Jagmeet Singh says NDP will vote to topple Trudeau's govt in Canada

Canada PM Trudeau looks set to lose power after key ally vows to topple him

DECEMBER 21, 2024

OTTAWA (TIP): Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on Friday looked set to lose power early next year after a key ally said he would move to bring down the minority Liberal government and trigger an election.

New Democratic Party leader Jagmeet Singh, who has been helping keep Trudeau in office, said he would present a formal motion of no-confidence after the House of Commons elected chamber returns from a winter break on Jan. 27.

If all the opposition parties back the motion, Trudeau will be out of office after more than nine years as prime minister and an election will take place.

A string of polls over the last 18 months shows the Liberals, suffering from voter fatigue and anger over high prices and a housing crisis, would be badly defeated by the official opposition right-of-center Conservatives. The New Democrats, who like the Liberals aim to attract the support of center-left voters,

MOSCOW (TIP): Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Thursday, December 20, that he was ready to compromise over Ukraine in possible talks with US President-elect Donald Trump on ending the war and had no conditions for starting talks with the Ukrainian authorities, a Reuters report says.

Trump, a self-styled master of brokering agreements and author of the 1987 book "Trump: the Art of the Deal", has vowed to swiftly end the conflict, but has not yet given any details on how he might achieve that.

Senate passes spending bill to avert government shutdown

DECEMBER 21, 2024

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): The Senate early Saturday, December 21 morning passed a bill to avert a government shutdown, sending the measure to President Joe Biden to be signed into law. The bill, which passed by an 85-11 vote, extends federal funds to mid-March, sends more than \$100 billion in relief to farmers and natural disaster victims, and reauthorizes the sweeping

An Unparalleled Sacrifice in History


The event celebrated the year 2024 and looked forward to 2025, highlighting interactions between the consulate and the media. The Consul General expressed gratitude for the media's

INDIAN-ORIGIN PROFESSIONAL NOMINATED FOR THE HOUSE OF LORDS PEERAGE BY UK PM KEIR STARMER

LONDON (TIP) : A London-based professional who chairs the Labor Party's diaspora group, Labor Indians, was on Friday, December 20 nominated by British Prime Minister Keir Starmer as one of his 30 picks for new political peerages in the House of Lords, to be approved by King Charles III.

Krish Raval, awarded an OBE in 2018 by Queen Elizabeth II for Services to Leadership Education and Inter-Faith Cohesion, is the Founder-Director of Faith in Leadership - a University of Oxford-based organization working towards fostering inter-faith relations.

He is now expected to join the Labor benches in the Upper House of the UK Parliament as a life peer, along with Starmer's former chief of staff Sue Gray and former Labor shadow minister of Sri Lankan heritage Thangam Debbonaire.

"The King has been graciously pleased to signify his intention of conferring peerages of the United Kingdom for Life," reads the Downing Street statement announcing the nominations this week.

An independent House of Lords Appointments Commission (HOLAC) vets these nominations before the Prime Minister can formally recommend them to the King.

This is followed by legal documents, or the writ of summons, issued by Parliament and a Letters Patent issued by the monarch to create a life peerage for the new members to be able to take their seat in the House of Lords and vote.

The Labor Party has nominated 30 peers in what is seen as an attempt to balance the numbers in the Lords, where the Tories have the greatest number of peers. Once the new nominations are approved, which include Opposition Conservative Party Leader Kemi Badenoch's six picks and Liberal Democrats' two, the governing Labor Party is expected to have 217 peers, Tories 279 and Lib Dems 80. Over 180 crossbench peers are also part of the Lords as unaffiliated with any party, which means no party has an outright majority in the Upper Chamber of Parliament. *(Read full story at www.theindianpanorama.news)*

Indian-origin Singapore based comedians aim to reconnect with their roots through performances in India


SINGAPORE (TIP) : Indian-origin Singaporean comedian couple wants to reconnect with their roots through performances in India and to expand their base in the country's large stand-up comedy market.

Rishi Budhrani and Sharul Channa are set to perform in Bengaluru and Chennai this weekend.

"We have to go overseas, especially to India which is a huge market waiting to be tapped," said Rishi, who has a good fan base in Southeast Asia, but believes he has to expand it to be more successful and enduring.

Rishi, 40, and Sharul, 37, impressed the audience in Cape Town through their performances a few months ago. They believe that they can do the same in India this month.

Singapore-born Rishi, whose parents moved here from Mumbai and Jaipur in the 1960s and the 1970s respectively, has previously performed in Mumbai,

Bengaluru, Ahmedabad and Gurugram. This time he is looking forward to performing in Chennai.

"In the north, the Hindi-speaking comedians are more popular. It was

difficult to match up to them. But in the south, English is more accepted. So, I'm well-prepared," he told Singapore's Indian community serving Friday weekly *Tabla*, a tabloid for news in India and the nation's entertainment scene.

"Having grown up in Singapore, I felt like a bit of an outsider in India," Rishi said. "I now want to reconnect with my roots. I am going with a changed perspective. I will be talking more about Indian heritage and the connections among Indians."

Rishi has been performing in India since 2018 but is "super excited" to do a "double headliner" there for the first time.

Sharul will also have solo shows in Bengaluru and Mumbai.

"The Indian comedy scene, on the other hand, is growing fast. The reach is bigger, there is more money, and I want to establish a base there with Rishi," said Sharul.

British Indian hedge fund trader jailed in Denmark for tax fraud

and 24 Malaysian companies entered into agreements to purchase Danish listed shares at times when the shares were traded with the right to dividends. "The verdict is a milestone in the criminal justice settlement following the dividend tax cases, as the convicted person was the main instigator of a fraud against the Danish state of historic proportions," said Marie Tullin, special prosecutor at State Attorney for Serious Crime (SSK). "It is therefore with satisfaction that I can now state that the court has imposed a sentence that reflects the extremely serious and extensive nature of the case," she said. In addition to the prison sentence, the court confiscated a total of approximately 7.2 billion kroner (USD 1bn), corresponding to the economic gain of the convicted person. Among other things, deposits in accounts in foreign banks, shares and bonds, as well as a number of properties or shares thereof belonging to the convicted person, his companies or his wife were confiscated.

"The fraud has caused a major loss for the Danish state, and it is therefore of crucial importance that the court today has confiscated an amount that corresponds to the convicted person's profits from the fraud," says Dennis Bæckmann, special prosecutor, National Unit for Serious Crime (NSK).

Indian-origin man jailed for 4 years for 'horrific attack' on woman in UK

DECEMBER 18, 2024

LONDON (TIP) : A 34-year-old Indian-origin man has been jailed for four years for a "horrific attack" on a woman in her own home in London after being found guilty of grievous bodily harm.


Parvez Patel was arrested at the scene in the Westminster area of the city after neighbors heard the woman's screams and called the police.

The Metropolitan Police said the attack took place late on the evening of January 29, when Patel booked a sex worker and arrived at her home. He went on to launch an assault, leaving the victim in her 40s with severe injuries including a broken nose, extensive bruising, swelling and cuts.

"The victim suffered a horrific attack in her own home, where she was most vulnerable. Patel inflicted significant injuries, and it is thanks to the quick actions of the public, who alerted police, we were able to intervene," said Detective Constable Lloyd Leech from the Met Police's Central West Rape and Serious Sexual Offences Unit.

"Sex workers are among the most vulnerable in society, and we want to ensure they are heard and supported. We encourage anyone who has experienced any form of violence to come forward. You will be listened to, supported, and we will work tirelessly to bring offenders to justice," he said.

Patel was charged on January 31 and following a recent three-week trial at Southwark Crown Court in London, he was sentenced on Monday.

Besides Raj Singh, three other Indian Americans were among the faculty, staff, and administrators recognized in 22 different categories at the 2024 University Awards Convocation on Dec 13 at the Student Union Ballroom.



Indian-origin Suchir Balaji OpenAI whistleblower, dies by suicide in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (TIP) : A 26-year-old Indian-origin former employee of the artificial intelligence giant OpenAI has died by suicide in San Francisco, authorities said.

Suchir Balaji was found dead inside his Buchanan Street apartment in San Francisco on November 26, San Francisco police and the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner were quoted as reported by media.

The medical examiner's office determined the manner of death to be suicide and police officials said there is "currently, no evidence of foul play." Balaji was known for whistleblowing the blockbuster artificial intelligence company which is facing a swell of lawsuits over its business model.

Balaji's death comes three months after he publicly accused OpenAI of violating US copyright law while developing ChatGPT, a generative artificial intelligence program that has become a moneymaking sensation used by hundreds of millions of people across the world, the report said.

Its public release in late 2022 spurred a torrent of lawsuits against OpenAI from authors, computer programmers and journalists, who say the company illegally stole their copyrighted material to train its program and elevate its value past US\$ 150 billion.

In an interview with the New York Times published on October 23, Balaji argued that OpenAI was harming businesses and entrepreneurs whose data were used to train ChatGPT.

Balaji left OpenAI because he no longer wanted to contribute to technologies that he believed would bring society more harm than benefit, the report added.

and dimensions associated with meditation in his keynote address.



Elon Musk is the ultimate chaos agent

WITH ONE POST ON X, MUSK HAS THE POWER TO SHUT DOWN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE MOST POWERFUL NATION IN WORLD HISTORY

Elon Musk holds no public office. He has never stood for election, passed scrutiny for appointment to public office, nor commanded a political force of any measure. He is, however, the latest star and favorite of Donald Trump, the US president-elect. So when Musk issues one of his off-the-cuff missives via his decrepit social network, X, Trump loyalists (almost all the Republicans) take him seriously.

Yet now, suddenly, Musk has the power to shut down the government of the most powerful nation in the history of the world and depose his party's legislative leader, the speaker of the House, Mike Johnson, a Republican lawmaker from Louisiana.

Very early Wednesday morning, fueled by hubris and whatever else, Musk called for the US House of Representatives to reject the negotiated continuing resolution that it must pass this week to keep the federal government funded.

"This bill should not pass," the richest human being in the world wrote at 4.15am E.T. Musk followed up for hours, using every derogatory word he could muster to describe a bill he almost certainly had not read nor understood. "Any member of the House or Senate who votes for this outrageous spending bill deserves to be voted out in 2 years!" Musk wrote Wednesday afternoon.

Johnson spent months garnering enough votes among his divided caucus (plus Democrats, with whom he must negotiate to get such a bill passed) to send the resolution to the Democrats who control the Senate until next month and then to the president, Joe Biden. Johnson knows the failure to pass this resolution would cause great harm to 4 million federal employees and those who depend on their services right before the holidays. Farmers would go without subsidy payments. Small businesses would not get their loan payments. Kids in head start programs would have no place to go during the workday, forcing parents to take time off from work and possibly lose jobs. Active-duty military personnel would work with no December or January paychecks until Congress passes such a resolution.

Because of this impasse, congressional Republicans might force Johnson to resign as speaker and yet another chaotic scramble for that job would ensue. Johnson is the third Republican leader since Trump first took office in 2017. Every time one resigns the factions of the Republican party generate grinding conflict. The last one, after Kevin McCarthy was ousted in 2023 after negotiating a similar agreement with Democrats, yielded a standoff and the

ultimate ascension of Johnson, considered a rightwing extremist and Trump loyalist. But talking to Democrats at all now makes one unacceptable to the Trump crowd. So there is a good chance that not only will the government not function for weeks or months, it won't even have the opportunity to come back until the Republicans can once again choose a speaker. That is not going to be easy.

According to news reports, many Republican members of Congress took Musk's rant seriously, and feared crossing Trump's new buddy who allegedly will head some yet-to-be-created federal office that is supposed to ferret out waste from the federal government.

In such an unstable political environment, with no real party discipline within Congress, figures like Musk have unprecedented influence. Being called out by someone with that much volume would be debilitating to

one's political career.

Much about the second rise of Trump, like that of the first, undermines or overthrows everything we thought we knew about power and politics. Trump seems to maintain his support in spite of, if not because of, his willingness to blow everything up, to flout norms of decorum and law and to engage in fabulous hyperbole that bears little grounding in reality.

Musk, who built his early reputation as a charismatic leader of upstart companies like PayPal and Tesla (neither of which he actually founded), inflated his ego faster than he inflated his wealth, merged with Trump to share these features. Years of pushing the limits of automobile and financial regulation, often breaking those limits but rarely held accountable for those abrogations, have left Musk feeling invincible yet victimized. He's a whiner more than a winner.

Musk is also an immigrant (who

worked illegally in the United States for a time) who has turned on immigrants and a former free-speech advocate who has turned off the ability of his critics and independent journalists to find voice on his platform.

The lesson of Musk's effort to shut down the US government and depose the Republican House speaker is that he has no interest in building, maintaining or managing anything responsibly. We know that already from how he runs X, the company he has all-but-destroyed since being forced by a court to buy it. The only things that have kept his two significant companies afloat have been teams of well compensated lawyers and engineers who have kept federal subsidies, loans and contracts (none of which are endangered by the looming shutdown) flowing to both companies.

Musk, like Trump, does not believe rules should apply to rich men. As long as the rest of us keep rewarding them for that, they will not be deterred and neither will the next crop of rich men. And now, with Musk mimicking Trump, we have two chaos agents tearing the basic functions of government apart while betraying and mocking the rule of law.

This is the first test of the United States to keep functioning under this new, radical, unleashed Trump. So far, this nation is failing and falling.

It is for historians to dig for tell-tale remains, not bigots

IT IS UNFORTUNATE THAT JUDICIAL MISDIRECTION IS STIRRING UP THE RETALIATORY INSTINCTS OF PEOPLE FED ON THE FALSEHOODS OF MANUFACTURED HISTORY

Normally, digging at historic sites is done by an archaeologist and historians in search of a lost civilization or an ancient city or some signs of mythological events. But nowhere in the world, in the modern age, is an excavation done underneath a place of worship of one religion to find the remains of a place of worship of another religion. While digging in search of historical facts is a secular act, and is done using internationally recognized scientific methods, digging to establish the presence of a place of worship of one religion in a place of worship of another religion is, clearly, a non-secular act. Therefore, it is absolutely puzzling why the former Chief Justice of India (CJI), D.Y. Chandrachud found nothing objectionable or illegal in a survey in a place of worship of a particular religion by another religious group. In his oral observation, the former CJI, said, in 2022 (he was the CJI then), "a survey may not necessarily fall foul of the Places of Worship Act." He made this tricky observation in the Gyanvapi mosque case.

CLARITY IN THE ACT, YET CHALLENGED

The Places of Worship (Special Provisions) Act was enacted by Parliament in 1991 in the background of a strident movement by Ram Janmabhoomi supporters which heightened communal tensions in Ayodhya and many other parts of north India. The government of the day apprehended the imminent outbreak of violence in different parts of the country due to the raising of claims over the places of worship of a particular minority community. This Act bars the conversion of places of worship of any religious community into a place of worship of a different religious community. It declares that the religious character of a place of worship existing on the 15th day of August 1947, shall continue to be the same as it existed on that day.

The Act further provides that any suit and appeal seeking to convert the religious character of a place of worship existing on 15th August, 1947 pending before any court or tribunal shall abate on the commencement of the Act. It also states that no suit or appeal relating to this matter shall lie in any court after the commencement of the Act, and any suit alleging that the religious character of a place of worship has been converted after 15th August 1947 will be determined in terms of this Act.

But the constitutionality of this Act is under challenge in the Supreme Court of India. A petition was filed in 2020 challenging the constitutional validity of the Act on the grounds that the date of August 15, 1947 was fixed arbitrarily and that this Act takes away judicial review.

The contention that the date of August 15, 1947 was arbitrarily fixed in the Act to prevent the conversion of a place of worship is a specious one. This is the day when the transfer of power from the British government to the Indian government took place. Naturally, this was the earliest date the government could think of for the purpose of this Act. In any case, the Government of India could not have chosen April 21, 1526 when Babur defeated Ibrahim Lodhi in the battle of Panipat and captured Delhi and Agra and laid the foundation of the Mughal empire. Nor could it have chosen, arbitrarily, a later date and kept the field open for a set of religious fanatics to make reckless claims on the places of worship of another religion. Therefore, by all accounts, the date chosen by Parliament in this enactment was the most reasonable one.

The second ground cited in the petition is that the Act takes away judicial review which is a part of the basic structure of the Constitution of India and any enactment which alters it is unconstitutional. This contention, needless to say, is without any merit. The Act declares that from the commencement of the Act, all pending suits, appeal or proceedings seeking to convert a place of worship of one religion existing as on August 15, 1947 into that of another religion or altering the religious character of a place of worship shall abate. It is the legislative policy of the government to declare through a law that certain types of suits shall abate under certain circumstances. It is not the same as stating that "no court shall have any jurisdiction in respect of any suit arising from the place of worship of any religion". The latter legislative assertion can be interpreted as an exclusion of judicial review which would, no doubt, be unconstitutional. But that is not the case here.

ON THE LOWER COURTS

Subsequent to the above quoted observation of the former CJI, lower courts in the State of Uttar Pradesh are ordering surveys in mosques to determine their religious character with great alacrity. It has led to violence in Sambhal in Uttar Pradesh in which some lives were lost. The lower courts do not seem to have bothered to check whether it was an order of the Supreme Court or a mere observation of the CJI during the hearing. The fact is that such observations from the Bench have no significance as those are not a part of any judgment of the Court.

Besides, it is a matter of common logic that when the law has barred any kind of conversion of the religious character of a place of worship as it existed on August 15, 1947, then what is the relevance of ordering or carrying out a survey to determine its character? Legally, its character is what existed on the date as above. So, where is the need for a fresh survey?

A close reading of the provisions of the Act would reveal that what has been prohibited is not merely the act of conversion but also fresh surveys to establish the

religious character of a place of worship. As that stands settled, any attempt to resurrect the dispute and get an order from the court would be clearly in violation of the Act.

The Places of Worship Act 1991 has been hailed as a law which protects secularism in the Ayodhya judgment of the Supreme Court. Wisely, the Court has now put a blanket ban on all litigations relating to the places of worship till it finally determines the issue of the constitutionality of the Act.

PROTECTION OF A FUNDAMENTAL RIGHT

Quite apart from the issue of constitutionality or otherwise of the Places of Worship Act, a religious denomination has the fundamental right, under Article 26, to manage its own affairs in matters of religion. Worshipping in a mosque or a church is a matter of religion and any kind of interference by any outsider in that place of worship can be treated as a violation of the fundamental right of that religious denomination. The court, while ordering a survey of such a place of worship, is in fact committing a violation of Article 26 of the Constitution. The object of this Article is to protect the right conferred on a religious denomination. So, even if the Act was not in existence, a survey or excavation in a place of worship being used by a religious denomination for the purpose of finding out the religious character of that place would be a violation of Article 26.

It is possible that beneath some mosques lie remains of temples. And beneath the remains of temples there may be the remains of Buddha or Jain viharas. History has sequestered in the womb of earth these tell-tale remains for an archaeologist and a historian to chronicle the history of this nation, and not for bigots to kindle revanchism and poison the minds of generations of unwary people. It is a great pity that judicial misdirection is refiring the retaliatory instincts of people fed on the falsehoods of manufactured history.

Crimes against humanity and an obtuse Indian stance

INDIA'S RESPONSE TO A 'CRIMES AGAINST HUMANITY' TREATY ALIGNS WITH ITS AVERSION TO THE ROME STATUTE AND THE INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL COURT

"India advocates for the inclusion of 'terrorism' as an act amounting to CAH. India's response to a CAH treaty aligns with its aversion to the Rome Statute and the ICC. For the last five years, since 2019, India has consistently argued for an 'in-depth study' and thorough discussion on the need for a dedicated treaty. India's stance at the UNGA reflects its skepticism that a CAH treaty might duplicate the already existing regime under the Rome Statute. Further, India takes issue with the exclusion of 'terror-related acts' and the 'use of nuclear weapons' from the definition of CAH in the proposed treaty. Most importantly, reiterating that it is not a party to the Rome Statute, India has stressed at the UNGA that national legislations and the jurisdiction of national courts are more appropriate fora for dealing with CAH and other international crimes."

On December 4, 2024, the UN General Assembly (UNGA) adopted a resolution approving the text of a proposed treaty governing the prevention and punishment of crimes against humanity (CAH treaty). This marks the beginning of the negotiation process among states for the conclusion of a CAH treaty. This resolution comes five years after the International Law Commission submitted the draft text of the CAH treaty to the Sixth Committee - the primary forum for considering legal questions in the UNGA. This development is a landmark in the international community's quest to combat impunity for CAH.

THERE IS A GAP IN ACCOUNTABILITY

Alongside genocide and war crimes, CAH are among the grave international crimes which the International Criminal Court (ICC), established under the Rome Statute, seeks to punish. Importantly, genocide and war crimes are also governed by dedicated treaties, i.e., the Genocide Convention of 1948 and the Geneva Conventions of 1949, respectively. However, CAH are governed only under the Rome Statute, which includes specific criminal acts such as murder, extermination, enslavement, deportation, torture, imprisonment, and rape committed as part of a 'widespread or systematic attack directed against any civilian population, with knowledge of the attack'. CAH were first codified in the 1945 London Charter establishing the Nuremberg Tribunal to investigate and prosecute the crimes committed in connection with the Second World War, and later in the statutes of the International Criminal Tribunal for Yugoslavia, and Rwanda. However, there is no dedicated treaty for CAH yet, creating a gap in terms of accountability in the legal architecture of international criminal justice. There are three reasons justifying the need for a CAH treaty.

First, the jurisdiction of the ICC covers a limited number of states, making it challenging to punish perpetrators of CAH in non-member states. Second, the Rome Statute and the ICC only address individual criminal responsibility. A dedicated CAH treaty would allow for holding states accountable under international law for their failure to prevent the commission of CAH, as is the case with the Genocide Convention of 1948. For instance, in 2019, The Gambia filed a case before the International

Court of Justice (ICJ) against Myanmar for alleged violations of the Genocide Convention against the ethnic Rohingya population. A dedicated CAH treaty would create an obligation for state parties to adopt administrative, legislative, or judicial measures to prevent the commission of CAH. Failure to meet this obligation could become the basis for the ICJ's jurisdiction if the CAH treaty so provides. Third, a CAH treaty presents an opportunity to enlarge the scope of CAH to include, as suggested by various states in the Sixth Committee, starvation of civilian populations, gender apartheid, forced pregnancy, the use of nuclear weapons, terrorism, exploitation of natural resources, and crimes against indigenous populations.

INDIA'S STAND

India is not a party to the Rome Statute and has consistently objected to the ICC's jurisdiction over issues such as the powers of the ICC prosecutor, the role of the UN Security Council under the Rome Statute, and the non-inclusion of 'use of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction' as a war crime. Further, India has argued that crimes committed only during armed conflicts - and not those committed during peacetime - should be considered CAH. Moreover, India does not favor the inclusion of 'enforced disappearance' as an act that can constitute CAH. Instead, India advocates for the inclusion of 'terrorism' as an act amounting to CAH. India's response to a CAH treaty aligns with its aversion to the Rome Statute and the ICC. For the last five years, since 2019, India has consistently argued for an 'in-depth study' and thorough discussion on

the need for a dedicated treaty. India's stance at the UNGA reflects its skepticism that a CAH treaty might duplicate the already existing regime under the Rome Statute. Further, India takes issue with the exclusion of 'terror-related acts' and the 'use of nuclear weapons' from the definition of CAH in the proposed treaty. Most importantly, reiterating that it is not a party to the Rome Statute, India has stressed at the UNGA that national legislations and the jurisdiction of national courts are more appropriate fora for dealing with CAH and other international crimes.

LEAD THE WAY

Currently, India does not have domestic legislation prohibiting international crimes. In 2018, Justice S. Muralidhar of the Delhi High Court in *State vs Sajjan Kumar* observed that 'neither crimes against humanity nor genocide have been made part of India's criminal law, a lacuna that needs to be addressed urgently'. Nonetheless, there is little or no debate on the need for such laws in the domestic legal and policy spaces. The recent amendments to the criminal law were a missed opportunity to include these crimes in the penal law. This is inconsistent with India's own insistence on the primacy of national and territorial jurisdiction for dealing with CAH. India should incorporate CAH and other international crimes into its domestic law, even if it is not a party to the Rome Statute, and lead the way in ending impunity for grave human rights violations - a role that befits a true Vishwaguru.

Trump says India charges a lot of tariff, threatens to impose reciprocal tax

DECEMBER 18, 2024

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): US President-elect Donald Trump has reiterated his intention to impose reciprocal tariffs in retaliation for the high tariff imposed by India on import of certain American products.

Trump made these remarks on Tuesday, December 17, and also said that India and Brazil were among countries that impose high tariffs on certain US products.

"Reciprocal. If they tax us, we tax them the same amount. They tax us. We tax them. And they tax us. Almost in all cases, they're taxing us, and we haven't been taxing them," Trump told reporters on Monday.

He made the remarks while responding to a question on a potential trade agreement with China. Trump said India and Brazil were among countries that impose high tariffs on certain US products.

"The word reciprocal is important because if somebody charges us - India, we don't have to talk about our own - if India charges us 100 per cent, do we charge them nothing for the same? You know, they send in a bicycle and we send them a bicycle. They charge us 100 and 200. India charges a lot. Brazil charges a lot. If they want to charge us, that's fine, but we're going to charge them the same thing," Trump said at a news conference at Mar-a-Lago.

Responding to a question, his

Commerce Secretary pick Howard Lutnick said "reciprocity" is something that is going to be a key topic for the Trump administration. "How you treat us is how you should expect to be treated," he said.

During his election campaign in October, Trump has claimed that India imposes the highest tariffs on foreign products. But they do it with a smile.

"Perhaps the most important element of my plan to make America extraordinarily wealthy again is reciprocity. It's a word that's very important in my plan because we generally don't charge tariffs. I started that process, it was so great, with the vans and the small trucks, etc," Trump had

said Thursday in October.

In 2019, Trump has repeatedly claimed that India is a "tariff king" and imposes "tremendously high" tariffs on American products.

He has criticized India's "big tariffs" on American paper products and the iconic Harley-Davidson bikes.

The US is the largest trading partner of India in 2023-24. India's exports stood at USD 77.51 billion, while imports aggregated at USD 42.2 billion in the last fiscal.

During April-October this fiscal, the country's exports to America rose by 6.31 per cent to USD 47.24 billion, while imports grew by 2.46 per cent to USD 26 billion.

Between FY 2020 and FY 2024, India's merchandise exports to America rose by 46 per cent from USD 53.1 billion to USD 77.5 billion.

Imports from the US also grew to USD 42.2 billion last fiscal from USD 35.8 billion in 2019-20.

On the other hand, trade in services between the two nations expanded 30.3 per cent from USD 54.1 billion in 2018 to an estimated USD 70.5 billion in 2024.

India is also a key destination for American businesses such as professional, scientific, and technical services, manufacturing, and IT. Washington is the third largest investor. India received USD 66.7 billion of FDI inflow between April 2000 and June 2024. (Source: PTI)

Biden admin makes it easier for US companies to hire foreign workers with H-1B visas

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): A month ahead of transferring power, the outgoing Biden administration announced a new set of rules on Tuesday, December 17 for H-1B visas that makes it easier for American companies to hire foreign workers with special skill sets and facilitate a smoother transition from F-1 student visas to H-1B visas.

The rule, announced by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), aims to provide greater flexibility to employers and workers by modernizing the definition and criteria for special positions and nonprofit and governmental research organizations that are exempt from the annual statutory limit on H-1B visas. The changes will help U.S. employers hire as per their business needs and remain competitive in the global marketplace, an official release said.

Donald Trump will be the next president of the US after a swearing-in ceremony on January 20.

According to the DHS, the rule also extends certain flexibilities for students on an F-1 visa seeking to change their status to H-1B to avoid disruptions in lawful status and employment authorization for students holding F-1 visas.

It also will allow US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to process applications more quickly for most individuals who had previously been approved for an H-1B visa.

It will also allow H-1B visa holders with a controlling interest in the petitioning organization to be eligible for H-1B status subject to reasonable conditions. The latest move by the outgoing Biden administration builds on its previous efforts to ensure that the labor needs of American businesses are met to reduce undue burden on employers while adhering to all U.S. worker protections under the law. "American businesses rely on the H-1B visa programme for the recruitment of highly-skilled talent, benefiting communities across the country," said Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas.

Prepare to remove TikTok from app stores: US lawmakers to Google, Apple

DECEMBER 14, 2024

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): Two influential US lawmakers, including Indian-American Raja Krishnamoorthi, have asked Google and Apple to remove TikTok from their app stores ahead of a potential ban on the video-sharing platform next month.

A bill signed by President Joe Biden into law in April requires China-based ByteDance, which owns TikTok, to divest from it by January 19 or face a US ban.

Ahead of the January 19 deadline, House Select Committee on the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) Chair John Moolenaar and Ranking Member Krishnamoorthi on Friday wrote to Apple CEO Tim Cook, Google CEO Sundar Pichai and TikTok CEO Shou Chew.

The lawmakers asked Cook and Pichai to prepare to remove TikTok from their play stores by January 19. In their letter to the TikTok CEO, they urged Chew to "immediately execute a qualified divestiture". All three letters come after the DC Circuit Court's 3-0 opinion that upheld the Protecting Americans from Foreign Adversary Controlled Applications Act. In the letters to Cook and Pichai, the lawmakers said, "Today, we sent a letter to TikTok highlighting that Congress has provided ample time-233 days and counting-for the company to take the necessary steps to comply with the law and pursue a divestment that protects US national security." "As you know, without a qualified divestiture, the Act makes it unlawful to provide services to distribute, maintain, or update such foreign adversary-controlled application.

Pannun's threat to Indian ambassador taken up with US: MEA

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) on Friday, December 20, said New Delhi had taken "seriously" the latest threat issued by US-based Khalistan separatist Gurbatwant Singh Pannun against India's Ambassador to the US, Vinay Mohan Kwatra, and raised it with the authorities in Washington.

In a recent video, Pannun threatened that Kwatra is on the radar of pro-Khalistan Sikhs in America for allegedly coordinating with Russian authorities, who in turn were providing inputs to Indian intelligence agencies on the Khalistan network in the United States.

"As and when such threats are issued, we take them very seriously and raise them with the US government. In this particular case also, we have raised it with the US government and it is our expectation that the United States government will take our security concerns seriously and act on it," MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said during a weekly media briefing in New Delhi on Friday, December 20. A former Foreign Secretary, Kwatra took charge as India's Ambassador to the United States in August this year, succeeding Taranjit Singh Sandhu.

His appointment came at a time when Khalistan separatists continue to target Hindu community in the country and also the Indian missions.

Amid din, Lok Sabha sends 'one nation, one election' Bills to joint committee of Houses

NEW DELHI (TIP)

Amid uproar over Home Minister Amit Shah's remarks related to B R Ambedkar, the Lok Sabha on Friday, December 20, referred the two bills on simultaneous polls to a joint committee of Parliament.

Opposition members were raising slogan haling Ambedkar and slamming Shah when the House met for the day.

Instead of taking up the Question Hour, Speaker Om Birla asked Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal to move the resolution to refer the Constitution (129th Amendment) Bill, 2024 and the Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2024 referred to Joint Committee of Parliament comprising 27 members from the Lok Sabha and 12 from the Rajya Sabha.

The resolution was adopted by a voice vote amid noisy scenes. The Lok Sabha was then adjourned sine die (indefinitely), bringing to an end the Winter session which began on November 25.

The two 'one nation, one election' (ONOE) bills, including one requiring an amendment in the Constitution, lay down the mechanism to hold simultaneous elections and were introduced in the Lok Sabha on Tuesday after a fiery debate.

BJP MP Bhartruhari Mahtab is being considered to head the joint committee of Parliament that will scrutinise the two bills proposing simultaneous elections, sources said.

With the BJP set to get the position of the chair for the crucial panel, official sources said Mahtab's parliamentary experience may weigh in his favour. The strength of the committee was increased from 31 MPs to 39, giving representation to more parties.

While the panel already includes BJP's P P Chaudhury and Anurag Thakur, Priyanka Gandhi Vadra of the Congress is another prominent member on the committee. Among the Lok Sabha members, 17 are from the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance, including 12 from the BJP.

Lok Sabha adjourns sine die amid protest by Congress

The Lok Sabha was adjourned sine die on Friday, December 20, after four weeks of high drama and protests,



which crippled the Parliament.

As soon as the Lok Sabha convened for the day, the Speaker called Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal to present a resolution for setting up a joint committee of Parliament to examine the bills related to 'one nation, one election'. Slogans of 'Jai Bhim' reverberated in the House as the Speaker read out directions barring demonstrations and protests at the gates of Parliament.

As the protests continued, the Speaker adjourned the House sine die.

Even before the House proceedings began, Congress members started raising slogans "Jai Bheem, Jai Jai Bheem".

Amid the slogans by the opposition, Prime Minister Narendra Modi entered the Lok Sabha chamber.

The Winter Session saw a standoff between the Congress and BJP with charges of 'attempt to murder' against the Opposition and they demand resignation of the Home Minister over remark on BR Ambedkar.

The Opposition MPs staged a protest at Vijay Chowk here on Friday again demanding Home Minister Amit Shah's apology and resignation for allegedly "insulting" BR Ambedkar.

They also carried out a protest march from Vijay Chowk to Parliament. Congress general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra also slammed the BJP over the FIR filed against the Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi, saying it "shows their desperation level".

2,200 cases of violence against Hindus in B'desh, 112 in Pak: Govt

NEW DELHI (TIP)

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) on Friday, December 20, revealed that as many as 2,200 cases of violence against Hindus took place in Bangladesh in the year 2024, especially after the Sheikh Hasina-led Awami League government collapsed in the neighbouring country. The government noted that 112 such cases were also reported in Pakistan during the same period.

Submitting the data in Rajya Sabha, MEA said that it has written to both Bangladesh and Pakistan, asking the respective governments to ensure safety, security and well-being of Hindus in their countries.

"The government has taken serious note of these incidents and shared its concerns with the Government of Bangladesh. India's expectation is that the Government of Bangladesh will take all necessary measures to ensure the safety and welfare of Hindus and other minorities," a statement from the Ministry of External Affairs stated.

"The Government of India raises the issue of violence against minority communities through diplomatic channels and has urged the Government of Pakistan to take steps to prevent religious intolerance, sectarian violence, systemic persecution and attacks on

minority communities and ensure their safety, security, and well-being. India continues to highlight the plight of minorities in Pakistan at an appropriate international forum," the statement added. As per the data shared, 47 incidents of violence against Hindus were reported in Bangladesh in the year 2022, 302 in 2023 and surged to 2,200 in 2024 (till December 8, 2024).

In Pakistan, 241 cases of atrocities against Hindus were reported in 2022, 103 in 2023 and 112 in 2024 (till October), the data added.

The government also noted that no cases of violence against Hindus were reported in any neighbouring countries other than Bangladesh and Pakistan.

"Cases of violence against Hindus and other minorities in other neighbouring countries (except Pakistan and Bangladesh) - NIL," it read.

Minister of State for External Affairs Kirti Vardhan Singh gave the information in a written response to a query in Rajya Sabha, citing data from minority and human rights organisations.

The Union minister in his response also said the "government has taken serious note of these incidents and shared its concerns with the government of Bangladesh".

"India's expectation is that Bangladesh will take all necessary measures to ensure safety and welfare of Hindus and other minorities. The same was also reiterated during the visit of the Foreign Secretary to Bangladesh on December 9, 2024," he added.

Relations between India and Bangladesh faced significant tension following the ousting of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, who was compelled to leave the country amidst large-scale anti-government protests in August. Days later, Nobel Peace Prize laureate Muhammad Yunus assumed power after Hasina sought refuge in India.

52 kg gold, Rs 10 cr cash seized from Innova abandoned in Bhopal forest

The Income Tax (I-T) Department on Friday, December 20, recovered 52 kg of gold and Rs 9.86 crore in cash from an abandoned Innova car in the forests near Bhopal, the police commissioner said. This latest seizure comes in the backdrop of the ongoing raids on several construction companies across Bhopal and Indore.

During one of these ongoing raids, the authorities received a tip-off of a car leaving Bhopal with a huge amount of cash and jewellery. Acting on the tip-off, a team of 100 policemen along with the I-T Department seized a four-wheeler in the wee hours of Friday in Mendori village.

Earlier in the week, the I-T department raided 51 locations of a construction company in Bhopal and Indore.

So far, Rs 2.85 crore in cash has been recovered from the house and office of former RTO constable Saurabh Sharma.

According to Lokayukta DSP Ravindra Singh, 60 kg silver bars have also been recovered from Sharma's house.

Apart from this, gold, silver and diamond jewellery worth Rs 50 lakh has also been recovered during the ongoing raids. The anti-corruption unit has also found 4 vehicles at Saurabh Sharma's house, out of which one is a luxury car.

According to Lokayukta, documents of properties worth crores have also been recovered from Sharma's house and office. A note found on a counting machine in his house has also stumped Lokayukta. A probe is underway.

'US man gifted drone to Manipur ultras'

Daniel Stephen Courney, a 40-year-old controversial evangelist of US origin, emerged as a subject of public interest after a video of him distributing drones and bulletproof jackets among Kuki militants in Manipur surfaced online. The video, which has been cited as proof to accuse him of inciting violence in ethnic violence-hit Manipur, was uploaded on his YouTube channel named "Fool for Christ" in March this year.

However, it was likely shot between August 16 and September 3, 2023, as India Today's Open-Source Intelligence (OSINT) team has established by analysing photos and videos posted by Courney and his associate MS Kumar on YouTube and Facebook. Apart from distributing relief materials to Kuki civilians, he also distributed socks, boots, two bulletproof vests, and a small drone to monitor the movement of the "enemy", i.e., "Meitei Hindus". Though there is nothing illegal about buying or gifting drones or bulletproof vests, such activities in an already strife-torn region by a foreign national with a claimed history in the US armed forces triggered concerns and veered too far from how religious preachers are expected to function.

PM Modi's Kuwait visit to open new chapter in bilateral ties: MEA

NEW DELHI (TIP)

Prime Minister Narendra Modi is set to visit Kuwait on a two-day tour starting Saturday, December 21, marking the first visit by an Indian Prime Minister to the Gulf nation in over four decades.

Modi's visit will help in opening a new chapter in the bilateral ties, the MEA said on Friday, adding that his visit would help develop a more dynamic partnership between the two countries.

The visit aims to bolster a more dynamic partnership between the two nations, MEA said, adding, "We are looking at bolstering ties in several areas, including defence and trade."

Elaborating on details of the visit in a special briefing, Secretary (CPV & OIA) Arun Kumar Chatterjee said, "This marks the first visit by an Indian PM to Kuwait in 43 years...There are excellent political relations between the two countries."

Upon his arrival, PM Modi will be accorded a ceremonial Guard of Honour at the Bayan Palace. This will be followed by separate meetings with the Emir of Kuwait and the Crown Prince of Kuwait, Chatterjee said.

Additionally, the Prime Minister will address the Indian diaspora at a community event and will also visit a labour camp, that hosts Indian expat workers.

As a special guest of the Emir of Kuwait, PM Modi will also attend the opening ceremony of the 26th Arabian



Minister of Kuwait travelled to India.

Bilateral mechanisms

India and Kuwait have institutionalised their cooperation through mechanisms such as the Joint Commission for Cooperation (JCC), which was established during the visit of the Kuwaiti foreign minister to India in December 2024, which is headed at the foreign minister level. Seven new Joint Working Groups (JWGs) have been established in the areas of trade, investment, education, technology, agriculture, security, and culture. These complement the three existing JWGs in hydrocarbons, health, and consular matters, bringing the total number of JWGs to 10 following the signing of the JCC. Six rounds of Foreign Office Consultations (FOCs) have been held, with the latest taking place in July 2024. Additionally, 26 agreements and memorandums of understanding (MoUs) have been signed under this framework.

Economic relations

Archaeological Survey of India surveys newly found temple, wells in Sambhal

NEW DELHI (TIP)

A four-member team of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) inspected the newly uncovered temple, 5 'teerth' and 19 wells in Sambhal, Uttar Pradesh, district magistrate Dr Rajender Pensiya told news agency ANI.

"In Sambhal, 5 'teerth' and 19 wells were inspected by ASI. The new temple that was found was also inspected. The survey took place 8-10 hours. In total around 24 areas were surveyed," DM Pensiya said.

He also stated that the ASI would submit a report to them based on their findings. The Sambhal district administration had written to the ASI for carbon dating of the temple and the well, news agency PTI reported.

On December 13, the 'ancient' Shri Kartik Mahadev Temple (Bhasma Shankar temple) was reopened for prayers, after it was discovered by officials during an anti-encroachment drive near the Shahi Jama Masjid. The temple had allegedly been closed since communal riots in the area in 1978 led to the displacement of Hindu families.

This discovery of the temple came on the heels of clashes between the police and residents in the area over a court-ordered survey of the Shahi Jama Masjid.

The violence that ensued on November 24 claimed the lives of five people and left 20 police officers injured. Since then, police forces have been deployed around the site.

The Supreme Court, in November, ordered civil courts to cease taking up fresh suits challenging the ownership or title





Ustad Zakir Hussain: Tabla loses its vibrant voice

ONE OF THE GREATEST GLOBAL AMBASSADORS OF INDIAN CLASSICAL MUSIC, THE MAESTRO TRANSFORMED THE MODEST INSTRUMENT INTO A ROBUST VOICE FOR UNIVERSAL PEACE AND BROTHERHOOD.

The tabla fell silent as Ustad Zakir Hussain (1951-2024), one of the greatest global ambassadors of Indian classical music, passed away on Monday (December 16, 2024) after a brief illness in San Francisco, California. A maestro who transformed the modest instrument into a robust voice for universal peace and humanity, Hussain's incredible speed, dexterity, and creativity mesmerised audiences across cultures.

Having grown up singing odes to Mother Saraswati, verses of the holy Quran, and hymns of the Bible as a daily ritual, India's syncretic soul echoed through Hussain's rhythmic art. With a flair for carving stories out of percussive sound, his conversational music buzzed with a spark of spontaneity. Natural flow defined his music and personality. The Padma Vibhushan would impress the purists, enthrall the seekers of fusion, and handhold the fans of Bollywood music into his creative space with equal felicity. At the peak of his creativity genius, he bagged three Grammys in one night this February.

Like his carefully designed free-flowing style, the versatile artist would execute complex rhythms, intricate patterns, and nuanced dynamics and then move on to items like the sound of traffic signal and deer's walk, without putting music into brackets. In tune with technology, over the years, he experimented with frequencies to highlight the subtle shades of the instrument to establish that tabla is not just a rhythmic instrument but also a melodic one. He emerged on the scene alongside eminent tabla artists like Anindo Chatterjee, Shafaat Ahmed Khan, Kumar Bose, and Swapan Chaudhuri, but Hussain's role in popularising tabla and providing it a global platform remains unparalleled.

Born to Ustad Alla Rakha, the eminent accompanist of Pandit Ravi Shankar, credited with taking tabla to foreign shores, tabla chose Hussain. He grew up in Mumbai in an environment where his father believed that every instrument has its spirit. Hussain befriended the tabla at the age of three and by the time he hit teenage, the instrument had become his muse for life and perhaps an extension of his personality. After watching him play, one couldn't see playing tabla as a chore in classical music.

His other two brothers, Taufiq and Fazal, are also noted percussionists but Hussain took his father's legacy to the next level by adding a touch of



showmanship and expanding the riches he inherited from the Punjab gharana. A keen learner and listener, Hussain was like a responsive satellite in orbit as an accompanist, shone like a star in his solos, and reserved the adventurous streak of a meteor for creating fusion music.

A child prodigy who gave his first professional performance at 12, Hussain was not regimented by his teacher-father. Rooted in Indian tradition, he was allowed to develop wings and explore new shores. His day would start with devotional music that would invoke Hindu deities followed by polishing Koranic verses in the neighbourhood madarsa before he would join the morning prayers at the Convent school. By 19, Hussain taught at the University of Washington before joining Ustad Ali

Akbar Khan's music college in San Francisco where he met his soulmate Antonia Minnecola.

Another fortuitous meeting in New York led to a lifelong bond with the iconic English guitarist John McLaughlin. Their friendship led to the formation of the groundbreaking Shakti band in 1973 which included violinist L. Shankar and percussionist T. H. Vinayakram who blended Hindustani and Carnatic classical music with Western jazz influences. This year, the band where Hussain joined hands with a new set of distinguished musicians won the Grammy for Best Global Music.

Hussain's desire to experiment led to rewarding collaborations with Irish singer Van Morrison, American percussionist Mickey Hart, Latin Jazz percussionist Giovanni Hidalgo, and

Jerry Garcia, the lead vocalist and guitarist of the Grateful Dead. He joined the Asian Underground music's electronic surge as well in the 1990s but retained the natural acoustic quality of tabla. He shared a special bond with Santoor maestro Pandit Shiv Kumar Sharma, flautist Hari Prasad Chaurasia, and sarangi stalwart Ustad Sultan Khan. Their jugalbandis would start as melodic banter and then turn meditative. In sync with the next generation, last year, he composed the Triple Concerto for Tabla, Sitar and Flute, with Niladri Kumar and Rakesh Chaurasia, and his collaboration with Carnatic musicians extended to violinist Kala Ramnath and veena exponent Jayanthi Kumaresh.

Fusion was never a novelty for Hussain as he had grown up listening to stories of how Amir Khusrau blended the Indian traditions of Dhrupad and Haveli sangeet with Sufi Qaul to create Khayal. As a young musician, he saw his father and colleagues contributing to Hindi film music that liberally drew from diverse musical streams. Hussain had his brush with cinema when he played tabla for Laxmikant Pyarelal's maiden venture Parasmani. Later he composed music for Ismail Merchant's films like Muhafiz, Aparna Sen's Mr And Mrs Iyer, and Rahul Dholakia's Parzania. The meaningful sound of his tabla lent layers to storytelling in international productions like Francis Ford Coppola's Apocalypse Now and recently Dev Patel's Monkey Man.

Hussain also had a flair for acting from a young age. It is said Dilip Kumar recommended his name to K Asif for the role of young Salim in Mughal-e-Azam but Ustad Alla Rakha vetoed it. Later, he performed in Ismail Merchant's Heat & Dust and Sai Paranjpye's Saaz. However, he became a household figure when he brought classical music to the mainstream by promoting a tea brand in a commercial where he played tabla at the iconic Taj Mahal. As an article in The Hindu described, "The combination of "Wah Taj!" with the dashing young Hussain's curly locks flying about his face as his fingers flew across the surface of his tabla — not to mention that charming smile accompanied by the resonance of his playing — ensured brand immortality.

Fame didn't diminish his humility and age didn't wilt his curiosity. Music was an endless journey for Hussain. Every time someone would toss the word perfection, he would say, "I haven't played good enough to quit."

A Tale of Heroism: The Martyrdom of the Sahibzadas

THE MARTYRDOM OF THE YOUNGER SAHIBZADAS IS OBSERVED AS VEER BAL DIVAS. ON 9TH JANUARY 2022, THE DAY OF THE PRAKASH PURAB OF SRI GURU GOBIND SINGH JI, THE PRIME MINISTER HAD ANNOUNCED THAT 26TH DECEMBER WOULD BE OBSERVED AS 'VEER BAL DIWAS', TO MARK THE MARTYRDOM OF THE YOUNGER SONS OF SRI GURU GOBIND SINGH - SAHIBZADAS BABA ZORAWAR SINGH JI AND BABA FATEH SINGH JI.

The martyrdom of the four sons of Guru Gobind Singh, the founder of Khalsa, is one of the most tragic and yet most glorious part of the proud community's history. The Sikhs have a long history of heroic struggle and sacrifice. The 5th Master of the Sikhs, Guru Arjan Dev Ji and the 9th Master of the Sikhs, Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji made supreme sacrifices for humanity, at large. The 10th Master and the Founder of the Khalsa which means pure (that is how the Sikhs came to be known) made sacrifices that stood out in the realms of world history. The martyrdom of the four Sahibzadas, Guru Gobind Singh's sons, has to be seen in that glorious tradition that Sikhs take pride in and derive inspiration from.

The four young princes of genteel birth – The Char Sahibzade – is the term endearingly used for the four sons of Guru Gobind Singh, all of whom died as martyrs while still in their tender age. Their names are reverently preserved in Sikh memory and are recalled every time the Sikh Ardas or prayer of supplication is recited at every religious ceremony in a congregation and privately twice a day (after the morning and evening prayer) by an individual. Sahibzada Ajit Singh, the eldest son of Guru Gobind Singh, was born to Mata Sundri at Paonta on 26 January 1687. The following year the Guru and his family returned to Anandpur. Sahibzada Jujhar Singh, the second son of Guru Gobind Singh, was born to Mata Jito-ji at Anandpur on 14 March 1691. From a very young age both brothers were taught the religious texts, philosophy and history alongside their training in swordsmanship, archery and horse riding. Soon they grew up into handsome young men, strong, intelligent and natural leaders of men.

In 1699 both Sahibzade Ajit Singh and Jujhar Singh, 12 years and 8 years of age respectively, received the rites of Khalsa initiation. Soon after the creation of Khalsa on 30 March 1699, Ajit Singh had his first test of skill. A Sikh Sangat coming from Pothohar was attacked and looted by Ranghars on the way, a short distance from Anandpur across the River Sutlej. Guru Gobind Singh sent Sahibzada Ajit Singh, then barely 12 years of age, at the head of about 100 Sikhs to punish the Ranghars and to recover the loot. The following year, 29 August 1700, when the hill Rajas, backed by Imperial troops, attacked Anandpur.



Ajit Singh was made responsible for the defense of Taragarh Fort which became the first target of attack. Ajit Singh, assisted by Bhai Ude Singh, a seasoned soldier, repulsed the attack. On 15 March 1701 a column of Sikh devotees coming

from Darap area (present Sialkot district) was waylaid by Gujjars and Ranghars. Sahibzada Ajit Singh led a successful expedition against them.

Instructed by his father, on 7 March 1703, he took out 100 horsemen to Bassi,

near Hoshiarpur and rescued a young Brahman bride forcibly taken away by the local Pathans. During the prolonged siege of Anandpur, it became necessary to leave the city under the pressure of pursuing enemy. Both the Sahibzade were experienced warriors, strong and fearless, displaying qualities of courage and steadfastness. On the night of 5 December 1705 Guru Gobind Singh gave each of his sons the command of a band of brave Sikhs to wade through the flooded Sarsa river on horseback and head towards the Fort of Chamkaur. Amidst the fierce fighting in the darkness of night and the hazardous long journey the Guru and the Sikhs, together with his family and both the elder Sahibzade in command of their bands, made their way to Chamkaur.

Further reduced in numbers by casualties at the hands of the enemy they reached Chamkaur by nightfall on 6 December 1705 and took up position in the Garhi – high walled fortified house. The enemy, with extra reinforcements from Malerkotla and Sirhind and from among local Ranghars and Gujjars, threw a tight ring around the fort of Chamkaur. An unequal but grim battle commenced with the dawn of 7 December 1705 – in the words of Guru Gobind Singh's Zafarnama – 'a mere forty defying a million'. The Sikhs, after they had exhausted the meager stock of ammunition and arrows, made sally in batches of five to engage the encircling enemy with sword and spear. Sahibzada Ajit Singh led one of the sallies and laid down his life fighting in the bloody battle, followed by his younger brother Sahibzada Jujhar Singh who led the next sally. Sahibzada Ajit Singh and Sahibzada Jujhar Singh, 18 and 14 years old respectively, who like the other brave Sikhs, fell fighting heroically. The valour displayed by the young sons of Guru Gobind Singh has been sympathetically and vividly narrated in the poems of a devout Muslim, Allahyar Khan Jogi.

Today Gurdwara Qatalgarh Sahib (Shahid Ganj) is the main shrine at Chamkaur. This marks the site where the most fierce hand-to-hand combat took place on 7 December 1705 between the Mughal army and a handful of brave Sikhs, including Sahibzade Ajit Singh and Jujhar Singh, and three of the original Panj Piare (Guru's Five Beloved ones). Unfortunately, during the crossing of the flooded river Sarsa, Mata Gujri and the two younger Sahibzade Zorawar Singh and Fateh Singh, aged 9

and 7 years respectively, together with their cook, Gangu, were separated from the Guru and the Sikhs. Seizing the opportunity of a reward Gangu spied on them and handed them over to the enemy. Both the young Sahibzade were executed on 12 December 1705 in Sirhind. Sahibzada Zorawar Singh was born on 17 November 1696 and Sahibzada Fateh Singh on 25 February 1699. After the tragic death of their mother Mata Jito-ji (5 Dec 1700) they were brought up under the care of their grandmother Mata Gujri Ji.

Both the princes were closely attached to their grandmother. Mata Gujri took charge of both the princes as the column moved out of Anandpur. As Guru Gobind Singh evacuated Anandpur on the night of 5 December 1705, he was pursued by the host. In front ran the river Sarsa, swollen with rain water. Under cover of a quick rearguard action fought on the river bank, the Guru, his brave Sikhs and his family succeeded in crossing the Sarsa. Unfortunately, in the commotion of confused cries in the dark, Mata Gujri and the two younger Sahibzade, along with their cook, Gangu, were separated from the Guru and his band. Not knowing where to go Gangu offered to shelter them at his house in village Kheri, now known as Saheri, near Morinda. The journey being hazardous and dark they reached Kheri the following night. Tired and hungry they were asked to rest in the attic. But Gangu proved deceitful. During the night Gangu stole Mata Gujri's saddlebag containing cash and valuables. In the hope of a reward from the government he spied on them. With the help of the village headman he betrayed them to Jani Khan and Mani Khan, the Ranghar officials of Morinda.

The latter took Mata Gujri and the two Sahibzade into custody and in the morning dispatched them to Sirhind where they were confined in the Cold Tower – Thanda Burj – of the Fort. On the morning of 9 December 1705 Zorawar Singh and Fateh Singh, aged 9 and 7 respectively, were summoned before the faujdar, Nawab Wazir Khan. Wazir Khan tried to lure the Sahibzade to embrace Islam with promises of riches and honors. But the brave and fearless sons of Guru Gobind Singh spurned the suggestion. He then threatened them with death but they remained undaunted. Nawab Sher Muhammad Khan, a high ranking officer and chief of Malerkotla, who was also present in the court, intervened for the innocent children to be spared their lives; to be given some more time to ponder over the suggestion to convert. As a result the two Sahibzade spent another two days of severe winter in their grandmother's lap in the Cold Tower. Still adamant as ever, on 11 December 1705 Nawab Wazir Khan ordered their death by bricking them alive. Nawab Sher Muhammad Khan pleaded against the death sentence on the grounds that the boys were too young to be given such a harsh penalty.

They could not, in any case, be held responsible for the actions of their father. As Wazir Khan began to waver at the just reproof of his peer,

Suchchanand put in a remark “The progeny of a serpent shall grow up as serpents, and should therefore be shown no mercy.” Wazir Khan was encouraged by these words and thereupon reiterated his order for the children to be bricked alive in a wall. By Divine Will, as the masonry around their tender bodies reached chest high, it crumbled. Wazir Khan's anger at this failure ordered the princes back to the Cold Tower for another night. The next day, 12 December 1705, the Sahibzade were once again offered the choice to convert to Islam or face death by execution. The brave Sahibzade chose the latter and were executed. The aged Mata Gujri, who had all along been kept in the Cold Tower, only a short distance away, breathed her last as the news of the execution reached her ears. After the death of Mata Gujri and the two Sahibzade, Seth Todar Mall, a wealthy merchant and an influential citizen of Sirhind, made arrangements to perform the last rites. But no one would give him a patch of land in the locality to be used as cremation ground. Then one Chandhari Atta, a local resident, agreed to sell him a small plot.

He stipulated that Todar Mall could take only as much land as he could cover with gold nuggets, mohran. The Seth produced the mohran and bought the piece of land he needed. After the cremation a Sikh, Jodh Singh, of village Attevali buried the ashes. Sirhind suffered a full fury of Sikh ire when Banda Singh Bahadur marched upon it with his daring host. Wazir Khan was killed. Diwan Suchchanand, who explicitly championed the penalty laid upon the young Sahibzade, was captured and killed. Sirhind and the Fort were razed to the ground. A memorial was erected marking the spot where the two princes were executed. In 1764 Maharaja Karam Singh of Patiala built the Gurdwara Fatehgarh on the site and ordered to search for and determine the exact spot where the three were cremated. At the spot, in 1843, the Gurdwara Joti Sarup was built. In 1888 Giani Thakar Singh started the annual Jor-Mela (fair) held during the last week in December to commemorate the martyrdom of Guru Gobind Singh's mother, Mata Gujri Ji, and his two sons Sahibzadas Zorawar Singh and Fateh Singh. A century later, in 1944, Maharaja Yadavinder Singh set up a committee for the improvement of Gurdwara Fatehgarh Sahib and Gurdwara Joti Sarup Sahib. Today Gurdwara Fatehgarh, with all the affiliated shrines, is administered directly by Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee.

Sahibzada Ajit Singh Ji

Sahibzada Ajit Singh (1687-1705) was born to Mata Sunder Kaur and Guru Gobind Singh at Paonta Sahib. Sahibzada Ajit Singh and Sahibzada Jujhar Singh are remembered as ‘Vade Sahibzada’ in Sikh history. Sahibzada Ajit Singh was very intelligent, gifted with Gurbani, and agile from his childhood. At an early age, he mastered horseback riding and gun shooting. On May 23, 1699, while commanding a group

of one hundred Singhs, he successfully raided the nearby village of Ranghars, who had once plundered the company of Pothohar Sikhs coming towards Anandpur Sahib. On March 15, 1700, he attacked the Gujars of Bajrur village, who once robbed the caravan of Singhs. On August 29, 1700, when the hill kings attacked the Taragarh fort, Sahibzada Ajit Singh bravely fought along with the Singhs. Similarly, in October 1700, again, the mountain forces attacked Nirmohgarh. Sahibzada took the lead, fought vigorously, and killed many hilly soldiers. Once, Dwarka Das Brahmin's wife was taken away by the ruler of Bassi Kalan. On March 7, 1703, along with Bhai Uday Singh, Sahibzada and a group of one hundred (100) Singhs rescued the wife of the Brahmin from Basi Kalan and handed her over to the Brahmin. Sahibzada Ajit Singh spent most of his life on the land of Anandpur Sahib. In May 1705, when Anandpur Sahib was besieged by a coalition force of Hill Chieftians and Mughal forces, he was also there. Both the elder Sahibzadas were with their father while leaving Anandpur Sahib. When forty Singhs fought a fierce battle in the fort of Chamkaur, Sahibzada Ajit Singh went to the battlefield with Singh spirit, showed his bravery, and killed many enemies. "Gur Sobha" testifies to this. Sahibzada Ajit Singh's total age at the time of martyrdom was 18 years, 11 months, and 19 days.

Sahibzada Jujhar Singh Ji

Sahibzada Jujhar Singh (1691-1705) was born to Guru Gobind Singh and Mata Jit Kaur at Anandpur Sahib. Like his elder brother, he too was very intelligent, Gurbani-oriented, and skilled in horseback riding and archery. When Guru Sahib left Anandpur Sahib, he was also a companion. During the war of Chamkaur, he demonstrated his unwavering bravery and skill in a face-to-face fight with enemy forces. Before achieving martyrdom, he fought fiercely and killed many soldiers of the Mughal forces. Such a great personality was Guru Gobind Singh Ji that before the start of the battle, he himself introduced both the Sahibzadas to the tradition of martyrdom. The Battle of Chamkaur was fought between the Khalsas and the joint forces of Mughals and hill chieftains of Shivalik Hills. It started at noon and continued until sunset. Guru Sahib has also mentioned this battle in his historical letter in Farsi, 'Zafarnama' or "Epistle of Victory," addressed to Aurangzeb. The details of this battle are also found in 'Bhattvahi Multani Sindhi'. By evening, only five Singhs were left in this battle. A council of Punj Pyares was convened and appealed Gurmata to order the Guru Sahib to leave the fort (kachi garhi) with three Singhs. The next morning, December 8, 1705, the remaining two Singhs, Bhai Sant Singh and Bhai Sangat Singh achieved martyrdom fighting the Mughal forces. Thus, the Battle of Chamkaur, fought between 40 odd Singhs and ten lacs of coalition forces led by the Mughals, remained the most unparalleled battle ever fought.


Sahibzada Zorawar Singh Ji



Sahibzada Zorawar Singh (1696-1705) was born at Anandpur Sahib to Mata Jit Kaur and Guru Gobind Singh. From an early age, like his elder brothers, he too had a compelling learning spirit. When Guru Sahib decided to leave Anandpur Sahib, both the younger Sahibzadas, Baba Zorawar Singh and Baba Fateh Singh, were also travelling with them and were in the care of their grandmother, Mata Gujri Ji. During the turbulence-dark night at the bank of the Sarsa River, they got separated from the main jatha, and on the way, they happened to meet their former cook servant, Gangu, who had been discharged from Guru Gobind Singh's household. Gangu took Mata Gujri and the younger Sahibzades to his village, Saheri (Kheri), near Morinda. He sheltered them in his house. In the night, when Mata Ji and Sahibzades fell asleep, Gangu searched their belongings and stole valuables. In the morning, when Mata Ji raised the issue with Gangu, the greedy Gangu became angry and protested his innocence, who later got them arrested at the Kotwal of Morinda, and from there they were sent to the court of Subedar Wazir Khan of Sirhind.

Sahibzada Fateh Singh Ji

Sahibzada Fateh Singh (1699-1705) was born to Mata Jit Kaur and Guru Gobind Singh at Anandpur Sahib. Fateh Singh was one year and ten months old at that time of the demise of his mother. So the upbringing of these two young heroes was approved under the care of their grandmother. At Sirhind, despite the chilly winter weather, they were kept as royal prisoners in an open, cold tower (Thanda Burj). From here, starts the mental and physical torture of the innocent sahibzadas. First, they were offered to convert to Islam, with promises. When they stood firm to their religious beliefs and flatly refused to convert to Islam, tactics of torture and threats were used on them. But both the Sahibzadas, aged 9 and 7, did not bow to

any threat to their lives. Finally, Subedar Wazir Khan, on the advice of Diwan Sucha Nand, and the Quazi passed the order of killing the innocent Sahibzadas by bricking them alive in a wall. It is said that during the court proceeding, the Nawab of Malerkotla, Nawab Sher Muhammad Khan, stood in protest against the gruesome order of the Subedar. On December 12, 1705, both the Sahibzadas were bricked alive in a wall, and when the walls came up on their shoulders, they were killed by cutting

their heads. Mata Gujri Ji was also tortured and killed in the cold tower by the subedar's soldiers. A merchant in Sirhind Diwan Todar Mall paid a heavy price in gold coins to purchase the land where Sahibzadas were cremated; it is considered to be the most valuable land in the history of the world.

At the site of cremation now stands a glorious Gurdwara, Gurdwara Fatehgarh Sahib, where thousands of devotees pay their obeisance to the youngest martyrs.

HISTORY

PRODUCERS

Christmas: Celebrating the anniversary of Jesus' birth



The middle of winter has long been a time of celebration around the world. Centuries before the arrival of the man called Jesus, early Europeans celebrated light and birth in the darkest days of winter. Many peoples rejoiced during the winter solstice, when the worst of the winter was behind them and they could look forward to longer days and extended hours of sunlight.

In Scandinavia, the Norse celebrated Yule from December 21, the winter solstice, through January. In recognition of the return of the sun, fathers and sons would bring home large logs, which they would set on fire.

The people would feast until the log burned out, which could take as many as 12 days. The Norse believed that each spark from the fire represented a new pig or calf that would be born during the coming year.

The end of December was a perfect time for celebration in most areas of Europe. At that time of year, most cattle were slaughtered so they would not have to be fed during the winter. For many, it was the only time of year when they had a supply of fresh meat. In addition, most wine and beer made during the year was finally fermented and ready for drinking.

In Germany, people honored the pagan god Oden during the mid-winter holiday. Germans were terrified of Oden, as they believed he made nocturnal flights through the sky to observe his people, and then decide who would prosper or perish. Because of his presence, many people chose to stay inside.

Saturnalia and Christmas

In Rome, where winters were not as harsh as those in the far north, Saturnalia—a holiday in honor of Saturn, the god of agriculture—was celebrated. Beginning in the week leading up to the winter solstice and continuing for a full month, Saturnalia was a hedonistic time, when food and drink were plentiful and the normal Roman social order was turned upside



down. For a month, enslaved people were given temporary freedom and treated as equals. Business and schools were closed so that everyone could participate in the holiday's festivities.

Also around the time of the winter solstice, Romans observed Juvenalia, a feast honoring the children of Rome. In addition, members of the upper classes often celebrated the birthday of Mithra, the god of the unconquerable sun, on December 25. It was believed that Mithra, an infant god, was born of a rock. For some Romans, Mithra's birthday was the most sacred day of the year.

Is Christmas Really the Day Jesus Was Born?

In the early years of Christianity, Easter was the main holiday; the birth of Jesus was not celebrated. In the fourth century, church officials decided to institute the birth of Jesus as a holiday. Unfortunately, the Bible does not mention date for his birth (a fact Puritans later

Christmas is celebrated on December 25 and is both a sacred religious holiday and a worldwide cultural and commercial phenomenon. For two millennia, people around the world have been observing it with traditions and practices that are both religious and secular in nature. Christians celebrate Christmas Day as the anniversary of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth, a spiritual leader whose teachings form the basis of their religion. Popular customs include exchanging gifts, decorating Christmas trees, attending church, sharing meals with family and friends and, of course, waiting for Santa Claus to arrive. December 25—Christmas Day—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1870.

pointed out in order to deny the legitimacy of the celebration).

Although some evidence suggests that Jesus' birth may have occurred in the spring (why would shepherds be herding in the middle of winter?), Pope Julius I chose December 25. It is commonly believed that the church chose this date in an effort to adopt and absorb the traditions of the pagan Saturnalia festival. First called the Feast of the Nativity, the custom spread to Egypt by 432 and to England by the end of the sixth century.

By holding Christmas at the same time as traditional winter solstice festivals, church leaders increased the chances that Christmas would be popularly embraced, but gave up the ability to dictate how it was celebrated. By the Middle Ages, Christianity had, for the most part, replaced pagan religion.

On Christmas, believers attended church, then celebrated raucously in a drunken, carnival-like atmosphere similar to today's Mardi Gras. Each year, a beggar or student would be crowned the "lord of misrule" and eager celebrants played the part of his subjects. The poor would go to the houses of the rich and demand their best food and drink. If owners failed to comply, their visitors would most likely terrorize them with mischief. Christmas became the time of year when the upper classes could repay their real or imagined "debt" to society by entertaining less fortunate citizens.

When Christmas Was Cancelled

In the early 17th century, a wave of religious reform changed the way Christmas was celebrated in Europe. When Oliver Cromwell and his Puritan forces took over England in 1645, they vowed to rid England of decadence and, as part of their effort, cancelled Christmas. By popular demand, Charles II was restored to the throne and, with him, came the return of the popular holiday.

The pilgrims, English separatists that came to America in 1620, were even more orthodox in their Puritan beliefs than Cromwell. As a result, Christmas was not a holiday in early America. From 1659 to 1681, the celebration of Christmas was actually outlawed in Boston. Anyone exhibiting the Christmas spirit was fined five shillings. By contrast, in the Jamestown settlement, Captain John Smith reported that Christmas was enjoyed by all and passed without incident.

After the American Revolution, English customs fell out of favor, including Christmas. In fact, Christmas wasn't declared a federal holiday until June 26, 1870.

Washington Irving Reinvents Christmas in America

It wasn't until the 19th century that Americans began to embrace Christmas. Americans re-invented Christmas, and changed it from a raucous carnival holiday into a family-centered day of peace and nostalgia. But what about the 1800s piqued American interest in the holiday?

The early 19th century was a period of class conflict and turmoil. During this time, unemployment was high and gang rioting by the disenfranchised classes often occurred during the Christmas season. In 1828, the New York city council instituted the city's first police force in response to a Christmas riot. This catalyzed certain members of the upper classes to begin to change the way Christmas was celebrated in America.

In 1819, best-selling author Washington Irving wrote *The Sketchbook of Geoffrey Crayon, gent.*, a series of stories about the celebration of Christmas in an English manor house. The sketches feature a squire who invited the peasants into his home for the holiday. In contrast to the problems faced in American society, the two groups mingled effortlessly. In Irving's mind, Christmas should be a peaceful, warm-hearted holiday bringing groups together across lines of wealth or social status. Irving's fictitious celebrants enjoyed "ancient customs," including the crowning of a Lord of Misrule. Irving's book, however, was not based on any holiday celebration he had attended—in fact, many historians say that Irving's account actually "invented"



tradition by implying that it described the true customs of the season.

'A Christmas Carol'

Also around this time, English author Charles Dickens created the classic holiday tale, *A Christmas Carol*. The story's message—the importance of charity and good will towards all humankind—struck a powerful chord in the United States and England and showed members of Victorian society the benefits of celebrating the holiday.

The family was also becoming less disciplined and more sensitive to the emotional needs of children during the early 1800s. Christmas provided families with a day when they could lavish attention and gifts on their children without appearing to "spoil" them.

As Americans began to embrace Christmas as a perfect family holiday, old customs were unearthed. People looked toward recent immigrants and Catholic and Episcopalian churches to see how the day should be celebrated. In the next 100 years, Americans built a Christmas tradition all their own that included pieces of many other customs, including decorating trees, sending holiday cards and gift-giving.

Although most families quickly bought into the idea that they were celebrating Christmas how it had been done for centuries, Americans had really re-invented a holiday to fill the cultural needs of a growing nation.

Who Invented Santa Claus?

The legend of Santa Claus can be traced back to a monk named St. Nicholas who was born in Turkey around A. D. 280. St. Nicholas gave away all of his inherited wealth and traveled the countryside helping the poor and sick, becoming known as the protector of children and sailors.

St. Nicholas first entered American popular culture in the late 18th century in New York, when Dutch families gathered to honor the anniversary of the death of "Sint Nikolaas" (Dutch for Saint Nicholas), or "Sinter Klaas" for short. "Santa Claus" draws his name from this abbreviation.

In 1822, Episcopal minister Clement Clarke Moore wrote a Christmas poem called "An Account of a Visit from St. Nicholas," more popularly known today by its first line: "'Twas The Night Before Christmas." The poem depicted Santa Claus as a jolly man who flies from home to home on a sled driven by reindeer to deliver toys.

The iconic version of Santa Claus as a jolly man in red with a white beard and a sack of toys was



immortalized in 1881, when political cartoonist Thomas Nast drew on Moore's poem to create the image of Old Saint Nick we know today.

Christmas Facts

- Each year, 25-30 million real Christmas trees are sold in the United States alone. There are about 15,000 Christmas tree farms in the United States, and trees usually grow for between four and 15 years before they are sold.
- In the Middle Ages, Christmas celebrations were rowdy and raucous—a lot like today's Mardi Gras parties.
- When Christmas was cancelled: From 1659 to 1681, the celebration of Christmas was outlawed in Boston, and law-breakers were fined five shillings.

Hanukkah: The Jewish festival

Hanukkah, Jewish festival that begins on Kisleiv 25 (usually in December, according to the Gregorian calendar) and is celebrated for eight days. Hanukkah reaffirms the ideals of Judaism and commemorates in particular the rededication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem by the lighting of candles on each day of the festival. Although not mentioned in the Hebrew Scriptures, Hanukkah came to be widely celebrated and remains one of the most popular Jewish religious observances.

Origin and history

Hanukkah commemorates the Maccabean (Hasmonean) victories over the forces of the Seleucid king Antiochus IV Epiphanes (reigned 175–164 BCE) and the rededication of the Temple on Kisleiv 25, 164 BCE. Led by Mattathias and his son Judas Maccabeus (died c. 161 BCE), the Maccabees were the first Jews who fought to defend their religious beliefs rather than their lives. According to I Maccabees, a text of the Apocrypha (writings excluded from the Jewish canon but included in the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Old Testament canons), Antiochus had invaded Judaea, tried to Hellenize the Jews, and desecrated the Second Temple in Jerusalem. Following the Jewish victory in a three-year struggle against Antiochus, Judas ordered the cleansing and restoration of the Temple. After it was purified, a new altar was installed and dedicated on Kisleiv 25. Judas then proclaimed that the dedication of the restored Temple should be celebrated every year for eight days beginning on that date. In II Maccabees the celebration is compared to the festival of Sukkoth (the Feast of Tabernacles or Feast of Booths), which the Jews were unable to celebrate because of the invasion of Antiochus. Hanukkah, therefore, emerged as a celebration of the dedication, as the word itself suggests.

Although the traditional practice of lighting candles at Hanukkah was not established in the books of the Maccabees, the custom most likely started relatively early. The practice is enshrined in the Talmud (Shabbat 21b), which describes the miracle of the oil in the Temple. According to the Talmud, when Judas Maccabeus entered the Temple, he found only a small jar of oil that had not been defiled by Antiochus. The jar contained only enough oil to burn for one day, but miraculously the oil burned for eight days until new consecrated oil could be found, establishing the precedent that the festival should last eight days. The early date for this story or at least the practice of lighting eight candles is confirmed by the debate of the 1st-century-CE scholars Hillel and Shammai. Hillel and his school taught that one candle should be lit on the first night of Hanukkah and one more each night of the festival. Shammai held that all eight candles should be lit the first night, with the



number decreasing by one each night thereafter.

Traditions

The celebration of Hanukkah includes a variety of religious and nonreligious customs. Like Purim, Hanukkah is a joyous festival that lacks the work restrictions characteristic of the major festivals of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur.

Menorah

The most important of all Hanukkah

traditions is the lighting of the menorah each evening. Also known as the Hanukkah lamp, the menorah recalls the Temple lampstand and is a simple or elaborate candelabra with eight branches plus a holder for the shamash (“servant”) candle that is used to light the other eight candles. One candle is lit on the first evening, and an additional candle is lit on each subsequent evening until eight candles are burning on the last evening. Olive oil was traditionally used for lighting the menorah, but it was replaced by candles,

which are inserted in the menorah incrementally each night of the festival from right to left but are lit from left to right. A blessing is also offered while the candles are lit each night. The menorah was originally kindled outside the home, but it was brought inside in ancient times to guard against offending neighbours.

Liturgy and prayers

The Hanukkah observance is also characterized by the daily reading of Scripture, recitation of some of the Psalms, almsgiving, and singing of a special hymn. The liturgy includes Hallel, public readings from the Torah, and the ?al ha-nissim (“for the miracles”) prayer. The Scroll of Antiochus, an early medieval account of Hanukkah, is read in some synagogues and homes. Along with the daily prayers, thanks are offered to God for delivering the strong into the hands of the weak and the evil into the hands of the good. The word Hanukkah in Hebrew also means “education,” and rabbis and Jewish educators try to instill in their congregants and students the notion that the holiday celebrates Jewish strengths, perseverance, and continuity.

Nonreligious traditions

There are also a number of nonreligious customs associated with Hanukkah, including festive meals, songs, games, and gifts to children. Potato pancakes (latkes), doughnuts (sufganiyot), and other treats fried in oil, which recall the miracle of the oil, are popular. Children receive presents and gifts of money (Hanukkah gelt), which is sometimes distributed in the form of chocolate coins wrapped in gold foil. Card playing is common, and children play a game with a four-sided top called a dreidel (Hebrew sevivon). On each side of the top is a Hebrew letter, which forms the initials of the words in the phrase nes gadol haya sham, meaning “a great miracle happened there.” In modern Israel the letters of the dreidel were changed to reflect the translation “a great miracle happened here.” In countries where Christmas rituals are widespread, some echoes of those rituals appear in Hanukkah celebrations. Some families, for example, exchange gifts or decorate their homes. In contemporary Israel, Hanukkah is a national holiday, and students present plays, sing holiday songs, and have parties. Schools are closed, and menorahs are displayed atop such prominent buildings as the Israeli parliament, the Knesset. A highlight of the eight-day festival is an annual relay from Modi?in to Jerusalem. Runners carry burning torches through the streets, beginning in Modi?in. The runners continue until the final torchbearer arrives at the Western Wall, which is the last remnant of the Temple. The torchbearer hands the torch to the chief rabbi, who uses it to light the first candle of a giant menorah.

Angelina Jolie again 'losing one of her' children as her battle with Brad Pitt continues

Angelina Jolie is "quickly losing her kids one by one" as her 18-year-old daughter, Shiloh Nouvel Jolie, prepares to leave home and pursue dance.

RadarOnline cited that the actress finds it difficult to cope with the prospect of her most "private" children moving out, as her ongoing legal disputes with ex-husband Brad Pitt over a French winery continue to add stress to her life.

"It's all happening so quickly," a source close to the family told RadarOnline. "One by one, her kids are moving out, and no matter how natural it is in the cycle of life, it's just very hard for Angelina to come to terms with."

Shiloh intends to live with friends while pursuing her passion for dance. "It's especially nerve-racking for Ange to send Shiloh into the world because she wants to pursue dance, and it's not a traditional career path. She wants to live with friends while she studies dance, which means she won't be on a university campus with all the protections that come with living in a dorm," they explained.

"She's proud of Shiloh and would never hold her back from her dreams," the source continued. "Still, it won't be easy for her to let go."

Having moved out at just 16, the *Maleficent* star "sees a lot of herself in Shiloh, who can be quite a free spirit, so the idea of her being out on her own in the world is pretty terrifying. She just can't help but worry about what sort of trouble she could get into," the insider shared.



Shiloh has also legally dropped her father's last name, 'Pitt' earlier this year. This decision reportedly left Pitt feeling deeply hurt. "They used to have a good relationship, but that's in the past, and it breaks his heart," a source told Page Six earlier. "Brad feels like

Angelina has turned his kids against him. He feels like Angelina knows exactly what she's doing."

Jolie and Pitt, who officially divorced in 2019, share six children: Maddox, 23; Pax, 21; Zahara, 19; Shiloh, 18; and twins Knox and Vivienne, 16.

Jennifer Lopez and Ben Affleck's divorce on hold



Jennifer Lopez and Ben Affleck's highly-publicised split is far from over. After almost 6 months of their *Will they? Won't they?* divorce drama and promises to part amicably, tensions are running high behind the scenes as they struggle to finalise details.

The situation has become so contentious that Affleck has reportedly been spending more time with his ex-wife, Jennifer Garner while avoiding his ex at all costs. Their complicated co-parenting scene only adds to the drama, as they both seek a smooth transition for their blended families.

The Jenny From the Block singer filed for divorce without a lawyer on the couple's second wedding anniversary. Since then, the two have largely been spending time apart and rarely been seen together, despite their attempts to present a friendly split. A source told *In Touch* that the situation has grown "increasingly tense and argumentative," with Affleck choosing to spend more time with his ex-wife rather than addressing the ongoing divorce.

Lopez "feels sidelined and frustrated," believing

Affleck should meet her demands, but he remains resolute believing he has been fair and that Lopez is deliberately prolonging the process.

"It's been six months since she filed and nothing has been resolved, it doesn't seem like they're anywhere close to finalising the divorce," the source added. The insider continued, "They both said they wanted to do it amicably and have even talked a good game about wanting to consciously uncouple, but that plan seems to be out the window because they can't agree on how to divide things up, which of course is affecting things."

The divorce argument makes sense since the couple entered their marriage on uneven footing, with Lopez's \$400 million net worth greatly outweighing Affleck's \$150 million, and no prenup in place. "She's worth more than twice as much as him so it's especially hard for him not to see this as her being vindictive and greedy," the source added. "They both say they're desperate to avoid more drama, but the longer this drags on, the worse it's going to get."

'DECISION TO INVADE UKRAINE SHOULD HAVE BEEN MADE EARLIER': PUTIN AT ANNUAL NEWS CONFERENCE

MOSCOW (TIP): President Vladimir Putin boasted that his military operation in Ukraine has strengthened Russia and denied that the ouster of key ally Bashar Assad in Syria had hurt Moscow's prestige, as he took questions at his annual news conference and call-in show on Dec 19.

He used the tightly choreographed event, which lasted about 4 and a half hours, to reinforce his authority and demonstrate a sweeping command of everything from consumer prices to military hardware.

Sending troops into Ukraine in 2022 has boosted Russia's military and economic power, Putin said, adding that if he could do it over, "such a decision should have been made earlier" and Russia could have "prepared for it in advance and more thoroughly." "Russia has become much stronger over the past two or three years because it has become a truly sovereign country," he said. "We are standing firm in terms of economy, we are strengthening our defense potential and our military capability now is the strongest in the world."

Putin, who has held power for nearly a quarter-century and began another six-year term earlier this year, said the military was "advancing toward achieving our goals" in what he calls the special military operation in Ukraine.

In response to a question about a new hypersonic ballistic missile that Russia used for the first time last month to strike Ukraine, Putin scoffed at claims by some Western experts that it could be intercepted by NATO's air defences.

He mockingly challenged Ukraine's allies to a "high-tech duel," suggesting that Moscow could give advance notice of a strike on Kyiv with the Oreshnik missile and see if the West could protect the city. "Let them select a target, possibly in Kyiv, put their air defense assets there and we shall strike it with the Oreshnik," he said with a dry smile. "Let's see what happens." Speaking on a visit to Brussels, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy responded to Putin's comment by asking, "Do you think it's a sane person?"

Russia is making steady, if slow, advances in Ukraine, but has also suffered embarrassing setbacks. On Tuesday, Lt. Gen Igor Kirillov was killed by a bomb planted outside his apartment building in Moscow — a brazen assassination claimed by Ukraine that brought the conflict once again to the streets of the Russian capital. Putin described Kirillov's killing as a "major blunder" by Russia's security agencies, noting they should learn from it and improve their efficiency. (AP)

At least two dead, 60 injured after car drives into German Christmas market, Saudi man arrested

MAGDEBURG (TIP): A car plowed into a busy outdoor Christmas market in the eastern German city of Magdeburg on December 20, killing at least two people and injuring at least 60 others in what authorities called a deliberate attack.

The driver was arrested at the scene shortly after the car barreled into the market at around 7 p.m., when it was teeming with holiday shoppers looking forward to the weekend.

Verified bystander footage distributed by the German news agency dpa showed the suspect's arrest on a walkway in the middle of the road. A nearby police officer pointing a handgun at the man shouted at him as he lay prone. Other officers soon arrived to take the man into custody.

The two people confirmed dead were an adult and a toddler, but officials said additional deaths couldn't be ruled out because 15 people had been seriously injured.

The violence shocked the city, bringing its mayor to the verge of tears and marring a festive event that's part of a centuries-old German tradition. It also prompted several other German towns to cancel their weekend Christmas markets as a precaution and out of solidarity with Magdeburg's loss.

The suspect is a 50-year-old Saudi doctor who moved to Germany in 2006,



Tamara Zieschang, the interior minister for the state of Saxony-Anhalt, said at a news conference. He has been practicing medicine in Bernburg, about 40 kilometers (25 miles) south of Magdeburg, she said.

"As things stand, he is a lone perpetrator, so that as far as we know there is no further danger to the city," Saxony-Anhalt's governor, Reiner Haseloff, told reporters. "Every human life that has fallen victim to this attack is a terrible tragedy and one human life too many."

The violence occurred in Magdeburg, a city of about 240,000 people west of Berlin that serves as Saxony-Anhalt's capital. Friday's attack came eight years after an Islamic extremist drove a truck into crowded Christmas market in Berlin, killing 13 people and injuring many others. The attacker was killed days later in a shootout in Italy.

Christmas markets are a huge part of German culture as an annual holiday tradition cherished since the Middle Ages and successfully exported to much of the Western world. (AP)

China has improved military infrastructure and training along LAC

NEW DELHI (TIP): The US Department of Defence, in its latest report, said that China has improved its training and infrastructure along the Line of Actual Control aimed at long-term sustenance of the troops along the de-facto borders.

Mentioning the People's Liberation Army, the Report says that the PLAA continued to improve its methods and standards of training combined arms units. Training encompassed individual to collective soldier events integrating reconnaissance, infantry, artillery, armour, engineers, and signal units.

In addition to continued PLAA deployments to the Indian border and Burma, the PLAA conducted multiple large-scale exercises in training areas throughout the country.

The 2024 report to the US Congress on the military and security developments involving the People's Republic of China (PRC) covers security and military developments involving the PRC through early 2024.

The report, to elaborate its point about the Chinese actions along the LAC linking it with the military infrastructure spruce-up, gives the background of China's tensions with India along the Line of Actual Control (LAC). LAC - a disputed border between the PRC's western provinces and India's northern provinces—sparked a standoff between PRC and Indian forces in mid-May 2020, which escalated on June 15, 2020, after a skirmish ensued in the Galwan Valley between the Indian Army and PLA forces that ended with 20 Indian soldiers and four PRC soldiers dead.

The two sides agreed to tactical pull-backs from most of the contested areas in early 2021 but standoffs continued at two locations in Ladakh on the Western Sector of the LAC. In late 2022, PRC and Indian forces engaged in an unarmed clash near Tawang along the Eastern Sector of the LAC separating Tibet and the Indian state of Arunachal Pradesh. This was the first such clash since the 2020 skirmish although local commanders quickly defused the clash and the overall standoff

did not substantively escalate.

"These engagements coincide with a significant and sustained escalation in military infrastructure to support a long-term presence on the LAC," says the DoD. In late 2023, India hosted the 20th round of commander-level meetings with the PLA. Both sides agreed to maintain communication and dialogue through military and diplomatic channels. In 2020, PLA Special Operations Forces (SOF) from the Tibet Military Region were deployed to the border with India following clashes between PRC and Indian forces along the LAC, the report adds.

Currently, there has been disengagement from all standoff points in Eastern Ladakh with the latest being those at the Depsang and Demchok in October. The PRC has defined its core interests, says the report, as issues so central to its national rejuvenation that the official position on them is not subject to negotiation or compromise and this also includes the Indian state of Arunachal Pradesh.

'People in Gaza are struggling to survive apocalyptic conditions': MSF

RAFAH (TIP): A new report by Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) on December 19 noted that "repeated Israeli military attacks on Palestinian civilians over the last 14 months, the dismantling of the health care system and other essential infrastructure, the suffocating siege, and the systematic denial of humanitarian assistance are destroying the conditions of life in Gaza, Palestine."

"People in Gaza are struggling to survive apocalyptic conditions, but

nowhere is safe, no one is spared, and there is no exit from this shattered enclave," said Christopher Lockyear, MSF secretary general, who visited Gaza earlier this year.

The MSF reiterated its call for an immediate and sustained ceasefire.

The report, "Gaza: Life in a death trap," urgently called on all parties, once again, for an immediate ceasefire to save lives and enable the flow of humanitarian aid. Israel must stop its targeted and indiscriminate attacks

against civilians, and its allies must act without delay to protect the lives of Palestinians and uphold the rules of war.

"The total destruction of Palestinian life in Gaza must stop," MSF said.

It also called for immediate and safe access to northern Gaza, to allow the delivery of humanitarian aid and medical supplies to hospitals.

"While MSF continues to provide lifesaving care in central and southern Gaza, we call on Israel to end its siege on the territory and open vital land borders, including the Rafah crossing, to enable a massive scale-up of humanitarian and medical aid," the report noted.

The Human Rights Watch in a 179-page report on Thursday revealed that Israeli authorities have intentionally deprived Palestinians in Gaza of access to safe water for drinking and sanitation needed for basic human survival.

"Water is essential for human life, yet for over a year the Israeli government has deliberately denied Palestinians in Gaza the bare minimum they need to survive," said Tirana Hassan, executive director at Human Rights Watch (HRW) as the organisation described this as "nothing short of crime against humanity of extermination, and an act of genocide," HRW noted. (AP)



SEVERAL CHILDREN KILLED IN STAMPEDE AT A HOLIDAY FAIR EVENT IN NIGERIA, STATE GOVERNOR SAYS

18 DEC 2024

ABUJA (TIP): Several children have died during a stampede on December 18 at a holiday funfair in southwestern Nigeria, authorities said.

The incident happened at the Islamic High School in Basorun, Oyo State, near the economic hub of Lagos. Security forces attended the scene and arrested the event organizers, state governor Seyi Makinde said in a statement.

"Earlier today, an incident occurred in Islamic High School Basorun, the venue of an event organised for families. Sadly, a stampede at the venue has led to multiple loss of lives and injuries. This is a very sad day," Makinde said.

"We sympathise with the parents whose joy has suddenly been turned to mourning due to these deaths," he added.

Nigeria's national emergency services said it has deployed a team to help provide assistance to the victims.

Children injured at the venue were taken to local hospitals where parents were asked to check for missing persons.

Video footage that appeared to be from the scene showed a large crowd of mostly children looking on as some children were being carried away from an open field.

Local media identified the event organizers as the Women In Need Of Guidance and Support Foundation, which held a similar event for children last year.

The group was preparing to host up to 5,000 young people at this year's event, the Oyo-based Agidigbo FM radio station reported on Tuesday, citing the organizers who had featured on its program. Children "will win exciting prizes like scholarships and other bountiful gifts," they said.

An investigation has been opened into the causes of the stampede, Makinde said, adding "anyone directly or remotely involved in this disaster will be held accountable." (AP)

Gisèle Pelicot's ex-husband, 50 others found guilty of rapes in France, get jail terms of up to 20 years

AVIGNON, FRANCE (TIP): A court in France on December 19 sentenced the ex-husband of Gisèle Pelicot to a maximum 20 years of imprisonment for drugging and raping her and allowing other men to rape her while she was knocked out, in abuse that lasted nearly a decade.

The sentence against Dominique Pelicot was declared after he was found guilty of all charges against him. At age 72, it could mean that he spends the rest of his life in prison.

The verdict was read by the lead judge of the court in Avignon, Roger Arata.

Arata read out verdicts one after the other against Pelicot and 50 other men, declaring "you are therefore declared guilty of aggravated rape on the person of Mme. Gisèle Pelicot" as he worked his way through the first names on the list.

Gisèle Pelicot was seated on one side of the courtroom, facing the defendants as Arata announced one guilty verdict after another.

The historic case has profoundly shaken France over the past several months.

Dominique Pelicot admitted that for years he knocked his then wife of 50 years out with drugs so that he and strangers he recruited online could abuse her while he



filmed the assaults.

The appalling ordeal inflicted over nearly a decade on Gisèle Pelicot, now a 72-year-old grandmother, in what she thought was a loving marriage and her courage during the bruising and stunning trial have transformed the retired power company worker into a feminist hero of the nation.

Stretching over more than three months, the trial galvanized campaigners against sexual violence and spurred calls for tougher measures to stamp out rape

culture.

Dominique Pelicot and 49 other men were tried in the southern French city of Avignon for aggravated rape and attempted rape and face up to 20 years imprisonment if convicted.

Prosecutors asked that he get the maximum penalty and for sentences of 10 to 18 years for the others. They also requested a four-year prison term for another defendant who was tried for aggravated sexual assault.

Of the 50 men accused of rape, just one was acquitted but was found guilty of aggravated sexual assault.

The defendants were all accused of having taken part in Dominique Pelicot's sordid rape and abuse fantasies that were acted out in the couple's retirement home in the small Provence town of Mazan and elsewhere. Dominique Pelicot testified that he hid tranquilizers in food and drink that he gave his then wife, knocking her out so profoundly that he could do what he wanted to her for hours.

One of the men was on trial not for assaulting Gisèle Pelicot but for drugging and raping his own wife — with the help and drugs from Dominique Pelicot, who was also tried for raping the other man's wife. (AP)



SRI LANKA'S NAVY RESCUES 102 ROHINGYA REFUGEES FOUND ADRIFT ABOARD A FISHING TRAWLER

COLOMBO, SRI LANKA (TIP): Sri Lanka's navy rescued more than 100 people believed to be Rohingya refugees who were found adrift aboard a fishing trawler off the island nation, a navy spokesman said on December 20.

Navy spokesman Gayan Wickramasuriya said fishermen had spotted the refugees, including 25 children and 30 women, off Sri Lanka's northern coast on Thursday. Navy vessels then escorted the trawler to naval base on Sri Lanka's east coast where they were given medical care, food and water.

Wickramasuriya said the navy hasn't yet confirmed whether the refugees are Rohingya because of communication difficulties. But the navy believes the group to be from Myanmar.

The rescue mirrored a similar incident in 2022 when the Sri Lankan navy picked up 100 Rohingya refugees who were also found adrift aboard a fishing boat inside Sri Lankan waters.

Hundreds of thousands of the predominantly Muslim Rohingya have fled Myanmar amid widespread discrimination. Most are denied citizenship.

About 1 million Rohingya live in Bangladesh as refugees. Most of them had fled a brutal counterinsurgency campaign in 2017 by Myanmar's security forces, who were accused of committing mass rapes and killings.

Thousands have been trying to flee Bangladesh's overcrowded camps to neighboring countries with Indonesia seeing a spike in refugee numbers since November which prompted it to call on the international community for help. Rohingya arriving in Aceh face some hostility from some fellow Muslims.

Returning safely to Myanmar is virtually impossible because the military that attacked them overthrew Myanmar's democratically elected government in 2021. No country has offered them any large-scale resettlement opportunities. (AP)

Women's rights under threat in Bangladesh amid growing radicalism, intolerance

DHAKA (TIP): Bangladesh is not going to become another Iran or Afghanistan, as far as the rights of women are concerned. Nevertheless, it's women who are bearing the brunt of the recent political upheaval in the country.

The radical elements which have the support of the present interim government seem to be on a mission to muffle the freedom that women have had until now.

"I have never covered my head or face with a scarf and never will. I am a woman and enjoy being one, why should anyone object to what I wear? Things have changed for the worse. A woman wearing western clothes is often subject to cat calls, threatened or looked down upon," Naseem Rahat Bano*, a writer in Dhaka told TNIE."

"We will not give in to the radicals who seem to be getting comfortable inside our once tolerant country," added Bano. She is most comfortable wearing western dresses and enjoys having a glass of wine while socializing.

It is not just older women but even teenage girls who are now being sermonized and admonished.

"My teenage daughter is under peer pressure to cover up as she fears being bullied and trolled. When we are at home she is fine, but the world has changed outside though we are optimistic that this would not be a permanent feature,"



said Bano.

There is a lot of concern and fear, which is also experienced by men who support women for the choices they make.

"I am ok with whatever the women in my family want to wear but get extremely worried when they are out of the house and fear their being bullied, scoffed at and even attacked in public. Our country has gone offtrack. Our history is being denied, Pakistan has become a friend from being a foe and India is viewed as an enemy even though it has been a supporter all through," said

Rafik who works with a publishing house in Dhaka.

Interestingly, when there was a regime change, the narrative was against the former Prime Minister of Bangladesh Sheikh Hasina. Four months since then, the narrative appears to be changing yet again but in her favour.

Whether the situation on the ground changes or remains the same is yet to be seen, but until then women like Bano will continue resisting the radical forces to protect their rights which include the freedom to wear what they want. (AFP)

52 killed in two bus accidents in central Afghanistan

KABUL (TIP): Two bus accidents involving a fuel tanker and a truck on a highway through central Afghanistan killed 52 people and injured 65, the Taliban government spokesmen said on December 19.

The accidents happened in Ghazni province on the same highway between the capital Kabul and southern Kandahar city late Wednesday, provincial head of information and culture Hamidullah Nisar said on X, without specifying how many people were killed and injured in each accident.

"We learned with great regret that two fatal traffic accidents occurred on the Kabul-Kandahar Highway, in which 52 of our compatriots were killed and 65 others were injured," said chief government spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid.

Nisar said one bus collided with a fuel tanker near Shahbaz village in central Ghazni, while the other hit a truck in the eastern district of Andar.

He added that rescue teams rushed to the site and transported the injured to the hospital, with some in "serious condition."

Traffic accidents are common in Afghanistan, due in part to poor roads after decades of conflict, dangerous driving on highways, and a lack of regulation.

In March, more than 20 people were killed and 38 injured when a bus collided with a fuel tanker and burst into flames in southern Helmand province.

Another serious accident involving a fuel tanker took place in December 2022, when the vehicle overturned and caught fire in Afghanistan's high-altitude Salang Pass, killing 31 people and leaving dozens more with burns. (AFP)

Pakistan court extends interim bail of Imran Khan, his wife in second Toshakhana case until January 7

17 DEC 2024

LAHORE (TIP): A Pakistani court on December 17 extended the interim bail of jailed former prime minister Imran Khan and his wife Bushra Bibi in the second Toshakhana case until January 7.

While the 72-year-old former cricketer-turned-politician remains behind bars due to other ongoing cases, Bibi was released in October after the Islamabad High Court approved her post-arrest bail plea.

Additional Sessions Judge Muhammad Afzal Mujoka of Islamabad-based District and Sessions Court conducted the hearing of bail petitions in the case, also called the Toshakhana 2.0. After hearing the lawyers, the court extended the interim bails of Khan and Bibi until January 7 next year and adjourned the hearing.

The case is related to the alleged violation of the state gift repository Toshakhana rules during Khan's term as the prime minister to acquire a precious jewellery set.

Pakistani police issues charges against Imran Khan, his wife Bushra Bibi for inciting violence. The two were indicted in the case earlier last week by a trial court, where Special Judge Central Shahrukh Arjumand read out the charge sheet against them. The court, after the indictment, adjourned the hearing until December 18 when the prosecution the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) will present the first four of its 28 witnesses.

The Toshakhana 2.0 case involves allegations against the former premier and his wife for illegally retaining a Bulgari jewellery set gifted to them during a visit to Saudi Arabia in May 2021. The set included a ring, a bracelet, a necklace, and a pair of earrings and was valued at approximately Pakistani Rs 75.7 million. (PTI)





Veg jalfrezi

Ingredients

For the Vegetables: 1 cup bell peppers (red, green, yellow), julienned 1 cup carrots, julienned 1 cup French beans, cut into 2-inch pieces, 1 cup cauliflower florets, 1 cup paneer (optional), cubed 1 cup onions, sliced 1 cup tomatoes, diced or sliced ½ cup green peas (optional)



For the Sauce: 2 tablespoons oil, 1 teaspoon cumin seeds, 1 tablespoon ginger-garlic paste, 2 green chilies slit, 1 teaspoon turmeric powder, 1 teaspoon red chili powder, 1 teaspoon coriander powder, 1 teaspoon garam masala, 1 teaspoon cumin powder, 1 tablespoon tomato ketchup, 2-3 medium tomatoes, pureed, Salt to taste, ½ teaspoon sugar (optional, to balance flavors)

For Garnish: 2 tablespoons fresh coriander leaves, chopped 1 teaspoon kasuri methi (dried fenugreek leaves).

Instructions

- Parboil the carrots, beans, and cauliflower in salted water for 2-3 minutes. Drain and set aside.
- Keep the bell peppers, onions, and tomatoes raw, as they cook quickly.
- Heat oil in a large pan or wok.
- Add cumin seeds and let them splutter.
- Add ginger-garlic paste and slit green chilies; sauté for 1 minute.
- Stir in turmeric, red chili powder, coriander powder, and cumin powder.
- Add the pureed tomatoes and cook until the oil separates (about 5-7 minutes).
- Add tomato ketchup, salt, and sugar if needed.
- Add the parboiled and raw vegetables to the sauce. Toss to coat evenly.
- Cook for 5-7 minutes on medium flame, keeping the vegetables slightly crunchy.
- Add garam masala and kasuri methi. Add cubed paneer and cook for 2 minutes. Serve.



Different fungi groups behind allergy-induced sniffles, asthma: Study

People with allergy-induced sniffles and asthma may have different fungal colonies or mycobiomes in their noses, finds a study.

The common respiratory disease, formally called allergic rhinitis, has frequently been associated with asthma. Typical symptoms of allergic rhinitis include sneezing, itching, inflamed nasal mucous membranes, and a blocked and runny nose. It's often comorbid with asthma, which also involves inflammation and obstructed airways.

Researchers from the University of Porto, Portugal, showed that this association may be because of different fungal colonies or mycobiomes in their noses.

"We showed that allergic rhinitis samples displayed a significantly higher fungal diversity and a different fungal community structure compared to those of healthy controls," said Dr. Luís Delgado of the University of Porto.

"This may suggest that allergic rhinitis increases the diversity and changes the composition of the upper airway's microbiome."

To study the nasal mycobiome, the researchers recruited 214 participants among children and young adults attending an immunology and asthma clinic in Porto. About 155 patients had both allergic rhinitis and asthma, while 47 were only diagnosed with allergic rhinitis and 12 with asthma. The team also enrolled 125 healthy controls.

The team analysed 306 samples, taken via nasal swabs. DNA sequencing revealed Ascomycota and Basidiomycota as the most common fungi families across all samples. In these two families, 14 genera dominated the mycobiomes.

"Among these dominant genera we detected common fungi that have been recognised in humans as allergenic or opportunistic pathogenic fungi," said Delgado. "This suggests that the nasal cavity is a major reservoir for fungi that could be involved in allergic rhinitis and asthma." *Source: IANS*

YouTube says it will soon start detecting AI avatars of celebs

YouTube is stepping up to protect creators from misuse of their likenesses with the help of AI. The platform is teaming up with the Creative Artists Agency (CAA) to roll out tools that allow creators and celebrities to detect AI-generated content that uses their image, face, or voice. This partnership aims to give individuals more control over how their digital likeness is used, especially as artificial intelligence becomes more sophisticated and widespread.

Starting early next year, YouTube will test these tools with celebrities and athletes. The idea is to let them find videos on the platform that mimic their face, voice, or other aspects of their identity using AI and make it easier to request that such content be removed. Once this initial phase is complete, YouTube plans to expand the program to include top creators on the platform, creative professionals, and other influential figures. This move is expected to protect YouTube's most prominent users, who often have to deal with issues like impersonation and misuse of their image.

In September, YouTube had already announced plans to develop tools that help manage AI-generated depictions of creators, including their voices. Now, the company is building on that commitment by giving celebrities the ability to deal with these issues on a larger scale. This is especially relevant as AI tools can now create hyperrealistic versions of someone's face, voice, or body, which can then be used in ways that the original person never agreed to.

Apple releases iOS 18.3 first developer beta

Apple has released the first developer beta version of its upcoming iOS 18.3 update, just days after introducing iOS 18.2 that was packed with Apple Intelligence features. While Apple has not yet disclosed specific changes in the latest beta, there is speculation about support for more smart home devices, such as robot vacuum cleaners, within the Home app.

Although the first developer beta for iOS 18.3 is now available, the stable version of the update is expected to roll out in January next year.

What to expect from upcoming iOS updates

The iOS 18.2 update added advanced Apple Intelligence features, such as image generation tools and system-wide ChatGPT integration. However, there are more intelligence features that Apple has yet to roll out, including on-screen awareness, personal context understanding, and more for the digital assistant Siri. Apple has also not yet launched the Priority Notification feature, which uses AI to sort notifications based on their importance.

More advanced Siri features are expected with the iOS 18.4 update in March next year, but iOS 18.3 could bring some minor tweaks and changes to existing Apple Intelligence features.

Apple Intelligence features with iOS 18.2

Last week, Apple released the iOS 18.2 update for eligible iPhones, adding several new Apple Intelligence features, including support for OpenAI's ChatGPT within Siri and Writing Tools, Image Playground, and Genmoji. Here are the key Apple Intelligence features:

- Image Playground: A tool for
- Compose with ChatGPT (Writing



generating images using text input or existing images from the Photos app. Users can create images based on themes, styles (such as animation, 3D, or illustrations), and specific requests. It is integrated within native apps like Messages, Freeform, and Keynote and also available as a standalone app.

- Genmoji: Integrated into the emoji keyboard, Genmoji enables users to generate custom emojis using text and images.
- Image Wand: Introduced in the Notes app, this tool transforms sketches into illustrations or generates images based on surrounding text.
- Describe Your Change (Writing Tools): This new option complements existing tools like Rewrite, Proofread, and Summarise, giving users more control over writing style and expressiveness.
- Compose with ChatGPT (Writing

Tools): OpenAI's chatbot integration allows users to generate text and accompanying images, accessible systemwide.

- Visual Intelligence: iPhone 16 series introduces a new Visual Intelligence feature. By long pressing the new Camera Control button, users can get information about real-life objects using Google image search or ChatGPT. It can also translate text, summarise it, and even detect and save phone numbers and email addresses.
- ChatGPT in Siri: With ChatGPT integration, Siri can now suggest using ChatGPT for specific queries and provide ChatGPT-powered responses directly. Users can enable or disable this integration and manage shared information.

While the iOS 18.2 update is available for all iPhones running iOS 18 versions, Apple Intelligence features are only available on iPhone 15 Pro models and the new iPhone 16 series.

Google unveils Veo 2 video AI generator to compete with OpenAI's Sora

Google has introduced a new and improved Veo 2 video generator model to compete with the likes of OpenAI's Sora. The company claims that the successor to the original Veo AI model can create realistic motion and high-quality output of up to 4K, which it says is better than leading AI video generator platforms. Alongside this, Google also announced the latest Imagen 3 version and new Whisk model to create a single image from multiple visuals. Here is everything to know.

Google shared a series of short video clips created using Veo 2, which shows that this platform can generate hyper-realistic videos of animals and food. We can also see animated clips of humans, all of which are 8-second videos.

"Veo 2 outperforms other leading video generation models, based on human evaluations of its performance," Google



said. While the company hasn't mentioned the names of the rivals, it is likely pointing towards OpenAI's Sora -- which is also a video generator. In the benchmark list, the company has added a graph, which claims that its Veo 2 model

is preferred more by people in comparison to Meta Movie Gen, Kling V1.5, Minimax and Sora Turbo.

The samples shared by Google look great, but some scenes with motions are seemingly a bit inaccurate. A few details

in parts of a frame are missing. Google acknowledges this and says that complete consistency throughout complex scenes or those with complex motion still remains a challenge. But, the overall quality of the videos is seemingly quite impressive. "While Veo 2 demonstrates incredible progress, creating realistic, dynamic, or intricate videos, and maintaining complete consistency throughout complex scenes or those with complex motion, remains a challenge. We'll continue to develop and refine performance in these areas," said Google DeepMind.

As for the Imagen 3 model, Google claims it can now create brighter and more realistic images with vibrant hues, better colour balance, and fidelity. The company is also claiming that it can currently produce highly detailed textures and attractive visuals.

Bears tighten grip on markets; Sensex tanks 1,176 points, Nifty falls below 23,500 level

Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty plunged about 1.5 per cent on Friday, December 20, taking their downtrend to the fifth straight session, due to risk aversion in the global markets after the hawkish stance of the US Federal Reserve.

The 30-share BSE benchmark tumbled 1,176.46 points or 1.49 per cent to settle at 78,041.59. During the day, it slumped 1,343.46 points or 1.69 per cent to 77,874.59.

The NSE Nifty tanked 364.20 points or 1.52 per cent to 23,587.50.

From the 30 blue-chip Sensex pack, Tech Mahindra, IndusInd Bank, Axis Bank, Mahindra & Mahindra, Tata Motors, Larsen & Toubro, State Bank of India, Tata Consultancy Services, UltraTech Cement and Reliance Industries were the biggest laggards.

In contrast, JSW Steel, Nestle and Titan were the gainers.

In Asian markets, Seoul, Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong settled lower.

Equity markets in Europe were trading in the negative territory. Wall Street ended on a mixed note on Thursday, December 19.

Foreign Institutional Investors offloaded equities worth Rs 4,224.92 crore on Thursday, according to exchange data. Global oil benchmark Brent crude declined 0.96 per cent to USD 72.18 a barrel.

New Zealand falls into recession with abrupt economic slowdown

New Zealand tipped into recession in the third quarter, official data showed Thursday, December 19, with the economy suffering an unexpectedly sharp slump that sent the country's currency tumbling and sparked political finger-pointing.

The conservative coalition government defended its "respect for taxpayers' money" as the opposition accused it of feeding a "recessionary fire".

The economy has for months teetered on the verge of recession, with consumer sentiment weighed by high prices, elevated borrowing costs and a housing crisis.

But the latest figures showed gross domestic product fell a bigger-than-expected 1.0 percent July-September from the previous three months. Analysts had forecast a contraction of 0.2 percent.

Fed cuts by a quarter point, indicates fewer reductions ahead

WASHINGTON (TIP)

The Federal Reserve on Wednesday, December 18, lowered its key interest rate by a quarter percentage point, the third consecutive reduction and one that came with a cautionary tone about additional cuts in coming years.

In a move widely anticipated by markets, the Federal Open Market Committee cut its overnight borrowing rate to a target range of 4.25%-4.5%, back to the level where it was in December 2022 when rates were on the move higher.

Though there was little intrigue over the decision itself, the main question had been over what the Fed would signal about its future intentions as inflation holds steadily above target and economic growth is fairly solid, conditions that don't normally coincide with policy easing.

In delivering the 25 basis point cut, the Fed indicated that it probably would only lower twice more in 2025, according to the closely watched "dot plot" matrix of individual members' future rate expectations. The two cuts indicated slice in half the committee's intentions when the plot was last updated in September.

Assuming quarter-point increments, officials indicated two more reductions in 2026 and another in 2027. Over the longer term, the committee sees the "neutral" funds rate at 3%, 0.1 percentage point higher than the September update as the level has drifted gradually higher this year.

"With today's action, we have lowered our policy rate by a full percentage point from its peak, and our policy stance is now significantly less restrictive," Chair Jerome Powell said at his post-meeting news conference. "We can therefore be more cautious as we consider further adjustments to our policy rate."

"Today was a closer call but we decided it was the right call," he added.

Stocks sold off sharply following the Fed announcement, with the Dow Jones Industrial Average closing down more than 1,100 points while Treasury yields soared. Futures pricing pared back the outlook for cuts in 2025, according to the CME Group's FedWatch measure.

"We moved pretty quickly to get to here, and I think going



forward obviously we're moving slower," Powell said.

For the second consecutive meeting, one FOMC member dissented: Cleveland Fed President Beth Hammack wanted the Fed to maintain the previous rate. Governor Michelle Bowman voted no in November, the first time a governor voted against a rate decision since 2005.

The fed funds rate sets what banks charge each other for overnight lending but also influences a variety of consumer debt such as auto loans, credit cards and mortgages.

The post-meeting statement changed little except for a tweak regarding the "extent and timing" of further rate changes, a slight language shift from the November meeting. Goldman Sachs said the adjustment was "hinting at a slower pace of rate cuts ahead."

The cut came even though the committee jacked up its projection for full-year 2024 gross domestic product growth to 2.5%, half a percentage point higher than September. However, in the ensuing years the officials expect GDP to slow down to its long-term projection of 1.8%.

Other changes to the Summary of Economic Projections saw the committee lower its expected unemployment rate this year to 4.2%, while headline and core inflation according to the Fed's preferred gauge were pushed higher to respective estimates of 2.4% and 2.8%, slightly higher than the September estimate and above the Fed's 2% goal.

No impact of Swiss withdrawal of MFN status to country: Nestle India

NEW DELHI (TIP)

FMCG major Nestle India on Thursday, December 19, said the suspension of the MFN (most favoured nation) clause granted to India by Switzerland will have 'no impact' on the company.

The suspension of MFN status under the Double Taxation Avoidance Agreement (DTAA) is a policy issue between the government of India and Switzerland and is not 'Nestle-specific', the FMCG firm said in a statement.

Nestle India, which owns popular brands such as Maggi, Nescafe and KitKat, said the company was already "deducting 10 per cent withholding tax" on cross-country payments.

Earlier on December 11, the Swiss government had announced the suspension of the MFN status granted to India following a ruling by the Supreme Court of India, which in a judgement last year had said MFN status under the DTAA cannot be enforced unless notified under Section 90 of the Income Tax Act.

This judgement of the apex court had come in a case related to Nestle, where it overturned an earlier order passed by the Delhi High Court in 2021, which had upheld the residual tax rates' applicability after considering the MFN clause in DTAA.

This has increased the tax liabilities for Indian companies having their operations in Switzerland.

"The matter is not a Nestle-specific issue but is a policy



matter between India and Switzerland. We would like to inform you that Nestle India was/is deducting a 10 per cent withholding tax, and this has no impact on Nestle India," a Nestle India spokesperson said.

India is among the top ten markets of the Swiss FMCG major Nestle SA, where it has been operating for 112 years.

It is investing Rs 6,000-6,500 crore between a period of 2020-2025 in the Indian market to scale up its manufacturing capabilities and others.

Saphala Ekadashi is a sacred day observed in the Hindu tradition, dedicated to the worship of Lord Vishnu, the preserver of the universe. Falling on the 11th day (Ekadashi) of the Krishna Paksha (waning phase of the moon) in the month of Pausha, this auspicious day is revered for its spiritual, moral, and religious significance. Rituals and Observances

complain Trudeau is too beholden to big business. "No matter who is leading the Liberal Party, this government's time is up. We will put forward a clear motion of non-confidence in the next sitting of the House of Commons," said Singh.

The leader of the Bloc Quebecois, a larger opposition party, promised to back the motion and said there was no scenario where Trudeau survived.

The Conservatives said they would ask Governor General Mary Simon - the personal representative of King Charles, Canada's head of state - to recall Parliament to hold a no-confidence vote before the end of the year. Constitutional experts say Simon would reject such a move.

"We cannot have a chaotic clown show running our government into the ground. What is clear is that Justin Trudeau does not have the confidence of Parliament," Conservative leader Pierre Poilievre told reporters.

Shortly after Singh issued his letter a smiling Trudeau, under growing pressure to quit after the shock resignation of his finance minister this week, presided over a cabinet shuffle.

Trudeau's office was not immediately available for comment.

Trudeau, who has not publicly spoken about Freeland's exit, usually addresses reporters after cabinet shuffles but left without saying a word. Major domestic media organizations said his office had canceled traditional end-of-year interviews.

Votes on budgets and other spending are considered confidence measures. Additionally, the government must allocate a few days each session to opposition parties when they can unveil motions on any matter, including non-confidence.

Singh's move is a political risk, since the polls showing a bad defeat for the Liberals also have bad news for the NDP.

Darrell Bricker, CEO of polling firm Ipsos-Reid, said Singh saw a chance to replace the Liberals as the first choice for voters who opposed the Conservatives.

"Waiting to give the Liberals and even Trudeau a chance to get off the mat is ill-advised," he said by email.

Before Singh made his announcement, a source close to Trudeau said the prime minister would take the Christmas break to ponder his future and was unlikely to make any announcement before January.

Liberal leaders are elected by special conventions of party members, which take months to arrange.

Singh's promise to act quickly means that even if Trudeau were to resign now, the Liberals could not find a new permanent leader in time for the next election. The party would then have to contest the vote with an interim leader, which has never happened before in Canada.

So far around 20 Liberal legislators are openly calling for Trudeau to step down but his cabinet has stayed loyal.

The timing of the crisis comes at a critical time, since U.S. President-elect Donald Trump is due to take office on Jan. 20 and is promising to impose a 25% tariff on all imports from Canada, which would badly hurt the economy.

The premiers of the 10 provinces, seeking to create a united approach to the tariffs, are complaining about what they call chaos in Ottawa. (Agencies)

Ready to meet Trump over Ukraine negotiations: Putin

meet Trump, whom he said he had not spoken to for years.

Asked what he might be able to offer Trump, Putin dismissed an assertion that Russia was in a weak position, saying that Russia had got much stronger

since he ordered troops into Ukraine in 2022.

"Soon, those Ukrainians who want to fight will run out, in my opinion, soon there will be no one left who wants to fight.

We are ready, but the other side needs to be ready for both negotiations and compromises." Putin said on Thursday that Russia had no conditions to start talks with Ukraine and was ready to negotiate with anyone, including President Volodymyr Zelenskyy. Zelenskyy, whose term has technically expired but who has delayed an election because of the war, would need to be re-elected for Moscow to consider him a legitimate signatory to any deal to ensure it was legally watertight, said Putin.

'Pulled back Russia from edge of abyss'

President Vladimir Putin said he had pulled Russia back from the edge of the abyss after the chaos which accompanied the fall of the Soviet Union, and had built the country into a sovereign power able to stand up for itself. He admitted there was inflation but said that Russian growth rates outstripped those of Britain.

MEA refutes China's '6-point consensus' claim

The statement by China's Foreign Ministry was at divergence from India's statement on the outcome of the December 18 talks.

The Chinese Foreign Ministry had said both sides reached a 'six-point consensus'. It mentioned putting the border issue in an 'appropriate position' in bilateral relations and harked back to an agreement the two sides had made in 2005. India had not mentioned any of these aspects in its statement issued late on Dec 18.

Answering a question on 'six-point consensus', Jaiswal said "our statement gives a perspective on what was discussed. We can speak for our press release only".

Meanwhile, sources on the Indian side said the phrase 'six-point consensus' is misplaced. These were points of 'discussions' between the two Special Representatives (SRs) - National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi.

For China, the 'appropriate position' of the border issue is to treat the matter as, one among, the many issues, sources said and added for India, a resolution of the pending boundary issue is a prime security concern and top-most priority. The Indian statement reflected it in as many words saying "reiterated the importance of maintaining a political perspective of the overall bilateral relationship while seeking a fair, reasonable and mutually acceptable framework for settlement of the boundary question and resolved to inject more vitality into this process".

The Chinese statement had a different take. It said "both sides reaffirmed their commitment to continuing to seek a fair, reasonable, and mutually acceptable package solution to the border issue in accordance with the political guiding principles agreed upon by the two countries' special representatives in 2005".

The Chinese statement further added, "Both sides agreed to further refine the management rules for the border areas, strengthen confidence-building measures". The Indian statement did not mention anything to 'refine' border management rules. It said, "Drawing on the learnings from the events of 2020, they discussed various measures to maintain peace and tranquility on the border and advance effective border management". On expected lines, the two statements



had a rather expected divergence. The Chinese side mentioned "promoting the resumption of pilgrimages by Indian pilgrims to Xizang". Xizang is the name China uses to refer to Tibet.

The Indian side just mentioned the resumption of the Kailash Mansarovar Yatra in its statement. Also, China mentioned resumption of trade via the Nathu La Pass in Sikkim. India remained silent on the issue. (Source: TNS)

agriculture policy and anti-poverty law called the farm bill. It was the final vote of the 118th Congress of the United States.

Brampton MP Ruby Sahota joins Cabinet as Justin Trudeau inducts eight new faces

OTTAWA (TIP): With the induction of Brampton MP Ruby Sahota, the number of South Asians in the 38-member Cabinet of Justin Trudeau has gone up to six. She will be the Minister for Democratic Institutions and Minister Responsible for the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario.

Never before have MPs of South Asian descent had such a good representation in the federal Cabinet. Questions were being asked about the longevity of the reshuffled Cabinet as all the three Opposition parties - Conservatives, Bloc Quebecois and New Democrats - are out baring their knives to kill the government at the first possible opportunity.

The American threat of a 25 per cent tariff looms large in the air as President-elect Donald Trump is scheduled to assume office on January 20.

After Ruby Sahota's inclusion, other MPs of South Asian descent on the Canadian Cabinet are Anita Anand, Minister of Transport and Internal Trade, as she sheds the portfolio of President of the Treasury (that goes to Ginette Petitpas Taylor), Jaffna-born Gary Anandasangaree, Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs and Minister responsible for the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency, Kamal Khera, Minister of Diversity, Inclusion and Persons with Disabilities, Harjit S. Sajjan, President of the King's Privy Council for Canada and Minister of Emergency Preparedness and Minister responsible for the Pacific Economic Development Agency of Canada, and Arif Virani, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada.

While the Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, announced changes to the Ministry, in his declared intent to continue till the next federal election in October of next year, both the Leader of Opposition, Pierre Poilievre, and the Liberals ally, Jagmeet Singh of New Democrats, made clear their stands to bring down the minority Liberal government at the early possible opportunity to force an early election.

Pierre Poilievre, who earlier in the day taunted the NDP leader Jagmeet Singh for his open letter to the Canadians, took to X to say that he has written to the Governor-General "confirming that the Prime Minister has lost the confidence of the House and that Parliament must be recalled to hold a vote before the end of the year on triggering an Axé The Tax election. I am asking the NDP leader to match his actions to his word and send a

letter to Her Excellency asking for the same."

In an earlier post on X, Pierre Poilievre said: "Ha! Now that Parliament is closed there is no chance to introduce any motion for months-until after you get your pension. You did the same stunt in September, claiming you would no longer prop Trudeau up. Then you went back on your word and voted 8 times against an election and for your boss Trudeau. Just 11 days ago you voted against a non-confidence motion filled with your own words. Had you voted the other way, we would be almost halfway through the election now. Only common-sense Conservatives can and will replace this costly NDP-Liberal clown show.

Hours before the swearing-in ceremony at Rideau Hall, Jagmeet Singh took to X and announced that "Justin Trudeau failed in the biggest job a Prime Minister has: to work for people, not the powerful. The NDP will vote to bring this government down, and give Canadians a chance to vote for a government who will work for them."

In an open letter to Canadians that he shared on X, Jagmeet Singh said that he "called Justin Trudeau to resign and he should. He cannot fix health care. He cannot build homes you can afford. He cannot lower your bills.

"I have always fought like hell to get dental care, free birth control and diabetes medication. I did not give up when Justin Trudeau said no. And I won't let Pierre Poilievre take it all away.

"The next fight is a big one. Pierre Poilievre and the Conservatives will give CEOs and big businesses anything they want, and make callous cuts to pay for it. They will cut health care, childcare, housing and people's pensions."

Meanwhile, the Prime Minister's office released a statement saying that the new Ministry will deliver on what matters most.

It said "Building on the work done since 2015 to invest in Canadians, the team will continue to move forward on housing, childcare, and school food while working to put more money back in people's pockets.

History This Week

DECEMBER 20

December 20, 1956 - The Montgomery bus boycott ended after the U.S. Supreme Court ruling integrating the Montgomery bus system was implemented. The boycott by African Americans had begun on December 5, 1955, after Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on a Montgomery bus to a white man.

December 20, 1989 - The U.S. invaded Panama attempting to capture Manuel Noriega on charges of narcotics trafficking. Operation Just Cause occurred seven months after Noriega had declared unfavorable election results in his country to be null and void. The invasion toppled the Noriega government and resulted in the installation of Guillermo Endara as president. Noriega temporarily eluded capture, but surrendered a few weeks later to U.S. troops. He was then tried, convicted, and imprisoned in the U.S.



Birthdays - American industrialist Harvey S. Firestone (1868-1938) was born in Columbiana County, Ohio. He founded Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. and was a close friend of Henry Ford and Thomas Edison.

December 21, 1945 - World War II General George Patton died in Germany following a car accident. He had been injured on December 9th near Mannheim and was taken to a hospital in Heidelberg where he died. He was buried in Luxembourg. Nicknamed "Old Blood and Guts," he once stated during the war, "We shall attack and attack until we are exhausted, and then we shall attack again."

December 21, 1972 - East and West Germany established diplomatic ties, ending nearly two decades of Cold War hostility and paving the way for international recognition of East Germany.





“Their passing has created an irreplaceable void, but their contributions and values will continue to inspire us as we move forward,” a resolution, signed by former judges, including Justice S S Sodhi, Justice M S Liberhan, Justice Mehtab Singh Gill, Justice S S Saron, Justice Ranjit Singh Randhawa, Justice Nawab Singh, Justice Rajiv Narain Raina, Justice Nirmaljit Kaur, Justice Jaishree Thakur, and Justice Sabina, expressed deep sorrow at the untimely passing of both luminaries within days of each other, stated.

Justice Kuldip Singh

(1 Jan 1932 - 25 Nov, 2024)

Justice Kuldip Singh was a renowned jurist and former judge of the Supreme Court of India, recognized for his unwavering commitment to environmental protection and human rights. Justice Harjit Singh Bedi

(Sept 5, 1946 - Nov 21, 2024)

Justice Harjit Singh Bedi (September 5, 1946 – November 21, 2024) was a distinguished Indian jurist who served as a judge of the Supreme Court of India. His legal career was marked by significant contributions to the Indian judiciary, characterized by fairness, integrity, and a deep commitment to justice.

Early Life and Education

Born in Sahiwal (formerly Montgomery), now in Pakistan, Justice Bedi hailed from a family of agriculturists. Notably, he was a direct descendant of Guru Nanak, the founder of Sikhism, being 17th in the line. Following the partition of India, his family settled in Fazilka, a township near the India-Pakistan border. His father, Tikka Jagjit Singh Bedi, served as a judge on the Punjab and Haryana High Court until his retirement in 1969.

Justice Bedi completed his schooling at

Bishop Cotton School in Shimla, obtaining his Senior Cambridge certificate in 1962. He pursued higher education in law, which laid the foundation for his illustrious legal career.

Legal Career

Enrolled as an advocate with the Bar Council of Punjab & Haryana on July 17, 1972, Justice Bedi practiced in civil, criminal, and writ matters. Between 1974 and 1983, he also served as a part-time lecturer in the Department of Laws at Panjab University, Chandigarh, demonstrating his dedication to legal education.

His career in public service began with his appointment as Deputy Advocate General for Punjab in 1983. He was designated as a Senior Advocate in 1987 and subsequently served as Additional Advocate General until 1989. In 1990, he was appointed Advocate General of Punjab, a position he held for about a year.

Judicial Appointments

Justice Bedi's judicial career commenced with his appointment as an Additional Judge of the Punjab and Haryana High Court on March 15, 1991. He became a permanent judge on July 8, 1992. His judicial acumen led to his elevation as the Chief Justice of the Bombay High Court on October 3, 2006. Colleagues and friends remember Justice Bedi as a gentleman judge, whose judgments were known for their clarity and compassion. His demeanor combined gentle firmness with a profound sense of humanity, leaving an indelible mark on Indian jurisprudence.

All India-Pakistan matches until 2028 at neutral venues, including Champions Trophy

The International Cricket Council (ICC) confirmed on December 19 that the 2025 Champions Trophy will be conducted in a hybrid model that will see India's matches in the eight-team event taking place at a neutral venue.

In a statement released by the ICC, it confirmed: "India and Pakistan matches hosted by either country at ICC Events during the 2024-2027 rights cycle will be played at a neutral venue," as reported by India Today last week. This will mean that Pakistan will not travel to India for their matches during the Women's ODI World Cup in 2025 and the T20 World Cup in 2026.

The tournament, scheduled to begin on February 19 in Pakistan, faced uncertainty due to India's refusal to travel to the host nation. The ICC reiterated in its statement: "This will apply to the upcoming ICC Men's Champions Trophy 2025 (hosted by Pakistan), set to be played in February and March 2025, as well as the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2025 (hosted by India) and the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2026 (hosted by India and Sri Lanka)."

The statement also announced that the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has been awarded the hosting rights for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in 2028, where neutral venue arrangements will also apply. Additionally, Cricket Australia is set to host one of the senior ICC women's events during the 2029-2031 cycle. "It was also announced that the PCB has been awarded hosting rights of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in 2028, where neutral venue arrangements will also apply."

R Ashwin announces retirement from international cricket

BRISBANE (TIP)

Indian cricket team spinner R Ashwin announced his retirement from international cricket following the third Test match against Australia in Brisbane on Wednesday, December 18. Ashwin made the announcement in the post-match press conference along with skipper Rohit Sharma after the game ended in a draw. Ashwin played the second match of the five-Test series in Adelaide but was replaced by Ravindra Jadeja for the match in Brisbane. Ashwin retires from the game as the second highest wicket-taker for India in Tests with 537 scalps in 106 games, leaving him only behind Anil Kumble (619 wickets).

Ashwin will continue to play T20 tournaments and he will represent Chennai Super Kings in IPL 2025.

"I won't take too much of your time. Today will be the last day for me as an India cricketer," Ashwin said at the end of the drawn third Test here in a joint press conference with captain Rohit Sharma during which he declined to take any questions and left after making the announcement.

The 38-year-old played the day-night Test in Adelaide and picked up one wicket. "He was very, very sure of his decision. We should stand by what he wants," said Rohit after Ashwin left the stage.

He was seen sharing an emotional moment with star batter Virat Kohli in the dressing room hours before the announcement. "A name synonymous with mastery, wizardry, brilliance, and innovation," said the BCCI in its tribute post on X.

With Ashwin stepping down from



the international stage, he is truly leaving behind a tremendous legacy and massive boots to fill for the youngsters who will come in to make up for his presence.

Ashwin spearheaded the bowling attack and was a major face behind India's rise to the top and eventual domination in Test cricket that lasted from 2014 to 2019.

When one turns to look at his dominance in the home conditions, he was a phenom. His expertise wasn't just limited to the ball but also some impactful contributions with the bat.

In the white-ball format, Ashwin made 181 appearances and snatched 228 wickets. He made 116 ODI appearances and took 156 wickets at

an average of 33.20, with best figures of 4/25. He also made 707 runs at an average of 16.44, with one fifty, a knock of 65 in 63 innings. He is the 13th-highest wicket-taker in ODIs for India.

In 65 T20Is, he took 72 wickets at an average of 23.22. His best figures are 4/8. He also scored 184 runs in 19 innings at an average of 26.28, with best score of 31. He is the sixth-highest wicket-taker for India in T20Is.

With 765 scalps in 287 matches, he is India's second-highest wicket-taker across all formats, next to Kumble (953). He also won the 2011 50-Over World Cup and 2013 Champions Trophy with India.

McSweeney dropped, Konstas called up for Boxing Day Tests

MELBOURNE (TIP)

Teenage sensation Sam Konstas was handed a maiden call up as Australia on Friday dropped rookie opener Nathan McSweeney for the final two Test matches of the Border-Gavaskar Trophy against India.

The 19-year-old is set to become Australia's youngest Test batting debutant in over 70 years.

If Konstas, who turned 19 on October 2, is selected in the playing XI in the Boxing Day Test, he would become Australia's youngest Test debutant since captain Pat Cummins, who was 18 years and 193 days old when he made his debut against South Africa in Johannesburg in 2011. The teenager would also become the youngest specialist batter to debut for Australia since Ian Craig when he played against South Africa at the MCG in 1953 aged 17 years 239 days.

Konstas's inclusion follows a series of disappointing performances from the Australian top order in the first three Tests especially McSweeney.

The 25-year-old, who made his Test debut in the series-opener in Perth, failed to score a single half century and could only manage scores of 10, 0, 39, 10 not out, 9 and 4 in his six innings and was dismissed by

Indian pace Jasprit Bumrah spearhead four times.

Konstas had been in the reckoning to partner experienced Usman Khawaja after grabbing the attention of Cricket Australia's selection committee following his twin Sheffield Shield centuries for New South Wales.

He had scored an unbeaten 73 at the MCG against India A while notching up a ton (107) in the Prime

Ministers XI pink ball game against India in Canberra.

"Sam gets a call up to the Test squad for the first time. His style of batting offers a point of difference and we look forward to watching his game develop further," Australian Chair of Selectors George Bailey said.

"We remain confident Nathan has the ability and temperament to succeed at Test level in the future. It was a difficult decision to leave him out.

"It has clearly been a challenge at the top of the order for batters throughout the series and we want to provide the option of a different line up for the next two matches," he added.

Konstas's inclusion follows a warning from former pacer Merv Hughes, who cautioned selectors against making any changes to the batting lineup for the Boxing Day Test.

The former selector said it would have been a "panic call" move from Australia to add Konstas in the squad.

"Now it would almost be a panic call to me... Just stay calm. They drew the last Test. The last two Tests have been a draw and a win, so what is there to panic about," Hughes had told 'The Courier Mail'.

Konstas had said earlier this week, "It would be a dream come true (playing the Boxing Day Test)."
