majority of those are in Cafos. The biggest pig farmer in the country is Virginia-based Smithfield Foods, which has nearly a million sows in the US (and more in Mexico and eastern Europe). Iowa Select Farms has one of the fastest-growing Cafo operations in the country, with 800 farms spread through half of the counties in Iowa.

Yet few of the economic benefits spill down to the communities around them. Workers are often poorly paid; many are bussed in. That they often include immigrants has sharpened the criticism from men like Nick Schutt, who used to work at Iowa Select, driving pigs in livestock trucks and handling sows. He says he earned \$23,000 a year for 12-hour days and no overtime.

"These companies claim they're creating all these jobs, but who's coming? Not people with families who create communities."

Schutt lives in Williams, a small town in central Iowa, which is surrounded by Cafos and currently fighting to keep a big new one out, saying factory farms pollute the environment and depress property values. When the wind blows in the wrong direction, the stench from huge lakes of pig manure wafts across the town.

The high school Nick Schutt attended has closed. His daughter was in the last class to graduate. As Williams declined, the only doctor shut his clinic and left town. Schutt's mother used to own a restaurant: that closed along with the town's three grocery stores.

In Blairsburg, seven miles away, pretty

In 2017, its former owner, Jack DeCoster, went to prison, along with his son Peter, over a 2010 salmonella outbreak that made tens of thousands sick, left some with permanent injuries and prompted the recall of more than half a billion eggs shipped from Iowa factory farms. Quality Egg pleaded guilty to selling eggs with false expiry dates and to bribing an agriculture department inspector to approve the sale.

DeCoster had a long history of paying fines worth millions of dollars for animal cruelty, falsifying records, swindling contractors and polluting - without much impact on the way he did business. He was found to have made immigrant workers, many of them in the US illegally, live and work in squalid and unsafe conditions. The company paid \$1.5m to settle allegations that supervisors at Iowa plants raped female workers.

DeCoster is an extreme case, but around Iowa he's seen as emblematic of how the industry uses its money and influence to impose its will, including changing planning and environmental regulations.

Much of this is the result of agricultural corporations pouring millions into lobbying state governments. But Gibbons says Washington also bears some responsibility. He accuses President Barack Obama's administration of failing to deliver on promised reforms that would have benefited smaller farmers. It is this, he says, that damaged Obama's standing among farmers and drove up their support for Donald Trump.

Barb Kalbach is not optimistic about the future. Her son will not be taking over the farm. She hopes the land will stay in the family for at least another generation, but expects it to be rented out and subsumed into some larger operation.

But Kalbach fears something bigger than the loss of her own farm. Farmers are ageing and their children either have little interest in working the land or cannot afford the sophisticated equipment needed to compete with corporations.

"Investors buy the land, and they have tractors and combines that you can run by computer," she said. "They'll hire somebody to sit in a little office somewhere and run that stuff off the computer and farm the land that way. Now what you've done is you have lost the innate knowledge of how to grow food and raise animals. You've lost a whole generation of it, probably two. Now we are going to rely on a few corporations to decide who is going to eat and who isn't. We're one generation away from that picture right now." In Williams, Schutt says he's seeing a community of owners becoming workers: "It's going to be like Russia with serfs. If you want to work on a farm, you'll have to work for them. We'll give you a job, but you're going to be working on our terms. We control everything. Small farms can't survive."

Kalbach agrees. "I think they're done," she said.

Why I Dare to Dream Big

This week, I began leading the nation's largest public school system. A school system that serves more than 1 million students-including, many years ago, me!

I am both excited and honored to take on this role. Not only because I am a New Yorker born and bred, but because education is in my blood. Both my mom and auntie were teachers and between them have 40 years of changing young people's lives. I became a New York City public school educator because of them, and the amazing teachers I had as a student myself-like Ms. Pearlman, my first grade teacher at P.S. 215, and Mrs. Hulak, Mr. Garrison, and Mr. McCarthy, and my great instructors at Queens Vocational and Technical High School where I studied plumbing.

Over the course of 20 incredible years, I worked as an English teacher, an assistant principal, and then principal. More recently, I served our school communities as a superintendent and Bronx executive superintendent.

But I have to admit, never did I imagine that a youth activist from the Highbridge section of the Bronx would rise to become the first Black woman to serve as Schools Chancellor. This is a milestone, not just for me, but for every child who feels "different" but dares to dream big.

I don't come into this role wearing rose-colored glasses. I know how challenging the last year has been for all of us. I know just how much our

students, families, teachers, school staff, and principals, have sacrificed and suffered. But I also see signs of renewal as more vaccines become available and more sectors of our great city reopen.

I have that same sense of optimism about our schools. As I prepare to welcome our high school students back next week, I want to share my top three priorities for this school year and beyond:

First and foremost, I want to give every student the option to go back into school buildings five days a week starting this fall. I want New Yorkers to know that our buildings are safe and

that our schools are ready. We've put all the recommended safety and health measures in place, and our schools are one of the safest places in the city to be. I hope to see everyone back full-time come September.

Second, I want to make sure that what we teach reflects students' lived experiences, including any trauma related to this past year. We are coming back from the hardest year of our lives.

We want all our students to see themselves in their curriculum, their classrooms, and their schools. We will have social-emotional supports in place as well, not only for our students but also for our staff. We are aware that many people will be returning to schools where they've lost somebody. They may walk past an office that was once occupied by someone else. They may think about a paraprofessional who supported them or a kitchen worker who gave them an extra lunch every day. So, we will have a dual-pronged approach, addressing both academics and social-emotional learning.

Third, I want to take the lessons we learned during the pandemic into the next school year. As an example, the pandemic forced us to harness technology to create a 21st-century learning experience and we've delivered nearly half a million devices into students' hands. At the same time, it showed us that human interaction is critical; nothing replaces the experience between a kid and a teacher in a classroom. So, I want to bring these two worlds together, using technology to

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address students' individual needs-both for those learning full-time in classrooms and those who may wish to continue learning remotely.

To our families, I want to assure you that this will be a collaborative effort, with many opportunities for us to meet and talk. I promise to include your voices and expertise as we finish out this school year and plan for the next.

To our students, as your Chancellor I will continue to dream big on your behalf, and I invite you to dream and achieve alongside me. Lean into your education, dream beyond your wildest imagination-and know that there are no limits, only endless possibilities.

Indian Americans divided, polarization increasing: Survey

The survey - "How Do Indian Americans View India?" - was conducted in collaboration between the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, Johns Hopkins-SAIS and the University of Pennsylvania.

The Indian diaspora in the United States is deeply divided over the direction India is headed, according to a first-of-its-kind survey of Indian Americans that was released early this month.

It also shows that religious polarization is increasing among Indian Americans, one of the authors of the survey told *indica News*.

The survey - "How Do Indian Americans View India?" - was conducted in collaboration between the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, Johns Hopkins-SAIS and the University of Pennsylvania.

It is authored by University of Pennsylvania professor Sumitra Badrinathan, Devesh Kapur of Johns Hopkins-SAIS, and Milan Vaishnav, director and senior fellow, South Asia Program, Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Vaishnav told *indica News* that they fielded a nationwide survey in September 2020 in partnership with YouGov. That survey had three modules: one on US politics, one on Indian domestic affairs, and one on Indian-American social identity and social relations.

"Our plan is to release one report on each," Vaishnav said. "We hope to publish our third and final report of this series in May 2021."

Asked what prompted the survey, Vaishnav said: "There have been surveys of Americans about India

and surveys of Indians about America but there have not been, to our knowledge, surveys of Indian Americans about India.

"Prime Minister Narendra Modi has made outreach to the diaspora a critical element of his foreign policy, but we know very little about how Indian Americans view their ancestral homeland. So that really was the inspiration," he added.

The survey had questions on how Indians in America regard India, how do they remain connected to developments there, what are their attitudes toward Indian politics and changes underway in their ancestral homeland, and what role, if any, do they envision for the US in engaging with India.

Vaishnav said they interviewed 1,200 Indian Americans across the country, ages 18 and older, and wanted to make sure that the sample contained both US citizens and non-citizens given that the latter constitute a significant share of the overall diaspora population.

The survey shows that 44 percent of US-born Indian Americans believe the country is on the wrong track, compared to 36 percent of foreign-born Indian Americans. Roughly 25 percent of respondents expressed no opinion.

However, many Indian Americans hold 'relatively more conservative' views on Indian policies - such as those affecting protection of religious minorities, immigration, and affirmative action.

As an example, 90 percent of respondents supported treating members of all faiths equally. Of these, 60 percent expressed opposition to the 'Muslim travel ban' imposed by Donald Trump but only 49 percent opposed the Indian government's controversial citizenship law.

Similarly, 69 percent supported the idea of more liberal immigration policies in the US and 55 percent supported less stringent policies. However, only 45 percent indicated they were opposed to the controversial all-India National Register of Citizens exercise proposed by the Indian government.

The report shows 18 percent believed government corruption to be India's most pressing challenge, followed by 15 percent who listed the economy as their area of concern. Another 10 percent of respondents cited religious majoritarianism as the country's most important challenge.

Indian Americans are also divided about US action to strengthen India's military as a check against China, which only 7 percent of respondents saw as the top challenge facing the Narendra Modi government today.

In 1977, work began on what is now known as the Eye Foundation of America. With Dr. Raju's guidance, the Eye Foundation of America's work has grown. To date, the Eye Foundation of America has performed over 3 million vision screenings in rural areas of over 30 countries. Through the Eye Foundation of America, over 350,000 sight-saving surgeries have been performed at no cost. 



Vijay Mallya, Nirav Modi, Mehul Choksi coming back to face law, says Sitharaman

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said that fugitive businessmen Vijay Mallya, Nirav Modi and Mehul Choksi are "coming back" to India to face the law.

The government is pursuing extradition of Vijay Mallya and Nirav Modi from the UK while Mehul Choksi is believed to be in Antigua and Barbuda.

"Vijay Mallya, Nirav Modi, Mehul Choksi all of them are coming back to face the law of this land...One after other everybody is coming back to this country to face the law of this country," Ms Sitharaman said while responding to a discussion on Insurance (Amendment) Bill, 2021 in Rajya Sabha.

Vijay Mallya, an accused in bank loan default case of over Rs 9,000 crore involving his defunct Kingfisher Airlines, is in the UK since March 2016. He is on bail on an extradition warrant executed three years ago by Scotland Yard on April 18, 2017.

Nirav Modi and Mehul Choksi, are accused in a scam involving fake guarantees in the name of state-run PNB to secure overseas loans. Both fled India in 2018, before the CBI began probe. Last month, Nirav Modi, the diamond merchant wanted on charges of fraud and money laundering in the estimated \$2-billion Punjab National Bank (PNB) scam case, had lost his legal battle against extradition as a UK judge ruled that he does have a case to answer before the Indian courts.

Stone From Sita Temple in Sri Lanka for Ram Temple in Ayodhya

A stone from Sita Eliya, the place in Sri Lanka where Goddess Sita is believed to have been held as a captive, will be used in the construction of the grand Ram temple in Ayodhya.

The stone is expected to be brought to India by Sri Lankan High Commissioner-designate to India Milinda Moragoda.

Sita Eliya has a temple dedicated to Goddess Sita and is said to mark the place where she was held captive by the demon king Ravana and where she regularly prayed to Lord Rama for her rescue.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi had laid the foundation stone of the grand Ram temple in Ayodhya in August last year.

Ambani security scare: Two cars allegedly used by suspended Mumbai cop Vaze seized

MUMBAI (TIP): The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Thursday, March 18, seized two more luxury cars allegedly used by suspended Mumbai police officer Sachin Vaze, sources said.

A Toyota Land Cruiser Prado was found parked outside Vaze's residence in Saket area of adjoining Thane, an agency official said. A Mercedes car was also seized but it was not clear from where it was picked up.

The total number of vehicles seized has gone up to five, including another Mercedes, a Scorpio and an Innova.

The vehicles were brought to the NIA office at Cumballa Hill on Pedder Road here.

The NIA on Thursday called two policemen, including an aide of Vaze and a senior police inspector, for questioning, sources said.

The NIA arrested Vaze on Saturday night in connection with the security scare outside the south Mumbai residence of industrialist Mukesh Ambani.

Under fire over handling of the bomb scare outside Ambani's house, Maharashtra Government on Wednesday shifted Mumbai Police Commissioner Param Bir Singh to the Home Guard.

Senior IPS officer Hemant Nagrale has replaced Singh as Mumbai police commissioner.

The NIA on Tuesday seized a black Mercedes from the Crawford market area in Mumbai and recovered from it the original number plate of the explosive-laden SUV that was placed outside billionaire Mukesh Ambani's residence 'Antilia' on February 25.

A 27-year-old travel operator said on Wednesday he sold the Mercedes-Benz car in February to a website that deals in

used vehicles. He said he did not know Vaze. Maharashtra Home Minister Anil Deshmukh on Thursday said Singh was transferred after some of his colleagues committed "serious and unforgivable mistakes".

In his first public comments after Singh's transfer, Deshmukh said he was shifted to ensure that the probe into police officer Sachin Vaze episode is conducted "properly and without hindrance".

Deshmukh said the Maharashtra Anti-Terrorism Squad (ATS) and the NIA are conducting the probe into the episode "professionally".

He said that action will be taken against whoever is found guilty in the respective probes by the NIA and ATS.

"This is not an administrative transfer (of Singh).

Some things have come to light through the probes conducted by the NIA

and the ATS," Deshmukh said.

"Some of the colleagues of the (former) Mumbai police chief (Singh) committed some serious mistakes. Those are unforgivable mistakes. Hence, he was transferred. Further action will be taken based on the probe report," he added.

Asked about the BJP and the MNS's allegation that political bosses of the officials are not being acted against, Deshmukh said, "The NIA and ATS are conducting the probe professionally. They will definitely find out whoever is guilty." Vaze was arrested by the NIA on March 13 in the probe into recovery of explosives from the SUV. He was later suspended.

Vaze, an "encounter specialist", has also been facing heat in the murder case of Thane-based businessman Mansukh Hiran, who was in possession of that SUV. Hiran was found dead in a creek in Thane district on March 5.

Foreign tourist arrivals will not revive before 2023: Report

NEW DELHI (TIP): Foreign tourist arrivals in India will not touch pre-Covid-19 pandemic levels before 2023, the Centre for Asia Pacific Aviation (CAPA) has said, citing the International Air Transport Association's (IATA) March survey that found 80% of visitors do not want to travel due to quarantine rules.

CAPA's preliminary forecast indicates that foreign arrivals will grow to just over 18 million by 2030. It said India is highly dependent on long-haul flights for foreign tourist arrivals. CAPA said such flights are expected to recover more slowly than short-and medium-haul travel. It has estimated 72.0% of people will travel by air for visiting friends and relatives as soon as the pandemic has been contained.

CAPA said Covid-19 has peaked in the UK, US, Canada, China, Malaysia, Australia, which are key sources of foreign tourists to India. It added Covid-19 vaccination rollouts are in initial stages worldwide, except the UK (34.3%) and the US (19.7%). Widespread vaccinations are expected by late 2021 in other countries from where a bulk of tourists come to India, it said.

The IATA survey found 56% of potential travellers will postpone their air travel until the economy stabilises, 66% of them feel that quarantine is not necessary for vaccinated passengers and 81% were ready to travel by air if vaccinated. The survey also found 84% of potential tourists will not travel if there is a chance of quarantine.

"The aviation and tourism industries should ensure the highest levels of strategic determination, commitment and coordination to expedite the recovery of India's inbound



tourism," CAPA said in its report. "Although some travel may resume from winter 2021/22, meaningful recovery is unlikely until winter 2022-23 and pre-Covid volumes will probably not be achieved until winter 2023-24." It added India is a long-haul destination from most of its source markets and a large proportion of travellers are from vulnerable older age groups. "[This] will impact the speed of recovery. Protocols related to health and hygiene, and the quality of civil infrastructure will become the new normal and the industry needs to prepare for this reality." Aviation safety consultant Mohan Ranganathan said foreign tourist arrivals will not revive before 2025. "Tourist's traffic will not commence even after the vaccinations are completed until restrictions imposed by the government are lifted," he said.

BJP announces 157 candidates for West Bengal assembly polls, turncoats rewarded

KOLKATA (TIP): The BJP on Thursday, March 18, announced its list of 157 candidates for the last four phases of assembly election in West Bengal, rewarding around 22 turncoats and fielding party heavyweights Mukul Roy and Rahul Sinha.

The candidate list also features 17 Muslim faces, including women.

The party is facing protests and resignations as many of its aspiring old-timers did not find their names in the list of candidates.

Roy's son Subrangshu, a sitting TMC MLA, state BJP Mahila Morcha president Agnimitra Paul, Bengali film personalities Rudranil Ghosh, Srabanti Chattopadhyay and Parno Mitra were among those given tickets by the saffron party.

Roy, BJP national vice-president and former union minister, is back in the electoral fray after a gap of two decades.

He will contest from the Krishnanagar Uttar seat, which is dominated by the Matua community. He had unsuccessfully contested election on a TMC ticket in 2001.

The BJP, which has emerged as the main opposition in the state, has also fielded sports personalities and a scientist for the high stakes battle in the state.

Despite protests over recruits getting more importance than old-timers in the candidates' list, the party gave nominations to 22 turncoats, including several former TMC MLAs like Arindam Bhattacharya who has been fielded in Jagatdal and Jitendra Tiwari in Pandaveswar.

However, in some cases, the saffron party has not



given nominations to turncoats from their home seats to avoid dissent.

The list also has 19 women candidates, which is more than its previous two lists.

The party continued with its strategy of fielding personalities from different walks of life and sitting MPs.

It named folk artiste Ashim Sarkar from Haringhata assembly seat and scientist Gobhardhan Das from Purbasthali Uttar.

It has fielded its former state unit chief Rahul Sinha, who is yet to taste success in any of the elections he has contested so far, from Habra against the state Food Supplies Minister Jyotipriyo Mullick.

The BJP has nominated party MP Jagannath Sarkar for the Santipur seat.

The party has so far announced names of five sitting MPs, including Union minister Babul Supriyo, as its candidates for the state election.

Nitin Gadkari: Will remove all toll booths within a year, take collections via GPS

NEW DELHI (TIP): The government will remove toll booths across the country within a year and carry out collections through GPS imaging on vehicles instead, Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari said Thursday, March 18.

"I want to assure the House that within one year all physical toll booths in the country will be removed. It means that toll collection will happen via GPS. The money will be collected based on GPS imaging (on vehicles)," Gadkari said in the Lok Sabha. His announcement came in response to a question raised by BSP's Danish Ali, who complained about toll booths in Ganamukteshwar in Hapur district. Ali said that instead of the norm of toll booths at 60-km intervals on national highways, his constituency has two booths within 40 km.

Gadkari said: "I know in some places there are too many toll booths. Its wrong and unfair. We have decided to get rid of them."

"There used to be lot of theft in this. Our income from toll tax used to be Rs 24,000 crore per year, but during Covid time, it was Rs 10,000 crore lower. But we have implemented FASTag," he said.

The FASTag system, which facilitates electronic payment of fee at toll plazas, was introduced in 2016.

Gadkari said 93 per cent of existing vehicles pay toll using FASTag, but the remaining section had still not adopted it despite having to pay double toll. "It looks like they don't want to leave a record. Now, I have called a police inquiry."

Priyanka takes dig at BJP leaders over 'ripped jeans' remark

NEW DELHI (TIP): Uttarakhand Chief Minister Tirath Singh Rawat had stirred a controversy on Tuesday when he said that due to a lack of values, young people, including women, follow strange fashion trends these days by wearing jeans ripped at the knees.

Congress leader Alka Lamba also attacked the BJP over the remarks, alleging that many leaders have made similar comments against women in the past, and the country is angry as the latest remarks have come from a Chief Minister.

"The Congress strongly condemns this kind of thinking towards women. We demand that Prime Minister Narendra Modi should ask the Uttarakhand Chief Minister to apologise immediately," she said.

Lamba also warned that if Rawat didn't apologise, the BJP will have to replace him as the women of the country will launch an agitation and expose the BJP leaders and their mindset.

"The Congress feels that the women of the country have complete freedom to eat, wear or speak whatever they want according to the Constitution. They will not tolerate any such remarks," she said.

On Tuesday, Rawat had said, "Showing bare knees by wearing ripped jeans just to look like rich kids is the value given now which is just a race towards westernisation when the western world today are following us. Ripped jeans pave the way for societal breakdown and is a bad example for children."

He had also said that youngsters go to the market to buy ripped jeans, and if they do not find one, they cut their jeans using scissors.

India looks forward to upping ties with US in five areas: Envoy

NEW DELHI (TIP): India looks forward to closely working with the new US administration and other stakeholders around five immediate baskets of cooperation, India's Ambassador to the US Taranjit Singh Sandhu told The Tribune in an interview.

Speaking after the February 18 Quad summit, Sandhu outlined cooperation in healthcare and pharma as the first item on the wish list. This also includes ensuring affordable medicines and vaccines.

Like Covid cooperation, the second area — digital space; information and communication sectors — was also discussed in the Quad under the rubric of emerging technologies. The third is the energy sector, including LNG, renewable and solar, that will help in the fight against climate change. Equally important are advanced partnerships in education and knowledge partnership; and cooperation in strategic and defence areas, including in the Indo-Pacific.

"We look forward to building on the momentum to strengthen our existing partnerships across diverse sectors," he said.

He said industries in both countries were working together to chart out reliable supply chains in next-generation defence technology and to undertake joint R&D, manufacturing, innovation and experimenting in new domains. Both sides can offer a lot to each other in critical and emerging technologies such as AI, big data analytics, robotics, quantum computing, block chain and Internet of things.

"In recent years, we have cemented traditional areas of cooperation, while simultaneously exploring new horizons. Today, there is no area of human activity that the partnership does not touch — from nanotechnology to space and Indo-Pacific to Covid vaccine manufacturing and delivery," he observed. "The visit of US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin to India will enable the two sides to review ongoing cooperation and provide new momentum to our defence ties," he said.

India remained committed to the bilateral trade target of

\$500 billion and hopes to re-engage with the US on trade and tariff issues. "In coming days, once senior officials of the Biden administration take their positions, intensive discussions can be expected on trade issues," he added.

Sandhu was hopeful that the brakes on immigration and easier work visas would also be revisited by the new administration. "We remain engaged on issues related to movement of Indian professionals, who bring in value to the US economy," he said.

There is a strong sense of commitment and determination among the political leadership of both India and the US to take the bilateral strategic partnership to the next level. The Ambassador, however, did not take questions on the farmers' agitation and allegations in New Delhi about the increased activity of US-based Khalistanis. *Source: The Tribune*

The character of a nation is known by its martyrs

India's freedom movement against the British was witness to an overwhelming participation of people throughout the country. From Kashmir to Kanyakumari, Assam to Gujarat, thousands of men and women fought together against atrocities of the British Raj. While many selflessly gave their lives to protect the dignity of their motherland, others got injured and embraced imprisonment. Let us know about a few brave freedom fighters from various parts of colonial India who gave their lives to achieve freedom for their beloved motherland:

Mangal Pandey



Mangal Pandey, (born July 19, 1827, Akbarpur, India—died April 8, 1857, Barrackpore), Indian soldier whose attack on British officers on March 29, 1857, was the first major incident of what came to be known as the Indian, or Sepoy, Mutiny (in India the uprising is often called the First War of Independence or other similar names).

Pandey was born in a town near Faizabad in what is now eastern Uttar Pradesh state in northern India, although some give his birth place as a small village near Lalitpur (in present-day southwestern Uttar Pradesh). He was from a high-caste Brahman landowning family that professed strong Hindu beliefs. Pandey joined the army of the British East India Company in 1849, some accounts suggesting that he was recruited by a brigade that marched past him. He was made a soldier (sepoy) in the 6th Company of the 34th Bengal Native Infantry, which included a large number of Brahmans. Pandey was ambitious and viewed his profession as a sepoy as a stepping-stone to future success.

Pandey's career ambitions, however, came into conflict with his religious beliefs. While he was posted at the garrison in Barrackpore in the mid-1850s, a new Enfield rifle was introduced into India that required a soldier to bite off the ends of greased cartridges in order to load the weapon. A rumour spread that the lubricant used was either cow or pig lard, which was repugnant to Hindus or Muslims, respectively. The belief arose among the sepoys that the British had deliberately used the lard on the cartridges.

There have been various accounts of the events of March 29, 1857. However, the general agreement is that Pandey attempted to incite his fellow sepoys to rise up against their British officers, attacked two of those officers, attempted

to shoot himself after having been restrained, and eventually was overpowered and arrested. Some contemporary reports suggested that he was under the influence of drugs—possibly cannabis or opium—and was not fully aware of his actions. Pandey was soon tried and sentenced to death. His execution (by hanging) was set for April 18, but British authorities, fearing the outbreak of a large-scale revolt if they waited until then, moved the date up to April 8. Resistance to the use of Enfield cartridges later that month in Meerut led to the outbreak of a revolt there in May and the start of the larger insurrection.

In India, Pandey has been remembered as a freedom fighter against British rule. A commemorative postage stamp with his image on it was issued by the Indian government in 1984. In addition, a movie and stage play that depicted his life both appeared in 2005.

Rani Lakshmi Bai

Lakshmi Bai, also spelled Laxmi Bai,



(born c. November 19, 1835, Kashi, India—died June 17, 1858, Kotah-ki-Serai, near Gwalior), rani (queen) of Jhansi and a leader of the Indian Mutiny of 1857–58.

Brought up in the household of the peshwa (ruler) Baji Rao II, Lakshmi Bai had an unusual upbringing for a Brahman girl. Growing up with the boys in the peshwa's court, she was trained in martial arts and became proficient in sword fighting and riding. She married the maharaja of Jhansi, Gangadhar Rao, but was widowed without bearing a surviving heir to the throne. Following established Hindu tradition, just before his death the maharaja adopted a boy as his heir. Lord Dalhousie, the British governor-general of India, refused to recognize the adopted heir and annexed Jhansi in accordance with the doctrine of lapse. An agent of the East India Company was posted in the small

kingdom to look after administrative matters.

The 22-year-old queen refused to cede Jhansi to the British. Shortly after the beginning of the mutiny in 1857, which broke out in Meerut, Lakshmi Bai was proclaimed the regent of Jhansi, and she ruled on behalf of the minor heir. Joining the uprising against the British, she rapidly organized her troops and assumed charge of the rebels in the Bundelkhand region. Mutineers in the neighbouring areas headed toward Jhansi to offer her support.

Under Gen. Hugh Rose, the East India Company's forces had begun their counteroffensive in Bundelkhand by January 1858. Advancing from Mhow, Rose captured Saugor (now Sagar) in February and then turned toward Jhansi in March. The company's forces surrounded the fort of Jhansi, and a fierce battle raged. Offering stiff resistance to the invading forces, Lakshmi Bai did not surrender even after her troops were overwhelmed and the rescuing army of Tantia Tope, another rebel leader, was defeated at the Battle of Betwa. Lakshmi Bai managed to escape from the fort with a small force of palace guards and headed eastward, where other rebels joined her.

Tantia Tope and Lakshmi Bai then mounted a successful assault on the city-fortress of Gwalior. The treasury and the arsenal were seized, and Nana Sahib, a prominent leader, was proclaimed as the peshwa (ruler). After taking Gwalior, Lakshmi Bai marched east to Morar to confront a British counterattack led by Rose. Dressed as a man, she fought a fierce battle and was killed in combat.

Subhas Chandra Bose



Subhas Chandra Bose, byname Netaji (Hindi: "Respected Leader"), (born c. January 23, 1897, Cuttack, Orissa [now

Odisha], India—died August 18, 1945, Taipei, Taiwan?), Indian revolutionary prominent in the independence movement against British rule of India. He also led an Indian national force from abroad against the Western powers during World War II. He was a contemporary of Mohandas K. Gandhi, at times an ally and at other times an adversary. Bose was known in particular for his militant approach to independence and for his push for socialist policies.

The son of a wealthy and prominent Bengali lawyer, Bose studied at Presidency College, Calcutta (Kolkata), from which he was expelled in 1916 for nationalist activities, and the Scottish Churches College (graduating in 1919). He then was sent by his parents to the University of Cambridge in England to prepare for the Indian Civil Service. In 1920 he passed the civil service examination, but in April 1921, after hearing of the nationalist turmoils in India, he resigned his candidacy and hurried back to India. Throughout his career, especially in its early stages, he was supported financially and emotionally by an elder brother, Sarat Chandra Bose (1889–1950), a wealthy Calcutta lawyer and Indian National Congress (also known as the Congress Party) politician.

Bose joined the noncooperation movement started by Mohandas K. Gandhi, who had made the Indian National Congress a powerful nonviolent organization. Bose was advised by Gandhi to work under Chitta Ranjan Das, a politician in Bengal. There Bose became a youth educator, journalist, and commandant of the Bengal Congress volunteers. His activities led to his imprisonment in December 1921. In 1924 he was appointed chief executive officer of the Calcutta Municipal Corporation, with Das as mayor. Bose was soon after deported to Burma (Myanmar) because he was suspected of connections with secret revolutionary movements. Released in 1927, he returned to find Bengal Congress affairs in disarray after the death of Das, and Bose was elected president of the Bengal Congress. Shortly thereafter he and Jawaharlal Nehru became the two general secretaries of the Indian National Congress. Together they represented the more militant, left-wing faction of the party against the more compromising,

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right-wing Gandhian faction.

Vocal support for Gandhi increased within the Indian National Congress, meanwhile, and, in light of this, Gandhi resumed a more commanding role in the party. When the civil disobedience movement was started in 1930, Bose was already in detention for his associations with an underground revolutionary group, the Bengal Volunteers. Nevertheless, he was elected mayor of Calcutta while in prison. Released and then rearrested several times for his suspected role in violent acts, Bose was finally allowed to proceed to Europe after he contracted tuberculosis and was released for ill health. In enforced exile and still ill, he wrote *The Indian Struggle, 1920-1934* and pleaded India's cause with European leaders. He returned from Europe in 1936, was again taken into custody, and was released after a year.

Meanwhile, Bose became increasingly critical of Gandhi's more conservative economics as well as his less confrontational approach toward independence. In 1938 he was elected president of the Indian National Congress and formed a national planning committee, which formulated a policy of broad industrialization. However, this did not harmonize with Gandhian economic thought, which clung to the notion of cottage industries and benefiting from the use of the country's own resources. Bose's vindication came in 1939, when he defeated a Gandhian rival for reelection. Nonetheless, the "rebel president" felt bound to resign because of the lack of Gandhi's support. He founded the Forward Bloc, hoping to rally radical elements, but was again incarcerated in July 1940. His refusal to remain in prison at this critical period of India's history was expressed in a determination to fast to death, which frightened the British government into releasing him. On January 26, 1941, though closely watched, he escaped from his Calcutta residence in disguise and, traveling via Kabul and Moscow, eventually reached Germany in April.

In Nazi Germany Bose came under the tutelage of a newly created Special Bureau for India, guided by Adam von Trott zu Solz. He and other Indians who had gathered in Berlin made regular broadcasts from the German-sponsored Azad Hind Radio beginning in January 1942, speaking in English, Hindi, Bengali, Tamil, Telugu, Gujarati, and Pashto.

A little more than a year after the Japanese invasion of Southeast Asia, Bose left Germany, traveling by German and Japanese submarines and by plane, and arrived in May 1943 in Tokyo. On July 4 he assumed leadership of the Indian Independence Movement in East Asia and proceeded, with Japanese aid and influence, to form a trained army of about 40,000 troops in Japanese-occupied Southeast Asia. On October 21, 1943, Bose proclaimed the establishment of a provisional independent Indian government, and his so-called Indian National Army (Azad Hind Fauj), alongside Japanese troops, advanced to Rangoon (Yangon) and thence overland into India, reaching Indian soil on March 18, 1944, and moving into Kohima and the plains of Imphal. In a stubborn battle, the mixed Indian and Japanese forces, lacking Japanese air support, were defeated and forced to retreat; the Indian National Army nevertheless for some time succeeded in maintaining its identity as a liberation army, based in Burma and then Indochina. With the defeat of Japan, however, Bose's fortunes

ended.

A few days after Japan's announced surrender in August 1945, Bose, fleeing Southeast Asia, reportedly died in a Japanese hospital in Taiwan as a result of burn injuries from a plane crash.

Lala Lajpat Rai



Lala Lajpat Rai, (born 1865, Dhudike, India—died November 17, 1928, Lahore [now in Pakistan]), Indian writer and politician, outspoken in his advocacy of a militant anti-British nationalism in the Indian National Congress (Congress Party) and as a leader of the Hindu supremacy movement.

After studying law at the Government College in Lahore, Lajpat Rai practiced at Hissar and Lahore, where he helped to establish the nationalistic Dayananda Anglo-Vedic School and became a follower of Dayananda Sarasvati, the founder of the conservative Hindu society Arya Samaj ("Society of Aryans"). After joining the Congress Party and taking part in political agitation in the Punjab, Lajpat Rai was deported to Mandalay, Burma (now Myanmar), without trial, in May 1907. In November, however, he was allowed to return when the viceroy, Lord Minto, decided that there was insufficient evidence to hold him for subversion. Lajpat Rai's supporters attempted to secure his election to the presidency of the party session at Surat in December 1907, but elements favouring cooperation with the British refused to accept him, and the party split over the issues.

During World War I, Lajpat Rai lived in the United States, where he founded the Indian Home Rule League of America (1917) in New York City. He returned to India in early 1920, and later that year he led a special session of the Congress Party that launched Mohandas (Mahatma) Gandhi's noncooperation movement. Imprisoned from 1921 to 1923, he was elected to the legislative assembly on his release. In 1928 he introduced the legislative assembly resolution for the boycott of the British Simon Commission on constitutional reform. Shortly thereafter he died, after being attacked by police during a demonstration in Lahore.

Bhagat Singh



Bhagat Singh, (born September 27, 1907, Lyallpur, western Punjab, India [now in Pakistan]—died March 23, 1931, Lahore [now in Pakistan]), revolutionary

hero of the Indian independence movement.

Bhagat Singh attended Dayanand Anglo Vedic High School, which was operated by Arya Samaj (a reform sect of modern Hinduism), and then National College, both located in Lahore. He began to protest British rule in India while still a youth and soon fought for national independence. He also worked as a writer and editor in Amritsar for Punjabi- and Urdu-language newspapers espousing Marxist theories. He is credited with popularizing the catchphrase "Inquilab zindabad" ("Long live the revolution").


In 1928 Bhagat Singh plotted with others to kill the police chief responsible for the death of Indian writer and politician Lala Lajpat Rai, one of the founders of National College, during a silent march opposing the Simon Commission. Instead, in a case of mistaken identity, junior officer J.P. Saunders was killed, and Bhagat Singh had to flee Lahore to escape the death penalty. In 1929 he and an associate lobbed a bomb at the Central Legislative Assembly in Delhi to protest the implementation of the Defence of India Act and then surrendered. He was hanged at the age of 23 for the murder of Saunders.

Sukhdev



Sukhdev Thapar was a senior member of the Hindustan Socialist Republican Association. He participated in several actions alongside Bhagat Singh and Shivaram Rajguru, and was hanged by the British authorities on 23 March 1931 at the age of 23. Sukhdev participated in numerous revolutionary activities such as a prison hunger strike in 1929. He is best known for his assaults in the Lahore Conspiracy Case (1929-30). He is best remembered for his involvement in the assassination of Deputy Superintendent of Police, J. P. Saunders, on 17 December 1928, by Bhagat Singh and Shivaram Rajguru, undertaken in response to the violent death of the veteran leader Lala Lajpat Rai.

Rajguru



Shivaram Hari Rajguru was an Indian revolutionary from Maharashtra, known mainly for his involvement in the

assassination of a British Raj police officer. He also fought for the independence of India and On 23 March 1931 he was hanged by the British government along with Bhagat Singh and Sukhdev Thapar.



Chandra Shekhar Azad

Chandra Shekhar Azad a close associate of Bhagat Singh in the freedom struggle was born in the year 1906. He is the most challenging and fearless Independence Fighters against the British Rulers. He was a part of the Hindustan Republican Association. After a fierce battle with British Soldiers and killing so many enemies he shot himself with a pistol.

Ram Prasad Bismil



Ram Prasad Bismil was a young revolutionary Independence Fighters from India who martyred for his country like Bhagat Singh. He was born in the year 1857 and was a respectable member of the Hindustan Republican Association along with Sukhdev. British government sentenced him to death for involving in the notorious Kakori train robbery.

Bipin Chandra Pal



Bipin Chandra Pal an unforgettable revolutionary was born in the year 1858. Pal was a substantial part of the Indian National Congress and he is the one who encouraged the abandonment of foreign goods. He formed an association with Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Lala Lajpat Rai, and Lal-Pal-Bal trio. All of them together executed many revolutionary activities for the country.

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Chittaranjan Das



Das the founder of the Swaraj Party and a Lawyer by Profession was born in the year 1870. He was popular as Deshbandhu and took an active part in the Indian National Movement. Being a Law Practitioner he successfully defended Aurobindo Ghosh who was charged in a crime by the British. Chittaranjan used to Mentor Subash Chandra Bose.

Abdul Hafiz Barakatullah



Abdul Hafiz Mohamed Barakatullah fought in a unique style for the nation's freedom. He was born in the year 1854 and is also the co-founder of Ghadar Operated overseas from San Francisco. He took Pen as a weapon and published blazing articles in England's leading daily to arose the fire of Independence.

Ashfaqulla Khan



Ashfaqulla Khan the founder of young revolutionary fire sacrificed his life for Mother India like many other leaders in the list. Similar to Bismil and Chandrashekhar he became a prominent member of the Hindustan Republic Association. He carried out the popular train robbery Kakori Khan with the help of his associates. That's the reason British Executed him.

Khudiram Bose



Born on December 3, 1889 in Habibpur of Midnapore district of the then Bengal Presidency, Khudiram Bose lost both his parents, Trailokyanath Bose and Lakshmipriya Devi, when he was just six. Never too fond of studies, he would rather spend his time helping people affected by flood and other calamities. A student of Midnapore Collegiate School, he gave up studies to dedicate his life to revolutionary activities. After dropping out, he became a member of the Revolutionary Party.

In 1905, when Bengal was divided, 'Banga-Bhanga' saw the strongest protests in Midnapore where Khudiram Bose actively participated in burning British products. The British attitude towards peasants, revolutionaries, farmers and other Indians further fuelled his anger.

As a member of the Revolutionary Party, he started distributing pamphlets with Vande Matram written on them. At one of the places where Bose was distributing pamphlets, he apparently slapped a police officer, breaking his nose when he was just 14 years old.

At the age of 16, he had learnt how to make bombs and went about planting bombs near police stations and targeted government officials.

In 1908, he and Prafulla Chaki were assigned to assassinate Muzaffarpur district magistrate Kingsford. Kingsford, before being transferred to Muzaffarpur, was a magistrate in Bengal and his method of torturous punishments against revolutionaries had angered the youngsters of Bengal. It was decided that the two appointed men, Bose and Chaki, would hurl bombs at him in the court but after 10 days of monitoring Kingsford's movements, they realised that hurling bombs in courtroom would injure a large number of innocent civilians. The plan was thereafter changed to assassinate him outside a club which he attended.

On April 30, 1908, Khudiram Bose instructed Chaki to run away and threw the bomb himself on the carriage, in which Kingsford was supposed to be travelling. However, as he had on previous occasions, Kingsford escaped death as the carriage was, instead, carrying the wife and daughter of a barrister named Pringle Kennedy. Bose was arrested from a railway station in Samastipur district, where he had reached walking barefoot for 25 kilometres (16 miles) after bombing the carriage. Later, the station where he was captured was renamed to Khudiram Bose Pusa railway station.

Unlike other parts of India, where revolutionaries could rarely afford a lawyer, educated Bengali lawyers' teams used to represent the revolutionaries of Bengal for free. Khudiram's statement was recorded in English, instead of the language used by Bose, and lawyer Narendra Kumar Basu used this, along with Bose's tender age, to defend him. Bose was too young to know the art of making a bomb, he had argued.

However, the judge received a letter, where it was written that there would be revolutions not only in Bengal but also in Bihar if Bose was not sentenced, or sentenced lightly.

On 13 July 1908, Bose was finally sentenced to death. On being asked by the shocked English judge, as Bose was still smiling after hearing the judgment, whether he understood the

judgment, the young freedom fighter said with a smile on his face, "Yes, I do and my lawyer said that I was too young to make bombs. If you allow me some time before I'm taken away from here, I can teach you the skills of making bombs too."

He was, finally, executed at 4:30 in the morning of August 11, 1908.

Jatindra Nath Das



He was born in Calcutta and when he was in B.A he was arrested for revolutionary activities. Later, he was contacted by other revolutionaries and he agreed to prepare the bomb. He was arrested when police discovered the Saharanpur bomb factory of H.S.R.A and were put in Lahore Jail with Bhagat Singh and Batukeshwar Dutta. He started hunger strike along with Bhagat Singh and other revolutionaries and died on the 63rd day of his hunger strike.

Bhagwati Charan Vohra



He was born in Lahore and he joined H.S.R.A when he met other freedom fighters of India at National College in Lahore. He was a great orator and a campaigner and he prepared the HSRA manifesto that was used to educate people about HSRA and its activity. He rented out a small room in Lahore and used it as his bomb preparation laboratory. The bomb prepared by him was used to blast the train of Viceroy Lord Irwin. He died in Lahore on 28th May 1930 while testing a bomb. It is said that bomb was necessary for the rescue of Bhagat Singh and other revolutionaries. His last words were: "Had this death been late by two days I would have attained more success before dying. Now that desire of mine remained unfulfilled."

Madan Lal Dhingra



Madan Lal was one of the first Indian revolutionaries of the 20th

century. He was studying in England when he carried out the Assassination of William Hutt Curzon Wylie. While studying in England he joined Abhinav Bharat Mandal and became an active member of India House an organization started by Indian in England. On 1st July 1909, during the gathering of the Indian National Association, Dhingra fired five shots at Curzon Wylie and then he didn't try to escape and surrendered. After a trial of 25 days, he was sentenced to death and subsequently hanged on 17th August 1909.

Pratap Singh Baharat

Pratap Singh Baharat was an Indian revolutionary who hailed from Udaipur district of the Indian State of Rajasthan. He was born in the family of freedom fighters and with his uncle, he carried out bombing at viceroy procession (Lord Hardinge) on 3rd December 1912. Later he was caught and trailed under Banaras Conspiracy Case. He was sentenced to 5 years rigorous imprisonment. Inside the jail, he was tortured to reveal the name of his fellow revolutionaries and he refused. He died in Bareilly Central Jail on 7th May 1918.

Bhai Balmukund

Bhai Balmukund was born in Jhelum district, now in Pakistan. He was one of the founding members of the Ghadar Party. He was involved in throwing a bomb at Viceroy Procession in Delhi and killing Europeans by a bomb at Lawrence Garden in Lahore. He was arrested in Jodhpur and after a trial in court, he was sentenced to death. He was hanged in Ambala Central Jail on 11th May 1915.

Rajendra Lahiri

Rajendra was born in Pabna District, now in Bangladesh and while studying in college he joined H.R.A to overthrow British from India by aggressive means. He participated in Dakshineswar Bombing and afterward escaped from the site. He remained underground in Benaras as a student and after joining H.R.A executed famous Kakori Train Conspiracy. After a long trial he was found guilty in both the cases and he was hanged in Gonda district Jail on 17th December 1927.

Udham Singh



Udham Singh was born in Sangrur district of Punjab and he is commonly referred to as Shaheed-i-Azam Sardar Udham Singh. His father and mother died at an early age of 8 and he studied in an orphanage. He was inspired by Bhagat Singh and joined the Gadar Party. He helped Indian Revolutionaries by providing Arms and ammunition for which he was later arrested. He is famous for Assassinating Michael O'Dwyer in England who approved Reginald Dyer's Jallianwala Bagh massacre. He concealed his revolver in a book and entered the hall. When the meeting was over he shot O'Dwyer twice killing him immediately. After assassinating O'Dwyer he didn't try to escape and was arrested.


Lesser known heroes who sacrificed their lives for country's freedom

Bhagat Singh, Azad, Rajguru, Sukhdev, Ram Prasad Bismil, Gandhi, and Bose are few names that are synonymous with our struggle for freedom from the British. We owe our freedom to them.

But apart from these hallowed names, there were thousands of others who too sacrificed their lives on the path of freedom. But unlike these big names, history didn't do justice with them.

Many of them have been forsaken by history and most of us don't even know about them. This is an attempt to give those souls a tribute because their contribution to our freedom is by no means lesser than those who got their due.

Kartar Singh Sarabha




We all love Bhagat Singh, but only a handful know Kartar Singh Sarabha who Bhagat Singh himself considered his guru. Kartar Singh Sarabha was the main architect of the Ghadar revolution which aimed to incite a mutiny in British Indian Army during the thick of World War-I. Sarabha sought to take advantage of the war to uproot the British from India. Born in Ludhiana, Punjab in 1896, Sarabha went to the US for studies and established Ghadar Party in 1913.

In 1913, the party came out with a paper called 'Ghadar' which came out in languages like Pushto, Hindi, Punjabi, Bengali, Urdu, and Gujarati. Sarabha aimed to start a mutiny within British Indian Army and over 20 thousand Ghadar activists travelled to India from different countries of the world put plans in the motion. But the betrayal of an insider resulted in the arrested Sarabha and a few more. After the trial, the 19-year-old, Kartar Singh Sarabha was hanged on November 16, 1915, in Lahore central jail, the same jail where Bhagat Singh, Rajguru and Sukhdev were hanged.

Raja Mahendra Pratap

A royalty of Hathras, Aligarh, Raja Mahendra Pratap was one of the first Marxist revolutionaries in the country. In fact, Pratap was the president



of first President of the Provisional Government of India formed in Afghanistan. In 1906, despite against the wishes of the family, he went to Calcutta to attend the Congress session and met several leaders of the Swadeshi movement.

But soon he realised that Congress won't be able to help his cause of freedom. Therefore, he moved out of India in 1915 and via Switzerland, entered Germany. With help of Indian members of the Berlin Committee, he met Kaiser Wilhelm-II, the German emperor who promised him assistance to invade India via Afghan border. Pratap who had family relations with Jat Sikh states of Jind, Nabha and Patiala wanted to invade India through Afghanistan and later to use these states to crush the British in India.

But with Germany's defeat in WW-I, his dream of invading India didn't materialise. Pratap also tried to connect with Russians after Germans forsake him and his peers. He met Lenin as well. In 1932, Pratap was also nominated Nobel Prize in 1932. N.A. Nilsson, his nominator, said about him- "Pratap gave up his property for educational purposes, and he established a technical college at Brindaban. In 1913 he took part in Gandhi's campaign in South Africa. He travelled around the world to create awareness about the situation in Afghanistan and India. In 1925 he went on a mission to Tibet and met the Dalai Lama. He was primarily on an unofficial economic mission on behalf of Afghanistan, but he also wanted to expose the British brutalities in India. He called himself the servant of the powerless and weak." Today majority of land acquired by Aligarh Muslim University is donated by Pratap and his family.

Alluri Sitarama Raju



Born in a prosperous Kshatriya family in Andhra Pradesh in 1887, Raju left everything for the freedom struggle. In 1922-24, he led a failed yet important 'Rampa Rebellion' with the help of tribals. Raju was referred, "Manyam Veerudu" (Hero of the Jungles) by the local people. He took up the cause of the tribal people in the Agency areas, who were being harassed by British officials under the Forest Act, and led an armed rebellion against the British forces. Raju was trapped and killed by the British in the jungle in 1924.

Tirot Singh



Tirot Singh was one of the chiefs of Khasi people in the early 18th century who fought against the British who tried to take control over the Khasi hills. Though the year of his birth is unknown, Tirot Singh fought the British in 1835 when British tried to acquire Khasi hills to extend their possession on Lower Assam areas.

Actually, the British wanted to construct a road through this area to connect Guwahati with Sylhet to save weeks of travel and malarious country. But Singh and his tribe objected the British occupation of the area and thus British tried to crushed their opposition which resulted in a bloody war between Khasi tribes and the British in which Singh sacrificed his life defending his tribe and land.

Pingali Venkayya



Venkayya was the man who designed the Indian national flag. Before independence, many flags were designed and used by different groups and in this process, Venkayya designed one version of flag for Indian National Congress which later became Indian flag after minor alterations post-Independence.

According to The Hindu, "Pingali Venkayya was an authority in geology,

agriculture and also an educationist who set up an educational institution in Machilipatnam. He, however, died in poverty in 1963 and was largely forgotten by the society and by his own party, the Congress." A postage stamp was issued to commemorate him in 2009 and in 2011 it was proposed that he be posthumously awarded the Bharat Ratna. The outcome of that proposal is, however, not known.

Tanguturi Prakasam



Not many people know about this Andhra Kesari (Lion of Andhra). Prakasam was first the chief minister of Madras presidency and then chief minister in Andhra state. He started as a lawyer but gave up practice in 1921 to participate in the freedom movement. He rose to fame in 1928 during the protest against Simon Commission in Madras. The police had issued orders of shooting people in some areas. But Prakasam didn't fear the orders and faced police by tearing open his shirt and daring police to shoot at him. This lone act of defiance won him the title of Andhra Kesari.

Veerapandiya Kattabomman



Almost 60 years before the rebellion of 1857, Kattabomman rebelled against the British and refused to pay taxes to them. As a chieftain of Palyekar community in the 18th century, Kattabomman waged a war against the British to protect his lands. He too died in the war against the British.

The Trio of Badal, Dinesh and Benoy

Bengal had given many freedom fighters and these three were also from there. They are known for their attack on the Dalhousie Square in Kolkata. Much like Bhagat Singh and his



friends killed Saunders, the trio killed Col NS Simpson Inspector General of Prisons who was known for his atrocities on the prisoners. The trio of Badal Gupta, Dinesh Gupta and Benoy Basu decided not only to kill him, but also to strike fear in the hearts of the British by attacking the secretariat building- the Writers' Building in Dalhousie Square, Kolkata. On 8 December 1930, trio dressed as Europeans went to Writers' building and killed Simpson. None of the three revolutionaries wanted to be nabbed; therefore Badal consumed poison whereas Benoy and Dinesh shot themselves. Badal was taken to hospital where he died on 13 December.

Surya Sen



Surya Sen popularly known as master Da because he was school teacher was a Bengali Indian independence activist. Sen is known for 1930s Chittagong armoury raid. Sen drew his inspiration from nationalist ideals during his college days on 1916 in Behrampore. In 1918, he was selected as the president of INC's Chittagong branch. Later after college, Sen started recruiting young men to fight the British. In the late 1920s, Sen decided to free Chittagong from the British and thus formed a group of revolutionaries who carried out the infamous Chittagong armoury raid. On 18 April, Sen led a group which looted the armoury of the police. Their plan was to seize the arms and destroy the communication system of the city, thereby isolating Chittagong from rest of the British India. The group managed to loot the armoury, but failed to get the ammunition. The group hoisted the Indian National Flag on the premises of the armoury before escaping. But the British captured most of the revolutionaries but Sen in Jalalabad hills. Many died there while fighting the British.

Sen managed to escape and remained absconding for three years before being captured in 1933. Before he was hanged by the British, he was tortured beyond the limit.

Ghadar Movement: The rebels who wrote history

On November 16, 1915, seven patriots were hanged after the culmination of the first Lahore Conspiracy Case. These hangings, however, did not deter the Ghadarites from waging a war against the British.

These included Bakshish Singh, Jagat Singh, Vishnu Ganesh Pingle, Surain Singh s/o Boor Singh, Surain Singh s/o Ishar Singh, Harnam Singh and Kartar Singh Sarabha. These trials were to have an enduring impact on the psyche of Punjab and reverberations on India's history. These hangings by the colonial government were one of the many in order to curb the war declared by the Ghadarites on the colonial government in India in February of 1915.

Events that led to Ghadar

A week after Britain declared war on Germany on August 4, 1914, a clarion call had appeared in Ghadar, a weekly revolutionary newspaper published from San Francisco, summoning its overseas Indian readers to return to their homeland and fight. It said the opportunity to free their country from slavery had arrived.

This was so because Britain was quite vulnerable due to depletion of troops and resources. Also, its arch-enemy Germany was offering support to various revolutionary movements which had the potential of undermining the strength of the Empire. These included the Indian and Irish national revolutionists and the pro-Ottoman pan-Islamists. This was how the Ghadar Movement was launched among the Punjabi migrant workers in North America in 1913. It was characterised by a predominant Punjabi male participation and was a ringing explosion in the ears of the imperial government of the time.

The Ghadar Party was established by the Punjabi Sikhs of the USA and Canada in June 1913 also known as the Hindi Association of the Pacific Coast. The word 'Ghadar' means "mutiny" or "rebellion" or "revolt". On November 1, 1913, the Ghadar Party issued their first newspaper from University of California in Berkeley. This party was originally built around the weekly paper Ghadar. For the first time, a true picture of the British rule was shown in the journal, simultaneously enunciating a vision for the future of India. In fact, the founders envisioned that the Ghadar would do the work of preparing the Indians for revolt until the actual war.

Today, it is important to remember the martyrs and the specific conditions that led the erstwhile loyal 'Sikhs' to turn against their imperial benefactors. At the heart of the movement was the Punjabi farmer-soldier-turned-labourer abroad, driven out by the accretion of economic problems at home.

In the decade before the seeds of this large-scale unrest were sown by the imperial government in Punjab, the agrarian legislation, the colonisation Bill, issues of water rates and enhancement of land revenue had largely contributed to Punjabi men being forced to migrate in search of economic opportunities. At the same time the Indian National Association, the Indian National Congress, the Swadeshi Movement and the activities of Zamindara League (Unionist Party) had contributed to the political awakening of the Punjabis.


The Sikh connection

It is a curious question of history as to how the Sikh community in Punjab which was given the distinction of being a 'martial race' by the British, turned around to demand complete independence and plan a violent stratagem against their benefactors. The spectacular display of material prosperity, the spring of freedom in the steps of white people and the opportunities of economic mobility in the USA and Canada led the pioneer migrants to understand their own depravity induced by slavery to an imperial power. The white Canadians and Americans believed that they belonged to a superior and civilised race whereas Indians and other Asians were considered uncivilised.

During the first decade of the 20th century, 5,000 Indians reached Canada. Out of these more than 90 per cent were Sikhs. The harsh racial differentiation, violent attacks by white labourers and hoodlums led to a feeling of humiliation and shame among these Indian migrants. They believed they were subjected to this treatment because they were citizens of a slave nation. The British at

that time did not want Indians associating or interacting with white people. This led to measures being taken by the Canadian government, then a colony of Britain, discouraging immigration from India. The freedom offered by these countries to the migrants propelled the transition to a demand for a more just social order.

These socio-political conditions led to the birth of the Ghadar Party, a party that gave expression to the evolved understanding of the repercussions of colonial rule in India. Although strict interpretation of its character is difficult without being unfair to its secular participants, numerically the Ghadar was largely a Sikh movement. The Komagata Maru incident was the final spark that ignited an already inflamed Sikh pride. The aftermath of this incident was a burst of revolutionary activity in the migrant Sikhs to redeem themselves from both the shame of allegiance to the British government in 1857 and their own cursed status as a slave nation.

Literary legacy

The Ghadar was no ordinary movement neither in its scope of influence nor its tactics. Maia Ramnath has observed in her book, Haj to Utopia that the Ghadar's printed material served as connective tissue or switching

circuit, capable of linking various elements among the Indian radicals abroad. It also linked Indian radicals to other networks, and also connected pre to post-war revolutionary movements inside the country. This movement in its overall assessment has been termed as a "heroic failure" by Ghadar historian Harish K Puri. Although it largely failed to impact the colonial government in ways its members had originally anticipated, its cultural reach extends to this day.

The literature of Ghadarites was strikingly separate from any talk of fatalism. Instead it spoke to the higher ideal in men while looking at the ultimate fate in its eye. It remains a shiny reminder of the refusal of a population which formed the spine of the military prowess of the colonisers to yield to exploitation, a doomed attempt of unthinkable courage and splendid patriotism. It is a story of our forefathers which merits remembrance and retelling.

The Ghadar Movement was the first Indian movement with truly global linkages that effectively kick-started the movement of immigrants for equal rights and consolidated the integration of migrants into their new nations. It needs to be remembered that the participants being largely Sikh, the ideas of egalitarianism, sacrifice, service and martyrdom formed the bedrock of the political thinking of this and the later resistance movements in the region.

A struggle like Ghadar which failed in its overall objective and did not gain the large-scale support of the citizenry has a tendency to be relegated into historical insignificance. However, this is the exact reason why it must be remembered that not every battle is about victory.

Parallels can be drawn with the widespread desire of today's Punjabi youth for migration abroad. The fact that it speaks volumes about the socio-economic conditions here is not lost to anyone. The demand for fair migratory opportunities is a prominent legacy of the Ghadar.

The rejection of sectarianism, calling out for social justice and demand for a just society, are vestiges of its cultural impact. In line with Kartar Singh Sarabha's daring conviction 'the blood of martyrs never goes waste', the failure of the Ghadar Movement proved to be a landmark in the struggle for freedom. It inspired the likes of Bhagat Singh who considered Kartar Singh Sarabha his role model towards a revolutionary change. It will be right to conclude that the dreams of these primal modern revolutionaries must be remembered on the day of their martyrdom to serve as a light post for the future we aspire to as a society and a country and to forever be grateful.

The saga of Komagata Maru

On May 20, 2016, Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau rendered an apology in Parliament, saying 'More than a century ago, a great injustice took place.'

This was one of the rare occasions when a sitting public official apologised publicly for a controversial historic event. What he was apologising for was the SS Komagata Maru incident of 1914, when a ship laden with Indian immigrants was refused entry at the Canadian ports.

It was a time when Canada's immigration policies were an actively racialised endeavour. The objective of the Canadian government was to attract more British and American immigrants, as well as immigrants from the 'preferred countries' of central and northern Europe. This strict hierarchy continued till the Second World War, with a more inclusive policy only being adopted in the 1960s.

Suffice it to say, Indians and other 'Asians' were on the bottom deck, actively kept out due to Western paranoia about them coming and taking up local jobs and introducing their 'ways of life.'

As per the Canadian government's 1908 Continuous Passage Act, all potential immigrants had to make a continuous journey to Canada, with no stops. A later amendment stated that no immigrant of 'Asiatic' origin would be permitted unless they were in possession of \$200, a significant sum even today.

Canada at the time was actually seeing a period of increased migration from Europe, with its more direct routes. A journey from law. This was, therefore, just another case of 'smart discrimination,' part of a concerted Asian-exclusion policy by the Canadian Government, to keep the 'unwanted' out.

Matters came to a head with the Komagata Maru incident.

The story begins in 1913. Gurdit Singh was a well-to-do Sikh contractor from Amritsar, who had also lived variously in south-east Asia. During a visit to Hong Kong in 1913, he came across a large contingent of Sikhs who were looking to immigrate to the United States or Canada.

The ship set sail from Hong Kong on April 4, 1914, with 165 passengers, and more joining in Shanghai and Yokohama. It left Yokohama on May 3 with 376 passengers and sailed into Burrard Inlet, near Vancouver, on May 23.

The Canadian authorities, however, citing the policy, refused permission to dock and the passengers were detained on board. A two-month stalemate followed, with negotiations, political manoeuvring and talks taking place. Conditions aboard were abysmal for the passengers, with a shortage of food and water.

'Shore' committees were formed to help the passengers with provisions, both food and legal, by Indians in Vancouver. Protest meetings were also held in the city. But on July 23, the ship was forced to turn back, with only 20 people satisfying the authorities to stay back and the rest having their dreams shattered.

The ship's departure, however, was just the beginning of the saga though—the passengers faced the iron fist of the

The Komagata Maru incident involved the Japanese steamship Komagata Maru, on which a group of people from British India attempted to immigrate to Canada in April 1914, but most were denied entry and forced to return to Calcutta, where at least 19 people were killed in a clash with British soldiers.

IN 2017, the Akal Takht, the highest temporal seat of the Sikhs, accorded the status of martyrs upon those killed in Komagata Maru tragedy.

British authorities, to much more violent ends, on the return voyage.

It was the time when the revolutionary Ghadar movement was sweeping across the Indian diaspora in the USA and Canada. The leaders planned to return to India and foment a revolution. Clarion calls were sounded across Indian student societies across the Pacific Coast, including California and Oregon, urging Indians to 'go home'.

The British were not in the dark about what was brewing. They were well-prepared for it, and the passengers of the Komagata Maru had to bear the brunt of the response. They even passed an ordinance restricting the liberties of any Indian returning to the country after September 5, 1914, and the ship's passengers were one of the first to be charged. The SS Komagata Maru arrived at the Budge Budge dock in Calcutta on September 27, only to be welcomed by British gunboats at the entry into the port. The passengers were charged as political agitators who had acted illegally. A riot ensued, as the police stepped in to capture Gurdit Singh and other leaders. In the ruckus, 19 passengers were shot and killed, the rest were incarcerated or kept under house arrest until WWI ended. Gurdit Singh escaped, but eventually gave himself up

and served a ve-year term.

Komagata Maru was an incident that not only shaped Indian immigration but galvanised Indian nationalism, particularly with the Ghadar movement. The confrontation became a rallying point in a diasporic movement for social justice and a springboard for an international, anti-colonial sentiment.

In 1952, the Indian government erected a monument to the martyrs of Komagata Maru at Budge Budge. September 29 is marked as memorial day when Sikhs visit Budge Budge to pay homage.

While remembered as a dark phase in Canadian history, the story still remains largely forgotten in India.

Pak PM Imran Khan receives anti-COVID vaccination; urges nation to implement norms against deadly virus

ISLAMABAD (TIP): Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan on Friday received the first shot of vaccination against COVID-19 and urged the citizens of his country to ensure the full implementation of norms to prevent the surge in cases of coronavirus.

Khan, 67, was vaccinated as part of the nationwide anti-coronavirus vaccination campaign which is underway in its first phase. "Prime Minister Imran Khan was vaccinated today. On the occasion, he appealed to the nation to ensure full implementation of SOPs in view of the third wave of the pandemic," according to a tweet by his office.

The COVID-19 vaccine is being provided to people 60 years of age and above and to front-line health workers.

Pakistan on Thursday also imposed smart lockdowns in areas worst hit by the coronavirus as the country recorded a sharp increase in the positive cases.

All markets, shopping malls, offices, and restaurants will remain closed in the areas of smart lockdown. However, grocery stores, hospitals, pharmacies, bakeries, meat and milk shops will be allowed to remain open.

Punjab province Health Minister Yasmin Rashid said that smart lockdowns are imposed in Gujrat,



Sialkot, and Hafizabad, which will remain in effect till March 30 in Gujrat, March 24 in Sialkot and March 26 in Hafizabad. "We have to save more people from the danger of being infected. The coronavirus is spreading rapidly because of not taking precautions," Rashid said.

Minister for Planning Asad Umar, who is also head of National Command and Control Centre that deals with the

pandemic, warned that stricter restrictions on activities might be enforced if the compliance of standard operating procedures (SOPs) did not improve.

"Sharp spike in covid positivity. Hospital daily admissions & people in critical care rising fast. If sop compliance does not improve, we will be forced to place stronger restrictions on

activities. Please be very very careful," he tweeted.

He also urged the people to remain careful as the new (UK) "strain spreads faster and is more deadly" as compared to the Wuhan variant of the COVID-19 virus.

The fresh measures were taken as Pakistan recorded the highest 3,495 new coronavirus cases in a single-day after three months as the national tally of infections reached 615,810 on Thursday, according to the official data.

It is the highest number of new cases in a day since December 6 last year when 3,795 cases were recorded, according to the ministry of National Health Services reported.

The ministry data shows that 61 people died in the last 24 hours, taking the COVID-19 death toll to 13,717. Another 2,062 patients were in critical conditions.

Meanwhile, 1,634 patients recovered from the deadly disease during the day, taking the total number of recoveries to 577,501. The sharp rise in the coronavirus cases came as the second batch of 500,000 Sinopharm vaccines sent by China reached Pakistan on Wednesday. Pakistan officials last week said that the country was hit by the third wave of the pandemic. PTI

Indonesian girls traumatised by push to wear hijab: HRW report

JAKARTA (TIP): Ifa Hanifah Misbach was 19 when her father died - and her family told her he would not go to heaven because she refused to wear the hijab, a Muslim head covering.

Misbach now works as a psychologist in Bandung, West Java, where she has counselled dozens of Indonesian girls who have been ostracised, bullied and threatened with expulsion from school because they too declined to wear the veil.

"The impact of religious pressures, especially to wear the jilbab, when you're young, makes it feel like you have no breathing room," Misbach said, using the word for hijab more commonly used in Indonesia, in a report by Human Rights Watch.

"I wanted to run away."

The 45-year-old's experience is one of many shared by women and girls in the world's largest Muslim-majority nation, including cases of girls being expelled from school.

Indonesia's ideology enshrines religious diversity and the country has significant Christian, Hindu, Buddhist and other minorities, but religious conservatism and growing intolerance of beliefs other than Islam has been rising over the past two decades. Reuters

Helicopter crash kills 9 Afghan troops in central province

KABUL (TIP): A helicopter crash overnight has taken the lives of at least nine Afghan military personnel in a central province, the defence ministry said Thursday.

In a statement, it said that four crew members of the MI-17 helicopter along with five security personnel were killed in the crash, in the Behsud district of Maidan Wradak province. It gave no further detail except to say that investigations were ongoing.

Separately on Thursday, a bombing killed four state employees commuting in a minibus in the capital Kabul, police said.

Ferdaws Faramarz, spokesman for the Kabul police chief, said a woman was among the dead and nine other people were wounded in the attack in the city's north.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for the Kabul attack, but government employees have been targeted before. On Monday, another bombing on a minibus carrying state workers in Kabul killed three women and a 3-year-old child, and wounded 13 others, according to security officials.

Afghanistan is experiencing a

nationwide spike in bombings, targeted killings and other violence as peace negotiations in Qatar between Taliban insurgents and the Afghan government stall.

The Islamic State group's local affiliate has claimed responsibility for some of the violence, but many attacks go unclaimed, with the Afghan government putting the blame on the Taliban. The insurgents have denied responsibility for most of the attacks.

The attack in Kabul comes on the same day Russia hosts the first of three international conferences aimed at jump-starting the peace process, ahead of a May 1 deadline for the final withdrawal of US and NATO troops from the country.

The Moscow conference is seen as a critical first step toward peace. Key players are attending, including US peace envoy Zalmay Khalilzad, Afghan national security adviser Hamdullah Mohib and Taliban co-founder Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar, who will lead a 10-member delegation. Representatives of Pakistan, Iran, India and China are also participating. AP

Myanmar faces growing isolation as military tightens grip

MYANMAR (TIP): Myanmar faced growing isolation on Thursday with increasingly limited internet services and its last private newspaper ceasing publication as the military built its case against ousted elected leader Aung San Suu Kyi. Nobel peace laureate Suu Kyi was overthrown and detained in a February 1 military coup, triggering mass protests across the country that security forces have struggled to suppress with increasingly violent methods.

The total documented number of people killed in the unrest stood at 217 but the actual toll was probably much higher, the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners activist group said.

Western countries have condemned the coup and called for an end to the violence and for the release of Suu Kyi and others. Asian neighbours have offered to help find a solution, but the military has a long record of shunning outside pressure. Large parts of an economy already reeling from the novel coronavirus have been paralysed by the protests and a parallel civil disobedience campaign of strikes against military rule, while many foreign investors are reassessing plans. Empowered Women Empower Women: CII Hosts Women Leaders in the US-India Corridor to Reflect on International Women's Day 2021

NEW DELHI / NEW YORK (TIP): To commemorate International Women's Day, the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) brought together leaders within the US - India partnership to discuss innovative and empowering solutions to daily challenges women face in the workplace. Countries around the world have rallied for international gender parity with International Women's Day celebrations for over 100 years, highlighting the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. CII's own first female president, Ms Shobana Kamineni, Executive Vice-Chairperson of Apollo Hospitals Enterprise Limited, moderated Monday's panel that reflected the vast diversity of women's experiences from government to the corporate boardroom and even outer space.

CII's "Women Leaders in the US - India Corridor" panel featured remarks from Ms Diane Farrell, Acting Undersecretary of Commerce for International Trade, US Department of Commerce; Dr Swati Mohan, Lead, Guidance and Operations - Mars 2020 Perseverance Mission, JPL, NASA; Ms Bhavani Parameswar, Executive Director and President, Indivate Inc (ITC Group); and Dr Sofia Mumtaz, past Chair, CII - India Business Forum USA and President, Lupin Ltd, who graciously joined together to share their experiences and insights, as well as a few words of advice for women navigating the post-COVID workforce.

Acting Undersecretary Farrell, reflecting on her years of service within the US Government, attributed much of her success to remaining flexible in her career path, staying open to opportunities, and taking risks. She

stressed perseverance and working through emotions to free oneself to try new things and solutions to professional struggles.

Dr Mohan spoke to studying, working, and building a family within a STEM field known for its gender disparity, and how she strives for the elusive "work/life balance." She called for diversity and particularly increasing the representation of women and minorities in every career field and at every level, as all the panelists concurred that women proliferate throughout educational institutions and entry-level positions, but are still largely missing from upper-level, management roles.

From the corporate sector, Ms. Parameswar noted her organization's dedication to mentoring and supporting women throughout their careers, and remarked that in addition to gender constructs, she faced cultural barriers as well when she began working in the US from India. Besides learning about American football to build relationships with her predominately male US colleagues, Ms Parameswar also worked within her company to eliminate the "motherhood penalty" and prevent women who chose to have children from suffering lost wages, equity, and leadership opportunities.

Dr Mumtaz was also quick to point out that gender discrimination is both a US and India issue, citing that for women to succeed in the workplace, they must overcome society's expectations as well as their male peers' prejudices, as being called pejorative names like "aggressive" to family pressures to quit after marriage



The participants

are prolific in both countries. Empowerment, she declared, begins in the home, and young girls have to be taught to see themselves as equal to persist in a world that tells them otherwise.

While all the panelists agreed that things are not as they should be, the general consensus of CII's 2021 Women's Day Panel is that the world is certainly improving in terms of women's access and empowerment within the US - India Corridor. Dr Mohan cited that she was selected to work at NASA by a woman leader whose supervisor was also a woman, and reiterated the imperativeness of supporting and mentoring women particularly within male-dominated career fields. She also noted that her daughters have access to a plethora of resources like STEM camps, classes, etc. that did not exist when she was younger. Dr Mumtaz concurred, praising the positive impact of increasing levels of female education, as well as companies like Lupin that directly focus on encouraging women in the workforce. Ms Parameswar stressed the advantages for companies and countries' overall GDP to increase and retain women workers, noting specifically that continued success depends upon examining policies and how they either effect or enable women to excel in their fields. To conclude, Acting Undersecretary Farrell engendered another cause for hope by suggesting to the panel that the new Biden - Harris Administration in the US is expected to focus more on gender equity for women all around the world.

Katherine Heigl undergoes neck surgery for 'excruciating' herniated disc in her neck


Katherine Heigl has undergone neck surgery after having a herniated disc in her neck.

IRS Pushes Tax Deadline Back by One Month

Filers will have until May 17, the agency said Wednesday, March 17

WASHINGTON (TIP): The Internal Revenue Service will give Americans extra time to file their taxes as a result of the pandemic.

Instead of the usual April 15 deadline, filers will instead have until May 17, the agency said Wednesday, an extension that will ease the burden on filers dealing with the economic upheaval caused by the coronavirus, which has put millions out of work or caused their hours to be cut.

"This continues to be a tough time for many people, and the IRS wants to continue to do everything possible to help taxpayers navigate the unusual circumstances related to the pandemic," said Chuck Rettig, the IRS commissioner.

The one-month delay is not as much

extra time as the IRS offered last year, when the filing deadline was pushed to July 15. But it should make it easier for taxpayers to get a handle on their finances - as well as tax changes that took effect just this month with the signing of the American Rescue Plan.

The new law made the first \$10,200 of unemployment benefits received in 2020 tax-free for people with incomes of less than \$150,000, a significant change for many whose jobs were affected by the pandemic. The IRS said last week that it would provide a worksheet for paper filers and coordinate with tax-software companies. The agency also asked those who were eligible for the tax break but had already filed their 2020 returns not to file an amended return until it had issued

additional guidance.

But Mr. Rettig said taxpayers should not unnecessarily delay filing, especially if they will be receiving money back.

"Filing electronically with direct deposit is the quickest way to get refunds," he said. (Taxpayers who file electronically can generally expect to receive any refund within 21 days.)

The IRS emphasized that the extra time is only for federal returns, not state returns, so taxpayers should check with their state tax agencies about any deadline changes. It also does not apply to estimated tax payments that are due on April 15, which are still due on that day.

Filing quickly also can benefit people whose 2020 income makes them newly eligible for a stimulus payment, or

eligible for a larger one. (The latest stimulus bill includes a provision for the Treasury Department to make supplemental payments by September; if you don't get one by then, you should be able to claim what you're owed when you file your 2021 taxes.)

The IRS is behind in processing nearly 7 million tax returns, slowing refunds as it implements new stimulus

- IRS commissioner says he hopes to clear tax refund backlog by summer
- Lawmakers told him Americans need the refunds as a lifeline during the pandemic.

WASHINGTON (TIP): Nearly 7 million tax filers are in limbo and facing substantial delays in getting refunds so far this tax filing season, as the Internal Revenue Service struggles to keep up with the demands of issuing stimulus checks and implementing myriad tax code changes from coronavirus relief packages, including the one President Biden signed this week.

There are 6.7 million returns that have not yet been processed, more than three times the number in the same period last year, when fewer than 2 million returns faced delayed processing, IRS data shows.

The delays are largely a result of a year's worth of extraordinary stimulus measures that have created more complicated tax returns for millions of Americans. The IRS was already straining to adjust after the December stimulus package. The newest package, the American Rescue Plan, adds even more tasks for the agency, including sending out another round of one-time payments, making changes to tax rules to help unemployed workers and paying out a new child tax benefit.

Many Americans who did not receive the correct stimulus payments in January or last year are filing for additional money now. And some low-income filers are newly eligible for more tax credits than usual. The IRS is having to manually review a lot of these returns, a slow process that is delaying refunds for millions of low-income families, after the agency has faced a decade's worth of budget cuts and staffing losses.

More than 100 people still waiting for the IRS to process their returns shared their stories with The Washington Post. Most filed electronically on Feb. 12, when the IRS opened tax filing season. They were eager to get their refunds and to update their information with the IRS ahead of the \$1,400 stimulus payments going out. But a month later, many of these early filers are still waiting for their returns to be processed - and their refunds to be deposited.

"I'm supposed to get a \$5,600 refund. I absolutely need



that money, and the IRS just won't give me any answers," said Frances Johnson, a single mother in Burlington, Wash., who filed on Feb. 12 and needs the money to repair her car. "When I call, they say I will have to wait until the end of April."

The main two issues to emerge so far this tax filing season are a large number of returns being sent for manual review and the malfunctioning of the popular "Where's My Refund?" tool for weeks. The tool was fixed last weekend, the IRS confirmed, but the processing delays persist.

National Taxpayer Advocate Erin Collins has been urging the IRS to let people know why returns are delayed. She is also concerned that the processing delays could get even worse if millions of people who already filed their taxes have to file amended returns to benefit from the changes Congress just enacted.

For example, unemployed workers could see tax breaks, because Congress agreed to make the first \$10,200 of unemployment benefits received from the government in 2020 nontaxable.

The backlog is severe for any tax return requiring a manual review by an experienced IRS staffer. Amended returns typically require a manual review, and many of the 6.7 million returns that have yet to be processed are also sitting in line for a manual review, according to Collins.

The IRS said that 36 million refunds have gone out so far and that the agency is moving as fast as it can to get stimulus payments out in the coming days, all while

processing more returns.

"While the IRS issues most tax refunds within 21 days of the filing season start, it's possible some refunds may take longer," said IRS spokesman Robert Marvin. "Many factors can affect the timing of your refund after we receive your return. Some tax returns take longer to process than others. For example, returns with an error, incomplete information or those affected by theft or fraud may take longer to process."

Marvin said the IRS would send taxpayers letters if more information is needed to process a return.

Jacob White is one of the frustrated Americans desperate for a refund to arrive, so that he can pay March rent. He and his girlfriend both filed their tax returns on the same day: Feb. 12. Her refund arrived two weeks later. He has not seen his, and the IRS reports that it is still "processing."

An IRS call center agent told White on Wednesday that "over 7 million returns were sent to the Error Resolution System to buy time."

"It's just the wrong time for all of this. People need the money," White said. "My rent and my car payment are due next week, and the electric."

The Error Resolution System is the group involved in the manual review of returns. Most years, it deals mainly with returns that are flagged as potentially fraudulent, but this year millions of returns claiming stimulus money or involving the earned-income tax credit or the child tax credit have also gone to the error department. Most of these filers are low-income families who lost a job or who had a new baby in 2020, and should have received stimulus checks based on those events but did not.

"We had a 2020 baby, and we also had our income drop in 2020, so we claimed that we had missed out on some stimulus," said Caitlyn Primiano, who lives in Syracuse, N.Y., with her husband and five children. "The IRS is telling everyone like me that their returns are in the 'review and errors' department and to expect 10 weeks."

The other problem is that Congress said low-income tax filers could use either 2019 or 2020 income to qualify for the highest possible tax credits for children. IRS systems have struggled to handle two different years of income qualification.

Senators ask Blinken to raise farmers issue, say Indians will determine path ahead on new laws

WASHINGTON (TIP): Observing that it is for the people and the Government of India to determine the path forward on its recently enacted farm laws, two top Democratic senators have urged Secretary of State Antony Blinken to raise the issue of treatment of peaceful farmer protesters and journalists.

In a letter to Blinken, Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Bob Menendez and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer on Thursday urged the Biden administration to further engage with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government over its treatment of farmers in India who have been peacefully demonstrating against the passage of new farm laws.

"India is a long-term strategic partner with deep ties to the United States, thanks to our many shared values and our large and valued Indian American community. In light of these shared values and strong connections, we write with serious concern regarding the response of the Indian government to the farmer protests," Menendez and Schumer wrote in their joint letter to Blinken.

In their letter, released to the press, the two senators urged Blinken to raise the importance of freedom of speech and the right to peaceful protest in conversations with his Indian counterparts and to ensure that State Department officials at all levels do so as well.

After becoming the Secretary of State, Blinken has spoken with External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar multiple times. The



readouts of the phone calls do not indicate that Blinken raised this issue, under pressure from his party men, with Jaishankar. The Biden administration has insisted that the two countries share democratic values.

Schumer and Menendez said the months-long demonstrations have been met with orders from the central government and local authorities to shut off internet access in protest areas, cut off water and electricity supplies for the tens of thousands living in protest camps, and impede the work of journalists reporting on the protests.

"India's people and government will determine the path forward on these laws, and peaceful dialogue and respect for the viewpoints of all peaceful actors should drive that

decision. As the US pursues a more perfect union here at home, including efforts to bolster the rule of law and our democracy, those efforts reinforce the importance of addressing challenges to democracies abroad as well," the Senators wrote.

The letter by Schumer and Menendez comes a day after the latter wrote a similar letter to Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin, who is visiting India this week.

There has been no response from either Austin or Blinken if they plan to raise these issues with their Indian counterparts, especially when the Biden administration is going out of its way in its outreach with the Modi government given the serious challenge it is facing from China.

Tikri farmers shun jab, to be sensitised

JHAJJAR (TIP): Despite the best efforts of the district health authorities, farmers camping at the Tikri-Bahadurgarh border have so far been reluctant to get vaccinated against Covid-19.

For the second consecutive day today, no farmer turned up for vaccination at a booth set up at the protest site. The dismal response has forced the health authorities to plan holding an awareness campaign at Tikri. "We have been contacting farmers for vaccination, but they refuse to take jab. They often claim that the Covid-19 pandemic is nothing but a conspiracy of the Centre to divert the public attention," said an official.

Parminder Singh of Moga claimed no farmer had been infected for three months at the stir site hence there was no need for vaccination.

"The issue will be discussed in the next meeting of the Sanyukt Kisan Morcha to take a final call in this regard," said Purushottam Singh Gill, a senior BKU leader.

Civil Surgeon Dr Sanjay Dahiya said efforts were being made to convince the protesters.

Dr Vinay Deswal, Senior Medical Officer, said health officials had been directed to meet the farmers to motivate them. No one had been vaccinated, he added.

Farmers' protest to continue through harvest season

NEW DELHI (TIP): The farmers protesting at Delhi's borders plan to keep the movement alive during the upcoming harvest season with the help of supporters from other walks of life in an example of building solidarities across professions.

With the harvest season upon them, farmers from Punjab and Haryana are under pressure to return to their fields. But Darshan Pal of the Samyukta Kisan Morcha (SKM) said that various unions and groups had already committed to sending people in batches to occupy the protest sites during this period.

This is just one instance of the broader coalition sought to be built, against not just the three contentious farm laws but also the labour codes and bank privatisation.

It is with this end in view that progressive mass organisations, including trade unions and student associations, participated in a meeting organised by the SKM at the Singhu border on Wednesday to ensure the success of the Bharat Bandh called by farmers on March 26.

The farmers' unions, particularly from Punjab, are up in arms also over a new order from the Food Corporation of India asking peasants to furnish land records for direct transfer of the minimum support price to their bank accounts for the rabi marketing season. The SKM has asked farmers not to provide the documents to the government in a show of non-cooperation.

Insider advises Modi to bring in law on MSP

Satyapal Malik, the Meghalaya governor handpicked by the Narendra Modi dispensation, has pitched for a law on the minimum support price and warned the Centre of consequences if the government tries to suppress the farmers' protest and send them back empty-handed.

Malik's voice holds significance as he belongs to the ruling stable and hails from western Uttar Pradesh, the epicentre of the farm protests along with Punjab and Haryana.

"When I saw what was happening in the matter of farmers, I couldn't stop myself. I spoke and I told both the Prime Minister and home minister that 'One, don't send them back empty-handed because the sardars remember it for 300 years. Second,

don't use force against them'," Malik told a felicitation at a school in Baghpat, western Uttar Pradesh, on Sunday. Malik had studied in the village school.

Malik, who joined the BJP in 2004 after stints in the socialist camp and the Congress, was picked as governor of the erstwhile state of Jammu and Kashmir in August 2018, a move indicative of his proximity to Modi and Shah.

It was during his stint as governor that the Centre decided to revoke the special status of Jammu and Kashmir. Later, he was transferred to Goa and then to Meghalaya.

Malik, who had spoken in favour of the protesting farmers earlier too, said he was "ready to go to any extent" for the farmers since he belonged to a farmer family and knew well the problems they faced.

Malik warned the Centre against committing the mistake of ignoring the farmers and echoed their demand for a law on the minimum support price, underscoring that "Kisan bahut bure haal me hai desh me".

"Make a law on the MSP and the farmers will be ready for other amendments the government wants," he said, urging the Centre not to allow the protest to drag on.



Tanzania's Prez Magufuli dies

NAKURU (KENYA) (TIP): President John Magufuli of Tanzania, a prominent Covid-19 skeptic in Africa whose populist rule often cast his East African country in a harsh international spotlight, has died.

He was 61. Magufuli's death was announced on Wednesday by Vice-President Samia Suluhu, who said the president died of heart failure. "Our beloved president passed on at 6 pm this evening," said Suluhu on national television. "All flags will be flown at half-mast for 14 days. It is sad news. The president has had this illness for the past 10 years." The vice president said that Magufuli died at a hospital in Dar es Salaam, the Indian Ocean port that is Tanzania's largest city. Although the Vice-President said the cause of Magufuli's death was heart failure, opposition politicians had earlier alleged that he had Covid. — AP

China busts \$770 million refined oil smuggling ring in massive swoop

BEIJING (TIP): China foiled criminals seeking to smuggle nearly 1 million tonnes of refined oil worth 5 billion yuan (\$770 million), with officials seizing 11 ships and detaining 171 suspects in a sprawling swoop on Tuesday, customs authorities said.

The operation, which saw customs officers from the port city of Ningbo join forces with local law enforcement and maritime police, spanned eight Chinese regions, including the coastal provinces of Zhejiang, Jiangsu, Shandong and Fujian, the General Administration of Customs said in a statement.

A total of 14 gangs were busted on Tuesday, the agency added. It was not immediately clear if the gangs were trying to smuggle the oil into or out of the country. China is Asia's biggest refiner and consumer of oil products such as gasoline and diesel.

Customs authorities described the swoop as "one of the most extensive operations" to combat refined oil smuggling along China's southeast coast in recent years, in terms of area.

Such smuggling disrupts the retail fuel market, brings serious safety hazards and causes pollution, it said, adding that smuggled refined oil was of inferior quality and had a sulphur content that greatly exceeded stipulated limits. The customs agency said it had launched a coordinated nationwide campaign against refined oil smuggling in August last year, focusing on hotspots like the Pearl River and Yangtze River Deltas and had recorded 170 cases involving products worth 5.4 billion yuan by the end of February. South Africa has world's most dangerous roads: Study

JOHANNESBURG (TIP): South Africa has been ranked as the world's most dangerous country to drive in while India came in at a fourth place, according to a research study undertaken by international driver education company Zutobi.

Among the list of 56 countries in the study, Thailand came in the second position and the US took up the third spot.

The safest roads in the world can be found in Norway, with its Scandinavian neighbour Sweden having the third safest roads while Japan took second place, according to the study.

"We analysed each country on five factors, giving each one a normalised score out of ten for each factor, before taking an average final score across all five factors," Zutobi said.

These factors included estimates on the number of road traffic deaths per 100,000 population; the percentage of car occupants who use a seat-belt when travelling in the front of a vehicle; and



the proportion of road traffic deaths that have been attributed to alcohol consumption over the national legal limit.

These estimates were based on the World Health Organization's Global Health Observatory data repository.

The maximum speed limit on motorway and blood alcohol content restrictions in the various countries were also taken into account.

But Zutobi's findings have been challenged by the Justice Project SA (JPSA), an NGO that aims to improve road traffic laws and their enforcement

in South Africa.

JPSA Chairperson Howard Dembovsky, while agreeing that South Africans tended to be poor drivers, said that Zutobi had used outdated figures in its study.

Dembovsky also queried why South Africa was the only African country on its list.

"So to accuse us of being the worst in the world is a little bit unfair. If you are going to talk about the worst countries in the world, then you need to adopt a balanced approach," Dembovsky said as he commented on poor driving in his country in an interview with radio station Cape Talk.

"(South African drivers) do have a shocking road safety record. As much as I would not place much reliance on that so-called study, there is still plenty of evidence to show that South Africans are dangerous drivers and inconsiderate drivers and have very little regard for the safety of others on our roads," he said. PTI

Actor Johnny Depp seeks appeal in UK wife beater libel case

LONDON (TIP): Hollywood star Johnny Depp will seek permission on Thursday to appeal against his defeat in a London libel case last year over a tabloid article that labelled him a wife beater.

High Court Judge Andrew Nicol ruled last November that Depp had violently assaulted his ex-wife Amber Heard during their tempestuous five-year relationship, at times putting her in fear for her life.

That decision came after three weeks of hearings where the court heard sensational claim and counter-claim from Depp, 57, and Heard, 34, about violent outbursts that each accused the other of committing.

Depp, star of films including 'Pirates of the Caribbean' and 'Edward Scissorhands', had gone to the London court to sue The Sun newspaper and one of its journalists over an article that stated he had been violent towards Heard.

"I have found that the great majority of alleged assaults of Ms Heard by Mr Depp have been proved to the civil standard," said Nicol in his November ruling.

In the aftermath, Depp's lawyers said the ruling was so flawed it would be ridiculous for him not to appeal.

They said it was "troubling" the judge had relied on Heard's testimony while



rejecting the evidence of police officers, her former assistant and other witnesses

which they said had undermined her evidence.

On Thursday, Depp's legal team will apply for permission to appeal, and to rely on further evidence. The hearing, expected to last for about two hours, will be livestreamed on the Court of Appeal's YouTube channel.

Following Nicol's verdict, seen as being highly damaging to his career, Depp was asked to leave the 'Fantastic Beasts' franchise, the movie spin-offs from the 'Harry Potter' books and films.

During the libel trial last summer, Heard said Depp would turn into a jealous alter ego, "the monster", after bingeing on drugs and alcohol and had often threatened to kill her.

Heard detailed 14 occasions of extreme violence when she said the actor choked, punched, slapped, head-butted, throttled and kicked her, with Nicol accepting 12 of these accounts were true, including an assault after her 30th birthday party and another incident which left her with black eyes.

The couple met while making 'The Rum Diary' in 2011 and married four years later, but divorced in 2016.

Depp had told the court he was never violent towards his ex-wife, saying her claims were a hoax and portraying her as a gold-digger. But Nicol rejected his version of events.

Depp has also filed a \$50 million defamation lawsuit against Heard in a Virginia court over an opinion piece she wrote in The Washington Post.

Burglars, thieves, robbers to be fitted with GPS tags in UK

LONDON (TIP): Burglars, thieves and robbers released from prison will be made to wear GPS tags to track their movements in a world-first scheme to crack down on neighbourhood criminals, the UK government announced on March 18.

Under the new rules, such offenders who have served a prison sentence of a year or more will be automatically fitted with a tag on release, allowing their whereabouts to be monitored by GPS satellites 24 hours a day for up to 12 months.

With more than half of those convicted of theft and burglary reoffending within a year and almost 80 per cent of cases resulting in no suspect being identified, the Ministry of Justice said the new scheme will be a vital extra source of intelligence to help police catch these persistent offenders.

"Being burgled or robbed is devastating and I understand how frustrating it is when the perpetrators can't be caught, both for the public and the police," said Kit Malthouse, UK Minister for Crime and Policing.

"Tagging these prolific offenders so we know where they are 24 hours a day should be powerful persuasion to change



their ways and will help police find and charge them if they don't. It's another tool helping probation staff to cut crime and keep the public safe," he said.

Police will be able to work with the Prison and Probation Service staff to investigate whether those on the tags have been in the vicinity of recent burglaries, thefts and robberies.

It is hoped that this would provide the crucial evidence needed to catch the perpetrators.

The intention is the tags will also act as a deterrent, protecting people from further burglaries and thefts and forcing "career criminals" to choose a more honest way of making a living.

The Ministry of Justice said it is hoped this novel approach will reduce the estimated 4.8 billion pounds burden

such crimes place on the taxpayer every year.

"Tagging prolific offenders provides a strong deterrent and means officers will be able to quickly arrest and gather evidence against anyone suspected of being involved in a robbery, burglary or other theft," Deputy Chief Constable Jon Stratford, National Police Chief's Council Electronic Monitoring Lead.

"This scheme will play a part in our overall work to prevent crime and keep our communities safe," he said.

The scheme will initially launch in six England police force areas of Avon and Somerset, Cheshire, Gloucestershire, Gwent, Humberside and West Midlands on April 12 and it is estimated 250 offenders will be tagged in the first six months. It will then be extended to a further 13 areas in September.

Police officers will be able to submit any burglaries, thefts or robberies they are investigating to a dedicated unit overseen by the Prison and Probation Service.

Trained staff will then be able to check the location history of those on tags against the details of the crime, allowing police to either rule out or investigate suspects further. PTI

In landmark ruling, Japan court says not allowing same-sex marriage is 'unconstitutional'

TOKYO (TIP): A Japanese court ruled on March 18 that not allowing same-sex couples to marry is "unconstitutional," setting a precedent in the only G7 nation not to fully recognise same-sex partnership.

The ruling by a district court, the first in Japan on the legality of same-sex marriages, is a major symbolic victory in a country where the constitution still defines marriage as being based on "the mutual consent of both sexes".

While a new law will be needed before same-sex marriages can actually take place -- which could take some time in socially conservative Japan -- LGBT activists celebrated the ruling and said it had the potential to change their lives.

"I'm really happy. Until the ruling was announced, we didn't know this was what we'd get and I'm just overjoyed," said 44-year old Gon Matsunaka, director of activist group Marriage for All Japan and representative at Pride House Tokyo.

"Its value is absolutely measureless."

While Japanese law is relatively liberal by Asian standards, social attitudes have kept the LGBT community largely invisible in the world's third largest economy. Under the current rules, same-sex couples are not allowed to marry, can't inherit their partner's assets -- such as the house they may have shared -- and also have no parental rights over their partners' children. Though partnership certificates issued by individual municipalities help same-sex couples to rent a place together and have hospital visitation rights, they still don't give them the same full legal rights enjoyed by heterosexual couples.

The Sapporo District Court threw out the demand for damages by the six plaintiffs -- two couples of men and one of women -- who had asked that the Japanese government pay 1 million yen (\$9,168.42) each in acknowledgment of the pain they suffered by not being able to legally marry. But the "unconstitutional" ruling was the victory the plaintiffs, their lawyers and activists had been hoping for as a key step forward and one that sets an important precedent.

Similar cases are currently being heard in four other courts around Japan and this ruling may indirectly influence the outcome of those by changing public opinion, Matsunaka added. While homosexual sex has been legal in Japan since 1880, social stigma means many have yet to come out even to their families. Some in the business world say Japanese rules not allowing same-sex marriage hurts the country's competitive advantage, by making it difficult for companies, especially foreign companies, to attract and keep highly-skilled labour in an increasingly international economy. EU sets out virus pass plan to allow free travel by summer

BRUSSELS (TIP): With summer looming and tourism-reliant countries anxiously waiting for the return of a steady influx of tourism income amid the coronavirus pandemic, the European Union's executive body presented a proposal March 18 that would allow European citizens and residents -- vaccinated or not -- to travel freely across the 27-nation region by the summer.

The plan, which will be discussed next week during a summit of EU leaders, foresees the creation of vaccine certificates aimed at facilitating travel from one member state to the other.

The topic has been discussed for weeks and proved to be divisive. The travel industry and southern European countries dependent on tourism like Greece and Spain have been pushing for the quick introduction of the measure, which could help avoid quarantines and testing requirements.

But several member states, including France, argued that it would be premature and discriminatory to introduce such passes since a large majority of EU citizens haven't had access to vaccines so far.

According to data compiled by the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control, less than 5 per cent of European citizens have been fully vaccinated amid delays in deliveries and



production of vaccines. The European Commission, however, remains confident it can achieve its goal that 70 per cent of the EU adult population is vaccinated by the end of the summer.

To secure the adhesion of all member states, the commission proposed that its so-called Digital Green Certificates, which should be free of charge, would be delivered to EU residents who can prove they have been vaccinated, but also to those who tested negative for the virus or have proof they recovered from it.

"Being vaccinated will not be a precondition to travel," the commission said. "All EU citizens have a fundamental right to free movement in the EU and this applies regardless of whether they are vaccinated or not. The Digital Green Certificate will make it easier to exercise that right, also through testing and

recovery certificates."

The commission proposed that all vaccines rubberstamped by the European Medicines Agency should be automatically recognized, but also offered governments the possibility to include vaccines like Russia's Sputnik or China's Sinovac, which haven't received EU market authorisation.

The European Commission guaranteed that "a very high level of data protection will be ensured" and said the certificates will be issued in digital format to be shown either on smartphones or paper.

EU officials also hope that vaccine certificates will convince the member states which have introduced travel restrictions aimed at slowing down the pace of new infections to lift their measures.

The EU's executive arm has previously warned six countries that their travel-limiting measures, which in Belgium go as far as a ban on nonessential trips, could undermine the core EU principle of free travel and damage the single market.

The commission said the certificates should be suspended once the World Health Organization declares the end of the COVID-19 pandemic.

If agreed by the EU leaders, the proposal will need to be approved by EU lawmakers to enter into force. AP

WHO warns against premature easing of curbs

Hans Kluge, the World Health Organization's (WHO) Regional Director for Europe, has warned countries against premature easing of Covid-19 restrictions.

Kluge's warning on Thursday, March 18, came as the region has been witnessing a rise in Covid-19 transmission rates, while its death toll was inching towards the 1 million mark, Xinhua news agency.

Addressing a virtual press conference here, Kluge noted that "while 27 countries are currently in a partial or full nationwide lockdown, 21 are gradually easing restrictive measures".

"Some are doing so based on the assumption that increasing vaccination uptake in countries would immediately lead to an improved epidemiological situation," he said.

"Such assumptions are too early to make."

Kluge stressed that with vaccination coverage in the region ranging from less than 1 per cent to 44 per cent, it is "far too early to demonstrate the effect of vaccines on overall Covid-19 hospitalisation and deaths".

Despite "giant scientific leaps and the introduction of effective tools that give us power over the virus", the WHO official acknowledged that in parts of the region, such as central Europe, the Balkans and the Baltic states, "case incidence, hospitalizations and deaths are now among the highest in the world".

US threatens new sanctions over Nord Stream 2 pipeline

The US government has threatened new sanctions against companies involved in the Nord Stream 2 gas pipeline, urging them to pull out of the German-Russian project.

The US State Department "reiterates its warning that any entity involved in the Nord Stream 2 pipeline risks US sanctions and should immediately abandon work on the pipeline", said Secretary of State Antony Blinken in a statement on Thursday.

He added that the Department is tracking efforts to complete the pipeline and "evaluating information regarding entities that appear to be involved" in the project.

Nord Stream 2 is a "bad deal for Germany, for Ukraine, and for our Central and Eastern European allies and partners", Blinken said.

"As multiple US administrations have made clear, this pipeline is a Russian geopolitical project intended to divide Europe."

Global Covid-19 caseload tops 121.7 mn

In its latest update on Friday, March 19, morning, the University's Center for Systems Science and Engineering (CSSE) revealed that the current global caseload and death toll stood at 121,714,255 and 2,689,898, respectively.

The US is the worst-hit country with the world's highest number of cases and deaths at 29,664,869 and 539,659, respectively, according to the CSSE.


Brazil follows in the second place with 11,780,820 cases and 287,499 fatalities.

The other countries with more than a million confirmed coronavirus cases are India (11,474,605), Russia (4,378,656), the UK (4,294,327), France (4,241,963), Italy (3,306,711), Spain (3,212,332), Turkey (2,950,603), Germany (2,628,629), Colombia (2,319,293), Argentina (2,226,753), Mexico (2,175,462), Poland (1,984,248), Iran (1,778,645), Ukraine (1,553,659), South Africa (1,533,961), Indonesia (1,443,853), Czech Republic (1,439,019), Peru (1,435,598) and the Netherlands (1,196,045), the CSSE figures showed.

In terms of deaths, Mexico comes in the third place with 195,908 fatalities.

Nations with a death toll of over 50,000 are India (159,216), the UK (126,163), Italy (103,855), Russia (92,266), France (91,833), Germany (74,271), Spain (72,910), Colombia (61,636), Iran (61,581), Argentina (54,386) and South Africa (51,724).

India sees sharpest five-day rise in COVID-19 cases in 10 months

NEW DELHI (TIP): In the past five days, India has witnessed its sharpest rise in COVID-19 cases in at least the last 10 months. On Thursday, March 18, the daily cases almost touched 40,000 with 39,670 new infections in the past 24 hours. This was the highest single-day spike in November last year.

In the last five days, the average of daily cases has been growing by more than five per cent. Previously, the daily growth of over five per cent was seen from May 19 to May 22, according to a report in the Times of India.

Maharashtra on Thursday recorded 25,833 new coronavirus cases, the highest one-day spike since last March when the first coronavirus infection was detected. The earlier record was 24,886 cases, reported on September 11 last year.

Additionally, 15 other states and union territories have also reported their highest single-day caseloads since September 2020. Punjab reported 2,387 fresh cases—highest since September 19. Chandigarh also reported its highest tally of cases at 211 since September 25.

Daily cases were up in other states as well, including Gujarat (1,276), Tamil Nadu (989), Madhya Pradesh (917), Haryana (633), Delhi (607), Uttar Pradesh (321), Rajasthan (32), West Bengal (323), Himachal Pradesh (171), Jammu and Kashmir (140), Jharkhand (97), and



Puducherry (81).

COVID-19-related deaths have also seen a surge but not at the same pace as the spurt in cases. India reported more than 150 fatalities for three straight days.

Separately, the total number of COVID-19 vaccine doses administered in

the country has crossed 3.89 crore, according to the Union Health Ministry. So far, 76,19,786 healthcare and 78,11,126 frontline workers got the first dose, while 46,92,962 healthcare and 21,50,198 frontline workers have received the second dose.

Mutton curry

Mutton Curry is lamb cooked with flavourful spices in onion and tomato gravy. Though it is cooked in many delectable versions, Punjabi Mutton Curry is simple and tasty. The whole spices are sauteed in pure ghee or mustard oil and then cooked with onions, ginger garlic and tomato gravy. I prefer to cook it in mustard oil which gives a sharp flavour to this dish. I also prefer to cook my mutton Curry with bones. Since it adds flavour and juice to the Curry. The best meat is of the front leg of the lamb which is tender and juicy. The most asked question is why the mutton remains chewy. If we don't pressure cook it for the required time, it doesn't cook well and becomes chewy. It should be slow cooked for best results. Serve it with jeera rice on a Sunday brunch and delight yourself with this simple and flavourful recipe.



We need

500 gm Mutton with bones, 2 Tbsp fresh Curd, 3 Medium Onions, 2 Medium Tomatoes, 8 Cloves of Garlic, 2" Ginger piece, 2 Green Chillies, 2 Tbsp Kasuri Methi, 1 Tbsp Turmeric, 1 Tbsp Red Chilli Powder, 1 Tbsp Coriander Powder, 1 Tsp Garam Masala, 1 Tsp Kashmiri Red Chilli powder, 2 Bay leaves, 4 Cloves, 2 Green Cardamoms, 1" Cinnamon stick, 1 Black Cardamom, 1 Tbsp Cumin Powder, 1 Tbsp salt or to taste, 5 Tbsp Mustard Oil.

Here we go

- Wash Mutton thoroughly under running water and then put it in a sieve to drain water completely.
- Add fresh curd to the mutton along with ½ Tbsp salt and red chilli powder. Mix well and set aside.
- Grind onion to a fine paste. Also grind ginger, garlic and green chillies separately. Make puree of tomatoes also and set aside.
- In a pressure cooker add mustard oil and heat it till it smokes. Let it cool. When cooled, put it again on flame and add cumin seeds, black & green cardamom, cloves, bay leaves and cinnamon sticks. Saute till cumin seeds splutter.
- Add onion paste to these whole spices and saute till onions turn light brown in colour. Add ginger garlic paste to the onions and saute again till it leaves oil.
- Add tomato puree and ½ tsp salt, turmeric powder, coriander powder, kashmiri Red chilli powder and garam masala powder. Saute till it leaves oil. Add kasuri methi and mix.
- Add marinated mutton to this onion & tomato masala. Saute till it leaves oil and gets aromatic. Mutton juices are also sealed. It will take 5 to 7 minutes. Keep the flame on low during the process.
- Add around 600 ml of water to the mutton and close the lid of the pressure cooker. Keep the flame on high.
- After 1 whistle, turn the flame on low and continue cooking for 15 minutes. Oh, it smells so good. After 15 minutes turn off the flame and let the pressure release on its own. When the pressure is released, open the pressure cooker and serve your mutton Curry with jeera rice or chapati. Enjoy your Sunday Lunch.

Preparation Time : 15 minutes.

Cooking Time : 45 minutes.

Tips: Grind the onions to a fine paste for smooth gravy. Add a little water if required for grinding.

First wash mutton and marinate with curd, red pepper and salt and then start with the gravy preparation as the mutton will get marinated side by side till you prepare the gravy. It will save time.

Always keep the flame on low after the first whistle as the slow cooked mutton is tender and delicious.

The best way to decrease your blood pressure is to eat less salty foods.

Pickles

Pickles are a tasty addition to any cheese platter, burger, or roast chicken dinner. However, these salty treats are off the menu if you have hypertension. As vegetables pickle, they absorb large quantities of salt from their brine. For a healthier alternative, try fresh cucumbers or other raw veggies.

Canned soups

Many people love the convenience of ready-to-eat soups. But if you're watching your blood pressure, leave those cans on the shelf! They contain a significant amount of sodium, which elevates blood pressure. For example, just half a cup of canned chicken noodle soup contains 890 mg of sodium.

Opt for low-sodium versions or, better yet, make your own soup at home. Just remember to leave the salt shaker in the pantry!

Store-bought pasta sauces

You might be surprised to learn that supermarket pasta sauces are genuine salt bombs. Half of the sauce brands tested by Consumer Reports had 400 mg of sodium or more per half-cup.

If you have hypertension, choose low-sodium sauces or whip up your own salt-free version.

Coronavirus infection linked with skin rashes among adults

Skin rashes may be associated with a positive COVID-19 test result among adults, according to a study that could help identify cases missed when relying only on the core symptoms.

Previous studies conducted in hospitals reported that COVID-19 patients showed unusual skin rashes, researchers said.

The latest study, published in the British Journal of Dermatology, analysed information provided by 336,847 individuals who used an app designed to register COVID-19 symptoms.

The researcher also used data from an independent online survey of 11,544 respondents to investigate skin specific symptoms and collect their photographs.

In collaboration with the British Association of Dermatologists, they compiled a catalogue of images of the most common skin manifestations of COVID-19 from 400 individuals.

The researchers found that skin rashes were more common in adults with a positive COVID-19 test result than in those who tested negative.

Among the respondents of the online survey, 17 per cent of SARS-CoV-2-positive cases reported skin rashes as the first presentation, and 21 per cent as the only COVID-19 clinical sign.



"Cutaneous manifestations of COVID-19 are sometimes the first or even the only sign of SARS-CoV-2 infection," said senior study author Mario Falchi, from King's College London in the UK.

"Recognition of such early signs and symptoms of COVID-19 may enable identification of cases missed when relying only on the core symptoms, allowing preventive measures to be put in place to minimise further spreading of the infection," Falchi said.

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Facebook eyes newsletter biz with new publishing platform

After launching Facebook News, the social network now aims to monetise the newsletter business and will soon start testing partnerships with independent writers for its new publishing platform.

According to a report in Axios, the newsletter publishing platform is free-to-use, and will be integrated with Facebook Pages.

The Pages integration will allow writers, journalists and content professionals to publish content outside of text, like live videos and "Stories" status updates.

The platform will also include tools for journalists to build actual websites.

"Facebook plans to build tools within the platform that allow writers to monetise their websites and newsletters with subscriptions, and possibly other forms of revenue down the line," the report mentioned on Tuesday, March 16.

Hackers hit 32 Indian firms via Microsoft email servers

At least 32 Indian organisations have been attacked by hackers who exploited vulnerabilities in unpatched Microsoft business email servers, a new report warned on Monday, adding that the finance and banking institutions have been hit the most in the country.

The finance and banking institutions (28 per cent) in India are followed by government/military organisations (16 per cent), manufacturing (12.5 per cent), insurance/legal (9.5 per cent) and others (34 per cent), according to Check Point Research.

Overall, the hacking attempts on organisations using the services of those unpatched on-premises servers have multiplied by more than six times (or tripled) in the past 72 hours.

The country most attacked was the US (21 per cent of all exploit attempts), followed by The Netherlands (12 per cent) and Turkey (12 per cent), along with India.

The most targeted industry sector has been government/military (27 per cent of all exploit attempts), followed by manufacturing (22 per cent), and then software vendors (9 per cent), the researchers noted.

"A full race has started among hackers and security professionals. Global experts are using massive preventative efforts to combat hackers who are working day-in and day-out to produce an exploit that can successfully leverage the remote code execution vulnerabilities in Microsoft Exchange," said the researchers from the cybersecurity firm.

Mars may be hiding most of its 'missing' water underground: NASA-funded study

Vast amounts of ancient water may have been trapped beneath the surface of Mars, according to a NASA-funded study which challenges the current theory that the Red Planet's water escaped into space.

Evidence found on the surface of Mars suggests that abundant water flowed across Mars billions of years ago, forming pools, lakes, and deep oceans, and where did all that water go has been a matter of investigation.

The new study, published in the journal Science, shows that a significant portion of Mars's water—between 30 and 99 percent—is trapped within minerals in the planet's crust.

The researchers from California Institute of Technology and NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) found that around four billion years ago, Mars was home to enough water to have covered the whole planet in an ocean about 100 to 1,500 metres deep.

However, a billion years later the planet was as dry as it is today.

Previously, scientists seeking to explain what happened to the flowing water on Mars had suggested that it escaped into space due to Mars's low gravity.

Though some water did indeed leave Mars this way, it now appears that such an escape cannot account for most of the water loss, the researchers said.

"Atmospheric escape doesn't fully explain the data that we have for how much water actually once existed on Mars," said Caltech PhD candidate Eva Scheller, lead author of a paper on the research.

The team studied the quantity of water on Mars over time in all its forms—vapour, liquid and ice—and the chemical composition of the planet's current atmosphere and crust.

They did so through the analysis of meteorites as well as using data provided by Mars rovers and orbiters, looking in particular at the ratio of deuterium to hydrogen.

Water is made up of hydrogen and oxygen: H₂O. Not all



hydrogen atoms are created equal, however. There are two stable isotopes of hydrogen—deuterium to hydrogen.

The lighter-weight hydrogen has an easier time escaping the planet's gravity into space than its heavier counterpart, according to the researchers.

Because of this, the escape of a planet's water via the upper atmosphere would leave a telltale signature on the ratio of deuterium to hydrogen in the planet's atmosphere, and there would be an outsized portion of deuterium left behind, they said.

Instagram's new feature will protect kids, teens from creepy adults

Facebook-owned photo-sharing platform Instagram has announced new safety measures for teenagers, in a progression of endeavours to guard youngsters on its application.

As per Mashable, Facebook recognises that asking clients for their birthday won't prevent them from lying about their age, so the organisation said it is dealing with new man-made consciousness and AI advancements to attempt to comprehend the genuine age of its clients. This will likewise keep on working when clients are joined, helping the stage tailor the experience for more youthful clients.

Instagram is making genuine strides in shielding youngsters from conceivably risky grown-ups on the stage. One new element is that the grown-ups won't send direct messages to clients younger than 18 who don't follow them.

Mashable revealed, if the two clients are associated, Instagram will in any case caution the youngster about dubious conduct on the grown-up's part.



2nd-Gen Google Nest Hub to sense your sleep patterns

Google has introduced a new feature called Sleep Sensing on the second-gen Nest Hub which is an opt-in feature to help you understand and improve your sleep.

Available as a free preview until next year Sleep Sensing uses Motion Sense (powered by Soli low-energy radar technology) to analyse how the person closest to the display is sleeping, based on their movement and breathing - all without a camera or wearable.

Sleep Sensing can also detect sleep disturbances like coughing and snoring or the light and temperature changes in the room with Nest Hub's built-in microphones and ambient light and temperature sensors, Google said in a statement on Tuesday.

"We'll also be looking for ways to work with Fitbit's sleep-tracking features in the future," said Ashton Udall, Product Manager, Google Nest.

Sleep Sensing can also connect to your Google Fit app on Android and iOS devices, so you can see your sleep summary alongside your other health and wellness information.

Rajya Sabha clears Bill to raise FDI in insurance sector to 74%

Rajya Sabha on Thursday, March 18, passed the Insurance (Amendment) Bill, 2021 that seeks to raise the FDI in insurance sector to 74 per cent from the current 49 per cent, despite opposition push to refer the Bill to a standing committee.

"The FDI policy is brought in only to supplement domestic capital. This will only supplement what is available in the country because what is now available is not sufficient," Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman told the House.

Responding to the opposition's criticism against the amendment, Sitharaman said the law has "enough safeguards" built in.

"Under the new structure, the majority of directors on the board and key management persons would have to be resident Indians, which will make them accountable under the Indian law. At least half of directors are to be independent directors which also ensures accountability," she said.

On the criticism that the move might dilute reservation in state insurance players, the minister said the Narendra Modi government is committed to the protection of the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Backward Classes.

"All the places connected with Dr BR Ambedkar have been protected by the Modi government. This shows that the government is committed to the SC community and that the reservation policy will not be changed," she said.

During the discussion earlier, Leader of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge said the Bill will put people in trouble.

Oil slump deepens as Europe faces pandemic lockdowns

Oil prices fell on Friday, extending losses for a sixth day as a new wave of COVID-19 infections wash across Europe, spurring new lockdowns and dampening hopes for a recovery in demand for fuels anytime soon.

Prices plunged the most on Thursday since last summer, leaving oil down nearly 10 percent this week with the reality that the pandemic is abiding, even if infections have plummeted in the US, the worst-hit country and biggest crude consumer.

US crude fell below \$60 again and was trading at \$59.97 a barrel by 0115 GMT. Brent crude was off by 1 cent at \$63.27.

Several large European countries have reimposed lockdowns as new infections increase again, while vaccination programs slow because of concerns about side effects of the AstraZeneca vaccine, which was being widely distributed in Europe.

"Demand concerns linked to a bumpy vaccine roll-out in Europe and other parts of the world" are hitting prices, said Vivek Dhar, director, mining and energy commodities research, at Commonwealth Bank of Australia. Rising infections in Brazil were also weighing on the market, he said.

Germany, France and other countries have since announced the resumption of inoculations after regulators

declared the AstraZeneca vaccine safe, but the programme halt has made it harder to overcome resistance to vaccines among some of the population.

Rising COVID-19 cases, particularly in Brazil, also weighed on the demand outlook, and a stronger US dollar pressured oil prices.

Supplies of oil are plentiful as well, with Saudi Arabia's crude exports increasing in

January for a seventh straight month to the highest since April 2020, according to the Joint Organisations Data Initiative website on Thursday.

Shipments from the world's biggest oil exporter increased to 6.582 million barrels per day in January from 6.495 million the previous month.

In the US, crude inventories increased for a fifth week last week, according to official figures released on Wednesday.

Tesla to miss out on UK subsidy as government lowers price cap

Tesla Inc. customers in the UK will have to pay more for Model 3s after the country lowered a cap determining which electric vehicles qualify for subsidies.

UK transport authorities on Thursday cut a purchasing bonus for electric cars, vans and trucks to 2,500 pounds (\$3,491) from 3,000 pounds, and lowered the price of models qualifying to less than 35,000 pounds. While the previous ceiling of less than 50,000 pounds meant most Model 3 variants got the aid, none will qualify under the new rule.

The UK government has been under pressure to plug a hole in the country's finances left by the pandemic. It argues that buyers of higher-priced EVs can afford to make the switch from combustion-engine cars even without the aid, and that the number of battery-powered models costing less than 35,000 pounds has increased almost 50% since 2019.

The auto industry balked at the decision, saying the cut to subsidies is the wrong move as registrations continue to plunge amid shuttered showrooms and economic damage caused by the virus. The European industry's trade group this week reported the worst February for new-car registrations since 2013, with the UK auto market shrinking 36%.

Adani Green ties up \$1.3 billion from a dozen banks

NEW DELHI (TIP): A dozen global banks are to bankroll Adani Green Energy Ltd's under-construction renewable power projects with a \$1.35 billion revolving credit line, the company said on Friday, March 19.

The finance facility would initially fund a 1.69 GW (gigawatt) hybrid portfolio of solar and wind power projects through four SPVs (special purpose vehicles) in Rajasthan.

The company claimed this as the first 'certified green hybrid' project loan in India. The liquidity will boost the company's efforts to raise its capacity to 25 GW from a little over 3 GW at present over the next four years.

But the company still faces the challenge of finding buyers for an 8 GW manufacturing-linked renewable project it won last year with tariffs higher than current market trends. The project is to be set up in four phases of 2 GW each.

The dozen lenders include Standard Chartered Plc, Sumitomo Mitsui Banking Corp and Barclays.



Delhi HC restrains Future Group from going ahead with RIL deal

New Delhi (TIP): The Delhi High Court on Thursday, March 18, upheld the Singapore's Emergency Arbitrator's (EA) order restraining Future Retail Ltd (FRL) from going ahead with its Rs 24,713-crore deal with Reliance Retail to sell its business, which was objected to by US-based e-commerce giant Amazon.

Justice JR Midha directed Kishore Biyani-led FRL not to take further action on the deal and held that the group wilfully violated Singapore Arbitrator's order.

The high court directed the Future Group and its directors to deposit Rs 20 lakh cost in Prime Minister's Relief Fund for providing Covid vaccines to senior citizens of Below Poverty Line (BPL) category.

The court directed the presence of Biyani and others before it on April 28 as also attachment of their properties.

The high court asked them to show cause as to why they be not detained for three months under civil prison for



violating emergency arbitrator's order.

The high court's order came on Amazon's plea seeking direction to order enforcement of the award by Singapore's EA on October 25, 2020, restraining FRL from going ahead with its Rs 24,713-crore deal with Reliance Retail.

Amazon, in its interim plea, has sought to restrain FRL from taking any steps to complete the transaction with entities that are a part of the Mukesh Dhirubhai Ambani (MDA) Group.

Indian American Frontline Healthcare Workers Protest Outside US Capitol over Green Cards Backlog

WASHINGTON (TIP): A group of Indian-American frontline healthcare workers languishing in the Green Card backlog held a demonstration in front of the US Capitol urging lawmakers and the Biden administration to end the per capita country-specific quota.

A Green Card, known officially as a Permanent Resident Card, is a document issued to immigrants to the US as evidence that the bearer has been granted the privilege of residing permanently in the country.

Indian IT professionals, most of whom are highly skilled and come to the US mainly on the H-1B work visas, are the worst sufferers of the current immigration system which imposes a seven per cent per country quota on allotment of the coveted Green Card or permanent legal residency.

We are frontline COVID warriors, and we are here to tell how we have been shortchanged into a life of perpetual indentured servitude. Each of us has a story. We are here from all over the country asking for justice. Justice that has precluded us for decades now, Dr Raj Karnatak, an infectious disease and critical care physician and Dr Pranav Singh, a pulmonary and critical care physician, said.

Most of us are from India. We trained in the US and took oath as physicians to serve the sick and needy. Most of us are serving the rural and underserved areas. We are in a Green Card backlog due to archaic country caps that allow no country to get more than seven percent of employment-based green cards, said the two Indian American doctors' organizers of the peaceful protest said in a joint statement.

According to them, due to decades of backlog, many high-skilled immigrants are not able to change jobs due to fear of losing the spot in the Green Card line and are indentured to one employer.

Can only work in the specialty occupation the visa is allotted for decades. Many healthcare workers could not serve in COVID-19 hot spots as the visas are tied to the

job and employer, they said.

The small group of protestors said that President Joe Biden can direct United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to end the Green Card backlog for the frontline healthcare workers by utilizing the unused green cards in the past years.

There was an HR 1044 fairness bill that was passed in the House of Representatives by 365 votes in 2019 and its senate equivalent S386 passed the Senate in 2020.

Now it is back to House as a modified version. Representative Zoe Lofgren, initial co-sponsor of the bill HR 1044 has not shown any interest in bringing the bill to vote as a bipartisan solution to end the suffering of skilled professionals including frontline healthcare workers, they alleged.

Dr Karnatak and Dr Singh said that India is a land of more than a billion people, but the number of green cards India gets is the same as a country as small as Iceland.

Indian high-skilled workers are brought into the US on an H-1B visa. There is no country cap on the H-1B visa and due to its sheer population; Indians make 60 per cent of the H-1B workforce.

The H-1B visa, the most sought after among Indian IT professionals, is a non-immigrant visa that allows US companies to employ foreign workers in specialty occupations that require theoretical or technical expertise. The technology companies depend on it to hire tens of thousands of employees each year from countries like India and China.

The discrepancy in the number of H-1B hired from India and a small number of green cards allotted to India creates an inhumane Green Card backlog.

Green Card backlog is adversely affecting the professional and personal lives of high-skilled immigrants from India including the frontline healthcare workers, they said.

Frontline healthcare workers need immediate relief, they are suffering for a very long time. As frontline healthcare workers who are risking their lives in this pandemic, the least we deserve is a certainty. A certainty that if we die or get disabled, our children and spouses won't be kicked out of the country, said the joint statement on behalf of the protestors.

Last month, President Biden revoked a policy issued by his predecessor during the pandemic that blocked many Green Card applicants from entering the US.

Reopening the country to people seeking green cards, or legal permanent residence, Biden in his proclamation said that the policy of former president Donald Trump does not advance the interests of the country.

To the contrary, it harms the United States, including by preventing certain family members of United States citizens and lawful permanent residents from joining their families here, he said.

The US is currently facing a backlog of nearly 473,000 qualified family-based Green Card requests.

As a result of Trump's ban on issuing green cards, as many as 120,000 family-based preference visas were lost. But this came as a big boon for issuing employment-based green cards, mainly those on H-1B visas.

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

House passes bill to give Dreamers and other undocumented immigrants a path to citizenship

permanent legal pathway for roughly 2.5 million undocumented immigrants, including those brought to the United States as children - known as Dreamers - and those granted Temporary Protected Status for humanitarian reasons.

They were expected to approve a second measure later, with more bipartisan backing, that would grant legal status to close to a million farmworkers and their families while updating a key agricultural visa program.

The votes were significant milestones for the Dreamers and other activists who have waged a decade-long campaign, often at great personal risk, to bring the 11 million undocumented immigrants living in the United States without permanent legal status out of the shadows. Dreamers, those who have T.P.S. and agricultural workers have in many cases lived in the United States for long periods, and measures to normalize their status have broad public support.

In moving swiftly to consider both bills, House leaders wagered that singling out relatively narrow but publicly popular immigration fixes could shake up a deadlocked policy debate after years of failed attempts at more comprehensive immigration legislation, and deliver for a key constituency.

"This House has another chance to pass H.R. 6 and once and for all end the fear and uncertainty that have

plagued the life of America's Dreamers, who have become an integral part of the fabric of American society," Representative Lucille Roybal-Allard, Democrat of California and an author of the Dreamer bill, said during a hard-fought debate inside the Capitol. "It is an issue about who we are as Americans."

But after colliding with a wave of hardened Republican opposition in the House, the bills face steep odds in the evenly divided Senate. While some Republicans there have pledged support for Dreamers in the past, their party is increasingly uniting behind a hardline strategy to block any new immigration law as it seeks to use the worsening situation at the border as a political cudgel against Mr. Biden and Democrats.

"There is no pathway for anything right now," Senator Lindsey Graham, Republican of South Carolina and a key player in past bipartisan immigration pushes, said this week.

That means the immigration measures will join a growing pile of liberal agenda items, as well as broadly supported measures on pressing national challenges, that have passed the House but are destined to languish or die because of Republican opposition in the Senate. They include a landmark expansion of voting rights, new gun control measures, the most significant pro-labor legislation in decades and the Equality Act for L.G.B.T.Q. people.

Democrats in favor of eliminating or altering the filibuster believe the accumulating pressure could help break the dam in the months ahead, allowing them to change Senate rules to do away with the 60-vote requirement and let legislation pass with a simple majority. (Agencies)

Facebook sees computing's future on your wrist

They're doing it by putting a band on your wrist that reads nerve impulses sent by your brain to your hand.

The big picture: Tech insiders widely expect the next generation of computing after the smartphone will be built around some combination of glasses, headphones and other worn devices. The challenge is figuring out how users navigate information and make choices in such a world.

What's new: By picking up brain signals, Facebook's futuristic wristband can interpret small finger-motions as, for instance, typing on an invisible keyboard or clicking on a button that isn't there.

This "intelligent click" will be paired with images you'll likely see via augmented-reality glasses - so that the menu items you're selecting, for instance, might appear to be hanging in the air around you.

The whole system is stage-managed by predictive AI programs that work to understand where you are and what you might need. When you step into the kitchen, for instance, you might see a recipe.

The goal is to give users "exactly the right interaction at the right time," says Tanya Jonker - one of a crew of Facebook Reality Labs researchers who demoed the new technology for reporters this week.

The science behind Facebook's new vision for the human-computer interface - electromyography, or EMG - can read nerve signals in muscles anywhere in the body. But Facebook researchers said the wrist is the ideal spot to apply it.

The brain devotes lots of neurons to fine control of hand motion, providing plenty of information for the devices to read.

Also, people are already used to wearing stuff on their wrists.

"Brain-computer interfaces" is a field Facebook has been talking about and investing in for years now, but the company is emphasizing that we won't get our hands on this technology for some time.

Sean Keller, Facebook Reality Labs director of research, said Facebook was unveiling details of this work early because it knows there are pitfalls and hopes to steer around them with input from outside the company. "We want to open up an important discussion with the public about how to build this technology responsibly," he said.

Likely trouble spots:

The more "context" your device knows, the more data it has on you, and Facebook has a long record of playing fast and loose with user information.

Researchers say they know they've entered a potential minefield. "Building a new platform allows us to build security, privacy and safety in from the very start," said Facebook CTO Mike Schroepfer.

Facebook is all about connecting people. But the examples the researchers discussed, where lone users are cooking a recipe or choosing music to play, are far simpler than interactions between people using these tools, where the potential for privacy problems multiply.

Facebook makes money by selling ads, and the "all around you" interface it's building could easily become overloaded with commercial come-ons.

Of note: The Facebook team nodded to the scope of their ambition by showing a still from Douglas Engelbart's celebrated 1968 "mother of all demos."

That event introduced the mouse and many other foundations of the graphical computer interfaces we use today.

Facebook wants to invent the pieces for what comes after that.



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Indian Americans divided, polarization increasing: Survey

Only 53 percent of foreign-born respondents and 38 percent of US-born respondents supported that move, with the rest either in disagreement or expressing no opinion.

The division over support for the US strengthening India's military also plays out politically - 69 percent of Indian Americans who identify as Republican support this, as compared to only 41 percent of Democrats; they are also more likely to say they do not want the US to provoke China.

Despite their misgivings about where India was headed, 49 percent of the respondents gave a thumbs-up to Modi's performance as prime minister. The survey said that 32 percent disapproved of him, while the rest said they had no opinion.

Asked what surprised him in the outcome of the

survey, Vaishnav said: "A few things surprised us. First, 30 percent of Indian Americans favor the BJP while just 12 percent support the Congress party."

He also said that 40 percent do not espouse a partisan identity when it comes to Indian politics.

"We were especially struck by how low the Congress party number was. Rahul Gandhi and the Congress party rate very poorly compared to Modi, the BJP, and even the RSS. Second, we were also surprised at the mixed views on India's trajectory," Vaishnav said.

"Respondents were nearly evenly split as to whether India is currently on the right track or headed down the wrong track. This is not the picture one gets from most media narratives."

He also said: "I think we are seeing really striking evidence of polarization within the community, especially on religious grounds."

"On a number of issues, Hindus and non-Hindus hold pretty diverging views on politics, especially back in India," Vaishnav said.

"The polarization we view in India is clearly seeping into the diaspora as well. This means a more fragmented, heterogeneous community going forward."

This summer, head to secluded beaches

As Summer begins to kick beautiful Spring out of the calendar, it is time to head to the water. To gambol, to picnic, to tan, and to slough off everyday malice. But wait, between Summer and water lie the essential SOPs -social distancing and away from the maddening crowd. Here's a look at a few secluded beaches in India where the water is turquoise, the sand silken, and the people few.

Ottinene Beach (Karnataka)

No one will tell you how this pretty beach came to be called Ottinene but whoever has been to Ottinene will surely sing paeans to its spectacular sunset and jagged rocky cliffs. It is here that the Byndoor river enters the Arabian sea and any swimmer with a not-so-faint heart attempts to swim through. You can walk down the hill from Kshitija Nesara Dhama straight to the Ottinene beach. But if you have a duff pair of lungs, take note that the climb back can be uphill. Not just literally, but physically, too.

Where: Ottinene beach is 440 km from Bengaluru and 125 km from Mangaluru (nearest airport). The nearest railway station is Byndoor (4 km).

Mandvi Beach (Gujarat)

Gujarat Tourism describes Mandvi Beach as a golden-brown sprawl of sand along the southern tip of the Kutch district. Lying along with the namesake town of Mandvi which was founded in 1580 by the Rao of Kutch, Khengarji, the beach still carries the remnants of its historical past as a thriving port. The not-so-crowded beach is at its glorious best during evenings with the sun dipping in the sea and the hawkers peddling snacks and sweets.

Where: Lies 59 km from Bhuj airport; Bhuj is well connected by railway. The distance between Mandvi Beach and Rann of Kutch is 322 km.

Bakkhali (West Bengal)

One of the deltaic islands sprawled across southern Bengal, it is an 8-km long beach stretching from Bakkhali to Frazerganj. Do not get surprised at the sight of a grey beach - here, the land slopes into the Bay of Bengal. The beach is sturdy enough for cycling and light 4-wheelers but be careful of the deceptive soft spots. A mangrove adds to the allure of Bakkhali. Spare a few hours for Henry's Island which was named after a Mr. Henry who surveyed the land in the 19th century. Step into Frazerganj that bears testimony to the grit and enterprise of Andrew Frazer who tried building a resort in the early 1900s. He failed because the waves kept washing away the constructed areas. The resort was never built but Frazerganj has not forgotten Andrew Frazer.

Where: Bakkhali is 130 km from the Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose International Airport in northern Kolkata. The nearest rail station is at Namkhana. The road trip from Kolkata



to Bakkhali is about 4 hours.

Jalandhar Beach (Diu)

Jalandhar Beach has nothing to do with the city of Jalandhar in Punjab. But

the bustling city and the pretty beach both take their name from a mythological demon that was killed by Lord Vishnu's Sudahrshan Chakra. Jalandhar, the demon, has a shrine on a

hillock next to the beach. The water is calm, the palm trees countless and several opportunities for aquatic sports. The beach is prettiest in the evening when the area is illuminated.

Where: 1 km from the city of Diu which has an airport.

Butterfly Beach (Goa)

This summer, stay away from Miramar, Baga, Calangute, Anjuna and other popular beaches of Goa. Too many crowd these common beaches. Pack your picnic hamper, carry a hat, slather sunscreen and head to Butterfly Beach, a secluded beach in South Goa. If you find a few honeymooners, ignore them (Butterfly Beach is also known as Honeymoon Beach). Trek in the wooded forest, watch butterflies flit by and when there is low tide, watch out for sea urchins, goldfish and sea cucumbers.

Where: Butterfly Beach is 61 km from Dabolim Airport. The road trip from Panjim to Palolem beach takes about 90 minutes. Take a ferry from Palolem or Agonda beaches to reach Butterfly Beach.

Neil Island (Andamans)

Neil Island might not be as popular as Havelock Island but the tiny island is equally pretty. When there, do the 3-point tour which takes you through 3 beaches: Bharatpur, Sitapur and Laxmanpur. Laden with coral and exquisite marine life, Neil Island is loved by scuba divers and aquatic adventurers. There are 3 dive centres on the island. On a good day, you can spot a Dugong (Sea cow), the state animal of Andaman & Nicobar Islands. Remember, Neil Island can be an Internet black hole. No data. No signals.

Where: 37 kilometres south of Port Blair. The only way to reach Neil Island is through a ferry. Both government and private ferries are available. Most tourists opt for private ferries because government ferries are mostly reserved for islanders and there is no facility of online booking.

Gopalpur-on-Sea (Odisha)

Gopalpur can turn other beaches envious. Once upon a time it was a bustling port for the seafarers of ancient Kalinga. During World war II, it served as a busy military port. But beyond war and trade, Gopalpur has a hospitality history. It was in Gopalpur that Odisha's first hotel (Palm Beach Resort) was built in 1914 by an Italian named Signor Maglion. Not many head to Gopalpur but those who do swear by the spectacular sunrise and sunset. The sea is very rough, do not attempt swimming.

Where: Distance from Bhubaneswar, the nearest airport, is 174 km. The nearest railway station is Berhampur. Berhampur is well connected by bus service from across the state. Hire a local transport to Gopalpur after alighting at Berhampur.

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Atlanta shootings leave 8 dead at Asian businesses

Feng, according to police. A fifth person, Elcias R. Hernandez-Ortiz, sustained non-life-threatening injuries.

About 45 minutes later, four more people were killed at two other businesses - Aromatherapy Spa and Gold Spa - just across the street from each other. While the names of the victims have not yet been released, all four of them were of Korean descent, South Korea's Foreign Ministry officials said in a statement, though their nationalities have yet to be verified.

In Cherokee County, authorities arrested the suspect, 21-year-old Robert Aaron Long, on the side of Interstate 75, roughly 150 miles south of Georgia Tuesday night after a police chase. Long, who officers believe was heading to Florida to commit similar crimes prior to the arrest, has been charged with eight counts of murder and homicide and one count of aggravated assault. Officials are still investigating possible motives for the shootings.

Federal agents are joining local authorities to investigate the shootings, and many officials remain wary about pointing to any motives. "A motive is still not clear, but a crime against any community is a crime against us all," Atlanta Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms said in a statement Wednesday. "I have remained in close contact with the White House and APD as they work with federal, state and local partners to investigate the suspect who is responsible for this senseless violence in our city."

President Joe Biden on Wednesday, March 17, said that he is "very concerned" about the Atlanta shootings, adding that he's been speaking out about the "very troubling" anti-Asian violence in recent months.

"I'm making no connection at this moment to the motivation of the killer," Biden said. "I'm waiting for an answer as the investigation proceeds from the FBI and from the Justice Department. I'll have more to say when the investigation is completed."

Motives remain unclear, but advocacy groups point to a rise in anti-Asian hate

While Atlanta officials say it is still early to know what motivated the shootings, Tuesday's attacks sparked outrage and sorrow among advocacy groups across the country, particularly Asians, as they continue to face a growing number of pandemic-related anti-Asian hate incidents.

At a press conference Wednesday morning, Cherokee County sheriff's Capt. Jay Baker said the suspect indicated in police interviews that he targeted the locations because he was angry at the "porn industry," and saw the businesses as something "he wanted to eliminate." Officials also said the suspect claimed that he had a "sexual addiction" and that the shooting "was not racially motivated."

The Atlanta police chief said it was too "early in this investigation to determine [the shooting] a hate crime, even though we made an arrest."

But many advocates say it is impossible to divorce race from misogynist crimes that disproportionately impacted Asians. "Many of the victims are Asian. These murders occurred at a time when anti-Asian violence has been spiking," Rep. Ted Lieu (D-CA) tweeted in response to the attacks. "All officials should do their part to condemn violence and not inflame further discrimination."

On Wednesday, Rep. Judy Chu (D-CA) called out former President Donald Trump for spurring anti-Asian sentiment and violence with his racist named for the virus. "President Trump clearly stoked the flames of xenophobia against AAPIs with his rhetoric," she said at a news conference. "The CDC and the World Health Organization said we should all use the official term covid-19 in order to make sure this disease is not associated with a particular geographical location or ethnicity due to the stigma it causes. And President Trump refused to acknowledge that and instead used the terms 'China virus,' 'Wuhan Virus' and 'Kung flu.'"

On Tuesday, Stop AAPI Hate, an organization that has been tracking anti-Asian violence reports, also released its latest report that nearly 3,800 incidents had been reported since March 2020. The report also shows that a disproportionate number of anti-Asian attacks were directed at women, who reported hate incidents twice as often as men.

Since the shootings took place at spas, Atlanta police said

they have dispatched officers to similar businesses. Baker said homicides are rare for the area, adding that the county "had one homicide" in 2020. The incidents also stoked responses from places like New York City, which deployed counterterrorism officers to Asian communities for caution. (With input from Agencies)

Today We Are All Asian

Yesterday (March 16), another member of the Tribe of Armed and Angry White Men decided that it

would be a good thing to kill as many Asians as he could find in massage spas in and around Atlanta. He managed to kill eight people, six of whom were Asian. The other two just happened to discover that their Sell By date was yesterday.

In other words, the other two were just collateral damage in the continued hate war being waged by the Tribe of Armed and Angry White Men. And in that war, anyone and everyone stands the risk of being collateral damage. In that sense, we are all Asian. Just as we are all Black. We are all Latino. We are all Muslims. We are all Indigenous people. We are all LGBTQI members. We are all Jews.

Because in hating and targeting all of the above, the Tribe of Armed and Angry White Men doesn't care who gets in the way. And they certainly don't care who dies. Yesterday it was six Asian women who committed the capital crime of Being Asian and Working. About a year ago it was Armaud Arberry who committed the capital crime of Jogging While Black in an Atlanta suburb. In August 2019 it was 23 Latinos in El Paso who committed the capital crime of Being Latino in A Public Place. And in 2017 it was Heather Heyer who committed the capital crime of Demonstrating for Justice with Black People in Charlottesville. And in 2018 it was 11 Jews worshiping in a synagogue who committed the capital crime of Being Jews.

Of course, the behavior which cost these men and women their lives are only capital crimes in the twisted universe of white supremacist domestic terrorists. These men (and women) have been letting us know who they are for years and the response of the public and law enforcement has been tepid at best. All of the referenced atrocities are considered isolated events and not part of the obvious pattern of white extremist violence which is committed to maintaining white minority rule in this nation, no matter the human or institutional cost.

We saw the savage combination of white supremacy and white privilege on January 6, 2020 when a mob that would have warmed the heart of the Ku Klux Klan in days gone past, stormed the capital - ostensibly to keep 45 as president - but...there were Confederate flags and Nazi paraphernalia present - clear signs that white supremacy was coursing through the veins of these so-called "good people".

History shows quite clearly how this country responds when it perceives a domestic threat. Look at what happened to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Paul Robeson among thousands of others accused of being part of some Russian conspiracy to overthrow the government.

Look at what happened to the Black Panther Party when its members asserted the constitutional right of Black people to exercise their Second Amendment rights (the irony is apparent). And look what happened to Martin Luther King, Jr. when the Federal Bureau of Investigation considered him to be "the greatest domestic threat" in the country.

A Black man preaching nonviolence in the quest for justice is a domestic threat. A tribe of white supremacist domestic terrorists are considered to be either misunderstood or misguided, but certainly not a national threat.

Attorney General Merrick Garland has stated that he considers domestic terrorism to be a national threat. But he needs to be more specific - it is white supremacist domestic terrorism that is a true national threat. And unless and until this nation confronts this danger from within, every American citizen is in danger of being in the cross hairs of this renegade tribe.

And that is why today we are all Asian.

Kohli returns to top 5 in ICC T20I rankings

Following his stellar performance in the ongoing series against England, India skipper Virat Kohli on Wednesday broke back into the top of the ICC T20 batsmen rankings.

Kohli, a formerly top-ranked batsman in the format and currently number one in ODIs, gained one slot and a massive 47 rating points after unbeaten knocks of 73 and 77 in the second and third matches against England, to be placed fifth.

KL Rahul remains the top-ranked Indian batsmen at the fourth spot despite three failures in the series so far.

Shreyas Iyer is up 32 places to the 31st spot while Rishabh Pant gained 30 spots to be ranked 80th.

Among bowlers, all-rounder Washington Sundar is up two places to 11th while seamers Shardul Thakur (up 14 places to 27th) and Bhuvneshwar Kumar (up seven places to 45th) have also gained.

Jos Buttler has re-entered the top 20. His match-winning 83 not out in the third match has helped him advance five places to 19th position, just two shy of his career-best 17th position attained in October 2018.

There were also some other fine performances in the series, between the top two sides, which England leads 2-1. Jonny Bairstow, who chipped in with 40 runs and was associated in an unbroken 77-run stand with Buttler in the eight-wicket win on Tuesday, has moved up two slots to 14th position in the list led by his compatriot Dawid Malan.

Ritika, cousin of wrestlers Geeta and Babita Phogat, 'commits suicide' after losing final

HISAR (TIP): A budding wrestler, Ritika Balanda, cousin of famed wrestlers Geeta and Babita Phogat, allegedly committed suicide at their residence on Monday, March 15, night.

The village sources said that Ritika, 17, was reportedly under depression as she had lost a wrestling tournament's final held in Rajasthan recently by a narrow margin.

She had participated in a state-level competition at Bharatpur between March 12 and 14.

She had been staying at the residence of Geeta and Babita to get training under the mentorship of her uncle Mahavir Phogat. She had gone to sleep in her room on Monday night and was found hanging from a ceiling fan on Tuesday morning, the sources added. Dronacharya awardee Mahavir Phogat has trained his daughters Geeta, Babita and niece Vinesh at his wrestling academy at their native place in Balali village of Charkhi Dadri district.

Suryakumar shines with bat as India level series

AHMEDABAD: (TIP): India won the fourth T20 International against England by eight runs to level the five-match series at 2-2.

Ishan Kishan the other night, and Suryakumar Yadav on Thursday, March 18. India's T20 specialists don't waste any time to find their feet in international cricket and keep sending reminders why they should be playing more regularly.

Dropped for the third T20I without getting to face a ball in his debut game, Suryakumar top-scored with 57 in his maiden outing with the bat, an innings that showed what he could offer to the side. His knock was one of the highlights in India's win over England in the fourth T20I at the Narendra Modi Stadium, which ensured an exciting finish in the fifth and final match on Saturday with the series locked 2-2.

Suryakumar got the opportunity on Thursday only because Ishan had a groin injury. Taking his spot at No 3, the 30-year-old pulled the first ball he faced off Jofra Archer for six over fine-leg. It wasn't an instinctive shot. Having experienced such countless situations in the IPL, Suryakumar fully expected the length that Archer would deliver. And as the pacer obliged, the Mumbaier merely responded.

A batsman who should have broken into the side at least a year ago, Suryakumar is at the peak of his prowess in a format, in which he has been so dominant. Unlike the rest of the options, India have to fill in the middle-order slot, Suryakumar's range of shots are unparalleled. For a batsman, who has mostly batted at No 4 and 5 during the middle overs, he has an IPL strike-rate of 134.57. It is his ability to manufacture boundary balls in the middle-overs while maintaining the momentum given by the openers and lay a foundation for the finishers that make him a precious talent in T20s. His other prized asset is his ability to steady the ship when the team struggles without affecting the scoring rate.

With just six months to go for the T20 World Cup, India have finally given him an opportunity to claim a spot. In a team where competition is tough, there is little space for Suryakumar to take time to find his feet. Sanju Samson, who was unable to make most of the opportunities he got in Australia, finds himself

discarded for this series. And maybe all those times he spent waiting for the call has only made Suryakumar hungrier than ever. He looked unstoppable until a debatable umpiring

decision sent him back. Shreyas Iyer and Rishabh Pant ensured Suryakumar's innings didn't go waste as they took India to 185-8, their highest total this series.

And defending the total, England came hard at India. Jason Roy, Ben Stokes and Jonny Bairstow got starts and looked threatening, but somehow the hosts' attack found ways to get wickets when they needed the most as England wilted under pressure to keep the series alive.

Paul Pogba returns from injury to help Man Utd beat AC Milan in Europa League

Paul Pogba returned from injury to score the winner as Manchester United beat AC Milan 1-0 on Thursday to reach the Europa League quarterfinals, while Mislav Orsic netted a hat trick as Dinamo Zagreb stunned Tottenham 3-0 to eliminate the London team.

Pogba was brought on at halftime and had an immediate impact as he scored two minutes later to help United secure a 2-1 aggregate victory.

"Paul looked like he'd been out for six weeks. He's been working really hard but playing football is a different matter and you can see that he needs more time," United coach Ole Gunnar Solskjaer said. "He couldn't play for more than 45 minutes and he'll get better and better which is fantastic for us for the rest of the season ... He's going to give us a big boost."

Arsenal, Roma, Ajax and Villarreal all went through as well.

In Milan, former Manchester United forward Zlatan Ibrahimovic also made his comeback from injury as a substitute but saw his best effort saved as his powerful header was clawed away by goalkeeper Dean Henderson.

"There's so much disappointment, we played two matches well, today we just

missed a goal," Ibrahimovic said. "We made an error at the back but that's football and if you don't take your chances it's more difficult to go through.

"But now I'll be back to help the team. ... We didn't deserve to go out tonight, but you also learn from negative moments to grow and we'll move forward."

Ibrahimovic played for United from

2016-18, helping it win the Europa League in 2017. That was the English side's last trophy.

After conceding a late equalizer in a 1-1 draw at Old Trafford, United started positively at San Siro but Milan slowly got into the match and had the best chance with the last kick of the first half as Rade Krunic volleyed wide of the left post.

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
